Drop-off day is scheduled

The Middlesex County Division of Solid Waste Management has announced its Spring Household Hazardous Waste Drop-Off Day.

The drop-off will be held at three locations on different days: March 18 at the Middlesex County Division of Highways, 750 Jernee Mill Road in Sayreville, April 15 at the Middlesex County Division of Highways on Apple Orchard Lane off of Rt. 130 in North Brunswick, and May 21 at the Middlesex County College of Edison near the Mill Road entrance.

All collection times are 8 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Household hazardous wastes that are improperly disposed of are identified as a danger to children and animals, a potential cause of ground water and other environmental pollution and a potential threat to garbage collection crews.

Acceptable materials which county residents can bring to the events for disposal include but are not limited to: pesticides-herbicides, flammable liquids, solvents, pool chemicals, used motor oil, oil filters, paints, car batteries, household batteries, anti-freeze, propane tanks, fluorescent light bulbs (no broken bulbs) and asbestos.

Residents wishing to bring asbestos must pre-register by calling the division, and can only bring up to a maximum of 300 pounds.

Materials that residents must not bring and will not be accepted at the drop-off days are tires, electronics, explosives, and munitions, infectious waste, unknown materials and empty containers. Residents with tires and electronics can contact the division for information regarding separate recycling programs.

The drop-off days are sponsored by the Middlesex County Board of Chosen Freeholders and conducted in cooperation with the Middlesex County Department of Public Works, the Division of Highways, and Middlesex County College. The events are open to residents of Middlesex County only and are free of charge. Items should be brought in clearly marked containers.

Freeholders OK '06 county budget

The Middlesex County Board of Chosen Freeholders has adopted the \$343.56 million 2006 county operating budget that reduces the equalized county property tax rate by 2.1 cents per \$100 of equalized value.

"This is the 13th consecutive year that the Middlesex County Board of Chosen Freeholders has reduced the equalized county property tax rate with no corresponding reduction in the quality or quantity of services offered," said Freeholder Director David B. Crabel, chairman of the county Administration and Finance Committee.

He added that Middlesex County is probably the first county in the state to adopt its budget.

"The budget reflects the continuing goals of the Middlesex County Board of Chosen Freeholders to maintain the very highest level of county services to our residents, while at the same time minimizing the impact on the property taxpayers of the county," Crabel said.

The 2006 budget was formally adopted in a special meeting of the freeholders Feb. 15. This budget includes a net tax levy of \$239.228 million, which is \$23.896 million less than what would be permitted by the state's cap law.

Crabel said the county continues to maintain a AAA bond rating from Standard & Poor's and a Aa1 rating from Moody's Investors Service.

In order to enhance its financial position, in addition to reducing the equalized county property tax rate, Middlesex County has also increased its level of retained surplus by \$522,418 to a historic high of \$15.083 million in 2006.

Crabel said the county will continue its efforts to reduce the size of county government by eliminating non-essential positions, which become vacant during 2006, through attrition and not

through layoffs.

"If we implement this plan," he said, "we will fill essential positions as vacancies occur."

"The county will monitor each and every county position in a continuing effort to reduce the costs of the county workforce and to increase the resultant savings, which will be passed on to county property taxpayers."

"On a personal note, it is my personal goal to reduce the number of Middlesex County public employees by 50 or 2.38 percent," Crabel said. "The employee workforce would drop from 2,097 to 2,047 by year's end."

Evening easy on eyes, palette

Art association opens its gallery for wine tasting

BEDMINSTER — For one night only, people didn't have to travel far and wide to sample some unique art and wine.

The Somerset Art Association held its third annual wine tasting event on Feb. 25 to benefit the nonprofit art association. Wine and art enthusiasts had the opportunity to walk around and sample over 80 different kinds of wines and peruse through the association's display of approximately 45 different art pieces.

The event, titled "Bouquet," was a floral theme to represent the term used to describe the fragrance that develops in wine over time. Various techniques were represented in the art pieces, including watercolor, pastel, oil and photography. The artwork tied in with the theme of the event and had a floral theme.

