

# **Arthur "Art" Muglia Dies Suddenly**

Art was born and raised in South Plainfield, residing here before mov-ing to Warren 35 years ago. In 1963, founded and was president of Muglia Enterprises of South Plainfield. He also held a New Jersey Real Estate Agent License.

Art was well known in the South Plainfield community, always donating his time and expertise. He was a

member and past president of the South Plainfield Business Association and was instrumental in helping develop the business areas of South Plainfield. His passion for helping the South Plainfield community was exemplified through his efforts and donations in attempting to establish the former train museum in the center of town. Art was appointed to the South Plainfield Business Advisory Board, serving as chairman until last year, where he remained an active member until he died. He served as the voice for many business owners in town and never ceased to let his opinions be known to the mayor and council. Many times he interceded on behalf of a business who had an issue with one of the Borough's departments, in most cases helping solve potential

problems before they escalated further. One passion close to his heart, next to his devotion to his family, was his charity work. His support for the Matheny School and Hospital for Mentally and Physically Handicapped

individuals in Peapack was well known. Through Art, the New Jersey Motor Truck Association annually raised thousands of dollars to aid the Matheny School

Art enjoyed his hobbies, one of which was playing golf. He also had a passion for flying and building model air planes. He had been a private pilot, flying out of Solberg Airport in Readington and had been a member of the West Jersey Fliers Club. Art built a 1/4 scale B25-J WWII bomber, which was featured in the Observer in 1999. The plane is currently on dis-play at the Teterboro Aviation Museum. He also founded and headed the WWII model airplane club "91st Bomb Group," which meets monthly at the "Ready Room" in Warren. The club meets in remembrance of the significance of the pilots, crews and planes that helped lead our way to WWII victory.

Art was a most loving husband, father, grandfather, brother and friend. On June 4, the day before his death, he and his wife, Matty (Abraham) Muglia, celebrated their 33rd wedding anniversary.

In addition to his wife, he is survived by three daughters, Deborah Wise and Cheryl Lizotte, both of Colorado and Margaret Morbee of Fla.; a son, Arthur J. Muglia, Jr. of Roselle Park and three brothers, Ioseph P. Muglia of Hilton Head, S.C. Robert A. Muglia of Middlesex and James D. Muglia, DDS of Fairfield and nine grandchildren.



Being a resident of South Plainfield instills a sense of pride for many of us.

For some of us it is the manner in which our senior citizens are taken care of, their new Senior Citizens Center and other seniors programs. For oth-ers, it is the terrific recreational programs offered to our children, and for a large number of us, it is the beauty of South Plainfield's neighborhoods and open space areas. For over 77 years the property

fondly referred to as the Adams Farm has been tucked away, barely noticed for anything other than a hidden house, hardly visible at the end of Delancy Street. More recently, however, the residents of South Plainfield and Edison have come to know the Adams Farm as the 11 acres of wooded area near the Dismal Swamp that has protected wetlands within its boundaries which now faces becoming a new development of 19 homes.

It was apparent at the May 27 South Plainfield Planning Board meeting that the residents in that area have many concerns with the approval of that project. The concerns cover a wide array of ideas: drainage issues, the size of the streets in the area being able to

handle the additional traffic of cars and school buses that new homes will bring, the quality of the ground water, the destruction of nine acres of woodlands and the disturbance of the wetlands, the proposal of an emergency access road that will destroy even more of the wooded area not currently designated as a building area within the plans, as well as the further destruction of an area that houses deer, wild turkeys, snapping turtles of monumental size, foxes and hawks, to name just a few.

South Plainfield's Mayor, The Honorable Daniel J. Gallagher, and the Planning Board were very conscientious in not granting the approvals requested at the May 27 or June 10 meetings, and I strongly commend them for that. However, the residents of South Plainfield and Edison find themselves in a position of being the underdogs in a time of excessive development and lack of concern for the natural beauty which surrounds us in South Plainfield.

It was proposed at the Planning Board meeting that some funds are available at the Edison Wetlands Association to purchase the Adams Farm property, and as I write this, applications for grants are being processed to raise money to assist in the purchase of the property. What a generous offer of not only money, but time.

It is my sincere hope that Mayor Gallagher and the entire Planning Board will come to the Planning Board meeting, scheduled for June 24 at 7 p.m., with an open mind and an open heart. This is an extraordinary opportunity to preserve a stretch of beautiful land and for South Plainfield to have a hand in preserving the wetlands. Although a denial of the approvals may disappoint a few, the approval of the purchase of the land to be designated as open space will enrich the lives of numbers too large to count, for a very long time to come. 

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

## Boys' Spring Track Season Review

In the past few years, the South Plainfield Boys' Spring Track team has transformed their program. The Tigers started their turnaround in 2001, posting a respectable 5-2 record after going a disappointing 3-4 the year before. After that, they became a redoubtable team, going undefeated last year (9-0) and this past season (8-0), capturing the long sought after White Division Championship both times.

