Young Cancer Survivor Opens Her Heart with Gift to Others

Laura DeAngelis, 8, defies her age by her incredibly maturity and selfless actions. She recently donated her First Your Heart To Children Battling Cancer Foundation, Inc., founded by Century 21 Moretti Realty. What makes this donation so special is that Laura is herself a cancer victim.

Two years ago when Laura became ill, her parents took her to the doctor and got the shock of their life. Thinking she just had some sort of stomach disorder, Laura was diagnosed with which resulted in the removal of part of her colon, followed by aggressive chemotherapy. 
To the Editor,

They were looking for government forms and ended up at a site which wanted to charge them for the forms. Now, almost all government forms are free. What was confusing the situation was the fact that these websites, say www.irs, had the extension com. Now there are basically four web address extensions (there are more but these are the most common). They are: .com, .edu, .gov, and .org. .Com are commercial (business websites) like amazon.com, or cnn.com.; .edu are educational websites, such as Rutgers.edu.; .org are websites run by organizations like the American Library Association (ALA.org). Finally, all official federal government sites have the extension .gov. State governments have a totally different format. New Jersey is www.state.nj.us. The official U.S. Government website for the IRS is *irs.gov*. You will not be charged for printing out or filling in forms at this website. However, if you go to irs.com you will be charged for doing either of those activities, and the forms will be the same. It is just that the commercial site is in business

Passport Applications at Borough Hall

Residents can renew or obtain passports at Borough Hall in the conference room on Friday, Oct. 7 from noon to 2 p.m. Personnel from the Middlesex County Passport Office will be on hand to assist applicants. There are several items required to renew passports, so check out the list below or you will be disappointed.

In order to renew your passport, you must have a completed application-unsigned. All applicants must appear in person. For those under 14, both parents must be present.

You will need proof of American citizenship, such as birth certificate, previous passport or naturalization certificate (original). Hospital or Baptismal certificates are not accept-

Bring two identical photographs (2"x2") taken within six months; driver's license, employment photo ID, high school or college photo ID are acceptable. Be prepared to write two separate checks.

For those 16 and over, a check for

\$67 made payable to the U.S. Dept. of State and one for \$30 made payable to the Middlesex County Clerk is required. This passport is good for

For those under 16, the passport is good for five years. Write checks for \$52 made payable to: the U.S. Dept. of State and \$30 payable to the Middlesex County Clerk

No cash or credit cards will be accepted. Checks or money orders only. Passports will not be issued that day. Normal processing time is six weeks

Baldwin Art Collection Donated to Ft. Bragg Airborne Museum

Robert M. Baldwin, former Mayor of South Plainfield and an 82nd Airborne Division Paratrooper during World War II, died on Dec. 28, 2003, at his home in Saylorsburg, Pa., at the age of 78. His tour of duty during the war included participation in the Rhine Jump on March 21, 1945, as the Allied Army crossed into Germany during the occupation of Berlin after

During this time he sketched his observations and put together a collection of original water color paintings depicting the war scenes he witnessed. Between 1945 and his death in 2003 he added other battlefield depictions to his collection of the war in the Pacific and Vietnan

On Saturday, March 26, (almost 60 years to the day of the Rhine Jump) his 17-picture collection was donated by his estate to the 82nd Airborne Military Museum at Ft. Bragg, North Carolina, by his son, Mark Baldwin

Baldwin was born March 3, 1925, the second son of William M. and Evelyn L. Baldwin in Ridgway, Pennsylvania. He attended school in the Ridgway Public School system and although he didn't distinguish himself as an academician, he proved quite adept with a sketch pad and paint brush.

During the latter part of his senior year of high school, Robert was granted his diploma before the end of the normal school year so that he could serve his country's during World War II.

Baldwin left school Feb. 5, 1943. ust before his 18th birthday and enlisted in the U.S. Army. After completing basic training he passed from group to group serving in the infantry, artillery, the aviation cadets and fi-

nally ended up in the paratrooper school where in November of 1944, he graduated and was assigned to the 507 Parachute Infantry Battalion of the 504th Parachute Infantry Regiment of the 82nd Airborne Division as a Private First Class. He was sent to Europe in January of 1945 and saw ac tion in the Rhine Jump on March 24, 1945. He was a member of the first army of occupation in Berlin at the war's end. It was during this period in Germany that the first of his works were painted.

Baldwin received the following honors: Good Conduct Medal, Distinguished Unit Badge, American Theater Service Medal, EAME Theater. Service Medal, two Bronze Stars, and discharged from service on January 16,

Before departing for overseas he married his childhood sweetheart. Caroline Jean Hold of Ridgway, Pa. His first child, R. Mark, Ir., was born before his return from Europe. His three other children: Carl J., Jeanne L. and Erica H. followed during the 1950's.

After the war Baldwin moved to

New Jersey, eventually settling in South Plainfield in 1950. He was employed at the Art Color Company in Dunellen as a timekeeper in a composing room and then as a window designer for the Teppers Department Store in Plainfield.

A talented artist from childhood, he sought to build himself a career in mercial art. In 1948 he created The Robert M. Baldwin Company as a one-man commercial art and advertis-

In 1956 Robert ran for public office and led a Republican resurgence in the predominantly Democratic town of South Plainfield. He remained in office for six years.

