Revolutionary War Plaque Finds Home in Borough Hall The plaque reads: "Erected to **By William Tuthill**

Borough Hall is now home to one more piece of South Plainfield history. The Liberty Plaque, created in honor of the 25 area residents who served in the military during the Revolutionary War, was officially unveiled at last month's Borough Council meeting. It is now housed in Borough Hall

honor the memory of the valiant citizens of this community who served in the American Forces that won our Liberty in the War of Independence, 1775-1781. To these, and their comrades in arms, we owe the birth of liberty on these shores and we rededicate our commitment to which they struggled."

EPA Releases Cornell-Dubilier Clean Up Proposals

The EPA will hold a public meeting to announce their long-awaited Proposal Plansto clean up the Cornell-Dubilier site, located on Hamilton Blvd.

The contaminated site has been the source of several years of intensive testing and public meetings, to choose the best way to clean up the site. During the open meetings, the public was allowed to have an input in the final decision on how to clean-up the contaminated areas on the site.

Three proposed alternative plans for the building were evaluated by the EPA. The EPA has chosen alternative plan three, which calls for demolition and off-site disposal of a portion of the buildings.

Five proposed alternatives for the contaminated soil were evaluated by the EPA and they have chosen a combination of alternatives three and five, which will remove some of the soil for off-site disposal and the installation of a soil vapor extraction (SVE) system, which will remove the contaminants from the soil on site.

Cost estimates for the clean-up will run in the millions and may take years.

A public meeting is planned for Tuesday, July 13 at Borough Hall starting at 7 p.m. Representatives from the EPA will be on hand to explain the various proposals. Community members will be allowed to comment on the proposed plans.

where residents can get a glimpse of this small piece of local history.

The Liberty Plaque was originally presented to the borough in recognition of our nation's Bicentennial in 1976. For years it had been hanging in the South Plainfield Post Office, but was taken down during their recent renovations and apparently never rehung when completed.

Fortunately, it was rescued from oblivion by John Sideck, former South Plainfield Postmaster, who found it sitting in a corner. Tulio Capparelli did some restoration work on the plaque and added a Plexiglas front to protect it from any further damage.

The plaque was formally presented to the South Plainfield Historical Society in June by John Sideck, who is now retired.

Names of the 25 South Plainfield Residents who served during the Revolutionary War are inscribed at the bottom of the plaque. They are: Obidiah Ayers, David Blackford, Nathan Blackford, David Coriell, Ebenezer Tingley, Ephraim Drake, Joseph Drake, Benjamin Laing, Christianus Lupardus, Andrew Manning, David Martin, Enoch Runyon, James Martin, Sr. Nehemiah Fitz Randolph, Samuel Drake, Simeon Drake, Benjamin Sollard, William Lupardus, Benjamin Sollard, Benjamin Manning, Morris Frazee, Richard Runvon, Thomas Soper, Richard Heldom, Joseph Fitz Randolph and Clawson Dunn. Some of these Revolutionary War heros still have relatives in South Plainfield.

The plaque is on display at Borough Hall, so make a point to check it out and see a part of our history.

Last Tuesday the old PAL building, located behind Borough Hall, was demolished. (See photo below) It will be replaced with a new Detective building for use by the South Plainfield Police Department.

Monies received through forfeiture from the DEA received on Thursday will be used to house a juvenile aide bureau, a conference room and computer forensic lab.

The old building was originally a bike shop, which was located next to the Rescue Squad building. It was picked up and moved behind the Borough Hall parking lot. The building was then used by the police department as a youth group or DARE building. It housed a meeting room and a gym for the PBA. The building hadn't been used in over five years since flooding caused it to be condemned.

Plans for the future building have already been drawn up and construction should be starting soon.

When Robert Olsen purchased his home in South Plainfield from his father-in-law, he never anticipated the trouble he would have in paying his taxes. After all, at the time of his closing, he signed papers to have his mortgage company escrow for, and pay, his property taxes for him.

It turned out that things were not that easy. Soon after closing, his mortgage was sold to another company. Olsen still was not worried, until his father-in-law called him in the beginning of June to say he got a notice in Florida, where he now lives, saying he was delinquent in his property taxes and they would be sold at the tax auction if not paid by a certain date.

⁴ Alarmed, Olsen called his mortgage company, which claimed that no taxes were due to be paid until July. He also went to the borough tax office to explain that his mortgage company was responsible, but their records showed his father-in-law still owned the property and they couldn't help him.

It took six calls to the mortgage company, including a supervisor, before they realized their mistake and sent an overnight check to prevent the sale of his property taxes.

However, it did not prevent Olsen's name from appearing in the tax sale notice which appeared in the *Observer* paid the outstanding taxes, but all delinquent charges and he will not be responsible for the extra charges.

