The Labor Day Committee has announced that former Fire Chief John R. Cotone will be leading this year's Labor Day parade as the Honorary Grand Marshal.

Cotone, a lifelong resident of South Plainfield, has been a member of the fire department for 43 years, serving as a volunteer, captain, deputy captain and chief. He has been fire code official for 20 years. John started working in South Plainfield in 1961 as heavy equipment operator with the DPW and was promoted to foreman. This year's parade is already setting up to be better than ever. With a little less than a month to go, there are already twelve bands and 45 entries signed up to march, including our own South Plainfield

Drama Debuts "The Pajama Game nmer

This week the South Plainfield Summer Drama Workshop (SDW) will present their production of The Pajama Game, an unconventional story set in the 50's dealing with daily lives of the workers at The Sleep Pajama Factory in Cedar Rapids, Iowa.

The battle of the sexes is nothing new and union versus management conflicts are an age-old blue collar issue. While neither sound exciting enough to take to the stage as a musical, throw in some romance, comedy, a wonderful assortment of "real people" characters, add dance

numbers by acclaimed choreographer Bob Fosse and you have not just a musical, but a big hit.

Theater lovers in the know realize that The Pajama Game was a big hit years before Doris Day lit the silver screen with the film version. The Broadway production was directed by George Abbott (of Damn Yankees fame) and Jerome Robbins, choreographed by Bob Fosse, music and lyrics by Richard Adler and Jerry Ross. It premiered on May 13, 1954 at St. James Theatre in New York City. The Pajama Game previewed in New Haven, Conn. and it was during the preview the musical nearly lost one of the all time favorite dance numbers

Steam Heat. This jazzy dance with its risqué moves and derby tricks introduced the world to Fosse's style, but Abbott wanted to cut the number. Noting the positive reactions from the audience, co-director Robbins convinced him to leave the dance intact. The Pajama Game was an enormous success launching the careers of Fosse and later Shirley MacLaine. The show was the eighth musical to have a run of over a thousand performances.

As the cast of The Pajama Game takes to the stage, they are following in the footsteps of hundreds of youths who spent their summers steeped in all that Summer Drama has to offer. Many of the students on the 2005



SDW stage have been with the group for years, while others are excited to be in their first show. Older performers are savoring every second of their final summer drama year and still others have returned as interns or staff such as: Emma Fulton, Christopher Baron and David Garatino. Quite a few SDW veterans have moved on to professional careers in the arts. The Summer Drama Workshop was

I refused because I wanted to see my own doctor. When he found out that I was going to a different doctor to get a second opinion he immediately began saying that I had "misunderstood" him and that he had said to me that I "might get the disease in twenty years or so." How could I have misunderstood him if he even gave me types of vitamins to take for this disease? He had lied to me and tried to cover it up by saying that I had misunderstood him; however, I have written proof that he "diagnosed" me with Macular Degeneration. When I went for my second opinion the doctor told me that I didn't even have the beginning of it.

The reason I am telling my story is because I don't want him to do this to anyone else. The suffering that I went through thinking that I was going to go blind when I am only in my late forties was unbearable.



Keystone Community Residence Renew Front St. Adoption

Mary Ann Williams, Vocational Supervisor at the Keystone Community Residence, has renewed Keystone's Adopt-A-Spot contract with the South Plainfield Clean Business Association for another year. The Keystone Vocational Program litter crew has been maintaining the entire length of Front Street, from Maple Ave. to the railroad tracks. Working on Thursdays, the crew of six to nine people sweeps the sidewalks, picks up litter and pulls any weeds that might be growing in the curb.

Keystone first adopted this road in 1997, as part of the downtown revitalization effort. The Vocational Program has a separate contract with the CBA to clean litter from the Borough's parks and municipal buildings. Regular litter removal is an important facet of the Clean Communities Program, because people are less likely to drop trash in a clean area than if a place is already littered.