Chris Cree, master of wine and owner of 56 Degree Wine in Bernardsville, said he felt that art and wine are a good combination.

"It's a nice match," he said. "Art and wine just sort of go together."

Guests were greeted by the sounds of piano, featuring Annette Tsang Hu and Ken Smith, owner of The Pianomsmith in Somerville. They then spent the evening walking up and down the stairs, from one room to the next, with a glass in hand seeking out the next table of wine, being sure to check out the artwork on display on the way. The atmosphere was relaxed, with dim lights and candles on the scattered tables, and the Larry Adabo Jazz Duo entertained guests as they socialized.

Susanne Christie of Bedminster said it was a nice way to spend a Saturday evening, adding she didn't realize how many different kinds of wines exist.

"I'm an art lover and I happen to like wine," she said. "And there's a lot of wine out there that I'll never get to taste because I'll never live long enough."

Cree has been in the wine industry for over 25 years and believes that the best wines reflect the soil, climate, people and traditions of the places where the grapes are grown. He said his business focuses on

HIGHLAND PARK Gateway earns national praise

HIGHLAND PARK — The gateway into Highland Park on Raritan Avenue welcomes thousands of motorists every day.

Now an international magazine will be showcasing this entry from New Brunswick to millions of people by publishing renderings of the borough's new signage on its Web site.

The new signs are to be installed this spring in the borough's Centennial Park at the base of the Albany Street Bridge, which spans the Raritan River in Middlesex County. *Communication Arts*, a professional journal covering visual communications, selected the new Highland Park signage on its Exhibit On-line page, a special section of its Web site featuring cutting-edge concepts in advertising and design.

The design is available for viewing at www.communicationarts.com/2006/04/01/highland-park/ through early April. It will then be stored on the publication's archive page, which is located at www.communicationarts.com/CA/exhibit/archive.html.

"After culling through hundreds of projects, the editorial staff at *Communication Arts* chose the Highland Park identity as an example of creative excellence in graphic design," said Patrick Coyne, editor of *Communication Arts*, based in Menlo Park, Calif.

Mayor Meryl Frank said the magazine is recognizing the work of the many community members who came together to provide input on the new design. The effort was driven, in part, by a committee of Main Street Highland Park, which promotes and markets the downtown.

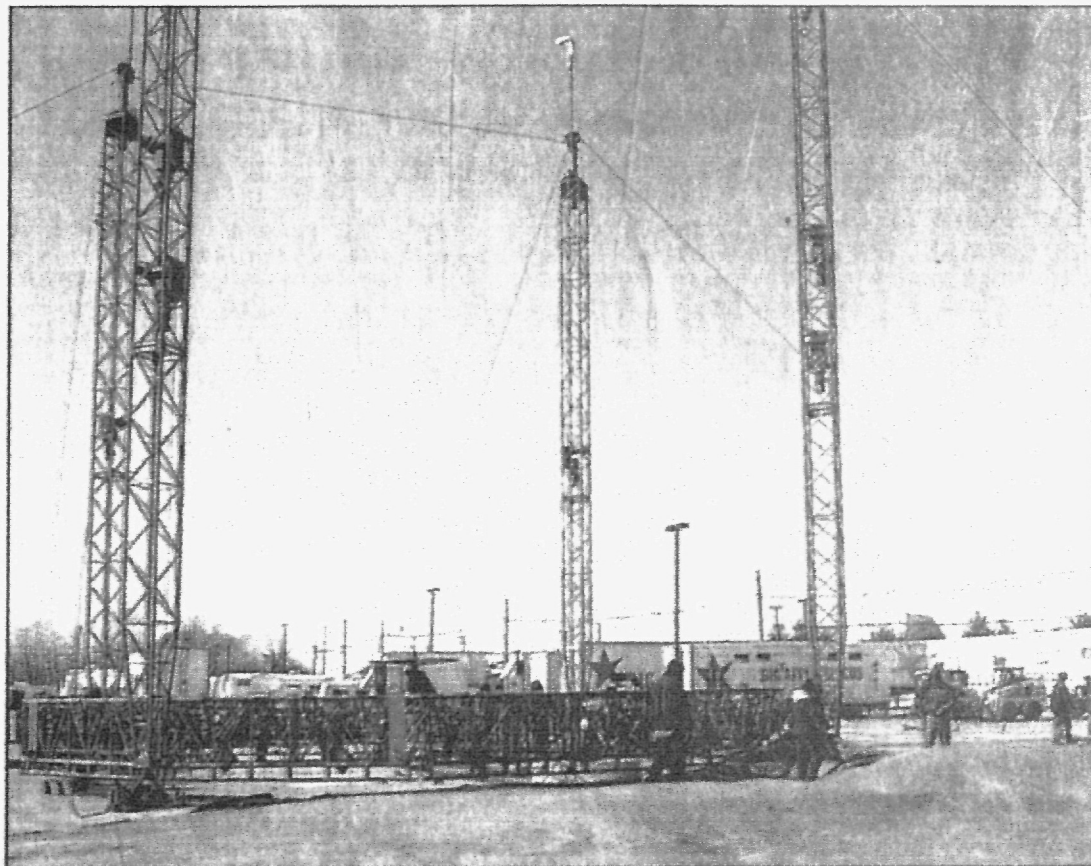
"It is an honor to have Highland Park's new identity, which we consider a work of art, posted for all the world to see," said Frank. "The layout and design of our borough's name is playful, like poetry; it will make people stop and think."

