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Steven Merkler officially retires as South Plainfield Police Chief this week, a job he has held since 1997. He will be leaving with a list of accomplishments that have vastly improved the South Plainfield Police Department in many ways. Steven's brother Robert has

been named as acting police chief. Merkler, whose police career spans 26 years, will be leaving to take a job with the FBI in the New York Field Office. He said he is looking forward to his new assignment and excited with the prospect of continuing his law enforcement career with the FBI.

Merkler became a police officer in 1974 with the East Orange Police Department. In 1975 oined the South Plainfield Police Department. In 1978 he moved to California, but after only a year, he returned to South Plainfield. Merkler was promoted to Ser-geant in 1985, Lieutenant in 1989, Police Captain in 1993 and Chief in 1997.

When asked about his accomplishments, Merkler interrupted to say that they were everyone's accomplishments, not just his and to use the words "our" or "us"

when listing them. Some highlights include hiring the first female officer as well as a Hispanic and an African Ameri-can; the police department's reaccreditation program in 1999, an ordinance for mandatory drug testing; the implementation of the 911 emergency system (merging police, fire, rescue and emergency management); the new community policing building on the cor-ner of New Market Ave. and Hamilton Blvd.; improving the firearm range, making it one of the finest in central New Jersey. Overall crime in South Plainfield has dropped 20%

Also, a Special Problems Units was established to address citizens concerns, the Traffic Safety Bureau was expanded to three officers, a full-time narcotic office was added to the detective bureau and two civilians were hired replacing police officers in the commu-nications office (allowing them to go back on patrol).

Last year, the police department received over \$555,000 in federal forfeiture funds and with that money they have purchased a prisoner transport van, a traffic safety

van, a stealth patrol car, three new detective cars, a traffic speed dis-play trailer, a DWI breathalyzer machine, three personal computers for the detective bureau, five mobile computers for patrol cars and a bullet resistant shield.

One accomplishment that Merkler alone can take credit for is his perfect attendance record during his 25 years. He also has been instrumental in helping Rhett Cady, the son of South Plainfield Officer William Cady, who died in the line of duty in 1975. He helped raised money so Cady could attend the police academy in Florida. Cady has since been appointed to the Indian Creek, Fla. Police Department.

Mayor Dan Gallagher recalled that in 1997, when Chief Mueller announced his retirement, three applicants were interviewed for the job. He said Steven Merkler became the obvious choice and was appointed unanimously.

Gallagher added that he has never been disappointed. Chief

Merkler has been at nearly even function in the borough, including the recent DARE graduations held at all five schools. He has also attended every council meeting while chief. He has been an asset in handling the police department's budget, obtaining grants for salaries, hiring additional per-sonal, bullet proof vest and has saved the borough tax dollars in numerous wavs

SP Volunteer Firefighters Battle Two Major Fires This Past Week

South Plainfield's Volunteer Firemen were called out two times in the middle of the night in the past week, one on a tractor trailer and one on a house fire. Last Friday, a tractor trailer fire

at 4:17 a.m., brought out various emergency services to U.S. Plas-tic Sales, located on Metuchen Rd., on the report of a fire. When they arrived, a 40 foot trailer in the parking lot was fully engulfed. It took the South Plainfield Fire hazard, on a scale of 1 to 10 with one being the least hazardous, these materials are considered to be a one. The incident was handled as arson and is under investigation by Fire Inspector. Joe Abruzzese and Police Det. Gene Bataille.

Due to the location of the fire, traffic was not disrupted during the morning rush hour. Many residents found out about the fire on television, a helicopters showed live shots of the burning trailer on

and Plainfield Fire Dept. Late Sunday night a house fire was reported on the twelve hundred block of South 9th St. A resident in the house was awakened with an odor of smoke and quickly woke her daughter and the other occupants of the house. They all fled the residence without any injury. The fire was reported by a next door neighbor. The house sustained damage to

all floors and the roof. The family dog, a rottweiler, perished in the fire. The residents of the destroyed home were taken to a friend's house in North Plainfield.

The fire was extinguished by the South Plainfield Fire Department and determined accidental, possibly caused by a faulty appliance. The house apparently did not have any fire detectors.

A member of the South Plainfield Fire Department sustained a minor knee injury after he slipped on the ice at the scene of the fire.



That'll do it for this week and this month. We'll be back next Friday with more. See you then.

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



Three Men Arrested For Armed Robbery

On Friday, Feb. 16, at 11:28 p.m., an armed robbery occurred outside a house on 116 Fairmount Ave., South Plainfield.

Three men; a 20-year-old South Plainfield resident, a 19-year-old Plainfield resident and a 17-yearold juvenile Tinton Falls resident, were robbed at gunpoint outside the Fairmount Ave. home after they left a party at that location.

The three men were approached by three adult males. One suspect, Robert Lee Turner, 19, of Plainfield, pulled out a loaded .22 caliber revolver and put it to the head of one of the victims, threatening to pull the trigger and demanding money. The other suspects stood by the victims, threatening them as the gunman pointed his weapon at those victims also. The two accomplices, Duane Dudley, 20, of Plainfield and Richard Timmons, 18, of Edison, fled into the Fairmount home along with the gunman. The gunman removed his coat containing the gun and went into the house. He then gave another suspect, Quaran Schenck, 19, of Plainfield, the money from the robbery and told him to hold it.

Sgt. Arancio, Officers McConville, Cassio, Mahoney, Diana, Hoppe and P. Campagna responded to the residence and secured those inside of the house. Once inside, the officers observed evidence of narcotic use. They detained the suspects after determining that they matched the descriptions of those responsible for the robbery. Upon further investigation, the four suspects were arrested for the robbery and possession of the stolen property. The gunman's coat was recovered, found with a loaded .22 caliber revolver from inside the house.

The officers also arrested Justin S. Adametz, an 18 year old Edison resident, for possession of marijuana and possession with the intention to distribute marijuana after finding baggies of the drug in his pockets while continuing their investigation.

continuing their investigation. Seven juveniles were taken into custody after the officers observed the use and presence of alcohol at the house, along with evidence of drug use. They were later released to their parents.

The homeowner's son, Jassie S. Farag, 20, was arrested at the residence and charged with providing alcohol to juveniles and other underaged persons. Robert L. Turner was charged

Robert L. Turner was charged with robbery, possession of a weapon, possession of a weapon for an unlawful purpose and possession of hollow point bullets. Bail was set at \$35,000, with no 10% option, and was held at the county jail.

Duane Dudley was charged with robbery, with a bail of \$25,000, with no 10% option, and was held at the county jail.

Quaran Schenck was charged with possession of stolen property and the stolen money, with a bail of \$25,000, with no 10% option, and was held at the county jail.

Justin Adametz was charged with possession of marijuana and possession with the intent to distribute. His bail was set at \$10,000, with no 10% option and was held at the county jail.

Jassie Farag was charged with providing alcohol to minors and was released on a summons.
