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

DAR to Dedicate Grave Markers

July 4th Celebration Planned

The Jersey Blue Chapter of the National Society of Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) will dedicate new stone markers placed at the graves of twenty Revolutionary War Veterans buried in the Hillside Cemetery of Samptown on New Market Road. The July 4 dedication will be attended by dignitaries, veterans and historical organizations from around Middlesex County and the State of New Jersey. The grave markers were placed by the DAR. Ruth Janowitz, South Plainfield resident and DAR member, has been actively working on this project for the past year.

The ceremony will take place at 1 p.m. at the Hillside Cemetery of Samptown, one of the oldest cemeteries in Central Jersey. Burials began on this site before 1700. In 1792, the congregation now known as the First Baptist Church of South Plainfield built its first church on this site.

Two of the twenty men to be honored served with the Continental Army. Pvt. David Martin served in Captain Shither's Troop, Sheldon's Regiment, Light Dragoons and Pvt. James Martin served in Captain Anderson's Company, 1st Battalion, N.J. Brigade. James Martin wore the blue and red uniform of the New Jersey Brigade. He served in such battles as Monmouth and Springfield and survived the winter at Valley Forge. After the war, he operated a tavern in Quibbletown (New Market).

New Jersey raised several battalions of troops for service in the Continental Army. In addition, New Jersey men served in several other units of the army. These men fought Indians in New York State, took part in the ill-fated invasion of Canada and fought under the command of George Washington in New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania and Virginia. These are the men most commonly thought of when we think of Revolutionary War soldiers. New Jersey had long main-

New Jersey had long maintained a militia organization to provide for self defense. At the outbreak of the war it was poorly organized and almost totally lack-



ing in training and equipment. Called to service in the summer of 1776, the New Jersey Militia served throughout the war.

The militia was organized by counties. Our local men served in the 1st Regiment of the Middlesex County Militia. Others from the area were in the Somerset or Essex County Militias. (Union County was not formed until the nineteenth century.) While senior officers were appointed by the Governor, company grade officers were elected by the men that they commanded. For this reason, they were often men who took a leadership role in the local community.

DAR Plans July 4 Grave **Marker Dedication**

to be honored:

Capt. Benjamin Laing, Commanding officer, Scotch Plains Company, lst Regiment, Essex County Militia. Laing was one of the first trustees of the First Baptist Church of South Plainfield.

Capt. Christianus Lupardus, Ist Regiment, Middlesex County Militia. Grandson of French Huguenots who fled France to avoid religious persecution, Lupardus was founding member of the First Baptist Church of South Baptist Plainfield.

Capt. Joseph F. Randolph, 1st Regiment, Middlesex County Militia. He was a founding mem-ber and the first Elder of the First Baptist Church of South Plain-

Capt. Nehemiah Randolph, Essex County Militia. Randolph owned considerable amounts of land on what is now the South Plainfield-Plainfield border.

Privates Obediah Ayres, David Blackford, Nathan Blackford, David Corriell, Joshua Davis, Ephriam Drake, Samuel Drake (founding member of the First Baptist Church of South Plainfield). Simeon Drake. Clason Dunn, Morris Frazee (founding member of the First Baptist Church of South Plainfield) Andrew Manning, Benjamin Manning (son-in-law of Nathaniel Drake, whose home is now a museum in Plainfield), Ephram F. Randolph (founding member of the First Baptist Church of South Plainfield) and Enoch Runyon. These men all served in the 1st Regiment, Middlesex County Militia. Also Pvt. Ebenezer Tingley from the Somerset County Militia.

In addition to these men, the cemetery contains the graves of at least eighteen other veterans ary War. These will be honored at a later date as their graves are identified and marked.

Hillside Cemetery

The Hillside Cemetery of Samptown, ca. 1690, is located in the western part of South Plainfield, down the street from Piscataway.

Laid to rest in the northwest corner of the cemetery are 21 Revolutionary War soldiers who were as young as 12 and as old as 50. Our local unit was part of the First Regiment of the Middlesex County Militia.

Hillside Cemetery was initially used as a public burial ground. It was a last refuge for paupers and travelers passing through the area when they died. Many of the graves were set off by simple wooden markers that eventually disintegrated.

The oldest legible gravestone is that of Benjamin Hull, a judge who lived from 1693 to 1745. It is likely that buri-

als began in the 1680's.
The Hillside Cemetery of Samptown also holds the graves of 51 Civil War soldiers, as well as Spanish-American soldiers, WWI, WW II, Korea and Vietnam soldiers

NJCF Identifies 210 Bird Species, Highlights Need to Save Land

The New Jersey Conservation Foundation (NJCF) team identified 210 species of birds during the grueling 24-hour competition known as the World Series of Birding recently. NJCF placed sixth out of 50 teams from around the world. But NJCF places first in protecting the birds' habitat.

"We saw a Bald Eagle flying overhead in Mannington Marsh in Burlington County, in the Delaware Bay Watershed," said team captain and NJCF Urban Parks Project Manager Dennis Miranda. "But if we don't protect the forest in the Delaware Bayshore, we'll lose so many of these species in the area, such as Summer Tanager, Blue Grosbeak and Prothonotary Warbler."

New Jersey Conservation Foundation, based in Far Hills, promotes conservation of land and natural resources throughout NJ. The nonprofit group focuses on protecting quality of life for all New Jerseyans—from the Highlands in the north to the Delaware Bayshore

in the south. They've protected over 77,000 acres of the state's precious open space since 1960. That's nearly one-tenth of all the preserved land in NJ and more than the entire state parks system. NJCF has also protected nearly one-fifth of all NJ's preserved farmland-over 10,000 acres to date. That's more land than any private group in the state.

Each spring, teams of trained ornithologists and skilled naturalists from all over the world come to New Jersey. They test their talents in this grueling, 24-hour High-Point-to-Cape-May contest to see who can identify the greatest number of bird species. During this wondrous window on the migration process, more species of birds might be found in New Jersey than anywhere else in the world. May 15 marked the 16th annual World Series of Birding.

Miranda, a champion birder and expert in Highlands species, recounted NJCF's visit to the state's northern mountainous region, "In the heart of the Wallkill River Wildlife Refuge in Sussex County, we saw grassland birds such as Dickcissel, Bobolink and Upland Sandpiper, birds you can see almost nowhere else in NJ because of all the farmland we've lost to development. It's a pleasure to see birds flourishing on lands that are preserved forever." NJCF was responsible for preserving the first property here, thus beginning the Wallkill Refuge.

The NJCF team logged over 500 miles this day, from the northern tip of the state to the south, in a four-wheel drive Blazer donated by Enterprise Rent-A-Car of Hamburg. In the Highlands, they spotted every type of Warbler that nests in the region—22 in all—including declining species such as Cerulean and Golden Wing Warblers, and other hard-to-find species such as Alder Fly Catcher, Northern Water Thrush and the Saw Whet Owl.

New Jersey is a migratory hub because of the surprising diversity of our coastal and woodland habitats. Tragically, some birds are finding shopping centers and housing developments where their homes used to be. Deprived of food and shelter, many will die. In fact, the total population of forest songbirds has been cut in half in just 40 years. That's why the World Series of Birding was started. It's "a competition with a cause"

tition with a cause."

The Delaware Valley Ornithological Club took first in the competition, identifying 223 species. But in the World Series of Birding, it's the birds who really win. This year, the contest raised nearly \$600,000 for environmental and conservation or organizations.

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

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


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
