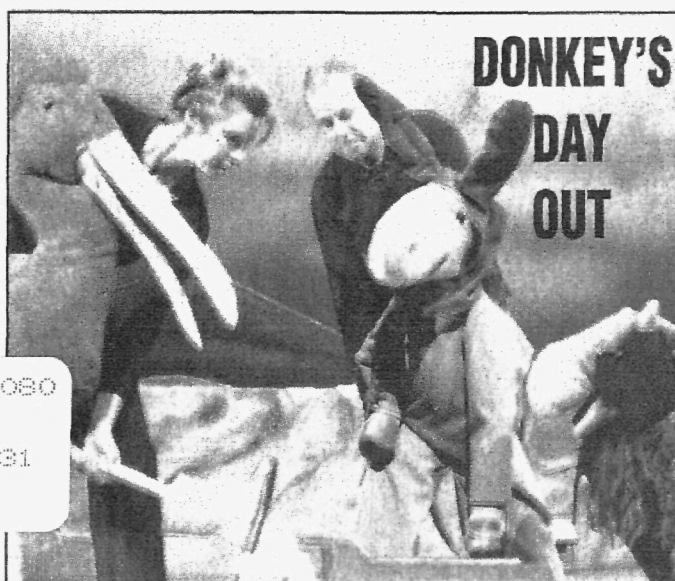




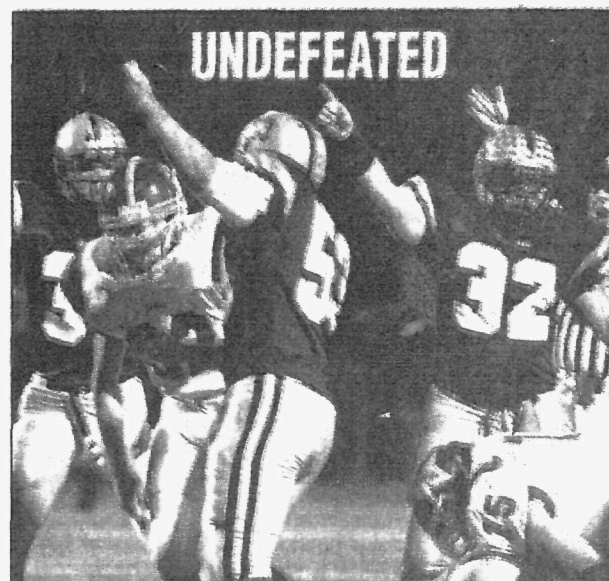

### Red Mass is tomorrow

PISCATAWAY — The Diocese of Metuchen holds its second annual Red Mass at 10:30 a.m. tomorrow at Immaculate Conception Roman Catholic Church, 35 Mountain Ave., Somerville.

The Red Mass was reinstated by Bishop Paul Boockkoski last year to honor those in the judicial system and legal profession.

## Superfund site proposals are expected

BRIDGEWATER — The township had yet to receive proposals from engineers by press time Tuesday in response to a request for services pertaining to the former American Cyanamid site.

However, Township Engineer Robert Bogart said that is not unusual.

"They usually come in at the eleventh hour," said Bogart, who noted that proposals were expected to be turned in yesterday. "Many times, they hand deliver them."

The township is seeking a consultant or consulting firm to develop a document outlining the remediation

scope of the site that is currently owned by the Wyeth Holding Corporation and an analysis determining the best end use for the land. Proposals were due to the township by yesterday and at its Nov. 20 meeting, the township council is expected to select the consultant or consulting firm to complete the report.

"The council needs an independent consultant's evaluations of its options based on Wyeth's request," Township Administrator James Naples said.

The property, about 535 acres bound by Main Street to the north, the Raritan River to the south, Interstate 287 to the east and the Raritan River to the west, was used

for numerous chemical and pharmaceutical manufacturing operations for 75 years by American Cyanamid. Production at the site stopped in 1999 and plant buildings were demolished in 2000.

The property was designated a Superfund site in 1982 and Wyeth took control of the land and remediation in 1994.

Remediation of the site is on hold as the state Department of Environmental Protection completes a feasibility study on how to best clean up the property at the request of Wyeth and its consulting firm O'Brien & Ger Engineers, Inc.

Currently, Wyeth hopes to create an 18-hole links style golf course and

wildlife preserve on the area. The township seeks its own independent consulting firm to determine if the golf course is the best possible end use.

