A loss like that and cold rainy summer days are fork stuck in the road. experiences. They can either bring us down and push us deeper into fear and feelings of despair and futility, or they can be a wake up call. Rainy days help us to savor the sunny ones - and make the most of them. The untimely death of a child hopefully moves us to wake up and deeply appreciate the days we share

with our own children and loved ones.

My gorgeous sunny summer 2000 pool days were few, but the ones I had - I valued. The ones I shared with all five of my children were fewer, because my oldest two are growing up spending more time doing other things. I savored the ones that we had together the most. My youngest daughter learned to swim in the same spot at the pool near the steps that her older brothers and sister did. Suddenly, my days at the baby pool that once seemed endless are over! I'd like to thank everyone at the pool-guards, staff, friends and fellow diehards, for another memorable summer. Until we meet again at sports events, school stuff around town-or around the pool next summer-I wish you good health, and days well spent with those you love. And to the Caruso and Yuill families, I offer a promise to never think of Zachary or Katie without remembering the innocence of their youth and the resolve to value each person in my life more than I did before their passing.

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Because We Do More

Two West Nile Virus Infected Birds Found; No Spraying Scheduled by Middlesex County

On Monday evening Bernard G. Mihalko, Director from the Middlesex County Health Department held a news conference on borough hall to update the council and the public regarding the West Nile Virus.

Last week two crows tested posititve for the virus in South Plainfield. One bird tested negative and three tests are still pending. The West Nile Virus Surveillance System indicates that all mosquito pools submitted from Middlesex County to date have tested negative for the virus, along with the sentinel chickNile virus have been identified in the State of New Jersey.

Mihalko explained that the mosquito that carry the virus is just a common household mosquito. He also said this spices only bites in the early morning and at dusk, so if you get a mosquito bite during the day, there's a 90% chance you won't be infected with the virus. The best deterrent to date is to use insect repellent containing 30% DEET. However he also said not put repellent on children under the age of

ens and no human cases of the West three. Other facts to keep in mind are that you cannot get the virus by handling a dead bird or from your household pets. If bitten by an infected mosquito, there is a 2-12 day incubation period.

The Middlesex County Health Department is asking residents to call if they find a dead crow, hawk or falcon. These three birds are the only ones that carry the virus. Arrangements have been made to pick up dead birds 24-hours-a-day, sevendays-a-week. The number to call to report a dead bird is, from 8:30 a.m to 4:15 p.m. (732) 745-3100, after hours and weekends call (732) 745-3271.

A number of birds have tested positive for the West Nile virus in Edison and Woodbridge Townships and the city of Perth Amboy, spraying has been conducted for the con-Continued on page 11



Middle School History Teacher Realizes Dream of a Lifetime

Middle School eighth grade history teacher Joseph Blondo will soon engage in his fantasy career on a U.S. Navy aircraft carrier, one of the most powerful weapons of war in America's military arsenal. How he got there is a story of perseverance, good writing and luck.

A contest offered by the Internet's popular search engine, YAHOO!, asked people to describe their "Fantasy Careers in Today's Military." The contest was co-sponsored by the U.S.

careers and recruitment. The contest had 3,355 entrants and a winner was chosen in each of the five branches of the military. Blondo replied to the query by the United States Navy: "Why do you want to experience life on an aircraft carrier?" His reply was chosen as one of five winning essays and his fantasy career will soon become

a reality. Blondo's winning essay

(which follows) is the beginning of

an adventure of a lifetime.

Department of Defense. The goal

was to increase awareness of military

"Commitment, dedication and sacrifice are but a few of the qualities needed to serve aboard an aircraft carrier in today's Navy. The aircraft carrier has been the centerpiece of US Foreign Policy since the end of World War II. The Carrier Battle Group has the ability to handle military hotspots around the world, or merely 'show the flag' when needed.

"As a United States History Teacher, I can appreciate the necessity for the aircraft carrier as well as understand its past. As a naval enthusiast, I can understand the need for building more carriers and where the future of Naval Aviation is heading.

