

# Police Surprise CarThieves; Give Chase

Last Wednesday morning police were called on a report of a suspicious incident in the parking lot of Innovative Packaging on Durham Ave. Upon arrival, police noticed a red Acura which had been reported stolen from Perth Amboy earlier that day. A witness saw the suspects abandon the Acura and leave in a red Honda. The area was searched for the vehicle with no results.

Detectives James Parker and Gary Kline set up surveillance of the abandoned stolen vehicle in the event the suspects' return to pick it up. Approximately 40 minutes later, the suspects returned to the parking lot to retrieve the stolen vehicle. As Det. Parker approached the driver of the Honda and ordered him out of the vehicle, two occupants fled on foot. Det. Parker reached in through the driver's open window and attempted to detain the driver. With Det. Parker still holding onto him, the driver sped away. Det. Parker was thrown from the vehicle, resulting in an injury to his right arm and left leg. As Det. Kline attempted to block the path of the fleeing vehicle, his car collided with the rear of the suspect's car. The suspect fled onto Rt. 287 South at a high rate of speed, lost control of his vehicle, struck a fence and came to a stop on the median. Det. Kline then placed the driver under arrest. The vehicle they were attempting to escape with was reported stolen from Sayreville.

An extensive search of the Hadley Road area was conducted for the two remaining suspects. Det. Parker and

Lt. Paul Brembt arrested without further incident one of the individuals who was hiding in a rear yard. A State Police helicopter was called to assist in the search for the remaining suspect in a heavily wooded area off of Hadley Rd. with no results. Piscataway Police also assisted in the search.

A short time later, a resident of the Traditions Residential Complex on New Durham Rd. reported that his vehicle, which had been left running in the parking lot, had been stolen. The car was described as a gray Ford Focus, NJ license plate LHT25Z. Police believe that the fleeing suspect was responsible for the motor vehicle theft.

The driver of the stolen vehicle was identified as Edwin Rodriquez, 18, a Perth Amboy resident. He was charged with aggravated assault on a police officer, two counts of possession of a stolen motor vehicle, possession of burglary tools and eluding police. # Second Billboard Gets OK

South Plainfield is about to get its second billboard along Rt. 287. Last Tuesday the Planning Board approved the application submitted by Klein Outdoor Advertising, to construct a billboard on the Caffe Piancone Restaurant property.

The applicant's hearing was continued from last month's meeting so that the applicant might find a way to move the proposed billboard that was in a direct line with traffic on South Clinton Ave. approaching Hamilton Blvd. Klein returned last Tuesday with several alternatives, one of which was to move the original placement of the billboard 120 feet to the east, thus placing it behind Caffe Plancone, not on the side. Thus, traffic approaching Hamilton Blvd. from South Clinton would not be directly in their site.

According to David Klein, owner of Klein Outdoor Advertising, the preparation and construction of a new billboard runs approxi-*Continued on page 10*

Assemblyman Patrick Diegnan Jr., along with representatives from the offices of Senator Barbara Buono and Assemblyman Peter J. Barnes Jr. teamed with New Jersey State Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) Commissioner Bradley M. Campbell in presenting a \$250,000 Livable Communities Grant to the Borough of South Plainfield last Thursday to help fund the cleanup of contaminated soil and other pollutants that were discovered last summer in Veteran's Park.

DEP Commissioner Brad Camp-

bell noted that the normal time for a cleanup of this type is usually to 1½-2 years. However, plans for the cleanup of the park took just one year.

Also on hand for presentation were several members from the Edison Wetlands Association, who applauded the clean up of the park. "The Edison Wetlands Association would like to applaud South Plainfield's commitment to the clean up of Veteran's Memorial Park," said Camile Nicholes, spokeswoman for the Edison Wetlands Association.

"Today's presentation is an outstanding example of how effectively local government, with the help of the state, can address an environmental hazard," said Diegnan (D-South Plainfield). "As someone who played in this park during most of my youth, I am particularly grateful to Governor McGreevey and DEP Commissioner Campbell for their ready response and financial assistance."