The report issued by the consultant will also include the status of the remediation conducted by Wyeth, options of the township with regard to the cleanup, an analysis of the benefits to and liability of the township for each potential use, an analysis of the rights of the township and obligations of Wyeth with regard to the remediation, recommended questions the township should ask Wyeth about the remediation and

## Students hope drivers will put the brakes on

DUNELLEN — Middlesex County and borough officials gathered recently with schoolchildren, parents and law enforcement personnel to expand the county's "Slow Down in Our Town" pedestrian safety program.

In an effort to combat speeding in residential neighborhoods, "Slow Down in Our Town" enlists the use of a new sign designed as part of a student contest in March. The winning design reads "Slow — Residential Zone" and depicts children, a god and a ball.

Twenty signs were to be erected in the neighborhoods surrounding Lincoln Middle School and Dunellen High School. Some 375 signs will be erected throughout the county as the program is expanded.

The campaign "is the perfect example of the county working with its residents, including the youngest among us, to effect real change," according to Freeholder H. James Polos, chairman of the

county Public Works and Transportation Committee.

"It's a program that was embraced by the schoolchildren and their parents," he said, "and one that we feel will help us protect our children. We are thrilled Dunellen has agreed to work with us and thank our municipal partners and their residents for their cooperation."

Polos joined Mayor Robert Seader and Dunellen Police Chief Gerard Cappella to unveil the first sign.

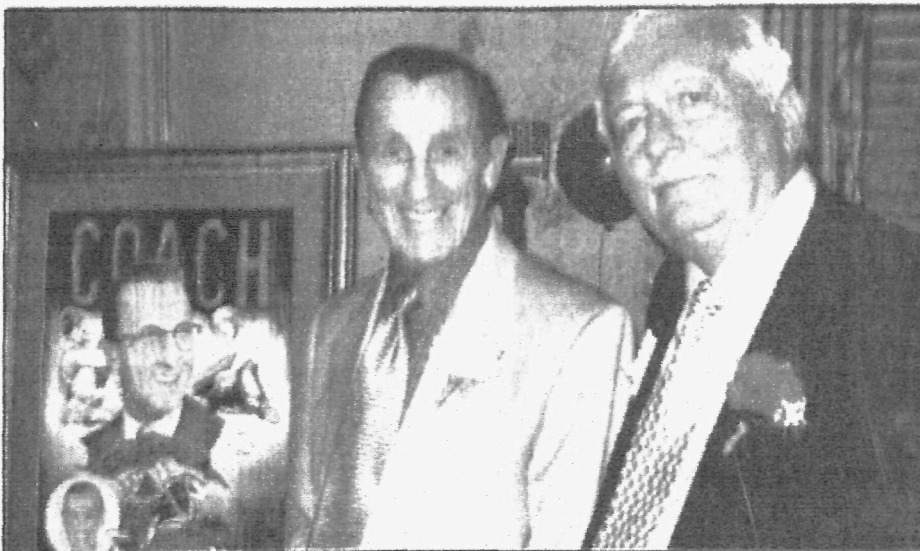
Dunellen is the second Middlesex County municipality to participate in the program. South Brunswick Township began displaying the signs in September.

Treasury in the consumer affairs area. Skillman resident Linda Spain is a film and video editor. Theresa Homisak, of Branchburg, is an attorney for Verizon Wireless and Kay Harada, of Manville, is an executive assistant and a certified public accountant.

But these individuals have a common bond — their love of singing — and share wonderful experiences — making music together.

"I remember walking out of a

concert and saying 'We made music. We didn't just sing something,'" recalled Homisak, who also plays piano. "Playing piano is solitary. Being in a choir is network minded. You share something in common and have a common experience."

Many of them have been performing since childhood and all of them joined Masterwork because it would challenge their musical abilities.

Under the direction of Maestro Andrew Megill, an associate professor at

Westminster Choir College at Rider University, the chorus has performed at Carnegie Hall, The College of St. Elizabeth, the Bergen Performing Arts Center, the Dorothy Young Center at Drew University and at many other venues.

"Carnegie was very attractive," said Homisak, explaining one of her reasons for joining the group. "Not many people can perform there as amateurs."

In addition to a fall and spring concert, the chorus per-

forms George Frideric Handel's "Messiah" annually.

In fact, the performances of "Messiah" drew Rollins to the group.

"I moved here from Chicago and I really wanted to join a community choir," he recalled. "I said to myself, 'I'd really like to sing 'Messiah.' I was in the Bridgewater Library and I saw a sign for Masterwork that they performed 'Messiah' and that was it." The choir's members range in age from 18 to 75 and together they sing in up to 12 part harmony. The broad age

range adds a sense of diversity to their performances.

"We're from all different walks of life," Muller said.

"It adds something to the song when you have a range," added Homisak. "Each one adds a richness."

At least once a week, the group comes together to rehearse. But the members also practice on their own time with the assistance of a recording.

