· The hundreds of parents, who spent hours planning the floats, decorating them and marching with the kids.


· The volunteer parade marshals, who while they walk the entire route, manage to keep the parade moving and make sure everyone is following the safety rules.

County, Towns Pool Financing to Lease Equipment

The County of Middlesex and nine of its municipalities continued the tradition of saving money on capital equipment lease/purchases by participating in the Middlesex County Improvement Authority's pooled financing programs.


The 13th series of the Capital Equipment Lease Program bond, for \$12,370,000, closed July 29. The county and participating towns have saved more than \$2.4 million in purchases and debt service since the program's inception in 1992.

"Through economies of scale and level debt service payments, the program, guaranteed by the County, reduces costs and increases efficiency for all who participate," said Freeholder Director David B. Crabiel, liaison to the Middlesex County Improvement Authority. "This is a winning program for our taxpayers."

This year, the county, Carteret, Edison, Monroe, Old Bridge, Perth Amboy, South Amboy, South Brunswick, South Plainfield and Spotswood participated. Items leasepurchased include ambulances, police cars, buses, plows, utility, dump and garbage trucks, computer and other electronics equipment, office furniture, radios and defibrillators.

For each bond series, the MCIA issues fixed rate bonds using the county's excellent bond rating, to finance the purchase of capital equipment, which is then leased to the participating government. The only limitation on the equipment purchases is that it must have an average life of at least three years.

Many times, towns are able to purchase equipment they could not have gotten on their own," Crabiel said. "We are proud to offer our local partners an affordable, efficient way to serve their residents."





Reedy, Rusnak, Jones: We Need to Stop the Tax "Shell Game"

Council candidates Bob Jones, Ray Rusnak, and Marge Reedy are calling for a stop to the tax "shell game" they say Democrats are playing with voters. All three candidates were stunned to see signs around town advertising no tax increase when, as Jones put it, "it just isn't so." In addition, they've called upon the Democratic * * * * * candidates to take down the signs, which are misleading.

"I can't understand how the other side can claim no tax increase when they raised the sewer tax 25%," said Jones. "They should take down the signs and put up something that's true.

"I agree," Rusnak added. "Last year's candidates promised no tax increase, and then the first thing they did after taking their oath was to increase the sewer tax. This is the second time they've raised that tax. The sewer tax is skyrocketing.

According to Reedy, the Democrats are playing a shell game: "They've been siphoning off hundreds of thousands of dollars from the sewer budget and putting it into the general budget. Now they're raising the sewer tax 25% and claiming 'no tax increase,' allegedly because the municipal portion of the property tax is unchanged. That's disingenuous.

Jones explained that he and his running mates want to work to restore fiscal integrity if elected. "Had the State of New Jersey not bailed us out, the tax increase would have been worse. As a local assemblyman reported in this paper recently, South Plainfield received over half a million dollars in extraordinary aid. That we need emergency aid is a sign of how bad things have become."

"The town has also been cutting services and using one-time revenue generators to prop up the budget" added Reedy. "The Council has been selling off Borough-owned land, and we're seeing more leasing and borrowing to make ends meet. That's not a

good sign. They've also slashed services."

"I don't think people would mind cuts in services if they knew the Council was doing all it could to trim costs," added Rusnak. "But cuts are hard to swallow when at the same time the Council is rewarding Democratic contributors with no-bid contracts and rewarding political cronies with big raises.

According to Jones, the Borough Clerk is a good example of the giveaways. "The clerk, a former Democratic councilman, got \$10,000 two years ago when they added "administrator" to his title. And right after last year's election they made him "personnel director" and gave him another fat increase. That's on top of his yearly raise. It doesn't make sense. They've cut public works to the bone and they've abolished the engineering and health departments. With all these staff cuts, why do we all of a sudden need a personnel director?

"These are places where we can save money," Reedy added. "Rather than cutting services, we should eliminate the fat by ending these patronage jobs. In addition, by getting competitive prices on the no-bid contracts the Democrats are giving to their campaign contributors, we can

New Curbside Pickup Program Just Another Example of Government Efficiency In Borough

Council members Charlie Butrico, Dennis Cerami and Kathy Thomas this week highlighted one of the new programs to improve the quality of life in South Plainfield while at the same time not increasing municipal taxes. Council President Dennis Cerami discussed the new curbside pickup program which will begin on Oct. 1. * * * * * "For as long as I can remember bulk pickups in South Plainfield have been difficult.

Residents were required to call public works and schedule a pickup months in advance of when they needed it. In addition, you were only allowed to have a pickup once a year. Mayor Dan Gallagher and the Democrats on the council agreed that the system needed to be changed. Starting at the beginning of next month there will be twice per year curbside bulk pickup in October and April. Last week we mailed out a flyer to every homeowner explaining how the system will work. Basically the borough will be divided into five districts and it will take a week per district to pick up the items residents want to dispose of. The same system will be used for

leaf pickup and Christmas tree pickup. Everyone I have spoken to is ecstatic about this improved bulk pickup procedure.'

Council member Charlie Butrico said, "Twice per year curbside bulk pickup is just another example of how the Mayor and Council are constantly trying to improve services in South Plainfield while keeping municipal taxes under control. This new system will actually save us over \$100,000 per year in costs and will free up public works employees to perform other services that will better utilize their skills. It is simply not cost efficient to have employees who are experienced in landscaping and building construction doing bulk pickups all day. In

addition, when we were required to redirect those employees for snow removal or other emergencies, scheduled pickups were delayed causing hardship to our residents. Creative 'out of the box' approaches to solve problems are typical to the members of our governing body.'

