## Ambulance Service to Supplement Rescue Squad

#### Rural/Metro to Provide Emergency Service during Working Hours

Rural Metro, the new ambulance coverage and there will be a charge problems answering emergency service the Borough has hired to answer emergency calls during the day, has been hired to supplement the volunteer rescue squad, not to replace it. Those were the words of Rural/Metro representative Steven Loures, who spoke to us about the ambulance service. The South Plainfield Rescue Squad is, and will


still be, needed in South Plainfield. Rural Metro has been in business for 50 years, covering municipalities in the area for 24 of those years. Most of their employees are volunteers on their own local rescue squads and all are certified EMTs. However, no one from our rescue squad works for the company at this time. South Plainfield will be covered by two EMTs from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. weekdays, with our volunteer rescue squad covering the town at night, on weekends, and if a second emergency call goes out during the day.

The town will be paying Rural Metro \$1,450 a month for their to residents for their services billed to their insurance company. According to Loures, Rural Metro's set charge is \$550, but most insurance companies have their own determined rates for ambulance coverage, so they rarely ever get that amount. For example, Medicaid only pays \$58 and Medicare \$190 and other insurance coverage varies from company to company. Medicare recipients may be expected to pay a 20% co-pay. Rural Metro accepts what the insurance company pays and will not take anyone to court over a balance on their bill. The only time they will sue is if a resident is compensated directly from the insurance company and they do no reimburse them. If you have no insurance, don't worry, they have assured us that they will take care of your needs just as they do everyone else; no one will be denied

South Plainfield is not the only town in our area that has had calls during the daylight hours. Rural Metro now covers Piscataway, Franklin, North Brunswick and Old Bridge, just to name a few. In fact, it was the Franklin Volunteer Rescue Squad, Old Bridge Rescue Squad and North Brunswick Squad who hired Rural/Metro. The Squads found they could no long cover the volume of calls during the day.

Rural Metro does not have a permanent office in town, even though they have been offered space in several borough owned buildings. Loures says the company feels that having their two EMTs stationed in the ambulance means they are ready to answer calls at a moment's notice.

"Our goal is not to eliminate the volunteer rescue squad, they are a part of the community and needed at night and on weekends. We are just a supplement," said Loures. He added that his experience with other towns has show that donations do not seem to go down when they are hired.

#### Seniors Get a Lesson on Internet Safety from the FBI

Assemblymen Peter Barnes and Patrick Diegnan, in conjunction with the FBI recently presented a new program entitled "Innocent Images" to South Plainfield seniors at the Senior Center recently.

In response to the many reports that the Middlesex County FBI office has received from parents and grandparents whose children have fallen victim to online sexual predators, the assemblymen put together a new child pornography prevention program. They felt that seniors spend a good deal of time taking care of their grandchildren who may be using the Internet and should be made aware of the dangers associated with people they may be speaking to and ways to prevent such occurrences.

FBI Special Agent Tim Nestor's informative program gave the seniors tips on what to look for when a child may be speaking with a potential predator. Nestor presented a slide show with images from the Internet and demonstrated how-strangers can just strike up conversations with users. He suggested closely monitoring instant messages and images that children download and also phone calls and possible meetings that they may

be planning. Nestor also pointed out how easy it is to obtain personal information about individual children on the Internet and how easy it is to become friendly with them.

The FBI suggests that if you suspect your child may be a victim of an internet predator, contact them immediately at (732) 469-7986 and ask for supervisor of "Innocent Images" or on the web at newark fbi.gov. Assemblymen Barnes and Diegnan are also working on bringing this program to local school systems throughout the County.

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
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#### County Ice Rink Now Open at Roosevelt Park

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
