The Borough's Labor Day Parade Committee has announced that as of presstime, there are 66 entries in the annual parade on Sept. 2..



## Dear Editor,

This letter is in response to one written a couple weeks ago about renaming Roosevelt School to William J. Cady Elementary School. If any-thing, it should be named the Richard H. Conklin Elementary School. Richard was the first South Plainfield police officer killed in the line of duty.

All of his life Richard wanted to be a police officer. After serving in Cuba and Vietnam with the Marines, his lifelong dream came true. However, on Jan. 21, 1972, Richard's life came to an abrupt end.

While transporting a patient to Marlboro Hospital in a rescue squad rig, this patient suddenly attacked Richard, ripped his holster off of him and shot him a couple of times. He died a short time later at Muhlenberg

Mrs. Henry Conklin. He was also survived by two sisters and his beloved fiance. Their new life as husband and

Since Richard was the first South Plainfield police officer killed in the line of duty, I think he should be honored by having the new school named after him. The new administration building could be named after William J. Cady

It is always interesting when the political season starts, to see what kind of issues the candidates will try to create. Last week, I read with indignation as Jake Cataldo rambled on about how a young couple on Franklin Ave. was turned down when they wanted to build an addition on their house even though no neighbors objected. As chairman of the Borough's Zoning Board that heard this application, let me set the record straight. The purpose of the Zoning Board is to hear applications from homeowners and businesses who seek variances from the borough's zoning code. Mr. Cataldo was not present at any of the meet-ings when this case was considered, so his facts are a little off base. The house is question is located on Blecker St., not Franklin Ave. The young couple wanted to build an addition so that the side of their home would be two feet off of the side property line.

A setback of eight feet is required for single-family homes. Now, I don't know what kind of vision Mr. Cataldo has for So. Plainfield, but I can say with 100% certainty that if every house was two feet off of the prop-erty line, South Plainfield would be a town of row houses. The members of the Zoning Board expressed their unanimous concern with a setback of two feet and asked the couple to reconsider the extent of the variance requested. The couple later decided not to pursue the variance and withdrew the application a few weeks later.

As for lack of objections from neighbors, I hope Mr. Cataldo doesn't think the purpose of serving on a municipal board is to win a popularity contest. Our job is to consider all of the facts and do what we think is right for the neighborhood and the entire borough. Sometimes that means having the courage to say no, even to your fellow residents

Mr. Cataldo should also try to learn a little of the law related to zoning issues. When the Zoning Board grants a variance, it creates a legal precedent for subsequent cases. Granting a twofoot setback makes it more difficult to refuse a two-foot setback for the next applicant. This type of zoning would lead to congested neighborhoods, less open space and more flooding from increased run-off after storms.

In my eight years on the Zoning Board, Mr. Cataldo has attended only one meeting and that was our last meeting on Aug. 15 and even then he left after a few minutes. I recognize that candidates need to stir up issues where none exist, but his accusations of favoritism and mistreatment of residents is outright despicable. In the last eight years, the Zoning Board has

turned down only a handful of applications from residents looking to ex-pand their houses. The members of the Zoning Board are a cross section of what makes South Plainfield a great place to live: hard working residents who volunteer long hours to make our borough a better place for our chil-dren and grandchildren. The Zoning Board meets twice a month and meetings regularly run over three hours. If Mr. Cataldo had stayed for the entire meeting on Aug. 15, he would have seen that we heard ten applications and did not finish until after 11 p.m. Our members include a lawyer, a schoolteacher, an accountant, a manager of a home improvement store and a member of the county road department. Every applicant is treated with respect and in a serious manner. Mr. Cataldo should learn to treat people with that same respect. His accusa-tions of favors to politically connected builders would be laughable if it wasn't so insulting to members of the Zon-ing Board. The members of the Zoning Board are a group of dedicated, hard working volunteers who deserve better than to have their motives and reputation questioned by Mr. Cataldo in a political campaign. Maybe Mr. Cataldo would know that if he ever

#### To The Editor:

Your paper attributed the follow-ing quote to Mayor Dan Gallagher last week: "For the third time since 1995, there will be no municipal tax in-crease." Gallagher's fibbing again. In 1995 the tax rate was \$.59 per

\$1,000.00 of assessed value. It went up to .66 in 1996, then to .72 in 1997, and then to .76 in 1998. In 1999 it dropped by a penny during Gallagher's last re-election bid. But then it shot up to .80 the following year (2000). It then jumped up to .86 in 2001.

