EDISON — The Edison Arts Society has announced that Jan. 31 is an important deadline for two popular annual events, the "Gardens of the Garden State" art and photography exhibition and a middle and high school poetry competition. ## Borough condemning shopping center holdouts

SOMERVILLE — In a last resort effort to bring the redevelopment of the Downtown Somerville Shopping center to fruition, borough officials filed documents in Superior Court to condemn two of the hold-out tenants.

On Friday, the borough filed a complaint to evict Country Fresh restaurant and Hollywood Video, said Colin Driver, the borough's director of economic development. The center is slated to become a \$66-million, mixed-use complex featuring stores, restaurants, office

space and 265 luxury apartments. Despite more than a year's worth of negotiations with JSM, the owner of the center, the businesses have been unable to terms on the value of their leases.

"We really, really tried (to come to terms with the tenants)," Driver said. "Condemnation is always the last recourse."

At a November meeting, the borough council approved a resolution to move forward with condemnation and in December the borough sent final offers to both tenants, Driver said.

"Country Fresh did not respond

and Hollywood Video came back with a number that was much higher than the appraised value," Driver said. "The council said reluctantly 'we have to take this action.'"

Joel Jacobson, an attorney for Hollywood Video, said he has not received the papers and declined to comment further on the matter. Steve Lieberman, an attorney for Country Fresh, said he did not receive papers as of press time, but that he views the condemnation process and the hearing as an opportunity for his client to finally present his case.

"We don't feel that they have made

us a fair offer," he said. "We haven't had a forum yet to present our case. We can do that now to someone independent and neutral who will decide what we're entitled to for reimbursement."

Lieberman said restaurant owners but don't want to incur out of pocket expenses for the move, especially since their lease is not set to expire until 2009.

"We're not looking to make money off of this," he said. "He (the owner Geff Khovitch) had a thriving business downtown. He should be able to relocate without it costing him anything because we do have a lease."

## Freeholder: Property tax crisis needs to be addressed

Middlesex County Freeholder Director David B. Crabel said that in 2007 the county will build upon its record of fiscal responsibility, offer enhanced services and will commit to building a new long-term care center in Old Bridge to meet residents' growing demand for quality health care facilities in Middlesex County.

In his address Jan. 5 at the Board of Chosen Freeholders' annual reorganization meeting, Crabel also urged state legislators to tackle the property tax crisis that is gripping New Jersey.

"Find the courage to put the people first," he said. "Do the job of property tax reform and do it this year. Don't let this opportunity fade and fail."

"Here in Middlesex County, I believe we are doing our part," said Crabel, re-elected for a 12th year as freeholder director. "We have practiced budgetary restraint. We are controlling spending and we have actually cut the tax levy in seven of the past 14 years."

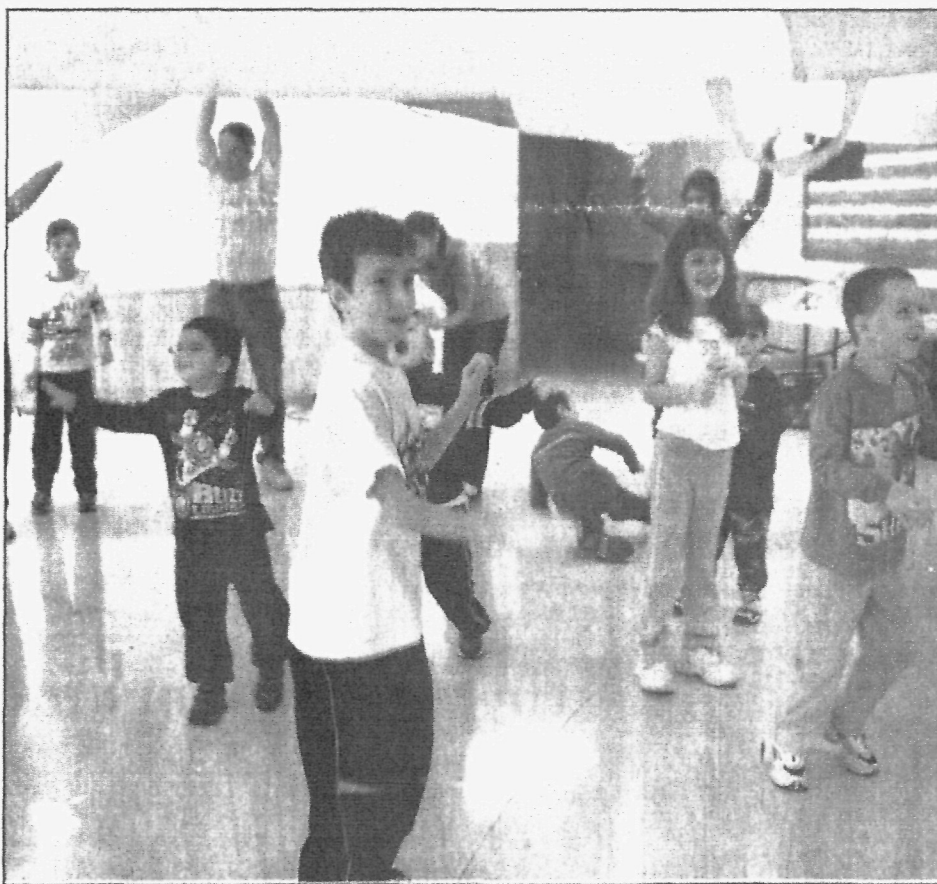
"In fact, we have extracted from our taxpayers less real dollars while assuring the delivery of high-quality county services," he said.

