

Sacred Heart School Graduates 31 Students



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


Grade Schools Hold Ceremonies

However, I write to inform you and your readers that Keith has not received the Cadillac and the matter of the hole-in-one insurance is still under investigation and may require a lawsuit in order for Keith to get his prize.

Imagine how thrilled I was on

May 4 to receive the phone call from Keith saying he got a hole-in-one and that he had won new clubs, a vacation and a Cadillac. I thought it was a joke and made the members of his foursome get on the phone to back-up Keith's story. Later that day, Keith was given the clubs, told that there was no vacation and that the car involved paperwork and an insur-

ance company. One week later Keith was told by Don Amorosi of Golf Event Services out of South Plainfield that someone made a mistakethe Cadillac was meant to be the prize for a hole-in-one on a different hole! Mr. Amorosi explained to Keith that the Business Association had purchased holein-one insurance for the value of the Cadillac but that it covered Hole No. 5, not No. 7. After another week of frustrating phone calls with Mr. Amorosi, Keith reluctantly asked me to do my "lawyer thing."

One month later, I have contacted the Connecticut insurance carrier, Indian Harbor Insurance Company; the carrier's managing agent in Melville, New York; the agency that obtained the insurance for Mr. Amorosi; Surebet Prize Indemnity Corp. in Tampa, Florida; Golf Event Services and the Business Association in South Plainfield, New Jersey; and the carrier's claim administrator in New York, New York. What a mess! All the entities involved in the tournament are blaming each other for parking the Cadillac, posting the signs and publicizing the hole-in-one for what they say was the wrong hole! As of June 11, 1999, the carrier has indicated (not officially yet) that they may deny the claim.



On June 7, a petition containing eighty signatures was pre-sented to Assistant Superintendent Dr. DeSimon and Mr. Ken LaFreniere, Chairman of the Curriculum Committee. This petition is requesting for a way to allow students to continue their music education on their respective instruments at the high school level without a grade penalty.

The current grading system for Performance Band penalizes all of the students that are unable to participate in Marching Band. At present only two classes for instrumental education are offered, Jazz Ensemble and Performance Band. Jazz Ensemble requires instrument proficiency and is for the advanced student. Performance Band has mandatory after school rehearsals, Monday, Wednesday and Friday, as well as expected attendance at all football games and competitions. This



of dedication, which some musicians are just unable to give due to other interests or commitments. However, if they are not in the Marching Band there is an

automatic grade deduction. Many of the students who are currently in the Middle School Band, Jazz Band and Ensembles. that were honored for their musical achievements by the Board of Education at their June meeting, will not be playing their in-struments next year. There are various reasons for their inability to play, but most revolve around the current curriculum of the music department, which requires their membership in the Marching Band. Many wish to join sport teams, after school activities, concentrate on their studies, or have family commitments all of which prohibit them from being active members of the assiduous Marching Band. Whatever the reason, they can not dedicate themselves to Marching Band, which will leave their beloved instruments that used to fill their community with music, silent and abandoned.

The parents who signed this etition are not trying to hurt the Marching Band. The Marching Band is a great ambassador—for South Plainfield at parades, football games and competitions. Our only goal is to let students who want to continue their musical education be given a fair opportunity do so. 





Dear W. D.: Unfortunately, this is an all too common problem these days—one which I have dubbed the "terminal syndrome." However, the science of ergo-nomics may lend a solution to your problem. "Ergonomics," according to Joseph J. Sweere, D.C., DABCO, Chair-man of the Department of Occupational Health and a professor in the Chiropractic Sciences Division at Northwestern College of Chiropractic, "induction for the Orachemetic access register and provide "is derived from the Greek words ergos, which means work, and nomicus, which means law. Therefore, the science of ergonomics refers to the study of the laws of work. In practical terms, and in its contemporary applica-tion to health considerations, it refers to the study of the human/work-place interface. Ergonomics is also spoken of as human factors engineering. A predominant goal of appropriate occupational ergonomic inter-vention is the identification and elimination of sources of stress to humans in the workplace."

Dr. Sweere says that these sources of stress include "items such as lighting, heating, cooling, noise and vibration abatement, air quality and ven-tilation, work surfaces and environmental hazards. In addition, especially to Doctors of Chiropractic and others interested in occupational health and safety, workstations and work environments, which produce abnor-mal biomechanics and altered postures are a significant source of stress to humans.

Dr. Sweere feels that, "Workstation modification often places significant emphasis on adjustability of the components of the workstation to accommodate the needs of individual workers of either gender and with a variety of physical capabilities. The goal of which is to permit humans to perform work tasks with a minimum of fatigue (stress/injury/illness), a minimum of error and maximum well-being."

Here's a simple check to help make you more comfortable at seated work. Edward A. Metzger, vice president of BioFit Engineered Products, feels that if you think you are using a good chair but find it tires you to sit, you may not be using the chair to its beat advantage. A major key to minimizing fatigue is sitting at the correct seat height. How do you deter-ming the correct height for you seat

According to Metzger, "The most important factor is the relation of the seat height to the work level. Work level is not necessarily just the height of the desk or other work surface; it incorporates the entire distance from the floor to where the hands are doing an assigned task." He states that, "A basic formula to determine the correct seat height is

the real work level (measuring from the floor to the height of the task) minus 12 inches. The resulting measurement is the suggested seat height and should be the mid-point of the seat-height adjustment range of the chair." For example: 38" (work level from floor to task height)

-12

26" (mid-point of a seat-height adjustment range of 23.5"-28.5") "This formula," Metzger states, "works for about 90 percent of work-ers. Most chair companies offer chairs with a seat-height range of five to six inches, though some have chairs with optional seat-height adjustment ranges of 7.5 inches or even 10 inches. Having an adjustable variation upward and downward helps assure that the chair fits the size and body style of the worker."

For the 10 percent of workers whose body type makes a different seat height necessary, Metzger advises that they choose a chair company that constructs its chairs in modules. "With modular construction, " he says,

constructs its chairs in modules. "With modular construction, " he says, "they can change seat height on the job by simply adding or removing adapter tubes between the pneumatic cylinder and the base." I also remind my patients that they should get up and move around periodically. By changing positions and walking around, your muscle ten-sion will be eased and fatigue minimized. Lastly, if you still are having problems with your back after trying the above, the problems you are experiencing may not be due to your chair and I would then recommend an examination by a Doctor of Chiropractic. On Wednesday, June 16 Maria LaSilva-Seliga, a teacher at the Middle School, pleaded guilty in Municipal Court to a charge of harassment. The complaint was filed by Board of Education can-didate Carol Byrne. The charges stem from a call made by LaSilva to Byrne the evening of the Board of Education elections at approxi-mately 11:30 p.m. The foul language used by LaSilva prompted Byrne to contact the police and file complaint. The charge was downgraded from disorderly conduct to harassment when LaSilva-Seliga agreed to plead guilty. She was fined \$50 and\$27 in court costs.

Explaining the complaint Carol Byrne said, "After receiving the call on Election Night, I felt it was necessary for Maria LaSilva to admit publicly that she had harassed me. It was a matter of principal. I was happy with the outcome of the case