Other than during Gallagher's 1999 election-year tax trick, the rate has increased steadily since 1995. In fact, when Democrats took control in 1993 the tax rate was .48. It's now .86—an almost 80% increase. We're on to the mayor's tax tricks. Taxes have not stayed the same a third time, nor will I be fooled a third time. DAVID GOUTH

## **Board of Education Accepts Krewer's Resignation**

A formal vote was taken at last week's Board of Education meeting to accept Superintendent of Schools Dr. Krewer's resignation.

Krewer, who resigned after only 18 months of a four-year contract, read a short statement to the public explaining his reasons for leaving, saying that it was one of the hardest professional decisions he has made in his career. Krewer said that the long commuteabout 21/2 hours a day-and the hours he feels he has to put in were taking a toll on his family. Krewer, the father of twins who are entering eighth grade, expressed that he was unable to attend most of their events last year due to his responsibilities here.

Board members expressed their displeasure with his resignation. Dan Smith expressed his disappointed, saying this was the first time the Board had signed a four-year contract with a superintendent. He added that the board accommodated all Krewer's requests so that the children of our district would have the best education. Ken LaFreinere said he was sad-

dened that Krewer never came to the board to say he was having a problem. He said the board would have been more than willing to work with him to find a way to accommodate his needs for his family

Frank Mikorski added his regrets. He reminded Krewer that he had the same family when he took the job and knew how far he had to drive, but still took the job. He asked Krewer to submit a list of all of the programs he has introduced and is working on, and to compile an update of where each program stands prior to his departure.


No one in the audience commented on Krewer's resignation.

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## **Gang Member and Two Others Arrested** In Weekend Road Rage Incident

Three young men, one a South Plainfield resident, wearing numerous gang member tatoos, were arrested and charged with assault and possession of a weapon early Saturday morning after intentionally ramming another vehicle.

South Plainfield Police received a call at 2:30 a.m. on a report of a fight on the street in front of Burger King on Park Ave. When police arrived no one was observed in the area. A short time later a call was received from Muhlenberg Hospital in Plainfield regarding a stabbing which occurred at the Park Ave. location.

The victims, Pedro Solano, 19, An-gel Cannone, 24, and George Caballero, 20, all of Plainfield, said they were traveling south on Park Ave. when a car behind them flashed their headlights and passed them in the 25 MPH speed zone. They, in turn, passed the suspects and were rammed, causing extensive damage to both vehicles. The occupants of both cars pulled over, words were exchanged and the victims were then chased on foot to the front of Burger King.

pects, South Plainfield Police Officer Matt Mahoney was able to locate the suspect vehicle and two of the men involved at which time they were placed under arrest. A 12-inch knife and two baseball bats were found inside the car, however it is believed that the bats were not used in the attack. Another suspect was located at 191 So. Plainfield Ave. and also arrested. Juan C. Guerra, 21, of Plainfield

stabbed Solano in the left side of his neck causing a four-by-one-inch cut that required numerous stitches and staples, and cuts to his arm and back. He also stabbed Cannone causing a one-inch laceration on the wrist. He was charged with aggravated assault and weapons charges and is currently being held on \$250,000 bail. Franklin Calderon, 20, of Bound

Brook, the driver of the suspect vehicle, was charged with four counts of aggravated assault with a motor vehicle and weapons charges. A 24-yearold woman was also inside the victims' car at the time of the crash. Bail was set at \$250,000.

Edward Israel DeLeon, 20, of South Plainfield was charged with simple assault and possession of a weapon. Bail was set at \$250,000. All three men are currently being held at the Middlesex County Adult Correctional Center in North Brunswick The victims were treated and released. Caballero was punched in the right

eye, but declined medical treatment. The South Plainfield Police Detec-

tive Bureau brought in the Middlesex County Prosecutor's Office Violent Gang Task Force when they noticed the suspects were heavily marked with tatoos, including gang member tat-toos. Spokesperson Brian Caffrey stated that he didn't want to release information on which gang as it would only further promote them.

The Immigration and Naturalization Service also has a detain order pending against DeLeon.

