The men's division will be competing for first and second prizes of \$500 and \$250. Nine-year-old Riley Hubner loves sports, especially baseball. A serious Mets fan, he has played short stop and pitched for Jr. Baseball. He also likes water sports, snowboarding and soccer. He spends much time going back and forth from home to the hospital. The leukemia has slowed him down and put a temporary halt on sports. Yet those who know him say there is always a smile on his face.

A bone marrow transplant is mong the possible treatments for Riley. Leukemia is cancer of the blood which results in overproduction of cancerous white blood cells. Leuke-

The Bone Marrow Drive is an extremely important part of the events on Saturday. As scary as it might sound, the bone marrow donor test is as simple as a pin prick. Bill Ashnault explained that the simplified testing method is new. The paper work, a few

simple questions and a signature, take more time than the actual test. Since making a match is difficult, finding a bone marrow match for Riley is a long shot.

Each person who participates in the drive is placed in a national registry. If they are not a match for Riley, they could be a match for someone fighting leukemia anywhere in the

country. Twin City Pharmacy ar ranged for the bone marrow drive to be conducted by HOA Registry Foundation, Inc. The non-profit organization is part of a national bone marrow registry. A \$79 donation is requested for lab costs, but is not required.

Traffic Safety Unit Introduces WHALE Program The South Plainfield P.D. Traffic Safety Unit will be implementing the "We Have a Little Emergency" (WHALE) program at its child passenger safety seat checkpoint, which will be held at Staples on July 20. This ongoing program may be utilized when any type of child passenger

safety seat is inspected or installed. While driving to the store with her infant daughter, a young mother lost control of her car and crashed into a tree. The mother was knocked unconscious, while the child appeared to be uninjured. Due to her injuries, the mother could not identify herself or her child. She was also unable to provide vital medical information about her daughter. Because of her age, the child was unable to communicate with rescue personnel. While both the mother and her child received the best care possible, the emergency services personnel felt their rescue and treatment could have been more effective and effcient if they knew the child's name and pertinent emergency information.

What Is The WHALE Program?

The WHALE Program is an iden-tification and information package that is used on child care safety seats. Originally created by Connie Day, a caregiver from Richmond, Va., who wondered what would happen to the children in her care in the event of an

automobile accident. It is a great idea whose time has come of age! WHALE is currently used in at least 32 states and is the first program of its kind here in the United States. It requires the use of four self-adhesive stickers and one 4"x4" information label.

How To Use The WHALE Stickers?

Two WHALE car seat stickers (printed on white vinyl) attach to the sides of the car seat. The stickers alert rescue personnel that the seat has the important info label attached to the back. Two WHALE stickers (printed

on clear vinyl) attach to the rear side windows of the vehicle, alerting rescuers that the vehicle occupants participate in the program.

One information label attached to the back of the car seat provides im-portant information about the child in the seat, such as the name, date of birth, medical history and whom to contact in case of emergency. There also space for a photograph of the child. If more than one child uses the seat, several labels with attached photographs can fit on the back of the


the window, entered the store where they removed several cartons of cigarettes and fled the scene. At least two cases of cigarettes were reported stolen, their value unknown

Dear Editor,

During the first few weeks of the summer, there have been a couple small heatwaves in Central Jersey. As with all heatwaves, they put a tremendous strain on the "power grid" in our area. However, unlike the situation in California last year where there were "rolling blackouts," it seems that our neighborhood is the only one left without power when electricity is consumed to its maximum in this community.

So far this summer, the Oakmoor Ave. neighborhood has lost power seven times. The funny thing is that each of those seven times, residents of Oakmoor Ave. have seen lights on no more than a block away. My older brother called PSE&G, as well as the Mayor's Office, on numerous occasions during these recent outages to complain about the situation, and was told by PSE&G that the outages in our neighborhood were a result of a sector in the "power grid" that needs to be upgraded.

Our neighborhood has a number of elderly residents and families who are among those who can be seriously affected by the heat. There are also other residents, such as my brother, who work outside in the heat all day, and would like to come home to a nice air conditioned home after being in the blazing sun for eight hours. If there is such a thing as "rolling blackouts" for our area, then they should be used in a way where it doesn't seem that only a specific area in the town is affected every time there a heatwave.