The Philadelphia-based design firm Cloud Gehshan Associates has arranged the words "Highland Park" into three lines. It depicts not only the borough's geographic location on the high land, but also the historic craftsman style of our older homes, with a contemporary flare.

small, family owned wineries that are not as well-known. "They're wines that are unique," he said. "They are typical of the place that they come from."

The event featured 10 tables with representatives from different wine distributors who supply 56 Degree Wine.

The representatives answered questions to help those in attendance learn more about the different kinds of wines that exist and which wines would suit them best.

Gary Podbielski, a representative for Winebow, said wine tastings are par for the course in his trade and looked forward to teaching people more about wine.

"We like to turn novices into budding enthusiasts and enthusiasts into connoisseurs," Podbielski said.

Podbielski has the same type of philosophy about wine as Cree and represents small, family-owned estates that control all aspects of the wine process.

"We believe that when someone puts their name, heart and soul into the wine, it comes to life," Podbielski said. "It has character."

Sylvia Le Vine of Woodcliff Lake said she attended the event to get a set of wines that she likes so that she doesn't have to take chances when ordering it.

"I didn't expect to see such a variety and breath of wines," Le Vine said.

Cree said he had hoped the event would be an opportunity for guests to try a lot of wines they never knew about and to learn more about their palette and what they like and don't like.

"I would hope people can connect to the wines," Cree said.

Cree's hopes came true, and most guests said they learned about what they liked and enjoyed tasting so many different kinds of wines.

"I've definitely learned what I like in terms of type," Jennifer Rector of Edison said.

Mike Norton of Basking Ridge said 56 Degree Wine's

philosophy on small, family-owned wineries gave him an opportunity to experience wines he may not otherwise experience. "Because of the store's emphasis on small boutique wineries, you get a chance to access wines you normally wouldn't be able to," Norton said.

In addition to the wine and artwork that were available for purchase, guests also had the opportunity to purchase tickets for a chance to win a gift basket that was raffled off.

The basket contained a bottle of wine, a weekend overnight stay and breakfast donated by the Bridgewater Marriott Hotel, two tickets to the 2007 wine tasting event, as well as other various wine-themed items.

Robin Tromer of the Somerset Art Association said 30 percent of the proceeds will be donated to the association and 70 percent of the proceeds from the art pieces will go to the artists. The art association uses the donations for future exhibits, workshops and classes.