This Adopt-A-Spot is important to the downtown area. The CBA is looking for other businesses or groups interested in adopting spots in the commercial districts. Hamilton Blvd., Church St., South Plainfield Ave. and Oak Tree Ave. are all subject to littering. Summer has arrived and now is the time for backyard barbecues and outdoor celebrations. The sweet smell of fresh cut grass lingers in the air and suddenly an increased amount of attention falls on your lawn. Gardeners often struggle with summer lawn care and unfortunately the extreme heat and humidity has crept in early this year. Parker Gardens' horticultural experts are offering up lawn care basics that will help bring you success.

Fertilizing is the first key to summer lawn success. If you did not fertilize in late spring and would like to now, use a time release fertilizer with emphasis on phosphorous and potassium to promote healthy growth.

Watering is the second key to summer lawn success. During the summer, gardeners should only water mature lawns every two days to a depth of two and a half to three inches. This is approximately three-fourths of an inch of water.

The purpose of this watering structure and cycle is to allow the roots to get a drink. The day the lawn is not watered gives the roots incentive to grow deeper; too much water causes shallow roots.

The optimal time of day to water is between 5 to 10 a.m. for the Central New Jersey area. At this time the soil is the coolest and allows for higher absorption of water. If you have a lawn that has gone dormant, due to summer heat and lack of water, you need to increase the duration of watering, not the frequency.

The third key to summer lawn success is mowing. Parkers recommends that gardeners mow high. The higher the lawn is mowed, no lower than four inches in the summer heat, the less the soil will dry out and the deeper the roots are able to grow.

The fourth and final key to summer lawn success is management of summer lawn problems. There are four main categories of problems: Japanese beetle grubs, above ground insects, fungus and weeds. Parker Gardens has treatment plans available for each of these problems. 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


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Plainfield Animal Hospital Unveils State-of-the-Art Building

The weekend of July 23 marked the official opening of the "new" Plainfield Animal Hospital. The 53-year-old establishment finally made the long awaited move into their brand new building, and Dr. Scott Linick's years of dreams were finally realized. The hospital's website offered a humorous invitation to join the festivities, "This party is for people. The rest of the year is for your pets!"

In order to accommodate everyone the hospital held two ribbon cutting ceremonies. The first was held on Saturday evening, July 23. Owner Scott ceremony was held for the hospital's

Staff members ran tours of the facility, regaling fascinated visitors with detailed facts about the many different areas and operation of the hospital.

Scott currently employs eight veterinarians and 20 support personnel.

Scott began planning the hospital in the summer of 2003 after attending a hospital design convention in Kansas City, Missouri. Construction took just over a year. The beautiful new building is located adjacent to the former hospital. The outside of the building is impressive, with glass walls towering to the second floor. Inside the reception area is expansive and cheery. There are check in and check out desks to speed clients along. The waiting area offers a coffee bar, children's play area and a viewing window for the luxury cat condos. A television plays non-stop runs of The Animal Planet.

The new hospital has six exam rooms. Scott proudly noted, "Each exam room is equipped with a television monitor, so that our clients may view videos pertaining to their pets' specific conditions. A large central treatment area is surrounded by our ICU featuring floor to ceiling glass so that the patients can be monitored at all times." Additional areas include a surgery suite, a dental suite, x-ray room and in-house laboratory. There are separate wards for dogs, cats and exotic pets, as well as climate controlled indoor dog runs. The hospital



offers in-house and online pharmacies. They also have a retail area filled with a wide variety of products for pets.

The second floor is devoted to office space-something in short supply in the old hospital.

There is a spacious conference room where Linick plans to teach dental classes. The conference table is equipped with audiovisual hook-ups for laptop computers. The room also features a board for projecting and writing. Linick's office is on this floor: it is the first time he has his own office. There is a staff locker room and an associate's office. 