However, if it is a specific problem with the "power grid," where a power station needs to be upgraded, then by all means, have it upgraded. When it comes to adding more housing in the community, there doesn't seem to be a problem in doing that, but when it comes to providing the essential infrastructure to support all these new homes, nobody is willing to make the effort. If we choose to build, we should do it judiciously, and make sure there are enough resources available to support such building. Otherwise, we're going to have one problem af-ter another, like recently with our school system and the traffic tie-ups in South Plainfield **GREG MACHOS**

Over the past month, quite a few Maple Ave. residents have approached me to see what can be done about the trucks that zoom down their road each day. Maple Ave. is a key thoroughfare, but homes filled with families line it practically from end to end. Trucks whizzing down the road at break-neck speed are creating a significant prob-lem – one the town needs to solve at

The first thing that bothers me about this situation is the lack of mean ingful response from Borough Hall. It's been several months since residents began voicing their concerns and the problems still exist. Nothing is more frustrating than being ignored. Hopefully, that is not the case and someone just dropped the ball. Either way, I call upon the Mayor and Council to do

something. Solve this problem! Second, while I am in no position to change things, I can offer some ideas that may help. A long-term solution would be best. In the meantime, though, there are ways to reduce the noise, traffic and - most importantly — the safety hazards the trucks bring. There are four steps the town should take without delay: 1. It should strictly enforce the speed

limit. This is an obvious first step to address the safety of these families. The word will get out if the police start issuing tickets.

It should start checking truck 2 weights and performing safety checks. If the trucks are going to be there, they must be safe.

3. It should set up its speed-display machine to let motorists see how fast they are driving. Some motorists may not realize how fast they drive. This, along with posting more speed limit signs (something that's been promised), can help. 4. It should talk to businesses that

route trucks down Maple Ave. to see if they can re-route some traffic. Some may cooperate; others may not. But at least we've alerted them to the problem.

As a candidate, I have no power to put these ideas into effect. Neverthe less, the town needs to get off its duff and resolve this problem. These ideas are a start. I hope Borough Hall is lis-

We Have A Budget!

Well, the wrangling is over. Last week the State Assembly and Senate passed the 2003 New Jersey State Budget. Unlike the federal government, our state constitution requires a balanced budget. As you probably know, Governor McGreevey had to deal with a \$9 billion dollar deficit left over from last year's budget. Since the entire state budget is 24 billion dollars that deficit equaled more than 35 percent of what our state spends for an entire year. I am yery

Assemblyman Patrick Diegnan for an entire year. I am very happy to report that we were able to adopt a budget, which pays off that incredible deficit and does not raise income taxes, sales taxes or the gasoline tax. The hard working middle class families of New Jersey were our focus as we prepared this budget. Funding for the Senior Property Tax Freeze Program and the Homestead Rebate Program was increased by \$22 Million dollars. This year the homestead rebate will be \$775.00. In addition, the NJ Saver program, which refunds up to \$500 to property owners to help offset

school taxes, was protected. As the legislature worked through the budget numbers, we tried to bring a balance between what an individual pays in taxes and what corporations pay. It is just not right that our largest corporations were paying only \$200 per year in state corporate taxes. The corporate business tax, which was signed into law, closed tax loopholes so that large corporations now pay

their fair share to the state treasury. This is the first budget process that I was involved in and I am proud of the final product. I think that everyone worked hard to come up with a plan that addressed the state's fiscal crisis while at the same time preserving programs that protect our quality of life in New Jersey.

Redevelopment of the Hamilton Boulevard Industrial Site moved forward on Monday night at the Borough Council's regular public meeting. Following a public comment session, the Borough Council officially adopted the ordinance accepting the proposed redevelopment plan for the 27-acre site.

The next step in the redevelopment process will be to incorporate redevelopment planning as an integral element of the clean-up plan that is proposed for the site. This will involve a cooperative effort with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA). Through such a cooperative effort, the normally lengthy Superfund process can be expedited and the property redeveloped at the earliest possible date. Speaking on behalf of Dana Corporation, a past owner of the property, Attorney Michael Last said, "We are very pleased with tonight's vote as it sends a clear signal to the USEPA about the community's commitment to the successful redevelopment of this property."







Five South Plainfield teachers, Janice Cotoia, Lois Crespy, Judy Evans, Dale Haley and Michael Kafka retired this past June. Two other teachers, Joe Versocki, who taught Physical Edu-cation at the high school and Barbara Wilusz, Middle School seventh grade Science teacher, retired earlier. Eileen Zawacki, secretary at Franklin School, has announced her plans to retire at the end of this month.