The sprinting team exploded this year, gathering a multitude of victories and accomplishments not seen in many years. The distance team has been solidly dependable ever since the SPHS Cross Country team showed remarkable improvement in 1998, the hurdling team has a few strong contenders, the jumping squad has not had a problem scoring points in re-cent years, the pole vault crew has been contributing more and more every season since they actually started getting points in 1999 when a couple of tes showed real interest and abilathl ity (before that, the event was usually forfeited), and the weight team, which had been a weaker area due to lack of depth, has aided the Tigers better than expectedly since Christopher Fisch took over as their coach last year.

Head Coach Scott Horowitz also attributed Assistant Coach Kevin McCann coming on to the scene last year as part of the reason for the Ti-gers' newfound success. He said that McCann has brought over a discipline that has changed the face of the team. McCann's strict, strong-minded approach as a wrestling coach has car ried over well and brought a new sense of commitment to the team.

The size of the squad has not really changed; the Tigers had about 50 members last year and about the same this year. What did change was some of the numbers the more experienced athletes produced. Many of the athletes that returned this past season stepped up their efforts, collectively making quite an impact. There were some promising newcomers as well.

In the dual meets, the Tigers devastated their competition. Their closest meet was won by 38 points. It was against Perth Amboy as the last meet of the season, and both teams were undefeated with the White Division title on the line.

The Tigers also did quite well in the four invitationals they went to. They started off their season by placing in the top six in many events at the GMC Coaches Relays. They did the same at the Homdel Relays and the Cougar Classic. At the Milburn Relays, not only did they repeat that accomplishment, but the 4\*200, 4\*400, 4\*800, and sprint medley teams all took first places

The sprint medley team of Marcel-lus Abrams, Will Hamilton, Ervin Williams, and Jeff Williams received special mention as the top relay team in the area for that category by the Home News Tribune.

Jeff, who is a senior, the team's MVP, and has been a captain for two years, has always been a solid runner. Ervin, also a senior and captain, has made solid contributions in the sprinting events and shot put, and was also selected for Player of the Week by the Home News Tribune, Will, a junior, will be looking to make a mark in the 100 and 200 next year. Marcellus, also a junior, has played an active role as a jumper and sprinter, especially on relay teams.

The boys repeated as White Divi-sion Relay Champions at the GMC Relays and finished seventh overall at the GMC Individual Championships. The performance of the day for the latter belonged to Jeff Williams, who easily won the 800 with a stunning time of 1:55, outdistancing second by five seconds. Junior Zac Coppola placed third in the javelin with a throw of 163"2,' and junior Galen Johnson placed fifth in the 3200 with a time of 10:01. Jeff also placed fifth in the long jump at 19"11". The 4\*400 team of senior Ervin, Jeff, Marcellus, and sophomore Mike Williams finished off the day by placing third. At the State Sectionals, the boys

tied their fifth place finish from last year. Jeff was the star of the meet. gathering a title in the long jump, with a jaw-dropping 21"7.75', and two second places, one in the 400 at 49.12 and the other in the 800 with an impressive 1:54. Coppola took third in the javelin while Johnson took sixth place in the 1600 at 4:39. The same 4\*400 team placed fourth.

At the State Groups, Jeff took third in the 400, improving his time to 49.05, and sixth in the 800, with a 1:56. He opted to eschew the long jump to concentrate on the running events. He would eventually place nineteenth at the Meet of Champions, becoming the first male athlete from SPHS to qualify for the spring season in over twenty five years Johnson placed sixteenth in the 1600 while Coppola took eighteenth for the javelin. The 4\*400 team took eighth, missing qualification by only two places.

The GMC Coaches' Relays, Sec-

tionals, and Meet of Champions were all newly featured at the South Plainfield track this year, to the delight of just about everyone. "I think it was great to showcase the track," said Horowitz.

There are a number of other contributors on the boys' team that deserve mention. Many of them have played significant roles in building the team to where it is now and collectively garnered many points, espe-cially for the dual meets, even if not always first places. Seniors: Chinny Okparaeke, an-

other captain, has been reliable in sprinting, hurdling, and jumping events for four years. John Rayho, the final captain, has been a sprinter, hurdler, mid-distance runner, and javelin thrower over his track career.