Crabel said the county has maintained its AAA bond rating from Standard & Poor's and carries the second lowest per capita cost of county government in New Jersey.

To meet county residents' growing and changing health care needs, Crabel said the freeholders are committed to building another 180-bed long-term care facility. Currently, quality long-term and rehabilitative care is provided at the historic Roosevelt Care Center in Edison and a state-of-the-art 180-bed facility across the street from the original building that was completed in 2005.

Plans had called for building a third facility on the same property as the historic building, Crabel said, but there is not enough land to do that.

## Program allows kids to be kids

BRIDGEWATER — The children knelt around the colorful parachute in a room at the Green Knoll firehouse Monday evening, waiting for the music to start. Each had a bucket of colored balls, and they began shaking the blue, pink, yellow, and green-striped parachute to the music. As the lyrics called out the colors, the children tossed in red objects, then blue, yellow, white, all along with the verses of the song. If an orange ball made it in a bit early, that was okay — it got tossed and bounced around in the rippling parachute along with the rest.

The parachute game was part of a new play program for children with special needs, started by a non-profit organization called Hop, Skip, and a Jump. The Monday evening program, an integrated class, pairs special-needs and non-special-needs children during games to help improve the social and motor skills of children in a play-oriented environment.

It's a type of program that parent Susan Fernandez said is greatly needed in the special education community. Her two sons, 7-year-old Chris and 5-year-old Ben, are diagnosed with Attention Deficit-Hyperactivity Disorder and autism, respectively.

"They need play. One of the biggest things, with therapy and as parents, we try to catch them up academically and they don't always have the chance to be kids," she said. "So this is both, it's social and it's play."

Part of the appeal of Hop, Skip, and a Jump is its focus on play, she said. While in his therapy, her son Ben is coached to do

things a certain way and fit certain criteria, and understands and feels bad if he gets things wrong. At Hop, Skip, and a Jump, he doesn't feel bad if he doesn't get it "right," said the Bridgewater resident.

The program is also a good fit because both of her sons can come together, she

## Law would control Web-based drug buys

State Sen. Barbara Buono, D-18th Dist., has introduced a bill which would establish a prescription and over-the-counter drug abuse public awareness campaign designated "Jason's Law."

This bill was prompted by the accidental death from an overdose of prescription drugs by a 19-year-old pre-pharmacy student, Jason Surks, who ordered drugs over the Internet from a pharmacy in Mexico without a prescription.

The measure — introduced in Trenton on Dec. 14 — has been referred to the Senate Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.

According to the National Center on Addiction and Substance Abuse at Columbia University, the number of Americans who abuse OTC and prescription drugs has nearly doubled from 7.8 million to 15.1 million between 1992 and 2003. Abuse among teens has more than tripled during that time. The number of teens ages 12-17 who abused OTC and prescription drugs jumped 212 percent and the number of adults ages 18-up abusing such drugs climbed 81 percent. In 2002 prescription and OTC drugs were implicated in 29.9 percent of drug-related emergency room deaths and at least 23 percent of drug-related emergency department admissions.

"Young people see these prescription and OTC drugs at home, so they rationalize that they can use them safely," Buono said in a press release issued Jan. 5.

"The Internet has made it easier for them to purchase these drugs, requiring just a credit card without a prescription," she said. "This combined with OTC and prescription drugs from their parents' medicine cabinets, have raised the availability of drugs."

Recently, the Partnership for a Drug-Free America conducted a study of teen drug abuse and found that abuse of medicine is now so prevalent it is considered normal among teens. Nearly one in five

said.