Kathy Thomas expanded on her running mates remarks. "We were the first to apply a 'pay as you go' approach to road projects which now total over 130 streets completed. We utilized that approach to build the state of the art senior center that is the envy of other towns. Our proactive approach stopped a drug store from going up on what is now our beautifully expanded Putnam Park. We partnered with the Lutheran Social Ministries to build our wonderful senior housing across from Riley School. We have saved over 130 acres of open space from development adding over 20 acres this year alone. Of course we are proud of our record of no municipal tax increase in five of the last seven years but we also feel an obligation to improve and enhance our infrastructure and services to our residents. Our new curbside pickup program is just one example of our approach to government. How Clutter Turns Into Litter

A hundred things compete for our attention in this age of information overload. Cell phones demand attention with electronic imitations of catchy tunes or symphonies. Messages from the radio and television assault our ears. On news broadcasts, we can read unfolding news items scrolling across the bottom of the screen while a reporter tells a different story above. Billboards overshadow highway caution signs. Storefronts announce today's sales. Flags and bunting draw our eyes to car dealerships, distracting us from the Men Working signs up ahead. Our telephones ring with computerized telemarketing messages and our computers announce that we have e-mail. When you log onto the Internet, advertising banners pop up on your

Among the visual jumble, two cat-

egories of advertising are actually illegal: signs standing in the Borough's right-of-way and signs posted on util-

The most frequent violators of the publicly-owned strip that runs along our roads are the real estate directional signs. These small cardboard signs on two wire legs dot the landscape. Sometimes a good wind will pull a sign up and deposit it in the gutter, where it becomes actual litter. According to Chapter 108.4 of the Borough Code, the public roadways must remain clear and unobstructed. "No person shall ...put or place...into, upon or within any street...any substance, matter or thing whatsoever whereby the safe, free or unobstructed use of the same by the public may be in any wise impeded or interfered with or whereby the same ance." The penalty for violations is a fine of not more than \$1,000 per day. This style of temporary, cheap signage is used not only by realtors, but by retailers politicians. The political signs are permitted during campaign season, but all others must be posted more than ten feet from the curb to stay out of the right-of-way.

New Jersey State Statute 27:5-9 says "A sign may not be painted, drawn, erected or maintained upon trees, rocks, other natural features or public utility poles." This law applies to garage sales as well as to businesses ("Lose Up To 30 Pounds in One Month," "Earn Big Bucks Working At Home"). The Borough's garage sale license includes a note that it's illegal to post signs on utility poles. Apparently, many people don't read their permits, because all

over town utility poles sprout garage sale signs, flapping in the breeze. Worse, the license holders don't take their signs down when their sales are over. The signs stay up until they deteriorate, fall off the poles and turn into litter.


The Borough's Clean Communities Advisory Board has hired a part-time enforcement officer to physically remove illegal signs from the right-ofway. The wire-frame signs are stored for a week at the Recycling Center to give the owners a chance to collect them. Those that are not picked up within a week are discarded.

This activity has significantly reduced the "litter on a stick" in the Borough's residential and commercial neighborhoods. So far this year, over 270 standing signs and more than 650 utility pole posters have been removed. However, one person cannot keep up with the constant influx. The Clean Communities Advisory Board is asking all Borough residents to lend a hand. Please do not post bills on utility poles or trees. Please do not advertise your event or business by setting signs in the Borough's right-of-way. And please feel free to remove any of these illegal additions to the visual clutter and physical litter we live with, and dispose of



2. A business may have up to a total of three (3) signs for the purpose of identification and advertising. NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE BOROUGH OF SOUTH PLAINFIELD, NEW JERSEY.

Section 1. Whenever any words or phrases are used

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DRIVEWAYS

in this ordinance, the meaning respectively described to them in Subtitle 1 of Title 39 of the Revised Statutes of New lersey shall be deemed to apply to such words or phrases.

Parking, stopping or standing of any motor vehicle shall be permitted at the following location in the Borough of South Plainfield, County of Middlesex, State of New Jersey

a) Kentile Road - 1000ft westerly of the terminus along the south curb

Section 3. Parking, stopping or standing of any motor vehicle shall be prohibited on any other portion of Kentile Road in accordance with Ordinance #717.

Any person or persons who violate any provision of this ordinance shall, on conviction thereof, forfeit and pay a fine of not more than fifty (\$50.00) dollars.

Section 5. All ordinances or parts of ordinances, which are inconsistent herewith, are repealed to extend to such consistency.

Section 6. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon adoption and publication in accordance with New Jersey Law.

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IRS Seeks Community Volunteers

Looking for a rewarding volunteer experience? Do you like to help people? "The Internal Revenue Service is seeking volunteers for its Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) and Tax Counseling for the Elderly (TCE) programs," said IRS spokesperson Gregg Semanick. "The IRS is looking for volunteers to take part in VITA and TCE throughout New Jersey.

During the tax filing season, VITA and TCE volunteers, in community locations throughout the state, help fill out tax returns for older taxpayers, people with disabilities, non-English speaking and other people who cannot afford professional assistance. Some of the volunteer groups even offer free electronic tax filing. The IRS provides VTTA and TCE volunteers with free instruction and all the materials needed to prepare basic income tax returns such as Forms 1040EZ, 1040A and 1040. Training for volunteers is generally held at convenient locations.

"These are great programs that help citizens meet their tax filing obligations. In New Jersey during the last tax filing season, over 500 VITA and TCE volunteers assisted over 15,000 taxpayers at 140 volunteer sites in communities across the state," Semanick said. Although an accounting background is helpful, it is not required, but basic computer skills are a plus.

Tax assistance generally is provided at schools, churches, malls, libraries and other convenient neighborhood locations.