Janice Cotoia has taught since 1956, with 35 years of experience in South Plainfield. She began as an el-ementary teacher at the Middle School, taught there for two years, moved to Franklin for another two years before commencing a maternity leave. She has been the reading teacher at John F. Kennedy, her last assign-ment, for many years. She has also taught grades two, three and five. Cotoia received her undergraduate degree in Business from Penn State. Later, when she decided to enter the field of education, she received a masters degree in Elementary Education from Rutgers University, where she earned her Reading Certification.

Cotoia was the first Kennedy teacher to receive the New Jersey Governor's Teacher Recognition Award for teaching excellence. In 1989, she was appointed as one of the original mem-bers of South Plainfield's Governor's Recognition Award Screening Com-mittee, where she served until 2001. Aside from her love of reading, her other interests include needlework (embroidery and crewell) and the computer. Lois Crespy has been a mathemat-

After two years he entered the Army, but returned to South Plainfield afterwards and began teaching metals at the high school. after 31 years of teaching in South Plainfield. Joe is a local resident who attended the public schools in town and graduated from SPHS. He ac-knowledges that he owes a lot to South Plainfield and the many teacher and coaches who were role models as he was growing up and who chal-lenged and inspired him to become a teacher. He attended Wichetah State, then transferred to East Tennessee State University, receiving his degree in 1969. He completed his student teaching at Seton Hall University.

Versocki began his career as a sub-stitute teacher in the district and then was hired to direct in-school suspen-sion at the high school. He later taught health and physical education, followed by physical education, both at the high school. His varied assignments include 13 years at Cedarcroft Middle School and nine years at the administration building, where as part

of special services he taught developmentally disabled students and pre school handicapped classes. With the support of Leonard Tobias, his super-intendent at the time, he attended Robert Wood Johnson Institute and vas trained to work with special needs children. Along with other faculty members, he also worked for nine years at the district's Summer School Program for the developmentally dis-abled. Versocki received a \$10,000 grant for weight training equipment to use with his special need students. He is internationally certified in Special Olympics and was the Director of Special Olympics in South Plainfield for nine years. During that time he helped showcase the community's spe-cial needs athletes on television. He was also an active member of SPEA and served on the Finance Commit-

tee during negotiations. Versocki has also led a busy life outside of teaching. He has been a mar-tial arts expert for over 36 years, winning many state and international championships. He is also a Martial Arts Stunt Breaker and Classical Weap-ons expert. In addition, he has written professionally for Karate Review and Action Martial Arts News, contributing feature articles on children. Versocki's material arts expertise

opened the door to stuntwork in films and television and to a new career as an actor. As a member of the Screen Actors Guild, he has appeared in a number of films including Donnie Brasco with, Al Pacino, on national and international television, including The David Letterman Show, Law and Or-der, and as a commentator on Wide World of Sports, in commercials and in other entertainment venues. In the summer of 2000, he co-produced and was the commentator on two radio shows on WPAT-1430 AM. He has studied at the Actors Training Insti-tute and the Independent Actors Guild. He has also been a screenwriter, a private detective and a firearms expert. His current goals are to learn to sing and to perform on The Sopranos. His future plans also include working in a rehab or outreach cen-ter as a drug counselor and to even-It ally earn a place on the South Plainfield High School Wall of Fame. Franklin School secretary Eileen Zawacki has been an important mem-

ber of South Plainfield's educational support personnel. A resident of the community, she began as a substitute secretary at the Middle School in 1977. Two years later she received a contract and began working at the old administration building at Foster and New Brunswick avenues, before mov-ing on to Franklin School. 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



§ 157-1. Operation of sewers as publicly owned utility.

§ 157-1. Operation of sewers as publicly owned usiny. The system of sanitary sewers, trunk or intercepting sewer or sewers, sanitary sewer works, sanitary sewer outlets, siphons, sanitary sewage disposal works, pumping stations and all improvements purchased by the Borough of South Plainfield from the South Plainfield Sewerage Authority, together with similar facilities and improvements constructed and owned by the Borough of South Plainfield or which may hereafter be constructed by the Borough of South Plainfield, shall hereafter be operated, maintained, managed and controlled by said Borough as a publicly owned or operated utility or enterprise of said Borough within the meaning and for the purposes of the Local Bond Law, NJ.SA. 40A:2-1 et seq., and the Local Boudget Law, NJ.SA. 40A:4-1, and all amendments thereof and all other provisions of other laws applicable. The Borough maintains the right to visit. Inspect and optical information regarding the

The Borough maintains the ring provisions of outer have appricable. The Borough maintains the ring provisions of outer have appricable, operation and type of discharge, on an as needed basis, for the protection and maintenance of the Borough's sewer system. The users of the system shall provide the Borough complete and unrestricted access to the collection system. Sewer users shall be required to submit data, which the Borough determines it requires, for servicing and maintaining the Borough's sewer system.

