Volunteer Committees Take First Steps

The volunteers on the four committees formed last week met to plan their strategy and elect chairmen. These committees have been given the task of making recommendations to the school board on what directions we will be taking in regards to the future.

The four committees formed are architecture, curriculum, technology and public relations. Members of the board of education and representatives from Prisco & Edwards, the architecture firm hired by the board, were on hand to supply information.

All of the committees will meet weekly through September and make recommendations to the board. The board has said that they will use these recommendations for a third referendum scheduled in December. With residents participating in the planning, the board feels the next referendum will receive the voters' approval. Voters have already rejected two school bond referendums this year.

Every Thursday night the committees will report on how their progressing. Keeping the public informed during each step is very important to the board. The *Observer* will be publishing the committees reports each week to keep the public informed.

If anyone would still like to join a committee, they are welcome to attend Thursday nights meeting and volunteer. The meetings start at 7 p.m. and are held at Grant School.

Internet Friendship Leads to Man's Arrest

On June 23, the South Plainfield Police Department received information that man had engaged in sexual impropriety with a female under the age whom he had befriended over the Internet.

The defendant, after numerous conversations with the victim over the Internet, was able to gain her trust and on June 22 he traveled to the victim's home in South Plainfield, where the incident took place.

Last Thursday, Ata Rehman, age 25, who lives in Far Rockaway Queens, NY, was arrested by South Plainfield Police Detective James Darby and Middlesex Co. Prosecutors Office Investigator Todd Gerba. Rehman was charged with third degree endangering the welfare of a child. The defendant was arrested as he voluntarily surrendered at the prosecutors office.

Conviction for a crime of this type carries a term of 3-5 years in prison and a fine. Rehman was released on his own reconisence. If he fails to meet or fulfill any stipulations of his release, he will be required to post \$20,000, with no 10% option.

Cindy Brinks Chooses 'Mrs. Mom' Over Being Mrs. New Jersey or Mrs. America

Mrs. Middlesex County, South Plainfield's own Cindy Brinks left town a few weeks ago nervous but confident. She went to the Mrs. New Jersey-America pageant with a goal in mind—to win. Yet when the evening ended and she found herself wearing the crown of Mrs. New Jersey-America, no one was more surprised than her.

She arrived at the pageant on Thursday and spent the next two days preparing, with an orientation, mock

interviews and dance rehearsals. Fourteen contestants competed, representing various counties, as well as town representatives. Cindy spent some time with some of the other contestants getting to know them. "I met a great group of ladies. New Jersey sure is lucky to have all these special women in their state!" she said.

Pageant day began early. Every event in the pageant was done alphabetically and 'Brinks' is at the top of the alphabet. Being first can be nerve-wracking, but Cindy used it to her advantage. 'It helped me a bit because I wasn't able to see how much better or worse someone was than me. It allowed me to focus on just myself."

The all important interviews with the judges began at 11 a.m. on Saturday morning. Contestants each spoke to six judges for seven minutes. Cindy noted, "All of the judges were extremely nice and made me feel at ease." After the interviews Cindy was able to relax for a few hours before beginning preparations for the big event. Her words best describe the evening, "At 8 p.m. with calm nerves, I left my room to start the hardest night of my life. I am not the type of person who is always center stage, so it took a lot of will power on my part

They announced the first runner up as Crystal Jennings and I stood there in shock and started to cry. I couldn't believe that I had won. 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





Police Warn Parents on Dangers on the Internet

Recently, the South Plainfield Police Department has experienced an increase in the number of Internet related crimes. While many of these cases are unsolvable or there is an insufficient probable cause to charge the someone with the crime, we feel it is important to alert the public, especially the younger people who utilize the Internet extensively, of the dangers of communicating with and/or supplying information to strangers or people they "meet" via the Internet.

Internet technology, while bringing a wealth of information to

everyone's fingertips, has also provided an easy and anonymous method for a person who preys on the vulnerable to become closer to anyone who uses the Internet. Predators can become "friends" of unsuspecting Internet users. These predators gain the trust of innocent people and when the time is right, they take advantage of them, whether by obtaining financial information for the purposes of defrauding them (credit card numbers, checking account numbers, etc.) or by arranging for meetings for the purpose of sexual gratificaWe are encouraging parents to discuss these dangers with their children, monitor their Internet activities and encourage their children not to blindly engage in conversations with strangers on the Internet or to meet with strangers they have "met" on the Internet. Furthermore, we encourage all Internet users to use caution with the type of information you reveal to strangers on the Internet.

Anyone who believes they have been the victim of a computer related crime is encouraged to report it to their local police department.


Tiger Day Camp Kids Show Off Their Talent