According to SP Police Captain John Ferraro, "The incident appeared to be some type of road rage case and then escalated into an assault." Caffrey said that he felt suspects were "flexing their muscles" and wanted to show people in the area that they are here.

The case is still currently under investigation.

The referendum has since been passed, the electrical upgrades took place this summer, but no outlets were installed by the windows to allow the installation of air conditioners.

Voicing their disappointment during the public portion of last week's Board of Education meeting were many teachers and parents, and board member Steve Bohn that the wiring upgrades completed this summer did not include outlets for air conditioning. It was suggested that until outlets are installed, each time the temperature hits 90 degrees, administration and school offices should be directed to turn off their air conditioning units.

According to those objecting, the doors to the classes have been shut and locked since Sept. 11, 2001, making it even more unbearable inside the schools.

According to Business Administra-tor Edward Izbicki, the board has two proposals to study on the requirements for the necessary wiring. He added, however, that putting in regular window air conditioning units may not meet state codes and that air conditioning units placed in classrooms must meet different standards than those for businesses. In schools, air circulation is state mandated.


## Community Pool Hosts "Hawaiian Night" for Members

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## From the Republican Party Cataldo Challenges Mayor on Tax Claim

Mayoral candidate Jake Cataldo this week challenged his rival's claims that South Plainfield taxes are unchanged for the third time since 1995. Several local newspapers attributed Gallagher with the claim, and according to Cataldo, the statement is false. "The municipal tax rate has gone

"The municipal tax rate has gone from \$.48 per \$1,000 in assessed value in 1993 when Democrats took control, to .86 now," said Cataldo, a Republican. "That's an almost 80% increase."

According to Cataldo, South

Plainfield's tax rate was .59 in 1995, .66 in 1996, .72 in 1997, and .76 in 1998. It went down a penny in 1999 during Gallagher's last election bid, and then went to .80 in 2000. For 2001 the rate was .86, and it remains the same for 2002. These figures show that Gallagher's tax claim is incorrect.

"The numbers simply don't support the claim," Cataldo said. "In fact, the one time the tax rate fell, which was during Gallagher's re-election campaign, it shot right back up the following year."

people who assist Tweed with the band, many of whom enjoyed band in our high school and are voluntary, are Brian Toth, Brian Sleeper, Kevin Adams, Bob Publik, Charlie Bubnick, and Scott Carey. Kathy Petrocelli, Angela Gallagher, Kara Georgio, and Maggie Smith help direct the color guard.

Practices after school run from about 2:30 until 5 p.m. After warming up, the members change move-ments to fit the next competition when deemed necessary, learn new songs and routines when needed, determine what parts need to be worked on most, run through the entire program a few times to determine the quality of the unbroken performance, and add new parts to the show when decided that it would be advantageous to do so. During practices, they will modify their act over the whole season and work on certain parts that need improvement or fine tuning. The concept behind practices is to refine every area of the entire performance as the season progresses, according to Tweed. The Tigers want to present themselves as efficaciously as possible. The thing that distinguishes band

from any other sport or activity is that it is a totally collaborative effort. Every member of the band and color guard must work in unison with evervone in every section of rehearsal, so togetherness is stressed. However, individual performances all contribute to the collective effect, so those are also

necessary and encouraged. The marching band and color guard focus on specific and general areas of expertise in music. As the season progresses, all of the specifics and more challenging parts are focused on heavily to polish the presentation of the program as a whole. Toward the end of the season, the main goal is to polish the general concepts and to reinforce all of the specifics. However, Tweed was quick to point out that the group may work very hard, but they try to have fun at the same time.

Senior trumpet player Laura Painton said, "I am very hopeful and confident that this upcoming season will be my best of the four years I have participated in marching band."

During my interview with Tweed, he also related movies to music to

give an idea of how it contributes to a movie's overall quality and is important to it. He said that certain intervals of music are mood inspiring and add to the visual picture to give it more feeling. He asked me to imagine a movie without music; I did and realized how different it would be.

When I went to the marching band practice on Aug. 21, I knew almost nothing about it. Having never had a penchant to play music myself, I had to ask general questions and have Tweed elaborate on them. He did and helped me to understand how the players and participants work to perfect their music. Tweed said that he has never had a year he was unsatisfied with, and having heard his opinions on this year's group, I can decidedly say that this year does not look like it will be an exception.
