## Tigers Rule Middlesex County!

The South Plainfield High School wrestling team headed into the Greater Middlesex Conference Tournament as the number one team and came home with their eighth title in 12 years. The Tigers dominated, cruising to a 74-point margin over second place JP Stevens. The Tigers, who placed third in the tournament a year ago behind East Brunswick and Old Bridge, left both those teams shaking their heads in total frustration.

On Friday night the Tigers advanced all but one wrestler into the Saturday morning quarterfinal round. The first round was disappointing to Coach Kevin McCann. "We started slow. We had a bad morning, but the kids who lost bounced back and did a great job and scored us some points." The Tigers sent eight

with seven of them making it to the finals. Overall, the Tigers crowned four individual champions and had three runner-ups.

In the championship round Jimmy Conroy (103), got the Tigers going when he scored an 18-2 tech-fall over Matt Pagan of Bishop Ahr. Conroy, the defending GMC champion, wasted little time scoring a takedown and a couple of three-point near falls before the end of the first period. Conroy pinned AJ Hrabar of Piscataway in the semifinals. Conroy is now 21-0


Next up was freshman Billy Ashnault (112), who had a great tournament knocking off the number one seed John Pagnotta of Old Bridge 6-4 in OT in the semifinals. He then gave JC Bandiero of Edison a run for his money in the finals when he took Bandiero down with just 60 seconds

wrestlers into the semifinal round, left in the period to take a 4-2 lead. However, Bandiero scored a reversal, sending the match into overtime. Bandiero then scored a takedown on the edge of the mat to win 6-4.

Nick Dorey (125), another freshman, also had a great tournament winning his semifinal match by a 16-5 major decision over Hamilton Hook of JP Stevens to reach the finals. In the finals Dorey gave a gallant effort, but was just out-matched, losing by a fall to state ranked Joe Bubenheimer of Woodbridge

Paul Ritchey (145) also had a great tournament, reaching the finals with an 8-7 decision over Jason Shelsby of East Brunswick. Ritchey faced state ranked Vin Iodaci of Old Bridge in the finals, but came up short dropping a 10-1 decision.

The pool's concrete lining has many small cracks and they leak, making it necessary to constantly add water to the pool. That water comes primarily from a well, which keeps the pool water cool.



The Middlesex County Public Health Department's Rape Crisis Intervention Center is seeking volunteers to provide support and advocacy to victims of sexual violence.

"Volunteers are vital to our center... and an important part of our commitment to comfort and advise victims of sexual violence," says Freeholder John Pulomena, chairman of the Public Health and Education Committee.

Those interested in volunteering will take part in the center's 50 hour Volunteer Advocate Training Program, which will train individuals in crisis intervention, advocacy and in the dynamics of sexual violence and recovery. 

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

D.A.R.E. (Drug Abuse Resistance Education) is a collaborative effort by DARE certified law enforcement officers, educators, students, parents and the community to offer an educational program in the classroom for the prevention and reduction of drug abuse and violence among children and youth. Emphasis on helping students recognize and resist the many direct and subtle pressures that influence them to experiment with alcohol, tobacco, marijuana, inhalants or

other drugs or to engage in vio-

The DARE program offers preventive strategies to enhance those protective factors-especially bonding to the family, school and community-which appear to foster the development of resiliency in young people who may be at risk for substance abuse or other problem behaviors. Researchers have identified certain protective and social bonding factors in the family, school and community which may foster resiliency in young people, in other words, the capacity of young people for healthy, independent growth in spite of adverse conditions.

These strategies focus on the development of social competence, communication skills, self-esteem, empathy, decision making, conflict resolution, sense of purpose and independence, and positive alternative activities to drug abuse and other destructive behaviors.


The program content for DARE is organized into seventeen 45- to 60-minute lessons to be taught by a law enforcement officer with suggested extended activities to be integrated into other instruction by the classroom teacher. A specially trained officer is assigned to the school one day a week for one semester to conduct weekly lessons.

An important element of DARE is the use of student leaders who do not use drugs as positive role models in influencing younger students.

## SPHS alumni Remember When

Last week we published flashbacks from residents about when ice skating was a part of the winter recreation in South Plainfield.

Patricia Abbott been busy collecting memories from former SPHS graduates from all over the country and we couldn't fit them in the paper.

We would like to continue this week with a few more memories

Anna (Klymec) Garelick SPHS class of 72-"I remember trying out my speed skating on the lake. I also remember a few people that were Curling. I remember seeing this huge round thing, which I now know is called a stone. There use to be an ice skating rink on Hamilton Blvd. The first day of each season was free, I was always there on Opening Day. It's a big Tin-Can type of building that's still standing. Its on the right hand side as you make a right hand turn over the overpass down Hamilton.