South Plainfield closed Veteran's Park last summer after large patches of oily tar began surfacing in portions of the park and stacks of asbestos tiles were discovered along Bound Brook in the park's northwest corner. The estimated cost and restoration was approximately \$1.3 million. A total of five bids were received on the cleanup project, the winning bidder was Clean Earth Environmental Service, with a bid of \$969,000.

Diegnan said the work is expected to start immediately and borough *Continued on page 10* 

# **Municipal Hotel Tax Ordinance Introduced**

South Plainfield Borough Council recently passed an ordinance allowing the borough to assess occupancy tax on hotels and motels here. A bill



South Plainfield Gearing up for Labor Day– See next week's issue for parade, activities and road closures info. passed earlier this year by the State gives municipalities the authority to charge a one percent tax effective immediately and up to three percent starting in July of 2004.

South Plainfield presently has three hotels, the Holiday Inn, Days Inn, both located on Stelton Rd. and the Ramada Inn on Hamilton Blvd. A third hotel has been approved by the Planning Board, but is yet to be built. It will be located directly behind the Days Inn on the property formerly occupied by Lean Line.

Environmental Commission member Larry Randolph said he was opposed to the tax. "By charging an occupancy tax, the Borough would be opening a can of worms to raise *Continued on page 10*





## From the Republicans... Effort To Clean-up Veterans' Park Long Overdue

The South Plainfield Democrats held a press conference last week touting a grant the municipality received to fund clean-up of PCB- and asbes-tos-contaminated soil from the ground in Veteran's Park. The event was organized by the Assembly campaign of Borough Democratic Chairman Patrick Diegnan and featured Democratic

officials from throughout the area. The park, which has been closed since last summer, began emitting black tar-like ooze several years ago. But the Borough's elected officials ignored the problem until several news outlets reported on the issue, forcing the Borough to shut the park last year. Before that, Borough workers would cover the ooze with sand and topsoil.

"For the second summer in a row, Veteran's Park is closed to the public,' said South Plainfield Borough Coun-cil candidate Ray Rusnak. "This project is well behind schedule and rather than expedite the work, the Democrats are holding press conferences, issuing press releases and grandstanding. This work should have been completed years ago, but rather than confront the problem, the council ignored it. Now they are seeking the spotlight for doing what should have been done long ago

Council candidate Marge Reedy agreed, "The mayor and council knew about this problem for years, but despite this, they let our kids play in the park, only closing it after the media forced their hand. They knew about the contamination and did nothing. Finally, last summer, after several news stations highlighted the problem, the council president shut the park out of a so-called 'abundance of caution.' One has to wonder why reporters and news cameras had to come to town before these officials became so cautious."

Yes, I'm glad the park will finally get the attention it deserves," added Rusnak. "But this should not overshadow how the mayor and council blundered this sensitive situation by ignoring the contamination without knowing what health hazards it might create. It's ironic that they are now boasting about their efforts to remedy the problem they closed their eyes to for so long.

South Plainfield Republican Chairman Bob Jones had another concern: that the municipality's all-Democratic governing body used Borough employees to prepare the park, which is closed to the public, for the event. "Today's press conference, put together by the Diegnan Assembly campaign, was a political event. Yet Borough workers were used to prepare the park grounds," said Jones. "South Plainfield taxpayers should not foot the bill for a campaign press conference. Moreover, the park should not have been opened for a political function when it is closed to the public."





## Tiger Sharks Perform Well at Odd Age Meet

Members of the South Plainfield Tiger Sharks swim team competed earlier this summer at the Odd Age Jubilee held at the Recreation Community Pool July 1 against swimmers from many other area teams and racked up points in the 40 events. It is an Invitation Only competition and swimmers from 30 area teams who qualified were invited. For this competition only, medals are awarded from first to third place and ribbons from fourth to tenth place, due to the large numbers of competitors in each event.

The Odd Age Jubilee is so-named because it is the one swim meet where swimmers' age groups are adjusted so that (for example) a nine-year-old who always competes against 10-year-olds in the 9/10 age group is able to compete against eight-year-olds in the adjusted 8/9 age group. This gives the nine-year-old the chance to be the senior swimmer for one competition and not have to swim against older/stronger swimmers in his/her age group. It also gives them a preview of what competition may be like the following year, when they become the older swimmer in their category.