"I sit at the piano each morning before work and practice for about 20 minutes," Homisak noted.

Performances of "Vespers" will be held at 3 p.m. tomorrow at St. Peter's Church in Morristown and at 3 p.m. Nov. 12 at Holy Trinity Roman Catholic Church in New York City. The Masterwork Chorus will perform Handel's "Messiah" 8 p.m. Dec. 15 at the Bergen Performing Arts Center in Englewood, 3 p.m. Dec. 17 at Morristown High School in Morristown and at 3 p.m. and 8 p.m. Dec. 23 at Carnegie Hall in New York City. the land and recommended actions to the township "that would insure the best possible use of the Wyeth land from an economic, environmental and recreation perspective," said the request for proposals. The township's request indicates that the report should be complete within six months from when the firm was put on the task. The fees of the consulting firm will be paid by Wyeth and the company has posted a \$40,000 escrow for the services.

The Department of Environmental Protection is expected to complete study on the cleanup by the end of the year. Over the course of the next year, the department along with the Environmental Protection Agency will review the plan, hold public hearings and issue an updated Record of Decisions or a remediation strategy. Wyeth's time line indicates that the cleanup could be complete by 2011 with redevelopment of the site slated to finish in 2012.

Wyeth's plan also includes reserving a portion of the property along the river and the wetlands for the creation a wildlife preservation area.

borough has initiated, including restricting trucks over 4 tons from roads near schools.

Cappella said the county program will enhance local law enforcement efforts, which include a radar trailer that tells drivers how fast they are traveling, and stand-up signs in the middle road that tell motorists to yield to pedestrians.

"We can't be everywhere," the chief said. "The signs will draw the attention of the driving public."

"The 'Slow Down in Our Town' program shows the county cares, we care and our residents care about the safety of our neighborhoods," he said.

Safe Kids Middlesex County and the Level One

Trauma Center at Robert Wood Johnson University Hospital, in collaboration with Polo's office, sponsored a Central Jersey forum in February 2005 to bring together members of local municipalities to discuss the issue of speeding in residential areas. From this was born a task force that developed and implemented the county "Design a Sign" contest.

The name for the county's "Slow Down in Our Town" initiative came from another entry in the student design contest. The phrase appeared on an entry submitted by Michelle Lavash, who attends Linwood Middle School in North Brunswick. She and Destiny Griggs were recognized at the unveiling on Oct. 24.

"The contest got a much bigger response than I ever thought," according to Diane Starace, who lives in

Dunellen and is coordinator of Safe Kids Middlesex County.

"This is exciting," she said. "I truly hope and believe it will help."

Starace is also the injury prevention coordinator at Robert Wood Johnson University Hospital. She learned that despite Dunellen being only 1 square mile, most children were driven to school because parents didn't feel it was safe for them to walk.

The Student Council at Lincoln Middle School fully supports the campaign, which encourages the community to be more aware of their speed when driving through Dunellen. The group will help promote the campaign to the community in a variety of ways, including raising funds to purchase additional signs for the community.

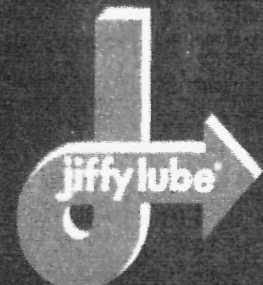

Solar rays help keep expenses at bay  
Branchburg company  
also uses panels to  
protect environment

BRANCHBURG — Rich Gorde put it best while on the roof of the Ferreira Construction Co. building. "They say you have to think outside the box," he said. "I think we're kind of standing on top of that box."

Gorde, who was literally standing in the middle of 1,276 solar panels, was talking about "going green" as a way to reduce pollution and beat high energy costs.

"The future is now," he said.

Ferreira, a leading highway, road and bridge construction company, located on Tannery Road in Branchburg, moved next door to its new 41,500-square-foot headquarters in the spring and was brought online by the end of July. Now everything, from its radiant heating system to its computers to hot water and air conditioning, can be powered entirely by solar energy, as long as the sun is shining. The system's peak capacity is around 230 kilowatts.