However, Olsen still feels he was publicly embarrassed by having his name placed in the paper and having everyone looking at him as if he didn't pay his bills. "Maybe after everyone reads this story, they will understand that this was just an error by my mortgage company, which has been corrected," said Olsen.







for two weeks prior to the sale. This embarrassed Olsen, who is a police officer in Edison. His neighbors and coworkers saw his name in the paper and thought he was truly delinquent.

Olsen said he did get a sewer bill, was able to pay it and have the name on the bill changed with the help of those working in the tax office. He said everyone at Borough Hall was very courteous and wanted to help, but their hands were tied.

In the meantime, his taxes have been paid and he has a letter from the mortgage company apologizing and admitting their error. They have not only

Carolyn Parisi Walking for Breast Cancer Awareness

Parisi is putting her best foot forward, over and over again, this summer. From Aug. 6 through 8 Parisi, along with thousands of other tri-state women and men, will walk 60 miles over three days to raise awareness and funds for Breast Cancer. The 3-Day is held in 10 major cities across the country each year to raise funds for the Susan G. Komen Breast Cancer Foundation. Parisi will be walking in the New York City 3-Day.

Every year in the United States, breast cancer claims nearly 40,000 lives. At each Breast Cancer 3-Day, thousands of women and men, including breast cancer survivors, family members, friends and supporters of the cause, gather together to walk 20 miles a day for three days to battle breast cancer one step at a time. Whatever their inspiration, all walkers have the same goal: to raise money to save lives and help put an end to breast cancer.

Besides knowing several people who have lost loved ones to breast cancer and others who are currently battling the diseases, the 3-Day has a personal meaning for Parisi. "After undergoing two biopsy's in two years, I looked at my young daughter and thought, I never want her to have to go through this, all the pain and worry, there must be a way to stop this'. I started to realize how many daughters have lost mothers and how many mothers have lost daughters to Breast Cancer. My mother-in-law lost her mother to breast cancer and it's just so sad. No mother should have to bury their daughter and no daughter should have to bury their mother due to breast cancer. So I decided to do something about it, to try and contribute to find-

> The Breast Cancer 3-Day in New York City will start on Friday morning, Aug. 6 and end with closing ceremonies on Sunday, Aug. 8 at Liberty State Park. The approximately 4,000 walkers will cover about 20 miles a day, traveling at their own pace. The walkers will be supported by approximately 500 volunteer crew members who will provide meals, water and snack stops, gear transport, hot showers, portable restrooms, safety on the streets and comprehensive medical services.

In order to participate, each walker must train for many months prior to the event and must commit to raising a minimum of \$2,000 (Parisi has committed to \$3,000). According to Parisi, the hardest part is not the actual three-day walk, but the months spent training beforehand. Working full time and taking care of a family does not leave a lot of time to walk four to six miles every weekday and 10 or more each Saturday and Sunday. "Tve had a hard time keeping up my training" she said, "I try to be creative and run errands on foot whenever I can, walking from my house to the post office, doing laps around my neighborhood and stopping off at home to throw in the next load of laundry every few miles, etc.'

U.S. ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION AGENCY REGION II INVITES PUBLIC COMMENT

Proposed Cleanup for the Cornell-Dubilier Electronics Superfund Site South Plainfield, Middlesex County, New Jersey

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) announces the opening of a 30-day public comment period on the Proposed Plan and Remedial Investigation/Feasibility Study (RI/FS), which addresses the cleanup of contaminated facility soil and buildings at the former Cornell-Dubilier Electronics (CDE). facility in South Plainfield, Middlesex County, New Jersey. As part of the public comment period, EPA will hold a public meeting on July 13, 2004, at 7:00 p.m., in the South Plainfield Borough Hall located at 2480 Plainfield Avenue, South Plainfield, New Jersey. The meeting, which will address the proposed cleanup plan, will allow community members to comment on the proposed plan to EPA officials. A final copy of the RI/FS for facility soils and buildings at the CDE facility and Proposed Plan may be reviewed at the South Plainfield Public Library, 2484 Plainfield Avenue, South Plainfield, New Jersey, and at the EPA Region II Records Center located at 290 Broadway, 18th Floor in New York City.

As the lead agency, EPA divided the site into three Operable Units (OUs). The first OU addressed residential, commercial, and municipal properties in the vicinity of the CDE facility. The second operable unit (OU2), the focus of this Proposed Plan, addresses the remediation of soils and buildings at the former CDE facility on Hamilton Boulevard. Additional operable units will address the contaminated groundwater and contaminated sediments at the Bound Brook.

