South Plainfield High School 5,000 Distinguished Scholars received is pleased to announce the current seniors who are recipients of the Edward J. Bloustein Distinguished Scholarship Award from the Garden State Scholarship Program.

The criteria for these high achieving students is that they rank in the top 10 percent of their class and have a minimum combined SAT score of 1260, or are ranked first, second or third in their class at the end of their junior year. In New Jersey more than

Former Resident Arrested For Decades Old Murder

Chief Helps Plainfield Solve 21-Year-Old Crime

Special detailed information provided by South Plainfield Police Chief John Ferraro helped the Union County Prosecutor's Office bring a wanted man to justice in one of the county's longest open murder cases.

Domenico Anastario, 44, formerly of South Plainfield, was charged last Wednesday with first degree murder. He is being held on \$500,000 bail at the Union County Jail in the shooting death of 22 year-old Marcus Jones of Plainfield on Nov. 28, 1983.

Ferraro was just a two-year veteran of the South Plainfield Police Dept. when he was flagged down by a woman who reported a shooting several blocks away. Upon arriving

at Kleen Car Wash, now Quickway Car Wash on Clinton Ave. in Plainfield, Ferraro found Jones, who had been shot in the friend, who

had also been wounded. These were the first shooting victims that Ferraro encountered in his short career. He immediately performed CPR, however, Jones died several hours later at Muhlenberg Hospital and his friend

This Saturday the South Plainfield Education Foundation will hold their tenth annual art auction. Proceeds from the event will fund scholarships and other foundation sponsored programs. This year's honorary chairman, Joe Papa, is no stranger to South Plainfield schools. As a DARE Police officer for six years Joe befriended hundreds of students and their parents. He has been on the local police force for 16 years.

Foundation President Marge Reedy said, "Each year we discuss different people who work with the students in South Plainfield. This year Officer Papa was at the top of our list."

Papa doesn't talk much about himself. His wife Marty helped filled in some of the more important details about her husband. Papa always dreamed of becoming a police officer. When he joined the South Plainfield Police Department in 1989 it was truly a dream come true. The road to get there however, was a long one.

He spent four years as a military police officer in the U.S. Marine Corps. This was followed by a series of diversified jobs, but all the while he yearned to be a policeman. Over the years, Joe worked in auto sales, had a printing company and became a licensed hairdresser. He worked in a steel mill for nine years before applying for a position as a police officer with the borough. While at the police academy, Joe received an award from the Attorney General's Office, and his classmates voted him "the officer they'd most like to ride with." Marty explained, "I think it had to do with trust, after spending time with him at the academy they felt they trusted him to protect both the public and his partner."

When Joe quit the steel mill and accepted a position as an officer, he willingly accepted a huge pay cut, about half, to finally make his dream

Marty, who owns Carousel Salon on Oak Tree Ave., will be unable (Continued on page 5)





Schools Collecting for Tsunami Victims



At the time, the incident was believed to be a random drive-by shooting. However, years of investigations by local and county departments in New Jersey and several other states led them to believe otherwise.

On the night in question, Plainfield Police Chief Edward Santiago claims that Anastario was involved in a drug deal gone bad. He retrieved a rifle from his father's home, and along with two other suspects in a Chevy Vega, shot Jones and his friend on their way to a

Anastario, a former resident of South Plainfield, fled the state several years after the murder, moved to Edgewater, Fla. with his wife and family and set up a new life for himself.

Plainfield Police Director Jiles Ship said the detectives learned that the

suspect and his accomplices, all childhood friends from South Plainfield who went to school together, moved away not long after the killing. Anastasio turned himself into police in Florida after recently being contacted about the case. Union County Prosecutor Theodore Romankow expects at least one more arrest to be made in the case shortly.

News of the arrest in the decades old cold case made its way to the local evening news stations, the New York Times and other local news publications. Ferraro was present at the press conference and was acknowledged for his role in the arrest. He said, "I was glad to assist in providing information. I admire the professionalism, dedication and determination of the Union County Prosecutor's Office and the Plainfield Police Dept."

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
