# BILLBOARDS? NOT AGA

Last year the council passed a law prohibiting billboards in South Plainfield, unless they advertise a business that is located on that property. This could all change if applicants going before the board of adjustment have their way. Next Tuesday evening, at special meeting, the board will be asked to permit the placement of three

billboards in the areas around Route

Three applicants on the schedule will ask for variances to permit outdoor advertising on property that is not occupied by the advertiser. They are also asking to erect signs larger than allowed and, in one instance, closer to Rt. 287 than allowed. The

applications are for the placement of signs on Bedford Ave., Hadley Rd. and Durham Ave.

If the board turns down the three requests, the applicants may challenge our local billboard ordinance in courts. The Board of Adjustment meets Tuesday night (Halloween) at . 8 p.m. The public is invited to attend.

The passage of a billboard ordinance last year was the result of a recommendation from a special committee formed after a controversial billboard ordinance was introduced and later withdrawn. The committee studied regulations other towns have imposed and how they have withstood challenges in the courts.

#### **Middle School Teacher** Raises \$6K for **Breast Cancer**

It took Middle School Health teacher Susan Slinger three long days to get from Bear Mountain State Park to Manhattan. This was no leisurely drive in search of autumn foliage, but the annual Avon Breast Cancer 3-Day Walk, a vast, multi-leveled fundraiser in search of a cure for breast cancer. The walk had a special meaning for Susan, it was a celebration of her tenth anniversary of cancer free living. Walkers and crew members had to raise a minimum of \$1,800. Friends and family joined her in celebrating life. Their generosity allowed Susan to initially pledge \$4,000. The final total she raised was over \$6,000. She described the three-day trek as "a tremendous commitment to a very special and powerful event in the fight against breast cancer and diseases that affect women." 


## Diners Line Up to "Get the Scoop" for Project Graduation

If things proceed as planned, the environmental sign-off should take place late in the spring of 2001 after which the final design specifications will be completed. The project will then go out for bid and a contract awarded. Our residents can expect construction to begin during the early part of 2002 and be completed by the end of 2002. In about two years, the traffic nightmare on Hamilton Blvd. should be addressed."

#### Next Referendum to be Discussed

The board of education will hold a special meeting on Monday, Oct. 30 to discuss a new bond referendum.

During the past few months four citizen advisory committees: public relations, curriculum, technology and buildings have been meeting regularly. They have now completed their study and given the board their

suggestions on the future needs of the school system.

The board must now decide what suggestions they will implement. The board is planning to ask the voters to approve a new referendum some time in the beginning of the

Last year, on two separate occa-

sions, voters rejected bond referendums. Since then the state passed a law which will compensate the school district by as much as 40% for new school construction costs.

The next referendum will list exactly how much the bond will cost and how much the state will contribute to the costs.

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


# Franklin School Annual Fall Harvest Festival

Continued from page I person's life, then it will be all worthwhile."

A week after the walk the thrill and excitement of her experience was undiminished. "The food was good and the weather was beautiful. Volunteers did everything! I met lots of wonderful people from all over the country and Canada and I'm in touch with fellow crew members... we're already planning a reunion!" On a more serious note she said, "We were given wrist bands. One for the food line and one for ID. When the event was over I couldn't part with them. It took me a week to cut them off. I will do it again next year, hopefully walking."

Arthoscopic knee surgery

months earlier could have been an end to her plans. According to her doctor the grueling hike had the potential to cause serious permanent damage to her knee. Susan saw this only a detour and opted for the next best thing. She became part of the sweep crew, teams that drove vans throughout the day. Crew members often put in more hours than the walkers. Drivers spent 15-20 hours training for safety and support. Susan noted, "Teamwork was essential!" in this position. Crew drivers began their day at 5:15 a.m. to go over their assignments. "We cruised the entire trail each day, stopping at 'pit stops' and handing out candy," she said. "We were the 'heroes' in our superman sweatshirts, there to rescue anyone who needed us." Being part of the crew encompassed a multitude of jobs. The end of each day brought the weary walkers to "Mobile City," a vast city of tents that became home for two nights. "Mobile City" is described as a "slumber party facility for adults that moved from day to day." Susan was one of 500 crew members, who offered a variety of services, others offered something equally important-their time and energy, their strong arms and legs, their love and their support. Walkers and crew members came from all all walks of life, some were cancer survivors, others walked in remembrance of a loved one.

The walk encompassed about 60 miles over the three days, starting in Bear Mountain State Park and ending in Morningside Park, Manhattan.

the US, and the leading cause of death in women between the ages of 40 and 55. It's estimated that 75,000 women will be diagnosed with breast cancer and more than 42,000 will die. The net proceeds from the Avon Breast Cancer Walk support non-profit breast healthcare programs, as well as medical research. With early detection crucial to survival, the mission is to provide women, particularly those lacking in medical assistance, access to breast health education and early detection screenings at little or no cost. Since the Avon Breast Cancer Awareness Crusade began, there have been revolutionary advances and the development of sophisticated technologies that have begun to close the gap towards a cure

The awe in Susan's face and voice is evidenced when she talked about the walk. "This experience was so unbelievably awesome! I cried in every class as I told them of the wonderful things I had seen that weekend; courage, stamina, camaraderie, support, caring, tenderness and spirit. It was everywhere! I told my students I would not apologize for my tears for the experience was one of the most important things I've done in my lifetime. I encouraged them to, at sometime in their young lives, walk or participate in an event to raise money for a cause; be it cancer, heart disease, diabetes, something that would make you feel good on the inside. Your self-esteem will be untouchable. I'll never forget the young girl on crutches who 'walked' from Bear Mountain to Manhattan. This was an experience of a lifetime, I'll talk