"Right from the get-go (Ferreira) decided to go green, and be a showcase," said Gorde, who writes the software for the building's

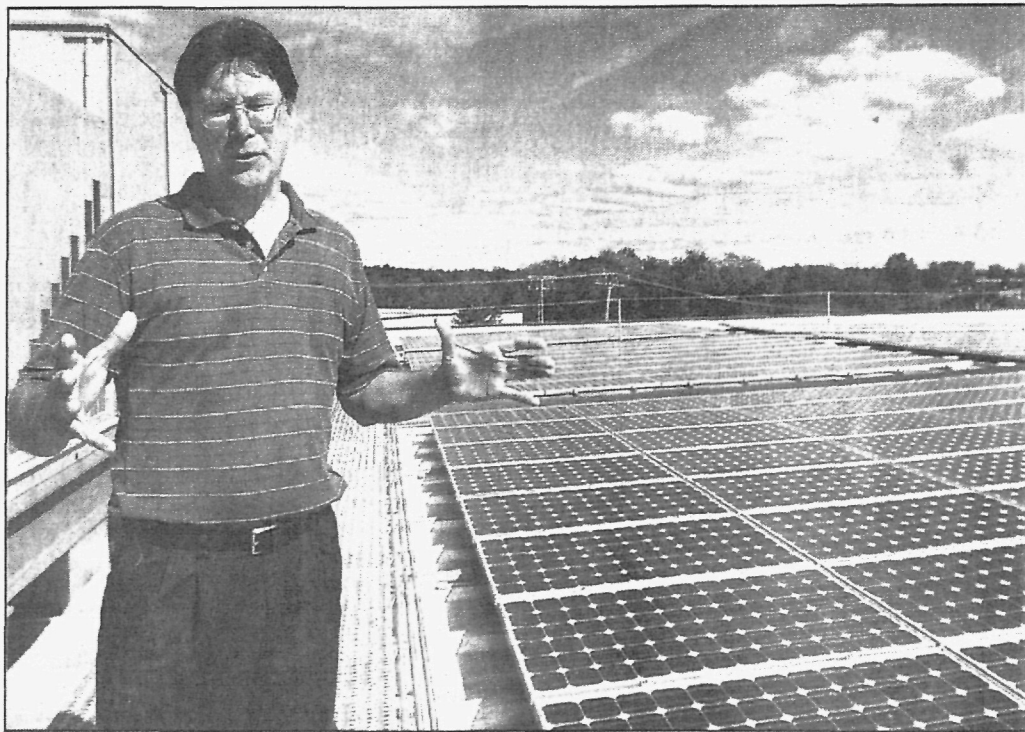
solar system. "It's like a laboratory for the future."

"This was a vision of our company president, Nelson Ferreira, to make our new corporate shop/office as energy efficient as possible and to use renewable energy," said Ed Brzezowski, director of engineering for the Ferreira Group, a Division of Ferreira Construction. Brzezowski helped make Ferreira's vision a reality.

Ferreira Construction shared this reality with the public last Saturday, serving as a host building for the nationwide 2006 Green Buildings Open House event, organized by the Northeast Sustainable Energy Association. It was an opportunity for people to visit homes and businesses and see clean, renewable energy systems at work.

Last month, with sunny blue skies and the occasional passing cloud, was an ideal time to catch the Ferreira building in action.

Inside one of building's offices, a flat-screen TV displays in real time how the solar energy is being used. A needle on the screen shows a percentage of how much the building is operating as a

"power plant" versus being a "consumer" of the national power grid.

When the needle is at a 90-degree angle, it means the building is running entirely on its own power. But, as a cloud passed over, the needle dipped slightly into the "consumer" zone, meaning it was drawing from the grid.

"That cloud," said Gorde, as he glared out a window into the sky.

A display on the screen also shows how much the electric

bill will be to power the building compared to what it would cost to power a similar-sized structure that does not use solar energy. By early afternoon, and only five days into October, it would have cost Ferreira \$628, had they not gone green. Instead, the display showed that the company was actually ahead \$120.

Brzezowski said the company anticipates saving \$68,000 per year on electricity and gas — a 65 percent reduction in the typical "large box" build-

ings found in most industrial parks. The company also estimates an "Annual Avoided Emissions" in CO2 of about 360 tons.

And because Ferreira feeds back into the grid via First Energy/JCP&L, it can sell solar renewable credits, which range in price from \$165 to \$300.

"Our energy conservation savings and performance of the solar array are exceeding our expectations," Brzezowski said.

