Gottlieb Calling It Quits After 30

After 34 years with the South Plainfield School District, SPHS Assistant Principal Helen Gottlieb will retire at the end of this school year.

Gottlieb began her career Helen Gottlieb with the town's school district in 1970, teaching second grade at Roosevelt School. After four years at there she moved on to Franklin School where she taught science and math for six years. Gottlieb commented, "Since I had majored in science in college, this was very enjoyable.

In 1979 she competed with 200 people and was one of nine to be awarded a full fellowship at Seton Hall for English as a Second Language (ESL) and Bilingual Education Masters program. The Board of Education granted her a sabbatical leave so that she could work on her Masters degree.

When she returned in 1980 she began the ESL program for the district, working in the high school and other schools. In 1994 that she applied for the position of assistant principal at the high school. "Mr. Massaro hired me and has been my mentor and friend ever since. I am also proud to have been the first Hispanic administrator in South Plainfield," says Gottlieb. During her 10 years as assistant principal she has enjoyed working with students and teachers to create new and interesting courses that help prepare students with more options for the future. Among these courses are: forensics, heritage Spanish, general biology and chemistry with labs, ESL science, ESL math, science and technology in society.

Assistant Superintendent Tony Massaro said, "Helen Gottlieb has been a colleague and friend of mine for more years than I can remember.

As her final days at the high school come to a close, Gottlieb reflected on her career, specifically her years at the high school,

Gas Leak Draws **Network News Crews**


Fumes Awaken Apartment Residents, 13 Sent to the Hospital

Residents on Brennan Ct. in the Woodlands Manor Apartment Complex were startled at 6:17 Tuesday morning by police and emergency personnel converging on building 6, after a caller reported smelling natural gas fumes in their apartment.

Members of the South Plainfield Police and Fire Depts., Rescue Squad, Office of Emergency Management, along with the Middlesex County OEM, were on the scene to help evacuate residents of the building from what could have been a deadly explosion.

Helicopters arrived and transported

a mother and her eight year-old child to Westchester, NY and another adult was flown to the University of Pennsvlvania Medical Center, both showing symptoms of natural gas exposure. Paramedics from JFK, Muhlenberg and Robert Wood Johnson Medical Center aided in treating victims, 10 of which were taken to area hospitals as a precaution with the help of rigs from Edison, Plainfield, Dunellen and Rutgers. None of the injuries appeared to be life threatening.

Evacuees were allowed to return to their apartments around 8:30 a.m. Residents in town were awakened by the sound of the helicopters used to transport victims and the news helicopter which hovered over the scene during the emergency. Shortly after, news vans carrying reporters from Channels 4 and 7 arrived to interview victims and residents of the apartments. The story appeared on the noon and evening programs of most local TV stations.

While the cause is still under investigation by the fire department, a preliminary investigation indicates that the gas leak may have come from a stove pilot lighting switch. The apartment was equipped with a carbon monoxide detector, however the homeowner had removed the batteries after a malfunction.

Dear Editor:

A recent issue of this paper contained a letter from Walter Pasacrita opposing the rezoning of the Tingley Rubber site, owned by developer Jack Morris, for senior housing. Pasacrita explained that the Senior Men's Forum voted unanimously to oppose the project and he indicated that our town's seniors would prefer adding a building at the present senior-housing location on Morris Ave. instead.

The proposal by the Senior Forum makes sense and I hope the governing body considers it. Additional senior housing on Morris Avenue would be the better choice. While I understand the mayor and council think additional senior apartments might create a traffic problem, I believe they are mistaken.

The current building has not caused traffic problems, mostly because the residents avoid driving during peak hours (i.e., when school is opening and closing). A drive by the site confirms this. Very few cars, if any, leave the apartment complex when school is beginning or ending.

Beyond this, the Tingley Rubber site is not suitable for senior housing and the zoning should remain industrial. Traffic woes on our south side, including trucks entering and exiting Route 287, make the location of senior housing there unwise. In addition, the complex would be an island

of residential construction in the middle of an industrial area—an illadvised mix of incompatible uses.

Making the Tingley Rubber site residential also opens up that whole industrial area to residential use, something that would expose the south side of town to even more overcrowding and traffic.

I hope the governing body considers the wants and needs of our seniors when it considers changing the zoning ordinance. If so, it will abandon its current course and keep the Tingley Rubber site industrial.

So far this year, the Lions Club has collected approximately 2,000 more glasses ready for shipment.



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
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