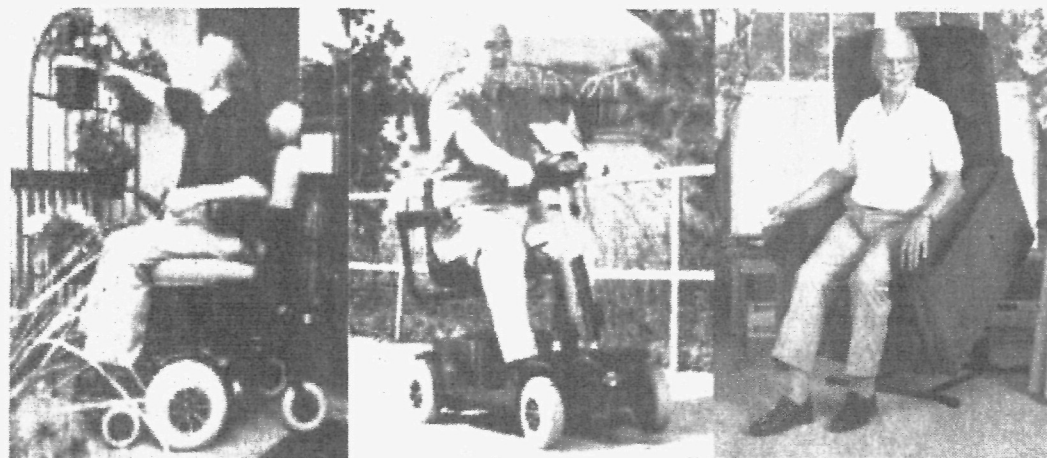

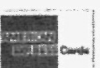

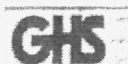

Finding a little faith

God, Buddha and Mohammad are all finding it a little harder to fit in here in Central Jersey these days.

From stone and brick edifices of old, today's "new" houses of worship are taking on a different shape — from a farmhouse to a building in town to a temple surrounded by trees. Blending traditional visions of what a house of worship was and what it has become has, of late, become the task of lawyers and judges.

Let's face it: It costs a lot of money to start a new congregation. Particularly one not connected with faiths that have established in the United States for a long time. While there have been a few large Hindu temples built and Mosques established, in many communities the creation of a new Christian church or Buddhist temple takes place on a small scale. And, because many of these houses of worship quickly attract a large following, what begins in a rented store front or house often blossoms and pushes that space to the limit. And that's where the trouble comes in.

Take Church of the Hills in Bedminster. For many years the church and the township have battled over plans to expand the facility to meet the needs of a growing congregation. The

church filed suit over the township's denial of the plans, and on Friday a federal judge denied four out of five counts in Bedminster's motion to dismiss the church's lawsuit. At the heart of the matter is a municipality's place in having a say on how a religious center operates — and its impact on the community — and that congregation's rights to grow and prosper. It is a question that encompasses constitutional law, religious freedoms and the rights of those living nearby.

It's also a question that is difficult enough for those familiar with constitutional law to tackle, as seen in the judge's 24-page decision, and one that is nearly impossible for a zoning board or planning board to be burdened with. In the end, many times these boards can only go by land use law, which almost guarantees a court hearing. Costs mount as the case makes its way through the system — often to the U.S. Supreme Court, where it almost always ends in favor of the house of worship. A simpler system could exist.

The time has come for New Jersey to create new standards for those seeking to open or build a house of worship, one that answers many of these questions before the lawyers and judges take charge.

Residents are urged to attend hearing

To The Editor:

Two newspaper articles covering the controversy between residents and developers before the Bridgewater Board of Adjustment remind us of the pressures on the township to succumb to developers and of the costs to residents. The controversy is also reminiscent of past pressures and broken campaign promises to control development.

According to Steven Scharf, director of development, Briard Group, "We've crunched all of the numbers and decided this is where we want to be." The problem is that Briard not only wants the right to build in Bridgewater but also to dictate the terms. It is asking for permission to shoe-horn two four-story hotels on a 13.4-acre property on Route 22 East, overriding existing zoning that is restricted to

office space and a three-story height limit.