Based upon the results of the Second Operable Unit RI/FS, EPA prepared a Proposed Plan that describes all the cleanup alternatives and provides EPA's rationale for recommending these alternatives. EPA evaluated the following three building alternatives:

Alternative B-1: No Action Alternative B-2: Decontamination and Surface Encapsulation/ Institutional Controls

Alternative B-3: Demolition/Off-Site Disposal

EPA evaluated the following five soil alternatives:

Alternative S-1: No Action Alternative S-2: Excavation; Off-Site Disposal with Treatment (if necessary)/Institutional Controls Alternative S-3: Principal Threat Excavation; Off-Site Disposal with Treatment (if necessary/Multi-Layer Cap/Institutional Controls Alternative S-4: Soil Vapor Extraction/Solidification/Multi-Layer Cap/Institutional Controls Alternative S-5: Low Temperature Thermal Desorption/Multi-Layer Cap/Institutional Controls

EPA recommends Alternative B-3 for the Preferred Alternative in the Proposed Plan to address the contaminated facility buildings. The Preferred Alternative for the buildings includes a contingency remedy that would allow for the decontamination and surface encapsulation of certain buildings that may not need to be demolished. Institutional Controls would also be employed for any structures that are not demolished.

EPA's Preferred Alternative for soils is a combination of Alternative S-3 (Principal Threat Excavation; Off-Site Disposal/Multi-Layer Cap/Institutional Controls), and Alternative S-5 (Low Temperature Thermal Desorption; Multi-Layer Cap/Institutional Controls), described in more detail in the Proposed Plan.

Before selecting a final remedy, EPA and the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection will consider all written and oral comments on this preferred remedy. All comments must be received on or before August 5, 2004. The final decision document, or Record of Decision, will include a summary of public comments and EPA's responses.






students had a better understanding of how to be proactive by using the prevention strategies.





Progress in Trenton

Tim happy to report on the conclusion of a very successful six months in Trenton. Last week Governor McGreevey signed the budget, which was approved by the Assembly and State Senate early in the morning on Friday, June 25. In my opinion this budget addresses many of the needs that have been facing residents of New Jersey for decades. It provides for real property tax relief by increasing the homestead rebate to \$1,200 per year for seniors and up to \$800 per year for most other homeowners. South Plainfield's property taxes ave-



rage about \$4,300 per year. Therefore, our average taxpayer will receive an approximate 20 percent rebate and our seniors will get about 30 percent. The checks will be in the mail by the end of the summer. In addition, the "Senior Freeze" property tax relief program, which keeps property taxes flat for seniors making less than \$50,000 per year, is fully restored in this budget. For the first time ever local, county and board of education expenses have been capped. Therefore, both property tax relief and spending controls have been put in place to benefit our taxpayers in both the short term and the long term. In addition, aid to county colleges and state universities has been increased by \$170 million and local state aid to municipalities and boards of education has gone up almost \$800 million. In the three years since I was first elected, working together with Senator Buono, Assemblyman Barnes and the Governor, South Plainfield will receive a half million dollars in extraordinary aid. We received zero for the prior five years under Governor Whitman.

I am really proud of the legislation that I have been able to sponsor in the first part of this session. I am the prime sponsor of 115 bills and co-sponsor of another 96. These bills cover many diverse areas from enhancing education to caring for children and the elderly to providing assistance to our veterans and fire and rescue squad volunteers to taking down the tolls on the Garden State Parkway and preserving the time honored tradition of "Ladies Night" in bars and restaurants. Please go on the legislative website, <u>www.nileg.state.nj.us</u>, and put in my name under "Bill Search, Sponsor." I welcome your input on pending legislation along with any ideas you may have for new legislation.

I want to mention three bills which are about to become law because of the efforts of our borough residents. As you may know, several members of the Board of Education asked me to sponsor legislation to save our Future Stars Program. I'm happy to report that bill number A2170, co-sponsored by my friends Assemblyman Peter Barnes, Senator Barbara Buono and I, passed both houses and is ready to be signed by Governor McGreevey. Future Stars is safe! In addition, a bill directing funds to upgrade computer technology in municipal courts passed handily due to a large extent on the testimony of our Municipal Court Administrator Pat Vargo. A bill protecting archeological sites has passed the Assembly and will be before the Senate soon because of the leadership of local advocate Larry Randolph. Whenever you think you can't make a difference in how your state is run, give my office a call and I'll be happy to work with you to make things happen.

I'll be reporting back on how things are going in Trenton. Have a great summer and remember to look in your mailboxes for those rebate checks.

Paul Collier Photos Added to Historical Society Archives

Twenty-six photos by renowned Plainfield photographer Paul Collier have been added to the South Plainfield Historical Society archives recently. The images of old South Plainfield were reproduced through the cooperation of Plainfield Library. The Collier collection of glass and film negatives are housed in the library's state-of-the-art facilities.

Collier, who died in the early 1950s, took thousands of photographs of the Plainfields-from society matrons and

In August of 1983, Jackie met Johnnie Edwin Dorch and they married in 1988. They shared a warm and loving relationship and loved to travel.


She is pre-deceased by her brother, Michael Gary Cooper, who died in 1955.