Definitions:

Building Connection shall mean the sewer line extended from a building to the property line and connecting with the service connection.

Service Connection shall mean the sewer line extended from the property line to the main in the street.

Sewerage System shall mean the sanitary sewerage system of the Borough of South Plainfield which transmits sewage to the Plainfield Area Regional Sewerage Authority for treatment by the Middlesex County Utilities Authority Treatment Plant.

BOD (denoting "biochemical oxygen demand") shall mean the quantity of oxygen utilized in the biochemical oxidation of organic matter under standard laboratory procedure in five (5) days at wenty degrees Centigrade (20°C), expressed in milligrams per liter in accordance with approved test procedures as defined in 40 CFR Part 136.

Buildings shall mean structures of all types, whether enclosed or not, such as shee pits, platforms, etc., which are connected, directly or indirectly, to the Borough sew lines.

Building Drain shall mean that part of the lowest horizontal piping of a drainage system which receives the discharge from soil, waste and other drainage pipes inside the walls of the building and convey it to the building sewer, beginning five feet (one and five tenths (1.5) meters) outside the inner face of the building wall.

Building Sawer shall mean the extension from the building drain to the public sewer or other place of disposal.

Categorical Industrial User shall mean a user subject to Categorical Pretreatmen Standards in accordance with EPA General Pretreatment Standards (40 CFR Part 403 Categorical Pretreatment Standard or Categorical Standard shall be any regulation containing pollutant discharge limits promulgated by USEPA in accordance with Section 307 (b) and (c) of the Act (32 U.S.C. 1317) which apply to a specific category of users which appear in 40 CFR Chapter I, Subchapter N, Parts 405-471.

Chlorine Demand shall mean the quantity of chlorine absorbed by wastewater in a given length of time to a specific residual concentration, expressed in milligrams per liter and performed in accordance with an approved test procedure as defined in 40 liter and performe CFR Part 136.

Composite Sample shall be a sample consisting of several sewage portions collected during a specific time period and combined to make representative sample.

Domestic Waste shall be any liquid waste containing animal or vegetable matter suspension or solution of the water carried wastes resulting from the discharge of w closets, laundry tubs, washing machines, sinks, distiwashers, or any other source water-carried waste of human origin or containing putrescible material.

Dwelling Unit shall mean residential space designated for more or less perr occupancy by a family, an individual or group of individuals maintaining a hou with cooking facilities.

Effluent Limitation shall be any restriction on quantity, rates and concentration of chemical, physical, thermal, biological and other constituents of pollutants established by permit, approval or imposed as an interim enforcement limit pursuant to an administrative order, including an administrative consent order.

Eloatable Oil shall be oil, fat or grease in a physical state such that it will separate by gravity from wastewater by treatment in an approved pretreatment facility.

Garbage shall mean solid wastes from the domestic and commercial prepara cooking and dispensing of food and from handling, storage and sale of produce.

Grab.Sample shall be a sample which is taken from a wastestream without regard to the flow in the wastestream and over a period of time not to exceed 15 minutes. Hazardous Pollutant shall be:

All non-domestic wastes discharged by an industrial user shall be considered industrial wastes. Industry shall be any establishment whose manufacturing process is included in the Standard Industrial Classification (SIC) codes.

Instantaneous Maximum Allowable Discharge Limit shall be the maximum concentration of a pollutant allowed to be discharged at any time, determined from the analysis of any discrete or composite sample collected, independent of the industrial flow rate and the duration of the sampling event.

Local Limit shall be where specific prohibitions or limits on pollutants or pollutant parameters are developed by the Middlesex County Utilities Authority in accordance with 40 CFR 403.5(d), such limits shall be deemed Pretreatment Standards for the purposes of Section 307(d) of the Act.

May is permissive; shall is mandatory.

MCUA shall be the Middlesex County Utilities Authority.

Medical Wastes shall be isolation wastes, infectious agents, human blood and blo products, pathological wastes, sharps, body parts, contaminated bedding, surgi wastes, potentially contaminate laboratory wastes and dialysis wastes.

