Robert Merkler is South Plainfield's Police Chief



Last Thursday, a promotion ceremony held at Borough Hall named Robert K. Merkler, Chief of the South Plainfield Police Department. Merkler was named Acting Chief in February, succeeding his brother Steven, who retired.

The council chambers were filled with members of law enforcement, along with officials from around the state and county. Police Chief's from surrounding towns, as well as family, friends and members of our own police department were there to give Merkler their support.

Mayor Gallagher noted that since his appointment as acting Chief, Merkler has been answering his phone saying, Acting Police Chief Merkler. Gallagher said that he is looking forward to hearing him just say, Police Chief Robert Merkler.

Chief Merkler is a 23 year veteran of law enforcement, who began his career with the Coral Springs, Florida Police Department in October of 1977. In July, 1979 he returned home to New Jersey to become a member of the North Plainfield Police Department. He was employed by the NPPD until joining the South Plainfield Police Department in October 1983.

Chief Merkler has been married to his wife, Doreen for 23 years and

Merkler was promoted to Sergeant in January 1989, Lieutenant in September 1993, Captain in January 2000, and Acting Chief in February 2001.

LIGHTNING STRIKES SULLIVAN'S AUTO BODY, SHOP IS DESTROYED



Sullivan's Auto Body Shop on Hamilton Blvd. was destroyed by a fire when hit by lightning on Monday night; 10 cars inside were all damaged.

Monday at about 11:30 p.m., a violent thunderstorm passed through South Plainfield and lightning struck Sullivan's Auto Body Shop, located on Hamilton Blyd.

The South Plainfield Fire Department responded on a report of a structure fire and the first responding Police Officer, Philip Campagna reported there was a fire at the rear of the building. The fire was brought under control in about an hour. Assisting in extinguishing the blaze were the New

Market Fire Department from Piscataway and Plainfield Fire Department. The building was extensively damaged. There were 10 vehicles inside of the structure and all were destroyed. The monetary loss at this time is unknown. There were no injuries reported.

The fire appears to have originated at the rear of the building on the outside. According to fire officials, a bolt of lightning struck the rear wall causing a ten-foot by ten-foot section of

brick facade to collapse off of the building. The lightning ignited the wooden roof and the fire spread across the interior of the roof. The vehicles inside the shop were damaged by smoke, heat, water and falling debris. Fire officials were on the scene all day Tuesday assessing the damage.

Middlesex Co. Hazmat, Office of Emergency Management responded to the scene. The South Plainfield Rescue Squad, 35 firefighters and five police officers also responded to the scene.

2001 Census Figures Show Increase in Population in South Plainfield

According to the 2001 Census, South Plainfield's population has increased slightly since the last count.

Total population in South Plainfield in 2001 was 21,810, up from 20,489 in 2000. That is an increase of 1,321 in 10 years.

Other interesting faces were that the largest age group is the 35-44 years old, comprising 17.5 percent or 3,819. The senior population is about 23 percent and females make up 51 percent of our population.

South Plainfield has 7,307 housing

South Plainfield has 7,307 housing units, 89 percent are owner-occupied. There are 783 renter-occupied units or 10.9 percent.

The average household size is 3.04

This years crew of crossing guards have been doing a great job. Several times last year, we ran articles about problems with the crossing guards and the company that was hired to oversee them.

Many times guards simply didn't show up, leaving very busy intersections with no crossing guard and no substitute to replace them. When that happened, the South Plainfield Police Department must cover their posts. At times that was a difficult assignment, especially when four posts

Crossing guards come under the jurisdiction of the borough, not the school board. Crossing guard companies are chosen by bid. Two years ago, when the bids were opened, Labor Management Concepts, (LMC) of North Arlington was the low bidder. This was the first time they were of North Arlington was the low bidder. This was the first time they were awarded the crossing guard bid. They didn't get off to a very good start when they approached the guards, who had worked in the borough the year before for another company. They offered them all jobs at less pay than they had been earning. Some guards agreed, some said no. The year was filled with no-shows and no-substitutes and lots of complaints. Several meetings were held, fines were imposed and the complaints were

eral meetings were held, tines were imposed and the compraints were still coming in.

When the bids were opened last summer, DMS Systems, Inc. won the bid and everyone gave a sigh of relief. DMS had previously been the company the borough had hired and they had a pretty good record.

Throughout this school year, we have been keeping an eye on the school guards to see if this company was doing better. Through rain, sleet and snow the guards diligently were at their assigned intersections, making sure the children make it safely to school. We feel that their commitment to the safety of our children should be noted. These guards have become friends to many of the children, calling many of them by their first name.

According to Doretia McCarthy of DMS, "Our crossing guards are relentless in their commitment to the safety of the children. Many times they brighten the day of the youngsters on his or her way to or from school. My hat goes off the crossing guard staff of South Plainfield for protecting our most precious gift—our children."