I would benefit greatly from experiencing firsthand life aboard an aircraft carrier by passing that experience on to my students. I would be able to explain the rigors of life at sea: the hardships of separation, the hectic schedule, and the danger of being in "harm's way." I would also be able to communicate all the positive aspects of life in the Navy: the feelings of teamwork, pride in serving your country and accomplishing a mission, the concept of honor, and yes...the travel.

The Navy was my career goal since I was a freshman in high school. Bad knees kept me from achieving that goal. This contest, however, has given me the opportunity to experience that goal even but for a few days. My students enjoy hearing stories of my personal life and experiences. They will truly be captivated by stories of life aboard an aircraft carrier.

Blondo is scheduled to leave on Sept. 18 for Norfolk, Va. to meetthe contest sponsors. He will spend five days with Navy personnel. On Sept. 19 he will spend the day training with Navy SEALS Special Warfare. The following day, the adventure kicks into high gear as he flies out to the USS ENTERPRISE offshore in the Atlantic Ocean. Changes in schedule may occur as the date approaches but the current schedule calls for him to spend Wednesday and half of Thursday touring the aircraft carrier. He will have the opportunity to steer the ship. This is just one of many amazing moments he will experience. He will enjoy talking to commanding officers and spend an evening dining with them.

The dream continues when Blondo is given the opportunity to fly in a C2Agreyhound, known as a COD (Carrier Onboard Delivery), a passenger aircraft that can fly from land to the aircraft carrier. Most planes assigned to an aircraft carrier do not carry passengers. He then will travel to Oceana Naval Air Station off the Virginia coast not far from Norfolk. Once there he will shadow the pilots, see how they train, plan missions and how they operate different carrier aircrafts. Another experience he looks forward to is the chance to fly an F14 or 18 in a simulator. The week ends with the flight home. The adventure doesn't end there, but begins anew as he relates to his eager students experiences that few are able to attain.


The following streets will be closed at some time during the parade: Plainfield Ave., Maple Ave. Front Street, South Plainfield Ave. and Hamilton Blvd.



Pulomena Unveils New Technology Plan

Freeholder John Pulomena was the guest speaker at Tuesday night's Board of Education meeting. He was there to explain the new Middlesex County Tech 2000 Program to board members. The goal of this program is to provide a computer for every classroom in every public school throughout Middlesex County.

Of the 3,238 total classrooms in this county, more than 1000 have no access to modern technology. The proposed program will help give students the competitive edge in higher education and future careers they deserve.

Freeholders are being asked to make a commitment of \$1 million dollars per year for the next five years for the purchase of stateof-the art computer hardware and

software to be a public placed in each classroom. In addition to the \$1 million dollar annual commitment by the county, we will be reaching out to the private sector to allow companies to invest in the future of our children.

The countywide technology program will also provide an incentive for school districts to encourage teachers to obtain those credits in the area of computer technology. For every teacher trained in computer technology in the classroom, one computer will be provided by Middlesex County.

School districts willing to provide a computer of equal configuration and value may be eligible for a second county sponsored computer.




The children's summer crafts program at the library, "Book a Trip Through Time," is coming back to earth, but not before they made one final craft that was out of this world.

trol of adult mosquitoes (adulticiding) within these municipalities.

If spraying is going to take place in South Plainfield, borough officials and residents will be notified in advance, through the media. Middlesex County uses a spray called 'Scourge.' It is a pyrethroidpesticide use to control adult mosquitos. Spraying takes place at night under controlled conditions.

Residents are urged to continue

eliminating areas of standing water around their homes. They should drain water from poot covers, change water in birdbaths once a week, put fish into ornamental pools, make sure roof gutters are not clogged, empty flowerpots and containers that may hold water, maintain swimming pools, eliminate standing water that may be on your property and talk to neighbors about eliminating mosquito sites on their property.