Zoning decisions and restrictions in the Master Plan have already addressed the need to balance commercial demands and quality of life issues in Bridgewater. Those decisions and restrictions were put in the Master Plan by the Planning Board and supported in township-wide open public meetings in the spring. The Board of Adjustment should hold the line against attempts to reinterpret those restrictions. Right now, neighborhood residents are leading the resistance. We urge all citizens to come to the next hearing scheduled for 7:30 p.m. March 28. Let your voices be heard.

Civilian orientation is held at police academy

Somerset County Prosecutor Wayne J. Forrest announced that the Somerset County Police Academy will be conducting an orientation for potential candidates in the Basic Police Recruit Alternate Route Program.

The program allows civilians to enter police recruit training on their own without first being employed by a municipal police department or Sheriff's Department.

Orientation is at 7 p.m. Monday at the Somerset County Police Academy, located at Raritan Valley Community College in Branchburg.

In 1993, the Somerset County

Police Academy was the first academy in the state to offer such a program. The Somerset County Police Academy's Basic Police Alternate Route Program is certified by the New Jersey Police Training Commission.

Candidates who are selected are enrolled directly into the 24-week training cycle at the Police Academy.

During the training process, recruits are taught in over 120 subjects to include: Police Professionalism; Criminal Justice Systems; Criminal Law; Arrest, Search and Seizure; Communications; Emergency Driving; Emergency Medical Training; Firearms; Self-Defense; Patrol Practices; Motor Vehicle Law; Accident Investigation; Criminal Investigation; and Physical

Fitness. In addition, each graduate is certified by the U.S. Department of Justice as a Community Policing Officer.

The Somerset County Police Academy is the only academy in the nation to offer this certification during basic training.

Since its inception in 1987, the Somerset County Police Academy developed a reputation for providing quality training in all topical areas. Over 1,300 police recruits have been trained at the academy and over 22,000 individuals have been trained in a variety of law enforcement continuing education related topics. The Police Academy is operated by the Somerset County Prosecutor's Office in conjunction with Raritan Valley Community College and law enforcement authorities in Hunterdon,

Somerset and Warren counties. Scholarships are available for those individuals with economic need.

All candidates must be a Somerset, Hunterdon, Middlesex or Warren county resident upon the opening of the academy class in June, have at least 60 college credits from an accredited college or university, as recognized by Raritan Valley Community College, or have two years of full time active military duty or a combination of college and military that equals two years, no criminal record, be at least 18 years of age and a citizen of the United States, possess a valid New Jersey driver's license, have a good driving record and be in good physical condition.