-Contact Cooling Water shall be water used for cooling which does not come into chootact with any raw material

PARSA shall be the Plainfield Area Regional Sewerage Authority

pH shall mean the logarithm of the reciprocal of the weight of hydrogen ions in grams per liter of solution. Solutions with a pH greater than 7 are said to be basic; solutions with a pH less than 7 are said to be acidic; pH equal to 7 is considered neutral. Analysis shall be performed in accordance with an approved test procedure.

Shah be performed and an accordance with an approved test processing. Pollutant shahl be any dredged spoil, solid waste, incinerator residue, filter backwash sewage, garbage, refuse oil, grease, sewage sludge, septage, munitions, medica wastes, chemical wastes, biological materials, radioactive substance, thermal waste wrecked or discarded equipment, rock, sand, cellar dint and industrial, municipalo agricultural waste or other residue discharged into the sanitary sewer. This definition shall also include holding tenk waste.

Pretreatment Requirements shall be any substantive or procedural require to pretreatment imposed on a user, other than a pretreatment standard.

Standard shall be all applicable Federal, State and local rules and regulations implementing Section 307 of the Clean Waste Act of 1977 (33 U.S.C. 1251 et seq.) or N.J.S.A. 58:11-49, as well as any local requirements the Borough deems necessary. Septage shall be the combination of liquid and solid residues resulting from the treatme of waterborne domestic waste in an individual subsurface sewage disposal system. Septage Tank Waste shall be any waste from holding tanks such as vessels, chemical toilets, campers, trailers and septic tanks.

Serious Violation shall be an exceedances of an effluent limitation for a discharge point source set forth in a Non-Domestic Wastewater Discharge Permit approval, administrative order or administrative consent agreement, including interim enforcement limits, by 20% or more for a hazardous pollutant, or by 40% or more for a non-hazardous pollutant for which the effluent limitation is expressed as a monthly average or, in the case of an effluent limitation expressed as a daily maximum and without a monthly average, on the basis of the monthly average of all maximum daily test results for that pollutant in any month, in the case of an effluent limitation for a pollutant that is not measured by mass or concentration the MCUA shall prescribe an equivalent exceedances factor therefore. - § 157-3. Charges, fees, rents and connection regul

The following charges, sewer system fees, rents and regulations. The following charges, sewer system fees, rents and regulations for connections with and the use and services of the sewer system are hereby fixed and prescribed for each building or structure or group of buildings or structures which may have a connection with the sewer system (herein called "the premises"), and the Borough shall charge the same to the owner and bill the owner in accordance with § 157-5 of the Code of the Borough of South Plainfield.

General regulations.

- (1) The Borough reserves the right for cause to refuse any request for permission to connect to the sewer system, to compel discontinuance of the use of any sewer or to compel the pretreatment of industrial wastes by any industry to prevent harmful discharges to the sewer system in any respect.
- (2) Industries shall install fine screens to prevent the entry of any materials considered by the Borough to overload, impair the efficiency of or cause difficulties in the operation of sewers, pumping stations or meters.
- The Borough reserves the right to require industries having large volumes waste discharge or their process discharges batches into the sewer to inst meters, totalizers and recorders to record flows and, in addition, any suital regulating device for equalizing the rate of discharge. In addition, the Borou reserves the right to require sewer users to install flow sampling facilities suitat for the collection of flow-proportioned effluent samples. (3) er to instal
- Any building used in whole or part as a dwelling, or which requires or us sanitary sewerage disposal, now or hereafter, on any lot abutting the street which a sanitary sewer line is now or hereafter constructed, shall be connected with such sewer line:
- Existing building within 180 days after adoption of this ordinance; New building prior to occupancy thereof; or Buildings on a strete in which a sanitary sever line is hereafter constructed, within 180 days after the completion of the construction of such sever

- (5) Where there is a sanitary sewer main within 100 feet or less of a property it shall be unlawful to own, operate, maintain, use or permit the maintenance, operation or use of a cesspool, septic tank or outhouse. (6) The Borough shall not be liable for stoppage of the sewer lines between the main sewer line and the building being served (lateral), nor for any damage resulting from the stoppage, nor will the Borough provide any labor or material to free, olar or enrow the obstructions from the lateral system. All such work shall be the sole responsibility of the owner of the premises served.

(7) A vent shall be connected with the house lateral just inside the house trap.

