Borough Gets Open Space Money

Buttiglieri Says Farewell, Petronko and Cusick Sworn In

The annual reorganization meeting held last Sunday at Borough Hall drew a standing room only crowd as friends and relatives of two councilmen, Ray Petronko and Bob Cusick, packed the room and the hall outside the council chambers. Freeholders Dave Crabiel, Chris Rafano and former South Plainfield Councilman John Pulomena, along with former Councilwoman Maryann Kochut and

Assemblyman Bob Smith were just a few of the dignitaries who attended the first official meeting of the 2001 Borough Council.

The first order of business was the swearing in of Councilman Ray Petronko, who begins his second term and Bob Cusick, the newest member of the council. Both will serve a three year term. Petronko and Cusick thanked the residents of South Plainfield for allowing them to serve their community. They promised to always remember to listen to what the residents have to say and do what is best for South Plainfield.

Outgoing Councilman Vinnie Buttiglieri gave a short farewell speech (see page 2), thanking those who helped and supported him during his council years. Mayor Dan Gallagher and council members praised Buttiglieri for his hard work, dedication and innovative ideas while serving the residents of South Plainfield.

Jim Vokral was again elected by the council to serve as coun-

This year the mayor's annual message noted all of the council's accomplishments of the past year. He added that it will be hard to follow the past year. Open space was also on his mind. Gallagher announced the purchase of the property on the corner of Clinton and Thompkins avenues, with grant money from the Middlesex County Open Space Committee. South Plainfield will only pay 10 percent or \$75,000 of the \$750,000 to acquire the land. He also wants the council to designate the 15-acre parcel of land at the intersection of Hamilton Blvd. and Belmont Ave. as open space.

Also appointed by the governing body were: Patrick Diegnan, borough attorney; Mary Blue, Public Agency Compliance Officer; Andrew Hodulick, municipal auditor; Thomas Lanza, municipal prosecutor; Edward Santoro, public defender and Richard Lorentzen, tax search officer.

Board of Adjustment Delays Billboard Vote

Last week's Board of Adjustment meeting ended without a vote on the three proposed billboards.

Because the Borough Council had not yet held their reorganization meeting at the time of the meeting, two members, John Rayho and Don Alexa, could not vote because they had not yet been sworn in for another term. Both men, however, were in attendance at the meeting and listened to the testimony

of the witnesses.

The council normally holds their reorganization meeting on New Year's Day or the following Sunday. This year the reorganization meeting was held on Jan. 7. Both appointed and reappointed members were officially sworn in at the meeting. The witnesses for all three bill-

The witnesses for all three bill-board applications have completed their testimonies and a vote is expected to be taken at the Jan. 30 Board of Adjustment meeting.

BOE Sets Referendum Date

The Board of Education has set Tuesday, March 6, as the date for the school referendum vote.

The BOE will be asking vorers to approve bonding for a construction of a new Roosevelt School, expansion of Grant School, and upgrading of all schools for technology infrastructure. This will be the third time the school board will be putting a referendum in front of the voters. Last year, voters wice rejected school bonding proposals. This time the state will contribute 40% of the fund-

The Board of Education has ing for school improvements.

Tracy Hartman, chairman of public relations for the referendum, is asking for volunteers to help her committee get the word out to every voter that this referendum is important to the school district.





There was never a year like the year

2000 in South Plainfield! More has been accomplished in the last 12 months than during the prior 20 years. After decades of talk, in September, we broke ground on the Borough's first ever senior housing project. Before this year is out, our seniors will be moving in to 100 units of affordable apartments designed to fit their needs.

Less than a month later, we witnessed the demolition of the old Shell station to clear the way for a 10,000-square-foot state-of-the-art Senior Recreation Center.

This center, including all of the site work, parking lot, lighting and landscaping, will be built without

spending one cent of tax dollars. Even the furniture will be paid for with a state grant. No single project shows this council's innovative approach to difficult projects than our new Senior Recreation Center. Construction will start in late spring and by this time next year, our seniors will be enjoying their new home.

It's appropriate that these two projects will serve our senior citizens, ing for South Plainfield their entire

The third jewel in the year 2000 was the beginning of construction of a 14,000-square-foot addition to our PAL Recreation Center. Construction is progressing on schedule and our young people will be enjoying their improved recreational facilities by summer. Special thanks must go to Recreation Director Michael English and the Recreation Commission for never giving up and coming up with both an architectural design and a financial plan to make the addition to the PAL a reality.

While all of this was going on, an additional 21 roads were repaved on a "pay-as-you-go" basis and the houses at the intersection of Park Ave. and Oak Tree Rd. were demolished which doubled the size of Putnam Park. Because of the farsightedness of

the council, that corner is now permanently preserved from development. It couldn't have happened without the support of our freeholders, who provided South Plainfield with \$1 million

dollars to acquire the homes. On behalf of all of the citizens of South Plainfield, I want to say thank you to our Mid-

dlesex County Freeholders.

Let's be honest...the year 2000 is going to be a hard act to follow, but there are important projects that need to be done this year.