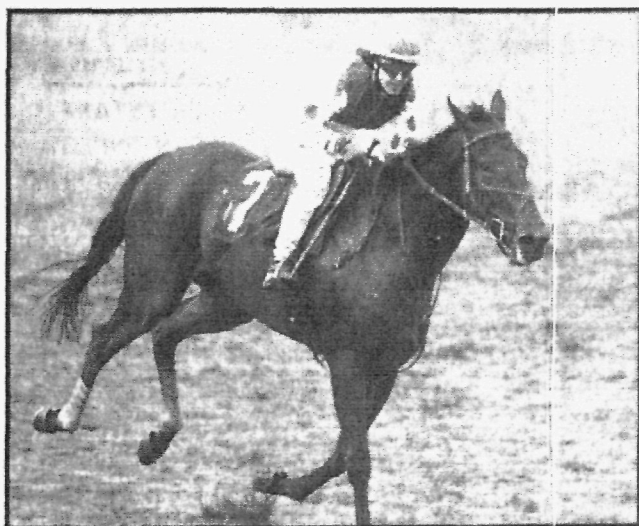
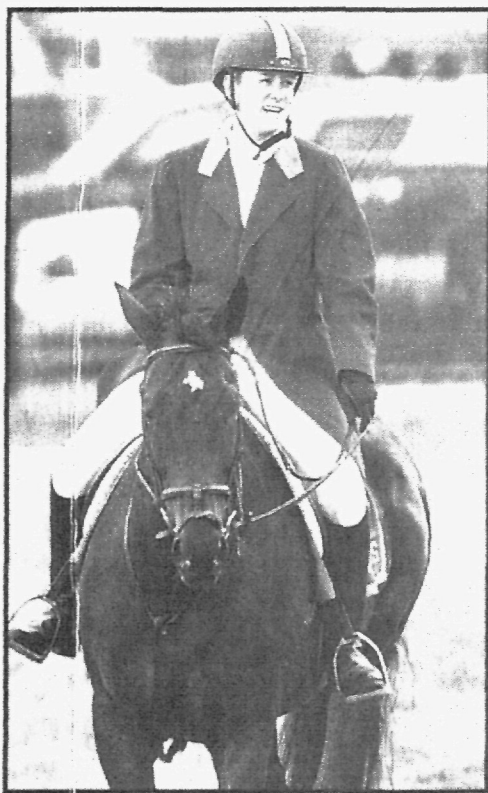

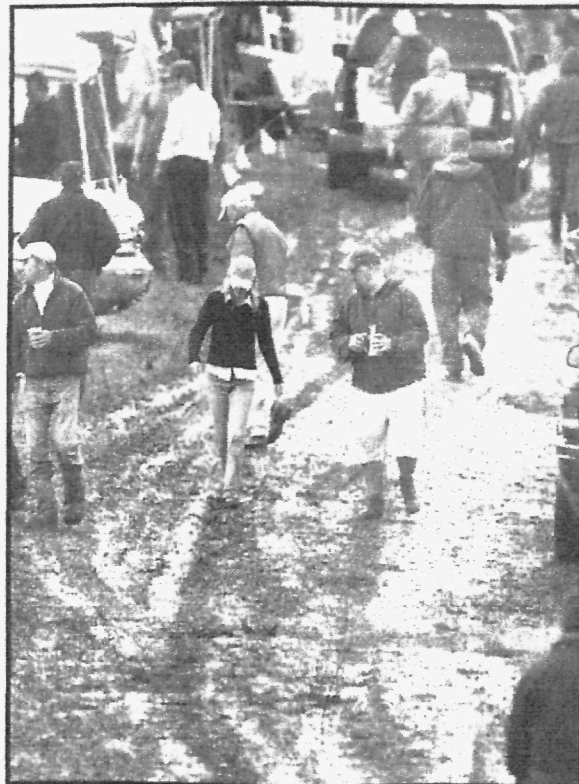

# Panthers stun Pingry in sudden death

## Caro's first career goal with :54 left delivers B-R's first outright crown

### BRIDGEWATER

Satisfaction turned into ecstasy even faster than it took for an unlikely hero to deliver the Bridgewater-Raritan High field hockey squad its first outright Somerset County Tournament championship.

On the verge of having to settle for the school's second shared SCT crown in three years, sophomore Mario Caro snapped a 1-1 deadlock with 54 seconds left in a sudden-death second overtime period to lift the Panthers to a 2-1 triumph over top-seeded and previously unbeaten Pingry (16-1) Saturday at Basillone Field.

It gave the Bridgewater-Raritan full possession of a trophy that Pingry had dominated for the previous decade, during which time the Big Blue had either won or shared the crown nine times.

For the Panthers, who played in the title match for the third straight year — tying Ridge in 2004 and falling to Pingry 1-0 a year ago — there was no better feeling than owning the hardware by themselves.

"It's amazing, absolutely amazing," said senior Alicia Perrine, the team's top scorer this year. "Really, I don't have the all the words to describe the feeling, but it's a great honor to be county champion. When Maria scored, it took be a few seconds to realize what had happened."

"Both teams were so tired and had played so hard that it would be acceptable to share the title. Pingry is just an amazing team and they were undefeated coming in, so to tie them would have been OK. Winning the game is just unbelievable."