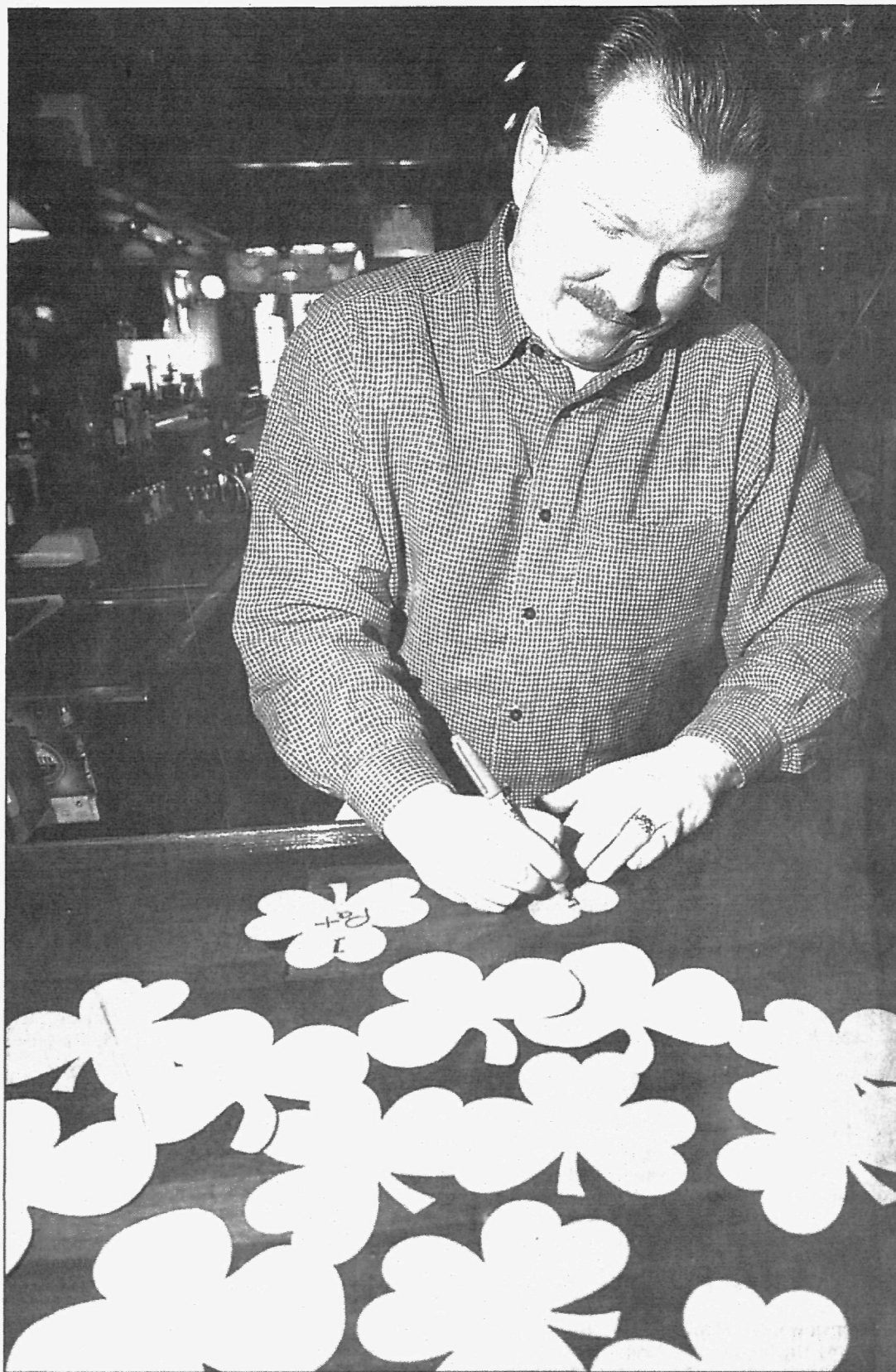

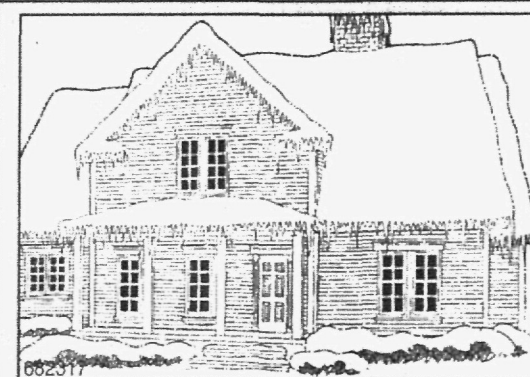

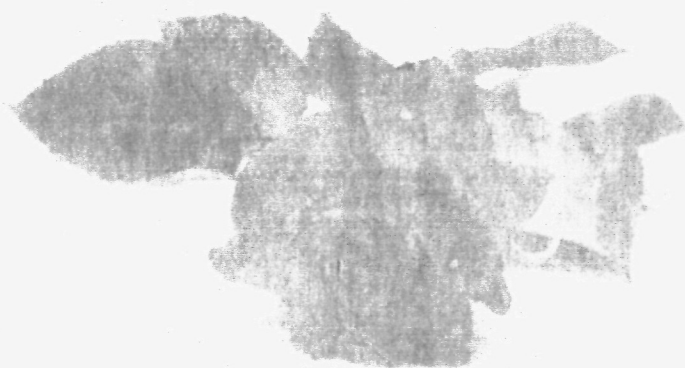

'Tattoo You'

Rolling stone ready to settle down

Body art earns 'Stiggy' place in Guinness Book of World Records

He took a drag on his first Lucky Strike when he was 9, and sat for his first tattoo when he was 13.