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Junior Police Academy Graduates Second Class



From the South Plainfield Library

What's Cookin' at the Library this Summer?—Two recent additions to our library's collection of cookbooks "sparked" my imagination this week and inspired me to seek out some of the other treasures that might otherwise go overlooked on our shelves. Karen Adler and Judith Fertig's *The BBQ Queens' Big Book of Barbecue* (641.5784 ADL) and James Purviance's *Weber's Real Grilling* (641.5784 PUR) have whet my appetite for some of the best outdoor cooking that summer has to offer.

Adler and Fertig's tome offers more than 30 chicken recipes, 65 rubs and sauces and 50 beef options, as well as chapters on fish, pork, lamb and (for the less-carnivoristically inclined) there is even a chapter on smoking vegetables, cheeses and pizza! One could hardly expect less of these two ladies from Kansas City who are the self-proclaimed Queens of BBQ. Tm personally impressed with something the authors call "The doctor is in Apricot-Bourbon barbecue sauce" (see pg. 90).

Purviance's book is a lot more than an advertisement for Weber's grills and charcoal products, though the namebrand support might account for the quality of this books' incredibly appetizing, full-color illustrations. Do not pick up this book on an empty stomach... it can be hazardous to your waistline! Each of the 200 recipes in this book are relatively simple to follow with ingredients that can be found in most neighborhood supermarkets. The last chapter features some irresistible dessert recipes that you don't always expect to find in outdoor cookery; try "Chunky Chewy Chocolate Cookies" on the grill ... I'm dying to whip up a batch!

Two books by Steven Raichlen; The Barbecue Bible and, companion volume, The Barbecue Bible: sauces, rubs and marinades provide a graduate level education in BBQ'ology. In his first book (pub. 1998) Raichlen offers a truly international approach to America's culinary claim to fame with recipes like Vietnamese "Shrimp Mousse on Sugarcane" (p. 55), French "Grilled Snails" (pp. 56-7), Korean "Sesame-Grilled Beef" (pp. 127-8), Peruvian "Beef Kebabs" (p. 134), and Argentinian "Veal and Chicken Kebabs" (pp. 149-50). But he also has done justice by such hallowed and time-tested pieces of down-home cooking as "North Carolina-Style Pulled Pork" (pp. 154-56) and the classic "Hamburger" (pp. 205-6). His second book (pub. 2000) is a treatise on all the flavor-boosting tricks that give grilled food its irresistible character, ality, and soul. This : harmonizes well with his first work. Raichlen offers his readers over 200 recipes for a truly global flavoring. With recipes so colloquial as "Pig Picker Pucker Sauce" and as exotic as "Persian Saffron-Yogurt Marinade" Raichlen seems to have covered all the bases.

Ann's Down Home Trailer Park BBQin' Cookbook (641.5784 BOX). "Ruby Ann's" is more about an "ethos" of trailer-park culture from a gastronomic perspective than it is about anything resembling legitimate cooking... but this book is good for a few bellylaughs. If you intend to try out any of the recipes in this book it might be advisable to lay in a good supply of Pepto-Bismol, Tums and Alka-seltzer before you begin.

Big on BBQ-grilled-and-smokedflavor but not so excited about cooking outdoors? George Foreman has the answer to your outdoor-phobic mania. *George Foreman's Indoor Grilling Made Easy* (641.5784 FOR) provides the health-conscious gourmet with tasty recipes that can be prepared anywhere from a dorm room (laws permitting) to a suburban home. Here's a book that dad can use to learn how to get his Fathers' Day gift into action... and remember, it's not "cooking", it's "grilling"!

Well, this is just a taste of what we have to offer in the library. I would like to remind you that we are now on summer hours. That means the library is no longer open on Sundays. The rest of our weekday and Saturday schedule remains: 10 a.m. to 9 p.m. on Monday, Wednesday and Thursday; 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Tuesday and Friday and 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturday.

We would like to invite children of all ages to participate in our summer reading club: *Be a Readerosaurus*. Parents can also get in on the fun by participating in our *Adult Summer Reading Program*. Prizes will be awarded at the end of the summer... the more you read, the more chances you have to win! 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