"We had a hard time bringing both of my boys to any social program," she said. "This is the first program in a few years we liked."

The group, which ran a five-week introductory session in the fall, had all of the children participating sign up for its first full session, which started this week, said Lisa Lender, the primary instructor of the group. The program offers both integrated classes and small-group classes at the firehouse on Mondays and Saturdays. The program has also reached out to the schools, and Adamsville School is the first that will offer integrated after-school enrichment classes for special needs children. Hopefully, Crim School and Milltown School will also offer the classes, said Lender.

"All day long, they're taught the ABA (Applied Behavior

Analysis, a structured therapy for children with autism) program, where they're taught to emulate a behavior," she said. "This is where they come to get away from it."

And since the special-needs children and non-special-needs children are paired up, the idea is that proper behavior "spills over," Lender said.

Volunteer Bryan Smith, who teaches adaptive physical education to special-needs children at the Bridgewater-Raritan School District, said that play is very important.

"This is probably one of the most needed programs. Most people see special education kids as, 'need to teach them this.' People forget sometimes that they're kids," he said. "You have all these therapies, and this is the only time to play."

Second-grader Sheila Noonan, who was helping out with the program along with other members of Brownie

Troop 268 of Bridgewater, said that the bubble game was her favorite. The children stood in a ring around a bubble machine, and clapped and pointed to pop the bubbles as they did the hokey pokey.

"You're helping people and playing, helping people that need help," said the 7-year-old, who attends Hamilton Primary School.

Chris DiMaggio said that her son, 5-year-old Mikey, enjoyed the introductory session so much that she signed him up for two days a week for the full session.

"It's good play, and it's social. He gets to play, and have fun," she said. DiMaggio, who lives in Middlesex, said that she found out about the program at the Somerset Handicapped Children's Treatment Center, where Mikey receives therapy for autism.

"There's not many programs that offer the social part," she said.

facility are off Route 18 in Old Bridge. One is on 10 acres owned by that township and the other is on land owned by Raritan Bay Medical Center.

teens (19 percent or 4.5 million) report abusing prescription medicine to get high.

Jason's mother, Linda Surks, is the public information coordinator for the National Council on Alcoholism and Drug Dependence of Middlesex County. The agency has renamed its East Brunswick prevention center for him.

"After working for years in substance abuse prevention, I believe that my kids were well equipped to navigate through life without drugs," she said.

"Jason believed he was being safe," Mrs. Surks said. "As a pre-pharmacy major, he worked part-time in a pharmacy and saw medications being handed out every day. He visited Web sites that told him these drugs were safe."

"How could it be that, 16 months after I sent my son off to college, I would be called to the emergency room to discover that he had overdosed on prescription medication?" she said.

"We need to educate our children regarding the dangers of using prescription and OTC drugs," Buono said. "Jason's law will help raise awareness among everyone in our state, especially parents."

# Global warming?

With a laugh, Jesse Gaeta lightheartedly warned that area residents had better get on down to Ace Post Hardware and pick up a snow shovel.

"I'm sure we will get some (snow)," Gaeta, the store's manager, predicted while conceding he personally doesn't mind the unseasonably warm weather the region has experienced the last two months.

"I would love it to stay this way all the time."

November and December were the warmest November and December since 1895, when statewide records date back to. In fact, 2006 was the second warmest year on record; 1998 was the warmest.

And last week, snow shovels, blowers, Ice Melt and rock salt were slow to move from the aisles of Ace Post Hardware on Route 22 in Somerville.

"People are picking up snow shovels little by little — the ones that think ahead. I hope they're right, so we don't have to carry them over (to next

season)," Gaeta said. "Living in this area all these years, I think we would get some kind of snow."

In the meantime, the question remains, is New Jersey experiencing the effects of global warming?

"Yes and no," said David Robinson, state climatologist at Rutgers University.

"It's a tricky question to answer, because the climate system is quite variable," he said.

"It would still be warm (right now)," he said. "Because of the natural variability of the climate system. You have warm spells and you have cold spells."

"But you can't explain away the warmth by natural fluctuations," he said. "We may be making it a little warmer."

Robinson said of the 12 warmest years on record, eight of them have occurred since 1990.

He said it should be more reasonable by this edition of *The Reporter*.

"Beyond that is a big question mark," he said.

see any of the white stuff this winter?

"We should see some snow," said Robinson, though he noted that since the 1890s, 22 November and December winter-month periods received

less than one inch of snow. Of those 22 two-month periods, 19 were followed by three months with below-average snowfalls.

"Not good news if you're selling snow-blowers," he said.