Some crossing guards have been doing their jobs for 20 years, some have just started, but all of them take their responsibilities seriously. Just try to ignore one of them and see what happens.

We are asking parents to let their school crossing guards know how much they appreciate them. Before school lets out this year, just tell them thank you. They would love to hear from you. 
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southplainfieldpeople | Cast Named for Summer Drama Workshops 2001 Production of Bye Bye Birdie

There are two sides to every story

On May 24, 2001 an article appeared on the front page of the South Plainfield *Observer*. The article titled "Mayor Promises Swift Action on Rat Problem at 1226 South 9th Street. South Plainfield." The address is presently a non-residing address as a result of a house fire, which killed a dog. The article states that the Mayor of South Plainfield, Mr. Gallagher, was unable at the time to contact the homeowners. Although, the home owners oldest son's work sign, including a phone number had been displayed on the lawn of the premises since the fire. As soon as the son was contacted about the debris, he notified the homeowners immediately. Two days after the homeowners re ceived notice from their son, action was taken. As a result, the homeowner immediately financed a dumpster and a work crew to remove debris from the premises.

Mr. Gallagher stated that the homeowners were allegedly in the midst of a divorce, which was incorrect. The homeowners have been divorced for several years. The female homeowner has been happily remarried and they were the occupants of the home at the time of the fire. Furthermore, they have been temporarily relocated to a different address in South Plainfield. The male owner of the house has been residing at a different address for several years.

My name is Anthony Calderone. I'm the youngest son the homeowners. It hurt me to see my child-hood home burn down that night. It disturbs me even more to learn that Mr. Gallagher has allegedly commented on personal information and portrayed them in a negative light.

The homeowners of 1226 South

oth Street, South Plainfield are my parents. I love them both dearly. More over, I am appalled that Mr. Gallagher, with all the resources at his fingertips was unsuccessful at making direct contact with the homeowners of the house, especially since the female homeowner has been presently residing at a South Plainfield address. More care should be taken in the futures othis type of embarrassment does not happen to any other public resident. I believe it was unnecessary for Mr.

Gallagher to allegedly make any comment in reference to my parents personal life and business.

As I had approached my mother's house the night of the fire, an officer of the South Plainfield Police department stopped me. He asked me who I was and said, "he had to get on his radio and speak with someone to give me permission to approach the house". The police officer told me everyone escaped the house okay and that they were allegedly having problems with the water pressure. I believe that this alleged water pressure problem that night deserves the front page of the South Plainfield Observer. It certainly should be a concern for every South Plainfield resident,

After the fire and during this litiga-

After the fire and during this litigation both homeowners of 1226 south 9th street were hospitalized due to heart conditions. This was an attributing factor in this situation. I think if Mr. Gallagher was as swift with the water pressure as he is with his words, perhaps I wouldn't be writing to the Observer. I feel that the health department should have placed rodent poison at the site immediately to ensure public safety and health. Until they were able to contact my parents about this problem. The safety of the residents should not have been compromised.

After Mr. Gallagher removes the rats from 1226 South 9th Street, he should swiftly remove all the walking and talking rats from city hall.

Finally, 'our family would like to personally apologize to the residents of South Plainfield for the unforescen problem. We hope to have this property situation resolved quickly to restore South Plainfield to its original beauty. I would like to thank all the neighbors who helped us on the night of the fire. It is comforting to know that some people still care. Our family would like to thank all the firefighters and policemen for their dedication and bravery they illustrated that night. I still feel that South Plainfield is the best because of its residents.

the insurance company would not cover this procedure. He tried to dissuade her, but she was determined. She found a doctor who would "find" a medical reason for the insurance company. Her family and friends tried in vain to convince her not to do this radical surgery. They all loved her for herself, not what she looked like. She went ahead, had the surgery and was planning to come home three days later. Her children made signs wel-coming her home and all was ready for her. On the third day, she started spiking a fever which progressively kept getting higher. They opened her up and saw that there was a leak where the tissue had been reconnected and was spewing out toxins into her sys-tem. They placed her in ice because now her temperature was up to 109 degrees. They went in again, but her systems were shutting down. And four days later after this "successful" surgery, Karen died.

But when it drives someone to seek out radical procedures to make their appearance conform to what is "normal" or "pretty" we have gone beyond civilized. 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

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
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SPHS Department of World Languages Inducts Honor Society Members





Local Business Owner Pleads Guilty to Fraud

The Office of the Inspector General (OIG), Department of Defense (DOD), announced that on June 7, Moti Glaser of Staten Island, NY and his business, Technology Products Manufacturing Co. Inc., South Plainfield, NJ, were sentenced in US District Court, Newark, NJ. Glaser was sentenced to one year and one day in prison. Both Glaser and Technology Products were each fined \$257,525.50. Glaser and his company both pled

Glaser and his company both pied guilty on Dec. 13 to one-count each of the major fraud act. Glaser, d/b/a Technology Products Manufacturing Co., was engaged in manufacturing chemical and biological protective hoods for the DOD through three contracts valued in excess of \$10 million. The protective hoods were destined for use by military personnel assigned to regions around the world where the threat exists of chemical and biological weapons use. The hoods were also purchased for use by military and civilian personnel for environments where chemical and biological accidents had occurred and clean up was necessary.

clean up was necessary.