"It's an amazing feeling," echoed senior Lauren Fabrizio, who scored the Panthers' first goal. "All the hard work we put in paid off. It just feels great. Our team has worked so hard to get here, and to finally win it is great."

In a tightly-contested and well-played match that saw the tournament's top two seeds score less a minute apart in the second half before going to overtime, the Panthers produced the unanswerable goal when Alyssa Dragon cleared the ball to midfield and Caro took it the rest of the way.

Caro started on defense and played through-out regulation and the first extra session, but she was on the bench to start the second overtime. Head Coach Kathie DeBonis, however, put Caro back in at midfield with about three minutes left, and all Caro did was score the first goal of her career.

"She plays defense for us, and is basically a defense-oriented player, but when you get into an overtime situation and you're seven on seven

you want your most versatile players on the field," the coach said. "Maria had fresh legs because she had just been subbed in two minutes before."

"I think Alyssa Dragon's ability to transition from defense to offense really set the play up. We just got down to the circle with numerical superiority much quicker than Pingry, and that's the name of the game. Maria picked a great time to get her first goal."

For DeBonis, who watched her club win for the 14th straight time and improve to 17-1-1 for the campaign, the winning goal came immediately after a dangerous situation at the Panther defensive end, so initially there was a sense of relief before the joy set in.

"In overtime it was going back and forth and back and forth," she said. "We had had some good opportunities, maybe a couple more than Pingry, but (in the final minute) I was just thankful I was out of our defensive end. I really wasn't thinking about scoring. We were 54 seconds away from sharing it again."

"I mean I wanted to win the game of course, but at that particular moment I just wanted to see the ball cleared out of our end. I think our speed was something that really helped us during the game. Our quickness and having some fresh legs on the field really were the difference on the winning goal."

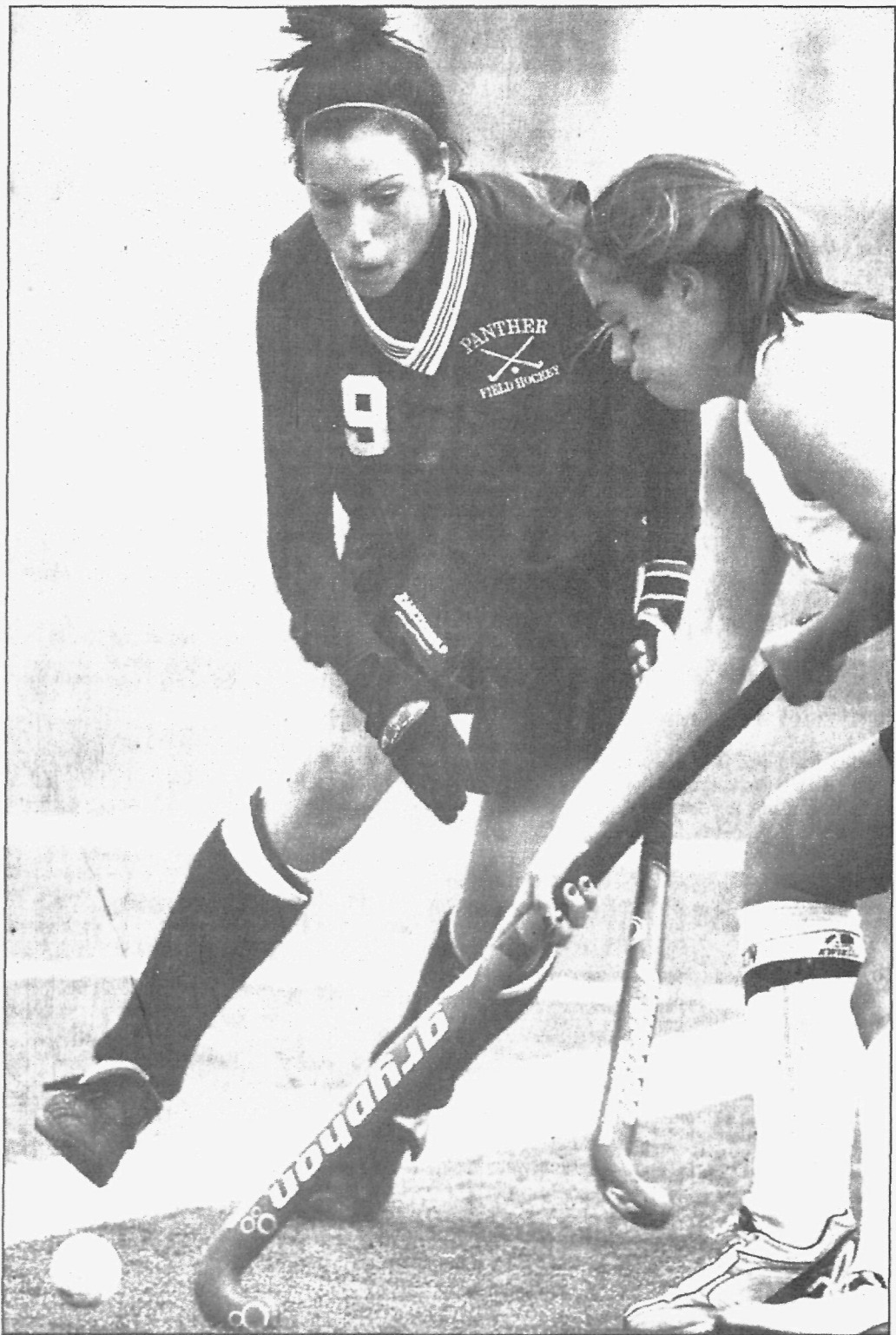
Caro took the ball in, got off a shot and then rebounded her miss off a scramble with a hard shot past Pingry goalie Cameron Lan (6 saves) to win it.