Two heart attacks convinced him to quit smoking by the time he was 40, but he never quit sitting for tattoos.

He rattles off the names of the world's best tattoo artists like a fan reciting the names of his sports heroes.

The artists, Stiggy says, all wanted a piece of him.

There was plenty to go around — arms, legs, back, chest, wrists, thighs, buttocks, calves, ankles, insteps and toes — enough room for 5,555 tattoos and enough to earn him an entry in the Guinness Book of World Records.

Now 68, and in failing health, it's been years since Walter Stiglitz has been jabbed or done the jabbing. A stroke last year really slowed him down; had that not happened, chances are he'd still be mixing inks and practicing his art form at his North Plainfield, N.J. tattoo parlor.

A legend in the world of tattoos and tattoo art, he was smoking five or six packs a day as a teenager, buying three cartons a week from wages earned as a painter and truck driver.

He also invested heavily in tattoos.

"Tattoo Stiggy" as he was known was something of a celebrity during his 14-year reign as the Guinness poster boy for body art, making television appearances and working the radio circuit. A wall poster showing him in his prime in 1987 hung on the wall in the back room of the tattoo shop, his body covered by a complex convergence of curves, swirls, figures, gargoyles, snakes and other designs.

The last tattoo — number 5,555 — is on his derriere.

"You know, the end," he jokes.

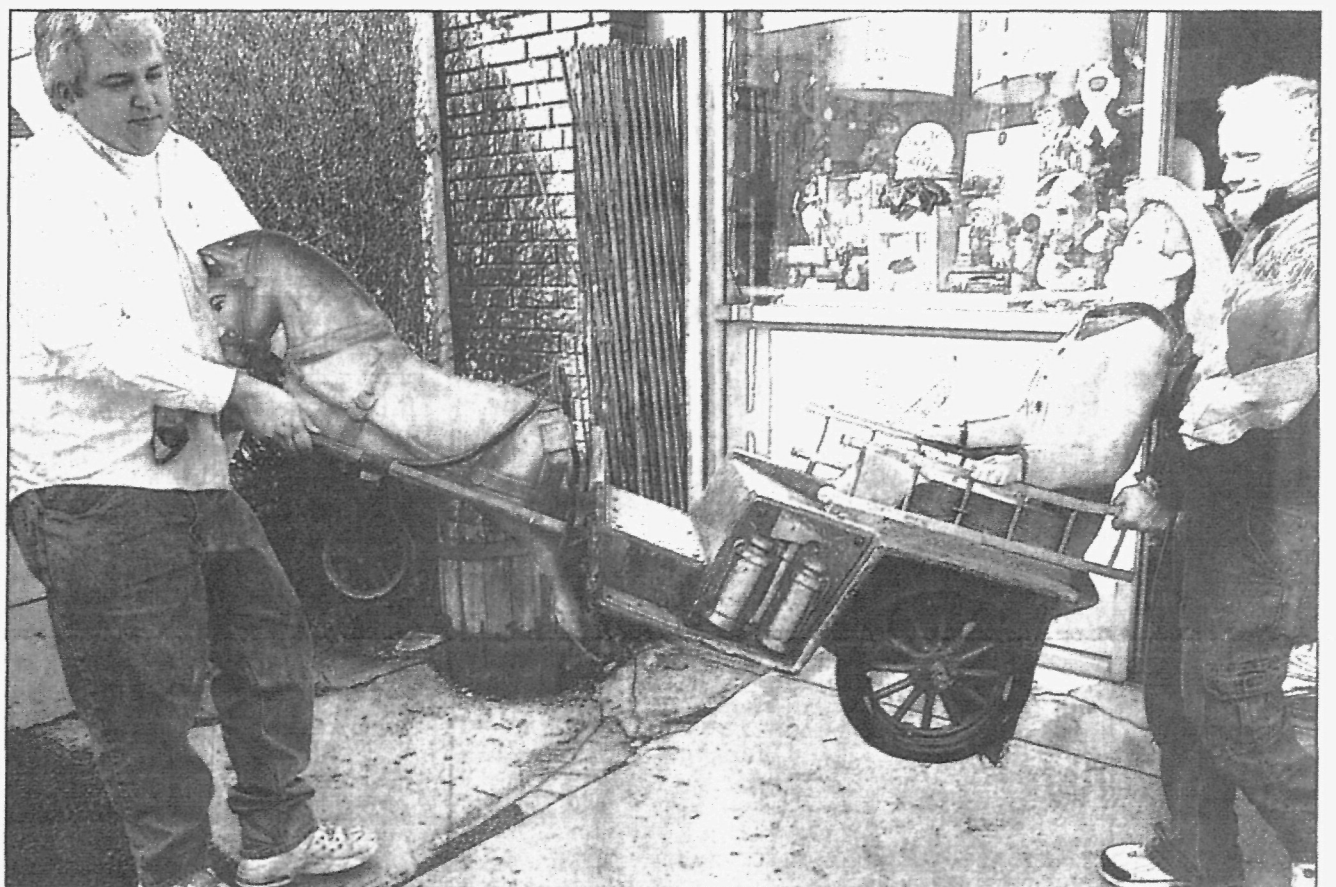
After the stroke last year, his daughter convinced him it was time to pack it in, and contacted Central Jersey auctioneer Joe Bodnar to see whether there'd be any interest in the contents of Stiggy's tattoo parlor. In particular, she mentioned a 1950s mechanical riding horse, and a 1960s fire engine mechanical amusement ride. That was enough for Bodnar to schedule a visit, but not before Stiggy emptied out a few items to take home to his apartment.