The fraud allegations against Glaser and Technology Products included filing in excess of \$1.4 million in false progress payment claims against the contracts, switching random sample hoods selected by the Government for independent certified laboratory destructive testings; submitting false Government DD-250 (material inspection and receiving reports) claiming boxes contained hood quantities that were in fact empty shipping boxes labeled to deceive Government inspectors; and

certifying the hoods were in compliance of Government manufacturing specifications when, in fact, 95 percent of the protective hoods failed a reinspection of hoods previously shipped to the DOD. The failure rate criteria for the protective hoods, as required by the specifications, had to be less than two percent.

be less than two percent.

A DOD safety alert was issued for the protective hoods following the inspection and discovery of the numerous flaws. The protective hoods were removed from DOD inventory following the safety alert.

An emergency reprocurement of the protective hoods was initiated by the DOD following the safety alert and termination of the contracts for default. The replacement costs associated with the contract terminations totaled \$12 million. Total payment to Technology Products for the defective protective hoods totaled approximately \$5 million. Total loss to the Government associated with this fraud exceeded \$17 million.

This investigation is being conducted by the Defense Criminal Investigative Service (the investigative arm of the OIG, DOD), the FBI and US Army CID. This case is being prosecuted by Assistant United States Attorney Scott Christie, District of NJ.














High School Prom Takes a Cruise on the Cornicopia



ORDINANCE NO. 1571

AN ORDINANCE REQUIRING CRIMINAL HISTORY RECORD CHECKS FOR ALL RECREATIONAL VOLUNTEERS PROVIDING SERVICES IN THE BOROUGH OF SOUTH PLAINFIELD RECREATIONAL PROGRAMS.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of South Plainfield, County of Middlesex, State of New Jersey as follows:

The purpose of this ordinance is to require that, effective upon the adoption of this Ordinance, all persons who volunteer their services in South Plainfield Recreational Programs, and who have contact with children and teenagers as a result of such volunteer services, shall be requested to consent to a criminal history record check prior to performing any such volunteer services. Applicants for volunteer positions will be disqualified from performing volunteer services if: (i) any such applicant shall refuse to consent to a criminal history record check or (ii) if a criminal history record check to which an applicant has consented discloses a conviction for any offense which would disqualify an applicant for paid public school employment as defined in Section 1 of Pt. 1986, c. 116 (N.J.S.A. 18A:6-7.1).

SECTION 2. CONSENT

Prior to performing, any volunteer services, all applicants for volunteer positions in the Borough of South Plainfield Recreation Department shall be requested to provide a written consent, on forms to be furnished by the Borough, allowing the Borough of South Plainfield to perform criminal history record checks on the applicant, and authorizing the Borough of South Plainfield to exchange fingerprint data and receive criminal history record information from the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the Division of State Police for use in making the determinations to be made under this ordinance. And applicant who refuses to consent to such a background check will not be permitted to provide volunteer services and the Borough shall decline to accept such volunteer services.

SECTION 3. SUBMISSION OF IDENTIFICATION INFORMATION

SECTION 4. NOTICE OF QUALIFICATION OR DISQUALIFICATION

Upon receipt of the criminal history record information for an applicant from the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the Division of State Police, the Borough of South Plainfield shall notify the applicant; in writing, of the applicant's qualification or disqualification as a recreational volunteer. If the applicant is disqualified, the convictions which constitute the basis for the disqualification shall be identified in the written notice to the applicant.

SECTION 5. ACCURACY OF THE CRIMINAL HISTORY RECORD CHECK

An applicant shall have 14 days from the date of the written notice of disqualification to challenge the accuracy of the criminal history record information. No applicant for volunteer services shall be disqualified from providing volunteer services without first having an opportunity to challenge the accuracy of the disqualifying criminal history record. Any challenge shall be decided by the governing body of the Borough of South Plainfield in a confidential manner.

SECTION 6. OFFENSES CONSTITUTING GROUNDS FOR DISQUALIFICATION

A volunteer applicant shall be permanently disqualified from volunteer services if the individual's criminal history record reveals a record of conviction for a crime or any other offense for which public school employment candidates are disqualified pursuant to section 1 of PL. 1986, c. 116 (N.J.S.A. 18A:6-7.1) as

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


