The Observer is a new newspaper dedicated to informing the local community about events and businesses. Articles and advertisements will inform readers about news, events, organizations, groups, products and services.


Our goal is to inform the community specifically about South Plainfield organizations, groups and government

American Legion Wins "Glitter Award"

Mr. Joe Penyak, Sr., Vice Magri, Louis of the Metuchen Commander of Grounds and Buildings for the American Legion Chaumont Post 243, accepted the South Plainfield Clean Business Association's Glitter Award recently from Joe Diegnan, CBA President. The Post, located at 243 Oak Tree Avenue, recently completed a major face-lift.

Also on hand to accept the award were a few of the many members who contributed to the renovation of the 33-yearold building: Louis DeFlillipo, Walter Janus, Darren Junge and Jim Duffy. Mr. Penyak noted that the work, which included waterproofing and replastering as well as repainting the exterior, and new ceilings and a new ballroom inside, took a year and a half of volunteered, part-time labor. The landscaping was also improved, with an ornamental stone and evergreen garden bordering the picnic area next to the building. The landscaping is being maintained by Bruce Star of B&R Trucking and Landscaping, and Commander Donald "Doc" Austin.

Commander Austin was credited by the members as the driving force behind the renovations, but he insisted that nothing could have been done without the help of Joe Penyak, Sr. and Joe Penyak, Jr. of Penyak Roofing, Dim Duffy, Jack Denaya, Carmen Pacifico, Rick

Post, "Uncle Bob" and the numerous others who dedicated their efforts and time into Chaumont Post 243 American Legion.

According to Mr. DeFillipo, the post was organized shortly after World War I, and was named for the French town of Chaumont, where the founding members were stationed. Originally, the group met on Plainfield Avenue, where Borough Hall is currently located, and later moved to a building across from the Fire Station before finally constructing the present building, which was dedicated in 1964.

Standing near the flower display around the American flag on the front lawn, the members said they are glad to have been able to contribute to improving the appearance of the Borough's downtown. Mr. Penyak thanked all those who were involved in the project.

The Clean Business Association gives "Glitter Awards" to South Plainfield businesses that are unusually well maintained or have recently improved their appearance through renovation or landscaping. Membership in the CBA is open to all businesses that share its goals of enhancing the appearance of commercial districts through property maintenance and litter control. The South Plainfield Police Department is currently accepting applications for full- and parttime public safety telecommunicators. Public safety telecommunicators work in the communications center dispatching police, fire and rescue squad units to calls as well as answering 9-1-1- calls.

The requirements that will be considered for these positions are: you must be 18 years or older; have a high school diploma or equivalency; be a citizen of the United States; pass a typing test of 20 words per minute or higher; be a resident of New Jersey; pass a physical, drug and psychological exam and pass a criminal background check.


Residents will be considered before non-residents. Non-residents may be required to establish esidency to be hired

Rail Car Renovation Feature of Downtown Revitalization

The future of the downtown area is what the South Plainfield Business Association is attempting to deal with in a unique way. An old-fashioned train car, Victorian-period lamps and Belgian block curbing are planned for the business district.


The Association's Downtown Revitalization Committee is attempting to lure business back into the downtown area by dressing it up in Victorian fashion, the way it may have looked in the early 20's when the borough was incorporated in 1926.

Shopping in the downtown area has moved to huge shopping malls and fast food stores.

South Plainfield's business district is comprised of about 25 businesses in the downtown area. The Business Association Committee has decided to renovate the area to make it more attractive to the residents, in an effort to draw shoppers back to the area.

Businesses are sprucing up their store fronts and the areas around them. The Senior Citizen's building, at one time a bank, has been cleaned up, painted and added lighting, to improve its appearance.

South Plainfield Hosts 40th Annual Labor Day Parade, Sept. 1, 1997

The 40th annual Labor Day Parade plans are complete and the fun is about to begin. The theme of this year's parade is "South Plainfield Loves a Parade." This parade has been designed for the entertainment and enjoyment of the citizens, their guests, as well as all the participants.

The day will begin with a 5K race at 9:25 a.m. starting at Veterans Memorial Park. A noncompetitive Fun Walk will held at the same time as the 5K race. The race is sponsored by Ricochet Health and Racquet Club and the South Plainfield Alliance for Substance abuse. Bill Beegle serves as race coordinator. Registration for the 5K race will begin at 7:45 a.m. and cost \$12. Prizes and trophies will be awarded following the race.


The Grand Marshal this year will be former mayor and high school teacher, Michael English. The parade will start promptly at 10:00 a.m. from Plainfield Avenue at Tompkins. Anyone marching in the parade is asked to be in the designated marshalling areas off Plainfield Avenue no later than 9:15 a.m. The parade will proceed down Plainfield Avenue via Maple Ave. and Front Street and end at Veterans Park. (See map) Trophies will be awarded at the park following the parade. Sixteen awards are scheduled to be handed out.