Juniors: Chris Dickerson is always there when you need him, especially in the high jump; Miguel Garcia has been a pole vaulter for all three of his years, and is given a hand by John Rodger in that event; Rob Hoffman is starting to make some noise in the 800 (running 2:02 this year); Ian Levine has run the 400 and 800 when needed, but shows his strength in hurdling, as does junior Alan Dummett; Tom Holowka is up and coming in the 800 (2:07) and the 1600 (4:57); and Jermaine Thomas shows strength in the discuss and shot put, as does Chris Uffer in the javelin

Sophomores: Jeremy Rodas is demonstrating a real flair for the 1600, having run a 4:43 already; Mike Williams is starting to run well in the 400 and 800, Kyle Thomas is an able thrower; Chris Bojorski, John Donahue, and Paul Corrado could be real contenders in the pole vault next year; and Matt Boley shows promise in the discuss, having well cracked the hundred foot mark his first year out. Freshmen: Chris Weakley is setting his foot on the track in the distance events, as is Jimmy Conroy.

Looking back, Horowitz is very pleased with how far the program has come and how the team looks for the future. He said that the expectations were high for this past season and that he challenged everyone to take the success of last year's team to another level.

Horowitz, who himself was a sprinter at Old Bridge High School, wants the kids to understand that track is a competitive sport to be based on its own merits rather than as training to keep in shape for an-other sport. He said that the team is "like a family" and emphasizes the importance of taking pride in being a part of a progressively excelling team.




## Kennedy School Mothers and Sons Dance the Night Away

## Self Portrait Exhibits at Riley and Kennedy Schools

This year Barbara Harris, art teacher at Riley School and also one of the art teachers at Kennedy School, presented a "Self-Portrait Exhibit" of all her students as the theme for the Annual Art Exhibit at both schools. At Riley School the theme complemented the Character Awareness Program that was an important element of Riley's curriculum this year. The self-portraits have been on display at Riley and Kennedy for several weeks and coincided with each school's spring concerts.

The self-portraits project grew out of the art history units and the artists that the children have been studying all year long. The first graders and Riley's com-

The first graders and Riley's combination Transitional First and Primary Multiple Handicapped art class observed the self-portraits of Vincent Van Gogh and many other artists. Then they learned about color theory and practiced color mixing before creating their own self-portrait paintings. After studying about the Impressionist painter Georges Seurat and his technique, the second graders used paint and Q-tips to print their self-portraits entirely in dots. The third graders also used Q-tips instead of brushes to duplicate the painting style and brushstrokes of the Post Impressionist painter Vincent Van Gogh.

Riley fourth graders created line drawings of their portraits which were then reproduced three times and displayed in the style of Andy Warhol's "multiples." At JFK the fourth graders created three-dimensional self-portraits. They began with pencil drawings. Then they added crayon to their faces, hair and shoulders before cutting out the separate parts and attaching them to three-dimensional hanger

armatures. Pierre Auguste Rodin, the famous Post Impressionist sculptor, was the inspiration for the fifth grade self-portraits which began with pencil drawings using the concept of bi-lateral symmetry for the features. These sketches were then transferred to aluminum and embossed with a variety of techniques and implements to create self-portrait reliefs.

The result of all the portraits displayed together was impressive. The unique personalities and distinctive traits of each child were charmingly expressed in each of their self-portraits.

## CJRRC Offers Class: Run for the Health of It

Anyone reading the magazine headlines at the grocery store checkout line might think that losing weight is no big deal. "Miracle" diets, tips on "how to lose 10 pounds in a week," or how to "melt off fat easily" are offered

to "melt off fat easily" are offered. Clearly, if any of these "miracles" worked, 65 percent of all Americans wouldn't be overweight. Maintaining a healthy body weight takes work and requires knowledge. To help area residents who are interested in losing weight, getting fit and getting healthy, the non-profit Central Jersey Road Runners Club is teaching a new class, Step by Step Running for adults.

The eight-week class begins July 1 at 7 p.m. in Colonial Park in Somerset and costs \$50. Students will work out with certified coaches and veteran runners, get training regimens to follow at home and expert advice on all aspects of running from how to breathe and how to select the proper shoes to how to drink water at a water stop in a race

"Most of the people running races these days are in their 30's and 40's, because they're at the age when all of a sudden it's not as easy to drop that five extra pounds as it used to be," said Bill Schaefer of Somerset, former president of CJRRC and an American Sport Education Program certified coach.

Dr. Robert Boyd, of Woodbridge Medical Group and a CJRRC member, says that running is one way to fight obesity and improve health. "Exercise, including running, is a good and necessary part of good health. Exercise is healthy for the heart. It helps to make our hearts stronger, increase the circulation within the heart itself, helps the general integrity of the cardiovascular system and raises HDL cholesterol, the good cholesterol, which fights against the LDL or bad cholesterol," Boyd said.

CJRRC, one of the state's largest running clubs, has always emphasized education as an important part of its goals, Schaefer said.

Class participants will be training to run the club's 26th annual Fall Classic 5 Mile Race or Practice Hard Mile event on Labor Day, Sept. 1, at Union County College in Cranford. They will become members of CJRRC for a year and receive a T-shirt.
