75TH BIRTHDAY PARTY A SUCCESS

Monday nights celebration of South Plainfield's 75th birthday was a standing room only affair. Residents began arriving early to get a good seat and well before the festivities started, every seat was taken and the hall outside the council chambers was bursting with people. If you missed this, you missed a great evening of history and memories.

This 75th birthday celebration was planned by the South Plainfield Celebrations Committee and chaired by Borough Administrator Pat Vargo. All the hard work paid off when the huge crowd of enthusiastic residents turned out to hear a re-enactment of the first council meeting and a short history of South Plainfield presented by the Historical Society members. They even got to meet some of our past officials who also attended the party. Everyone got a souvenir book to remember the occasion.

Present day council members had a name card in front of their seat with the name of a member of the first council. They acted out what the first mayor and council said at the very first meeting. The 1926 Council consisted of Mayor William Hamilton, Charles H. Thornton, Jr. (Police and Public Safety), Robert Ritter (Fire and Water), Albert J. Dellavalle (Finance Committee), Henry Brentnall (Administration Committee), Milton Mendel (Street Committee), Michael Pomponio (Street Lighting). The most interesting part of the first meeting was the request to pay Piscataway \$1,600 to buy our freedom.

Three past mayors were in attendance, along with many other past and present South Plainfield dignitaries. Natasha Kurilew, a student at SPHS started the festivities by singing the National Anthem and the entire room of guests sang right along with her. Many scouts and school children were in the audience and learned a lot about the early days of South Plainfield.

Rev. Dennis O'Neil, Pastor of First Baptist Church said the opening prayer. The First Baptist Church is the oldest church in town.

The mayor asked anyone who

was over 75 to raise their hands and well over a dozen people did so. They were also invited to come up to blow out the candles on the birthday cake.

Former Mayor Harry Gaynor (1967-1968) had the crowd on the edge of their seats with some of the stories he recalled. He was mayor when Englehard Ind. purchased 1,572 parcels of land from the town which they found out they did not own. These parcels were prizes in a raffle and the owners lived all over the country. The Mafia even became involved by attempting to buy some of the parcels dirt cheap and reselling them at inflated prices. Gaynor recalled that then Governor Hughes had to enact state legislation to prevent the parcels being bought and sold at higher prices. Gaynor also recalled that while he was mayor, the riots in Plainfield occurred.

Former Mayor Joseph P. Coughlin (1974-1978) said he had attended South Plainfield's 50th Birthday and hopes he will be invited to the 100th Anniversary Celebration. He added that even though he no longer lives in South Plainfield, his daughter is still a resident here.

Former Mayor Mike English (1983-1986), a lifelong resident, is now Recreation Director and still lives in town. He said much has happened in the 75 years in terms of growth. He added that South Plainfield is more than just a group of houses, it is filled with homes and families and most families tend to stay here generation after generation.

Four members of the South Plainfield Historical Society, Mary Mazepa, Bill Tuthill, Arline Anthony and Scott Culver all gave a small history of our town. In future issues of the *Observer*, we will feature this history in the next few issues.

The evening concluded with a birthday cake with 75 candles, which were blown out by several of our older residents. A buffet, catered by Michael's Kitchen topped off a great birthday party. The robber walked into the store holding a 9mm. handgun. He demanded the money while pointing the gun at three employces. He then pulled back the slide on the gun ejecting a bullet and chambering another bullet into the gun.

Meanwhile another employee, a 63 year old female South Plainfield resident, approached the gunman and told him to leave the store. She did not realize that he was in the act of robbing the store. The suspect turned and struck the employee on the left side of her head with the gun, knocking her to the floor.

The robber then fled the store on foot with an undetermined amount of cash. The injured employee was taken to Muhlenberg Hospital where she received seven stitches and remained there for observation. The suspect is described as a Hispanic male, thin build, wearing a red bandana over his face, a black baseball cap and a beige plaid jacket

Patrol units checked the area, but failed to locate the suspect. Officer Mahoney responded to the scene. Det. Parker is heading the investigation of the incident.

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

the young people in our country. As an official, Sue works with gymnastics in a variety of positions. Since 1984 she has served as a New Jersey Interscholastic Athletic Association Official/Judge and a New Jersey Gymnastic Official. In 1998, Sue added NJSIAA Girls Gymnastic Rules Interpreter to her list. Sue represents New Jersey Girls Gymnastics at State and National levels. She attends all meetings at the state level and the National Federation Officials Association level and assists with rules interpretations and special commitat the National meetings. She is a judge at girls gymnastics competi-tions in New Jersey at varsity high school level and acts as a Meet Referee at county and state meets and tournaments.

Sue was very surprised and honored to be selected for this award. "I enjoy judging the sport of gymnas-tics and I feel that my experience as Rules Interpreter' helps me as an of-ficial, as well as benefiting the sport in representing New Jersey Girls Gymnastics," she explained.

After completing these four re-quirements, the girl is ready to begin her Silver Award Project. She must design the project, implement the project and carry it out to its conclusion. This project is a personal action plan for helping others, which builds upon accomplishments made in Girl Scouting, in addition to all that was learned by completing the first four requirements for the Silver Award.