"We love Maria for it," Perrine said. "Who expects a sophomore to step up and score the winning goal like that. I play with her on my club team, and she's really a good player, but no one expected her to score there. Being that it's her first goal makes it all that more special. I'm very happy for her."

Perrine, who has connected 13 times this fall, knows something about scoring in clutch situations having scored the only Bridgewater goal when the Panthers shared the title with Ridge two years ago.

Caro's goal set off a celebration that included those all those on the sideline, among them senior Katie Kendal, who had to watch and root for her teammates after having a knee injury derail her final season.

"It's been a rough year for me," she said. "As a senior not to play in the county final (after playing in the past two) was pretty tough, but watching my teammates win was great. It was very exciting. When Maria scored I jumped up and limped over to the pile to join the celebration."

# Spartans rips Voorhees

### BRIDGEWATER

Seemingly driven by the lack of significant motivation, the Immaculata High football squad wiped out another division rival Friday night.

Already having clinched its first Skyland Conference Delaware West title, the Spartans nevertheless wanted to punctuate it with a division sweep, and after they bolted to a 34-0 halftime lead, it became a reality as they thumped Voorhees 37-6 to improve to 8-0 on the season at Bridgewater-Raritan High's Basillone Field.

Last fall, Immaculata narrowly missed winning the division as a 7-6 setback to Warren Hills cost it the crown. This season, the Spartans left no doubt as to their dominance in the Delaware West as they outscored their five opponents 166-29.

Against Voorhees, a club many felt would be the major road block to this season's championship, Immaculata just wanted to finish its business.

"I'm a little surprised we were up 34-0 at halftime, but I think we came out fired up," said A.J. Albert, who scored twice. "I think we came out fired up because no one thought we would."

"We're pretty set on having an undefeated season, and we wanted to make sure there was no doubt at all in winning the division outright. One of our main goals since the end of last year was to go undefeated in the conference. Everybody was upset when it didn't happen last year."

Quarterback Frank DeNick, who threw for a season-high 128 yards and a touchdown despite the wet and rainy conditions, agreed.

"There's no shortage of motivation in the locker room," he said. "Going undefeated in the division was the goal. Every year we look to have a good season. When we came into the conference, a lot of people didn't think we could compete, and we want to prove them wrong."

And playing as dominant a first half as they've put togeth-

er all season, the Spartans showed they're clearly the best in the division.

"We wanted to win the league outright and go undefeated. We didn't want to back into it," Head Coach Pierce Frauenheim said. "We've had a very good year, and last year, too, was very good with only the one-point loss to Warren Hills. I think this year's team can compete with anyone in the state."

You're not likely to get much of an argument from Voorhees, who had lost four straight decisions, but none by more than seven points. In this one, however, the Vikings (2-5) never had a chance.

Following a dropped pass on its first possession that led to a punt, Immaculata scored the next five times it had the ball before halftime and added a defensive score along the way.

The Spartans took advantage of great field position throughout the opening half, thanks to a defense that held Voorhees to 10 total yards and forced three turnovers.

"The kids played very well in the first half, and the starting offense only played one series in the third quarter," Frauenheim said. "I was surprised we had such a big lead at halftime. They played us tough in the second half last year, so I thought it would be closer."

"Frank (DeNick) threw the ball very well. He had at least two, maybe three drops. He was right on target all game. He did a great job. We came out throwing. It was a decision made for us because Voorhees came out with 11 men within 5 yards of the line of scrimmage."

