Sacred Heart School Celebrates 50 Years

The evening was indeed special because the Principal Celebrant and Homilist was The Most Rev. Edward T. Hughes, Bishop Emeritus of Metuchen. Concelebrants were Rev. Msgr. Michael Corona, Director, Department of Education; Father John Paul Alvarado, Pastor of Sacred Heart Church; Rev. John J. Werner, Rev Igor Jendruch, Sacred Heart; Rev. Thomas Ganley, Chaplain, McCarrick Care Center; Rev. John Primich, Immaculate Conception in Spotswood and Deacon Joseph

A reception was held in the school cafeteria after the mass with a buffet and refreshments. Attending were many Sisters of Mercy who taught at Sacred Heart, as well as many former students from Sacred Heart.

A display of pictures and memorabilia was set up showing early classes and events at the school. Many of the guests were amazed to discover the display included pictures of their parents, aunts and uncles.

The school's first principal was Sister Mary Alma Chambers, RSM and the pastor at that time was Father Alfred T. Sico. The faculty consisted of five Sisters of Mercy and one lay teacher.

The lighting of the towering fir tree in front of McCriskin's Home For Funerals took place Saturday morning. The annual tradition, sponsored by McCriskin's and the 101st Airborne Screaming Eagles and General Anthony C. McAuliffe Chapter, is held to remember the men of the 101st Airborne who lost their lives in an air crash in Newfoundland, Canada in 1985.

Each December surviving members of the 101st Airborne attend the services and place a wreath below the tree next to the plaque in honor of the deceased servicemen. The tree can be seen for miles around and stays lit during the holiday season.

Driver Killed on Park Ave.

Last Saturday evening, a 1999 Plymouth Neon, operated by Timothy Briant, age 48 of Plainfield, was traveling south on Park Ave., near Walter St., when it left the roadway, struck a telephone pole and overturned. Paramedics from Mercy 6 at Muhlenberg Hospital pronounced Briant dead at the scene. The vehicle was owned by Briants' daughter, Kimberlie, age 19, also from Plainfield.

The telephone pole was snapped at

the ground; however, power was not interrupted. PSE&G crews responded and worked through the night to set the new pole.

Middlesex Prosecutor Makes Parental **Monitoring Software Available Locally**

Middlesex County Prosecutor Bruce J. Kaplan and the Middlesex County Association of Chiefs of Police have announced a joint initiative to assist law enforcement efforts to combat crimes against children committed over the ternet or as a result of the internet.

The Prosecutor's Office, South Plainfield Police Department and several other Middlesex County Police Departments have purchased a customized version of a parental internet monitoring software system which will enable parents to take a more active role in preventing their children from being victimized by internet predators.

The software, ComputerCop, is a

CD-ROM which instantly shows parents what children have been doing online by scanning for images and potentially offensive words or phrases. The program runs off the CD, requiring no installation. It will not filter or

block internet access.

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Two Police Officers Hired, Three Promoted





During the end of the 1994-1995 school year, the administration, faculty, parents and students of Sacred Heart School prepared for the Middle States School Accreditation. In October of 1996, a visiting team of evaluators appointed by the Commissioner of Elementary School of the Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools came to observe classes and interview the students, parents, teachers, members of the support team, the principal and pastor. A year later Sacred Heart School was granted Middle States Accreditation for 10

Sacred Heart School has expanded in many ways over the years, they now have a Pre-K (four-year-olds) classes and have added Spanish to their curriculum. Also Pre-K for three-yearolds was offered for the first time this vear.



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