(8) Whenever a connection has been legally made within a sewer main for the purpose of providing sewer service to a cellar, a backflow preventer shall be placed on the lateral connection, which backflow preventer shall be maintained solely by the owner of the premises served.

(9) No cellar drains of any kind shall be connected with the Borough's sanitary

system.
(10) Whenever a sewer utility user charge is delinquent and said charge still remains in arrears on the first day of January in the calendar year following the calendar year when said user charge first became in arrears, the Department Head of the Sewer Utility bapartment Head, or the authorized designee of the Department Head, shall submit a certified list of delinquent sewer charges to the Mayor and Council to later than January 31*of each calendar year. Upon receipt of the list of delinquent charges, the Mayor and Council may, by general or special resolution, direct than January 31*of each calendar year. (13) Grease Traps - All restaurants, garages, hotels, commercial or industrial establishments from which any wastewater containing fats, wax, grease or oils, whether emulsified or not, shall be equipped with grease traps. Calculations as to design size and layout shall be prepared and signed by a Professional Engineer licensed in the State of New Jersey and shall be submitted to the Borough Engineer and also to the Plumbing Inspector. All grease traps shall be so located as to provide ease of maintenance by personnel and or easy access for compliance inspections. by the Borough and/or Plumbing Inspector. A location outside of the structure shall be provided unless otherwise specifically permitted.

(1) The Applicant or property owner, or their agent, shall be responsible for making the physical connection to the Borough's samilary sewer main and for furnishing and installing the service connection from the Borough's sewer pipe to the structure, including the cleanout, which will be placed one foot inside the curbline. That portion of the service connection from the sanitary sewer main to and including the cleanout shall be inspected by, and at the convenience of, a representative of the Borough, upon completion and acceptance, same becomes the property of the Borough, who will assume the responsibility for future maintenance thereof, excluding stoppages. Owners of line proved property currently connected to the sewer system may be required to install an inspection riser on their service connections and at their cost and expense when deemed necessary and ordered by the Borough.

(3) Service connections serving new industrial manufacturing facilities shall, in addition to other standard appurtenances, include the installation of a control manhole assembly in lieu of the aforementioned inspection riser and same

 - Three thousand dollars (\$3,000.) for the first four hundred (400) gallons of estimated annual daily average flow, plus three thousand dollars (\$3,000.) for each additional four hundred (400) galons of estimated annual average flow or major fraction thereof as determined by the Borough on the basis of the factors specified in NJ.S.A. 40:14A-8, the data and information made available to the Borough and the results of Borough investigation on meter reading studies.

In cases where the annual daily average flow cannot be computed with certainty because the factors constituting the criteria for computing these charges have not yet been determined with certainty, the charges shall be determined on the basis of relevant information requested by and supplied to the Borough. After the first year of operation, so that the annual daily flow can be established with certainty, the connection fee shall be adjusted to reflect that use. In no event shall the connection fee for stores, shopping centers and office buildings be calculated on less than one tenth (0.1) gallons per day per square foot of occupancy.

E Annual sewer rentals (1) General.

General.
(a) Sewer rentals shall be calculated annually and the cost of service distributed among users in proportion to each user's or user class's of sewage contribution to the system based upon flow, biological oxygen demand (BOD), suspended solids and chlorine demand. The Borough shall establish the formulas by which all costs associated with operating the sewer utility shall be recovered from each user classification. An appropriate factor to distribute the cost of infiltration and inflow into the system and flow from other extraneous sources on a flow proportioned besis will be applied to all users. Sampling and analysis shall be done to conform to accepted practice and in accordance with the current edition of Standard Methods for Examination of Water, Sewage and Industrial Wastes published by the American Public Health Association.
- (e) The cost of preparing and submitting this data for consideration by the Borough shall be borne by the industry: Ilkewise, the cost of sampling and analysis to determine compliance with the terms of the agreement shall be borne by the owner although conducted by the Borough or its duly authorized representative as established in Schedule A.

(7) Control meter and sampling manhole.

Industries permitted to connect to the Borough sewers, even though not initially being required to provide preliminary treatment, may be required to provide a control manhole and/or flow meter as described herein.

- (a) Where the owner provides its own water supply entirely separate from that supplied by the water utilities or provides from its own sources a portion of the water consumed on the premises, which eventually finds its way into the solverage system of the Borough, all aforementioned provisions will apply. Over 150 Attend American Legion 68th Picnic


