Eight Receive Governor's Teacher Award

The South Plainfield Education Association honored local educators with Governor's Teacher Recognition Awards at a luncheon in their honor at the Ramada Inn in North Brunwick.

Teachers are nominated for the award by panels from their respective schools based on the following criteria: use of effective instructional techniques and methods; establishment of productive classroom climate and repore with students; and development of feelings of self worth and love of learning in students.

The teachers nominated then move on to the assistant superintendent level where a committee of parents, teachers, administrators and other citizens confirm the winners.

The following eight teachers received the Governor's Teacher Recognition Award: Richard D'Urso (High School), Terry M. Allen (Middle School), Joanne Haus (Grant), Patricia Ratti (Franklin), Ann Witkowski (John F. Kennedy), Lydia Svoboda (John E.-Riley), Joy Czaplinski (Roosevelt) and Patricia Santillo (Roosevelt Administration). Together they have accumulated a total of 168 years of dedicated service to the children of South Plainfield.

Terry M. Allen, a seventh grade teacher at the Middle School, has spent his entire career as an educator in the South Plainfield School District, teaching fifth grade for 10 years at Kennedy, followed by 25 years in sixth and seventh grades. Allen received both his undergraduate and graduate degrees in Elementary Education and Administration and Supervision from Kean University. At the Middle School, he was the boys' basketball coach for the 25 years and also supervised intramurals at Kennedy for nine years. Allen served as president and vice president of the South Plainfield Education Association (SPEA) and was awarded the "Pride Award" by the New Jersev Education Association (NIEA) in 1998. He was also elected to the NJEA Delegate Assembly and was a member of the Middlesex County Education Association Executive

Joy Czaplinski teaches kindergarten educator in South Plainfield for 15 years, having also taught third grade. She graduated from the University of Tampa 22 years ago with a degree in Elementary Education and has earned graduate credits in Student Personal Services from Kean University. Czaplinski is a member of SPEA, NJEA, NEA and the Athletic Booster Club. She also serves as PTA faculty advisor.

Richard D'Urso has been an educator for 26 years, devoting his

entire career to the students of South Plainfield High School. He is currently teaching 9-12 grade graphic arts, although he has also taught metal and wood. He graduated from Trenton State College (The College of New Jersey) with a degree in Industrial Arts Education K-12. At school he is the advisor for the Graphic Arts Club, where he also served as tech coordinator for Middle States and S.A.F.T.E. Club, as well as a past member of Vision 2001. D'Urso is also a member of the Italian American Progressive League and Panasonic Kidwitness News.

D'Urso has devoted countless hours to serving the community and the high school, working along with the Graphic Arts Club and other students to create and donate numerous signs, banners and printed products for South Plainfield. Along with students, he participated in and filmed the annual Historical Society Conference. He also filmed and created video footage for guest speaker Sgt. McDonald, who captured Lee Harvey Oswald. He participated in and helped design the logo for the Tiger 24 Run and designed and created the scale model for the Fire Department Memorial. In addition, D'Urso raised and donated over \$5,000 to Desert Storm and \$10,000 to World Trade Center victims.

Joanne Haus teaches sixth grade math at Grant School. She has taught in South Plainfield for 27 years and has a wide variety of experience at various grade levels. At the elementary level, she has taught all academic subjects in grades four and five at Riley School and math and science in grade six at Grant. At the Middle School she taught seventh and eighth grade reading. Haus received her undergraduate degree in Elementary Education from The College of New Jersey (Trenton State College) and a Master's Degree in Reading Specialization from Kean University. She, is Teachers of Mathematics (NCTM), SPEA, MCEA, NJEA and PTA.

Haus has provided many hours of service to the South Plainfield community. She was co-president of South Plainfield High School's Project Graduation Committee. She is a member of the South Plainfield Junior Woman's Club (Sixth District) and the Alumni Club, as well as the South Plainfield Field Hockey Association and the Athletic Booster Club.

Program Sets Out to Educate Children About Dangers of Hazardous Materials

Members of the Middlesex County Public Health Department's HAZ-MAT have been visiting elementary schools, teaching children about the dangers of hazardous materials and how to identify them. The first session took place with the fourth grade Roosevelt students and was taught by John Dowd from the Middlesex County Health Department.

"Children come into contact with hazardous materials every day at home, at school and in their neighborhoods," said Freeholder John Pulomena, chairman of the county's Public Health and Education Department. "It's critical to teach them what the containers look like, how the labels read and how to stay safe."

The program is tailored to different grade levels. Each one will help children identify the three forms of materials – liquid, solid and gas – as well as the different shapes and sizes of containers, including cleaning products, car maintenance products and other common household items.

Riley Students Raise over \$11,000 during School Year

The Riley School Student Council, under the direction of co-advisors Kendall Shellhamer, the computer instructor and Angela Raimondo, third grade teacher, also ran several charitable events and fundraisers throughout the school year. They helped sponsor a "crazy hat and sunglasses" day to raise funds for the Avon Breast Cancer Walk in which one of Riley's teachers, Christine Dispenziere, will be participating. The Riley children raised \$504 for this very worthy cause.

Earlier in the year, the student council sponsored a school pajama day to raise money for the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society of New Jersey. Together, the students and teachers raised \$329 for this charity.

As an organization, the children felt it was also important to take part in community projects. Each year, the Student Council conducts school campus cleanups while stressing the importance of recycling appropriate litter. In the spring the student council members also helped plant flowers and weed and mulch the school grounds to maintain its beauty. Diegnan Bill to Expand Access to Pre-School For Low-Income Kids

Legislation Assemblyman Patrick Diegnan sponsored to expand access to high-quality pre-school programs to 4,000 low-income children in non-Abbott districts was released by the Assembly Budget Committee recently.

The pre-school program, the Early Launch to Learning Initiative (ELLI), is a key education component in the state budget for the 2005 fiscal year, which begins July 1.

"All children should have access to quality pre-school so they can begin their formal educational training squarely on the right foot," said Diegnan (D-Middlesex).

The bill (A-3124) would establish ELLI'as a competitive grants program in the Department of Education; the state budget would provide \$15 million to the program. ELLI funds would cover the costs for non-Abbott, low-income children who live in districts that are not in the state's Abbott school funding program. School districts receiving grants would be encouraged to contract with Department of Human Services-licensed child care providers and Head Start programs and would use the grants to implement preschool programs for four-year-olds.

Other costs would be funded through a combination of existing district funds, collaboration with Head Start and similar child care programs. The bill also permits districts to charge tuition for parents who enroll their children in the pre-school programs.

"Too many families living outside of our Abbott districts do not have the means to enroll their children in preschool," said Diegnan. "This will level the playing field by allowing less-fortunate families to give their kids the same jump start that we provide to children in Abbott communities."

A recent study by the National Institute for Early Educational Research showed the New Jersey leads all states in providing pre-school with high standards to low income children. Research on the pre-school program in the Abbott districts indicated that children are entering kindergarten with significantly better oral language and reading readiness skills.

It is expected the ELLI program will increase the percentage of four-yearolds enrolled in pre-school to over 70 percent of the low-income population and 52 percent of the total population during FY 2005. The program's goal is to provide universal pre-school by