An Especially funny tale came from Dirk Van Hart, SPHS class of 1959 who moved to town in 1955. His first winter here he discovered ice skating on Spring Lake. He said, "It was the number one activity for us kids. On the north side of the lake near Plainfield Ave. was a gas station with a pizza joint up on the second floor. My friend Tom Boyle lived on the south side of the lake. We'd build a campfire on the shore below his house, walk across the ice to get pizza and bring it back to eat by the fire. Once on the way back Tom went flying head over heals, fell

flat on his?\*#. The pizza levitated for a moment and then fell face down on the ice. We worked fast, scraped up what was left of the pizza and ate it by the fire! It wasn't as good as it should have been but — hey, it was a pizza! One of our classmate's, I'm not sure of his name, Ronny Bori I think, was the best skater and therefore had the honor of forming the head of the "whip." The whip would throw us, especially the ones near the end, to oblivion. Falling was never more fun. I kept those ice skates for many years. I distinctly remember dropping them in a Goodwill-type bin in Amarillo, Texas, I sometimes wonder what ever happened to those things. Not much ice skating in Amarillo!"

Roger Sheldon of California, class of 1969 said, "I recall a man with a tractor would pull us all over the lake for a small fee. Many times I skated from Spring Lake to Cedarbrook Park never going on a street. We'd start in the morning and wouldn't get home til way past the street lights were on. We'd be in deep trouble with our parents. Sledding at the Plainfield Country

Club was a great experience We used hoods from old trucks and inner tubes. Dad bought us all a toboggan. It was a space ship compared to what we use to ride. When we'd lose control, we would wipe out half the people on their way back up the hill.

John Abbott, Hamilton, NJ class of 1974, said, "I remember it was a place kids could gather safely to have a good time and hang out, flirt, practice skating backward, etc. I remember watching for the green flag that signified it was safe to skate. I'd hang out with my friends and-this was a bonusthere were kids from other schools we didn't normally get to see, like St. Pius in Piscataway. I even got a date or two out of it! There was a shed where we would thaw out and dry off after skating. It had a wood burning stove and I remember the hardwood scent and

how we baked in the shed!" Lory (Devries) J. Alcaro 1979 skated on Spring Lake many times as a child, but she has one very special memory. "My dad took me once to go skating with my friends. He held my hand and I had the best time with him.

If South Plainfield is only credited with having one perennially stellar sports program, wrestling is it. The SPHS Varsity Wrestling team is enjoying yet another successful season. They are ranked fourth in the state in one poll and tenth in another. As of Feb. 10, they are 11-1. They have already regained the Red Division title, after temporarily losing it to Old Bridge last year; they regained the GMC Tournament title, after placing third last year and they won the Morris Knolls Tournament title yet again. And they're still after plenty of other victories, too. Wrestling is just as individual as it is a team sport, so motivations have a dual purpose, but this team is all about collective achievement. The Tigers have amassed a wealth of both team and individual titles that just would not be possible without the team unity they are so well known for. "I think with the program and the tradition we have, we can set our goals to win whatever we enter," said second year Head Coach Kevin McCann.

The Tigers' success is hard earned. Practices are fueled by ferocity and an unbending desire for constant improvement and winning. "We go hard and fast," said McCann, who referenced that at the beginning of the season, the team had a lot of technique work to go over but that at this point, practices are as intense as they can be. 'We work hard and push the kids everyday, and the bottom line is that we're in better shape than most of the team we face; it becomes a big factor," McCann also said.

McCann himself is a product of the program. He was the 135 pound state champion in 1990, wrestled in college, and has coached for a total of eight years so far. "I know what it takes to be successful, and I just wanted to give something back to the program," he said.

The program has great depth. With the strength and popularity of recreational and middle school wrestling, SPHS is able to compete at a level few other schools can. And of course, the great support from the town helps, too.

Their one current loss is to Kittatinny. Delaware Valley and Brick Memorial will be competitive dual matches, and Livingston, Philipsburg, and Scotch Plains will be the Tigers' top competition at the Sectionals.

Last year, the Tigers placed second in the Sectionals. This year, they want to at least equal that. Other goals for the Tigers are to win their 20th consecutive District Championship, to possibly get another state championship, and to send as many as possible to the Regions and state matches.

In the Morris Knolls Tournament, seniors Ryan Elliot (Hwt.) and Guy Severini (152), junior Paul Ritchey (145), sophomore Jimmy Conroy (103), and freshmen Billy Ashnault

(112) and Sam Martin (130) all garnered first places; senior Joe Dibiase (171) and freshman

Mike Jakubick (119) both placed second; juniors Nick Curcio (135) and Pete DeAndrea (140) and freshmen Nick Dorey (125) and Kevin Krille (189) all placed third; and senior Frank Demarest placed fourth.

In the Hunterdon Central Tournament, Conroy and Elliot earned first places, Severini got second, Ashnault and Martin both took third; and junior Viet Vo (119) took fourth.

In the GMC Tournament, Conroy, Elliot, Krille, and Severini all emerged as champions while Ashnault, Dorey, and Ritchey all took second, Jakubick took fourth, and DeAndrea and junior Rob Maistickle (215) were fifth while Martin was seventh. Dibiase, Elliot, and Severini are the team captains.