While the running game didn't approach the normal production of more than 250 yards as it finished with 140 (Albert 8 carries for 55), DeNick came through by completing 6 of 12 attempts and could have easily been 9 of 12 for more than 200 yards.

On the first play of the game,

Brad McAdam had a long pass go through his arms, although he later made up for that with a 41-yard reception to set up a score and returned an interception for a touchdown.

After that punt on its first possession, the Spartans built a 21-0 lead by the first quarter's close. A fumble recovered by John Zetterstrom at the Voorhees 29 set up a three-play drive capped by Albert's 15-yard run with 2:51 gone in the game.

Taking over at midfield following a Viking punt, Immaculata traveled the 50 yards in three plays once again with McAdam's 41-yard reception setting up Albert for a 1-yard plunge. McAdam then caught the conversion pass from DeNick for 14-0 advantage with 5:31 left in the session.

Just 51 seconds later McAdam intercepted Matt Bologna and brought it back 35 yards. Mike Brownnett's first PAT and first of 11 points made it 21-0.

With 11:05 left in the half Brownnett booted a 24-yard field goal after an eight-play march from the Spartans' 45 stalled. Riddick set up the next score with an interception at the Viking 41 and three passes later — 17- and 14-yard receptions by T.J. Fabiano and Riddick's 10-yard TD grab with 9:06 left before halftime — and Immaculata was in the end zone again.

# Pioneers waste opportunity

MONTGOMERY — With a first-half performance as dreary as the weather, the Somerville High football squad picked a bad time to have an off night.

Falling behind 28-7 at halftime against a team that admittedly playing its best game of the year, the Pioneers found Montgomery too much to handle Friday night and dropped a 34-21 Skyland Conference crossover verdict to put their playoffs hopes in serious jeopardy.

Playing in the rain on the Cougars artificial turf field, Somerville came out flat against a team that entered the game with a 2-4 record and the Pioneers could not defend Montgomery quarterback Kevin Watson, who threw for 311 yards and two scores.

But it was Watson's legs that hurt Somerville early and it failed to recover until the third quarter, and by that time the Cougars had control.

"On the first play of the game their quarterback keeps the ball and goes 62 yards down to the 7. I don't know if that kid had 62 yards for the season before that," Head Coach Kevin Carty said. "It started off like that and it stayed like that until halftime."

pened. We just weren't ready to play I guess. (Montgomery) came out ready and they executed. By the time we woke up it was the third quarter, and by then it was too little, too late."

First, Watson and end Chris Garcia hooked up on a 69-

yard scoring play right after the kickoff to take the lead for good before the end of the first quarter, and Watson combined with his brother Steve on a 39-yard TD pass in the second period. Treichler finished off the surge with a 1-yard run to cap another drive as Montgomery opened its 28-7 advantage.

Following the halftime break, Somerville did come out and show considerable life, first with a 70-yard march in 10 plays finished off by Mason Robinson's 1-yard run, and then when it stopped a Cougar drive at its 1.

A couple of plays later, Mason Robinson found Dan Cuzzo on a halfback pass, and Cuzzo turned the catch-and-run into a 91-yard touchdown play to pull the Pioneers to within a touchdown with more than a quarter to play. Somerville, however, could get no closer.

# Radmonovich selected to BAAIL team

BRIDGEWATER — Somerset Patriots veteran rightfielder Ryan Radmanovich, who led the Atlantic League of Professional Baseball in home runs this season, has been named to Baseball America's All-Independent Leagues Team.

The 35-year-old Radmanovich, a lefthanded hitter, belted 27 homers despite missing three weeks of the season in the late summer to represent Team Canada in an Olympic qualifying event in Cuba. A year ago he and third baseman Jeff Nettles hit 28 homers

each to set a team record. Radmanovich led the ALPB in on-base (.423) and slugging (.617) percentages and was among the leaders with a .302 batting average and 51 extra-base hits. The West Hartford, Conn. resident had 101 hits, including 24 doubles, and drove in 66 runs in 334 at-bats while playing in 98 games.

"Ryan obviously deserved the selection to the team," said Patriots President-General Manager Patrick McVerry. "He had another great season for us and really was the key to our offense this year."

Radmanovich, who played

in 25 major league games with the Seattle Mariners in 1998, was also one of the top offensive players in the ALPB in 2005, finishing with a .319 batting average, 154 hits, 27 doubles and 89 RBI. In the playoffs he hit .400, including three homers and nine RBI in six games, to help Somerset claim its third league championship.

Radmanovich played for Team Canada during the inaugural World Baseball Classic in March and also was on the Canadian squad during the 2004 Summer Olympic Games in Athens, Greece.
