






Superfund site proposals are expected

BRIDGEWATER — The township had yet to receive proposals from engineers by press time Tuesday in response to a request for services pertaining to the former American Cyanamid site.

However, Township Engineer Robert Bogart said that is not unusu-

"They usually come in at the eleventh hour," said Bogart, who noted that proposals were expected to be turned in yesterday. "Many times, they hand deliver them."

The township is seeking a consultant or consulting firm to develop a document outlining the remediation

owned by the Wyeth Holding Corporation and an analysis determining the best end use for the land. Proposals were due to the township by yesterday and at its Nov. 20 meeting, the fownship council is expected to select the consultant or consulting firm to complete the report.

"The council needs an independent consultant's evaluations of its options based on Wyeth's request," Township Administrator James Naples said.

The campaign "is the perfect example of the county working with its residents, including the youngest among us, to effect real change,' according to Freeholder H. James Polos, chairman of the

county Public Works and Transportation Committee.

the land and recommended actions to the township "that would insure the best possible use of the Wyeth land from an economic, environmental and recreation perspective," said the request for proposals. The township's request indicates that the report should be complete within six months from when the firm was put on the task. The fees of the consulting firm will be paid by Wyeth and the compnay has posted a \$40,000 escrow for the ser-

Department of Environmental Protection is expected to complete study on the cleanup by the end of the year. Over the course of the next year, the department along with the Environmental Protection Agency will review the plan, hold public hearings and issue an updated Record of Decisions or a remediation strategy. Wyeth's time line indicates that the cleanup could be complete by 2011 with redevelopment of the site slated to finish in 2012.

Wyeth's plan also includes reserving a portion of the property along the river and the wetlands for the creation a wildlife preservation area.



Solar rays help keep expenses at bay

Branchburg company also uses panels to protect environment

BRANCHBURG - Rich Gorde put it best while on the roof of the Ferreira Construction Co. building. "They say you have to think outside the box," he said. "I think we're kind of standing on top of that box."

Gorde, who was literally standing in the middle of 1,276 solar panels, was talking about "going green" as a way to reduce pollution and beat high energy costs.






Caro took the ball in, got off a shot and then rebounded her miss off a scramble with a hard shot past Pingry goalie Cameron Lan (6 saves)