· We must act immediately to preserve additional open space in South Plainfield. I am happy to announce that we have reached a tentative agreement with the owner of the 10-acre tract at the corner of Tompkins and Clinton avenues. A proposal was already presented to the Planning Board to build 15 homes on that site. As a result of the quick response of the governing body, a plan has been approved by the Middlesex County Open Space Committee to permanently designate that site as open space. The cost to acquire the property is estimated to be \$750,000; 90% of the funding will come from the county. Therefore for a payment of only \$75,000, our residents will forever be able to enjoy an additional 10 acres of pristine land.

• I will also ask the council to des-

ignate the 15-acre parcel at the intersection of Hamilton Blvd. and Belmont Ave. as open space. If developed, an additional 60 homes could be built. When these open space designations are complete, this mayor and council will have preserved over 100 acres from development. Our

There is a general consensus that a jogging/walking trail should be created around the perimeter of the park and one or two soccer fields be established within the park. South Plainfield has always considered youth our most important asset. The expansion of Putnam Park will be a great benefit

to our kids.

• We must do whatever we can to alleviate the ever-increasing traffic problems within our borough. It's easy to say that South Plainfield is not alone, every town in New Jersey is experiencing traffic congestion. Al-though that is true, its not a satisfactory solution to the problem. We have asked Middlesex County to totally reconstruct Hamilton Blvd. from New Market to South Clinton avenues, including the installation of new curbs and drainage. We have also requested that a traffic light be installed at the intersection of Hamilton Blvd. and Ryan St. to be coordinated with Saint Nicholas Ave. As part of this process, I have asked the Traffic Safety Committee to coordinate all traffic signals along Hamilton Blvd. and Durham Ave., so that traffic can flow more easily. Particular thanks must go to our favorite son, Freeholder John Pulomena, for his help

• Ultimately the traffic congestion on Hamilton Boulevard and Belmont Avenue will be addressed by the Helen Street Project. That project is now in phase two, during which

time the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection must approve wetland permits. Phase three, which will start within four

months, includes the preparation of all environmental documents required by the DEP. That phase will be completed by the end of this year. Phase four, which will take approximately two years to complete, is the permit and design stage. Phase five, which is the actual construction stage, will also take about two years. Therefore, it will be about five years until Helen Street is completed. But remember, it involves crossing a rail line, two brooks and wetlands. This project is totally funded by a grant from the Federal Government. You can imagine how complicated and frustrating the process is. We are all impatient to have it finished. I can assure you that the borough will do whatever it can to expedite the process. But in the end, the Helen Street extension will be worth the wait.

· If there is one thing that every homeowner in New Jersey can agree on, it's that property taxes are too high. Although this mayor and council have kept expenses virtually flat for seven straight years and there was no municipal tax increase for four out of the last five years, we can't rest on our laurels. Members of the council, look at each of your departments and keep expenses under control. When you prepare the budget this year, use a sharp pencil and don't forget the eraser. Our residents deserve an affordable tax rate. With that in mind, I am asking that every council member recommend any position which can either be elimated or consolidated. As part of this process, the council should interface with the county and the state to see if there are any local services which either duplicate county or state services or which can be done more efficiently by the county or the

We should cross train our employees so that they can help out other departments when there is a need for temporary assistance. I understand that the approach of government and business is not identical, but our taxpayers deserve to know that their tax dollars are being utilized efficiently.

Before I close, I have to say that this is a somewhat sad day for the members of the governing body. Vinnie Buttiglieri is a special person. He literally changed the way we pave our roads. During his six years on the council, 90 roads have been repaved without borrowing one dollar. By comparison, during the last year of the prior administration before Vinnie Buttigleri became a council member, only two roads were repaved and almost a half million dollars was borrowed to do them. Vinnie has been instrumental in every project which has been accomplished over the last six years. He is the embodi-ment of the word "innovator." But most importantly, he is one of the nicest people any one of us has ever met. Vinnie, we will miss you. Promise you won't be far away and that you will be there when we need you. Let us now go forward with an

appreciation of past accomplishments tempered with a renewed commit-ment to address the challenges which await us. If we all continue to work together, we cannot fail.





Even if you haven't "formally" made New Year's resolutions for 2001, this is the time of year to spend on reflection and new commitments. We usually resolve to exercise more, save more money, or spend more time with our families. Whatever worthy resolution you're considering (or chose and already broke!) I hope you'll make a commitment this year to get more involved in preserving New Jersey's open spaces.

Psychologists say one way to keep your resolutions is to divide them into small steps that can be completed in a short time. That way, small tastes of success help spur us on to the next step. In the interest of helping people stick with their commitments to conservation, here are some ways to get started.

Start small by getting outside! We often think of winter as a time of year when the natural world is dormant. Winter may be cold, and lack the colorful bursts of spring and fall, but it has unique charms all its own! With the leaves off the trees, you get a much better perspective on the depth and diversity of a forest. There is nothing like a walk in the woods on a cold winter day. And when you have a chance, go play in the snow! You don't have to have skis, snowboards or sleds. After a good snowfall, listen to the all-encompassing quiet that prevails when a blanket of snow muffles the buzzes, hums and rumbles we never notice are always in the background until

they're missing.
Getting involved locally is also a great first step. New Jersey has 566 municipalities, all of whom make land use decisions at regular monthly meetings. 
In addition to the library, a number of the students also performed at the Foster Parent Association Christmas Party. The group has plans for future performances.
