#### Non-Driver Identification are Available

The decision to give up your driving privilege can be extremely difficult. But it doesn't mean that you also have to give up a critical form of identification. Residents should know that the New Jersey Motor Vehicle Commission (MVC) issues what's known as a non-driver photo identification card. So instead of carrying around an expired driver license, or one with a hole punched in it indicating it's no longer valid. The non-driver photo ID's are ideal for airline travel, banking or other circumstances where you may be asked for a picture ID.

Non-driver photo ID cards are available at your local MVC agency, which is now open on Saturdays from 8 a.m. to 12 noon. There cost of the ID card is the same for a driver's license, which

#### Arrest Made in Three Armed Robberies

Joseph G. Lopez, age 33, of Woodbridge was charged last week in connection with three armed robberies which occurred in the short span of three days in South Plainfield.

Lopez was charged with first degree armed robbery, weapons charges and aggravated assault in connection with two robberies which occurred on April 20 at K-Foods and Munchies Food Store, both located on on Park Ave.

He was also charged with first degree armed robbery, weapons charges, aggravated assault and criminal restraint in connection with the armed robbery at Footlocker on Oak Tree Ave. which occurred on April 22.

Detectives Gary Cassio and Christopher Colucci assisted in the arrest of the suspect. On April 23, the suspect was arrested by a Fugitive Task Force composed of members of several law enforcement agencies. Bail was set at \$150,000 for the South Plainfield charges. He is currently incarcerated at the Essex County Jail on robbery charges from other jurisdictions.


#### **Cheerleaders Used Clothing Collection**

## Residents Delve Into Local History at Reunion Sunday

Over 100 people attended the Historical Society's ReunionSunday held recently. True to its name, the event reunited residents with bits and pieces of their past, as well as offered young residents a glimpse of a developing South Plainfield.

The concept of Reunion Sunday came about as a result of the society's Oral History Preservation Program, an

ongoing project that allows residents to share their memories of growing up in South Plainfield via recorded interviews.

Displays were spread throughout the room. Tables held books containing carefully preserved original photos of the town. There were over 1,400 photographs with 600 from the original Grant School. There were also three volumes of newspaper clippings from 1947 through 1952, three panorama shots of 1914 South Plainfield; four framed photos of Lehigh Valley Railroad, four framed photos of Hadley Airport, four newspapers from Hadley Airport and a volume of articles written by Larry Randolph on the farm's history. The stage held a television where three videos were shown continuously; the 25th anniversary parade in 1951, 1950 Hadley Airport by John Donnelly and an interview with Mayor Henry Apgar speaking about Hadley Airport. In another room guests had the opportunity to videotape their memories of our town.

The day was more than a trip down memory lane for resident Linda Meixuer. She and husband Bill came across a 1952 newspaper clipping reporting the accidental death of her father at Camp Kilmer. He had been cleaning tools left behind by someone else when a tractor trailer fell on him. He was only 28 and Linda was three at the time. Her aunt had related the story to her but she had never seen a copy of the newspaper. The Historical Society is going to

Historical Society President Dorothy Miele declared the day a success. She saying, "We are pleased that so many present and former residents from the early days of the Borough's incorporation attended and supported the concept of a Town Reunion. Our next event is open to everyone. Town

History Day II is scheduled for Nov. 7. It will incorporate many of the same elements that made the first Town History Day so successful in 2003. We will have a lecture on the history of the Borough by Dr. Richard Veit, antique cars, antique clothing displays, entertainment, photo and map displays, movies and new elements."