Stiggy's collection of flea market finds, toys, carnival rides, tattoo art and other oddities will be sold by Bodnar next Thursday during his monthly auction at the Ukrainian Cultural Center in Franklin.

"Originally we were only going there for the mechanical horse and the carousel fire engine, but when we walked in and saw everything, I said to him 'We'll take it all,'" Bodnar said. "I'm looking here, looking there, it was like walking into a carnival, like I was at Great Adventure or the boardwalk."

The two rooms that make up Stiggy's tattoo parlor were crammed floor to ceiling with everything from a stuffed toy gorilla and disco floor dance ball to a Texas Longhorn skull — purchased in Mexico — 1950s pin-ups and a beat-up Koken barber chair that Stiggy sat in as a kid at a Newark barber shop to have his hair cut.

He bought the chair from the son's owner when the shop closed, and used it for his customers when he was working on their tattoos.

The fixtures in the shop were old school, some pretty rugged stuff — Stiggy mixed his own inks.

In the front room were scores of three ring binders and books containing tens of thousands of tattoo art swatches and patches for customers to browse through.

All of the tattoo art will be sold, as will a WWII Civil Defense helmet worn by his father during air raid drills.

Bodnar unearthed a real prize in the back room, a plastic Elvis Presley toy guitar still sealed in its original packing, dating from the 1960s.

The auctioneer expects at least one bidder will make a strong play for the toy guitar.

"About a week before we went to the tattoo parlor, I had picked up another toy collection from a consignor, a big toy collector, and he actually told me that he had always wanted that Presley guitar," Bodnar explained. "He told me he had tried to buy one recently, but someone



beat him to it, and there it is, a week later, a guitar just like the one he wanted."

Stiggy's collection is just the beginning.

Bodnar has been accumulating a wide selection of toys the past 4 months, over 1,000 lots including battery-operated robots, cars and trucks; action figures, dolls and trains.