His presence was not unfelt in the community. Although not an architect, he was responsible for the construc tion and design of the Borough Hall and the Borough Library, both of which bear plaques inscribed with his name. He also designed the Borough Seal and developed the original ideas for the New World Industrial Site in the southern end of town and the park

in South Plainfield's Spring Lake.

As a politician he was of course a oiner, whether by choice or otherwis In addition work on several town bodies such as the Planning Board, Sewer Commission and all other administrative boards.

Many of his memberships were of a military nature. He was a member of the local V.F.W. Post #16763, The American Legion Chaumont Post #243, and a trustee of the South Plainfield Public Library. He was also a charter member of the V.F.W. Post in Ridgway, Pa., the Military Order of the Cooties Pup Tent #41 of the South Plainfield V.F.W., the South Plainfield Civic Band, and the South Plainfield Junior Chamber of Commerce, the latter two of which he organized. And finally he was a member of St. Andrew Episcopal Church of Plainfield, serving as a Warden from about 1957-1959.

As Vice Chair of the Judiciary Committee, I have the opportunity to propose legislation to enhance law enforcement in our state. In this session of the Assembly I have drafted two bills that I strongly believe will better protect the citizens of New Jersey. As you may know Senator Barbara Buono and I sponsored companion bills which require a Municipal Court Judge to review a driver's record before imposing sentence for drunk driving. This bill was prompted by the tragedy involving the death of a young man who was a student at St. Joseph's High School in Metuchen. Prior to the accident, a judge sentenced the driver of the automobile that




caused the accident as a first time offender when in fact he was guilty on two prior occasions. If the drunk driver had been properly sentenced, his drivers license would have been revoked at the time of the tragedy. Governor Codey signed that legislation into law in February. Never again will that mistake be made in any municipal court in New Jersey.

However there is still a loophole in the law. Motor vehicle records do not always contain convictions in other states. It is quite possible that an individual could have two DWI convictions in Alabama that will not be recorded in New Jersey. Assemblyman Peter Barnes and I have sponsored Assembly Joint Resolution 128, which will create a National Drunk Driving Database Study Commission. This commission will be formed within 60 days of the Governor's signature and will report back to the Senate and General Assembly with specific recommendations to create a reliable national database for drunk driving convictions. Over a quarter of drunk driving offenses in New Jersey are committed by drivers with previous drunk driving convictions. This law will provide the judge with the proper information when a sentence is imposed and keep drunk drivers off the road.

A second bill that I have sponsored, (A4094), admits evidence of prior sexual offenses in a trial involving a repeat offender. Sexual predators are four times as likely to commit the same type of crime. Under New Jersey's present rules of evidence a jury would not know that the defendant committed the same crime previously. The proposed legislation will give the trial judge discretion based on all of the evidence to inform the jury of the defendant's criminal history. The rights of the accused will be protected. However we must assure that victims rights are also enhanced. There is no more despicable crime than a sexual attack. As a society, we must do all that we can to put these predators behind bars. A4094 will provide prosecutors with another tool to bring these individuals to justice



from disorientation due to illnesses such as Alzheimer's, dementia, or autism, we would like to hear from you. The Middlesex County Board of Chosen Freeholders will begin a pilot program this October called "Project Lifesaver" which will help locate missing persons using a tracking bracelet. The program will be utilized for individu-als prone to wandering due to a disorienting illness.

The teaching system will be administered by the County Sheriff's Office. Individuals enrolled in the program will wear a special bracelet that allows a tracking device to locate them. The Sheriff's office will be outfitted with special tracking equipment and fifteen officers will be trained in all aspects of the program. The Country will purchase 30 bracelets to begin the pilot program and will assess the need for more based upon requests for enrollment. At this time there will be no charge

for those who participate in the program.

The bracelet is not designed to act as a babysitter or be "big brother" and does not replace a home alarm or other security equipment that prevents individuals from leaving the home. It does not prevent individuals from locating them before they experience harm. Following a report that a person is missing, the tracking device is activated on location and it follows the signal in the bracelet to locate the individual



Anesh, Bengivenga Offer Fresh Leadership for South Plainfield

Summer isn't yet over, but Borough Council candidates Matt Anesh and Rob Bengivenga have already been hitting the campaign trail talking to voters And both candidates have

"Over the next two months. Rob and I will share our plans for making South Plainfield a better place," Anesh explained. "And while we have lots of ideas, don't expect any big spending plans. To make our town more affordable, we've got to stop the spending spree. Fiscal responsibility is the key."

Bengivenga reiterated the need for change: "We need fresh leadership. Under one-party control, things have gone in the wrong direction. Spending, borrowing, leasing and, most importantly, property taxes are all on the rise, and it's time for a return to fiscal discipline. Matt and I will work hard to make our town more affordable. because we can't continue to spend like there's no tomorrow. Under our leadership, South Plainfield will once again be an affordable place to live, work, and raise a family. That's our priority, and that's what we'll be talking about in the weeks to come




Their efforts were doubly rewarded recently when eight-year-old cancer





Special Education in New Jersey – Here's to the Next Fifty Years

The year 2005 marks the 50th Anniversary of special education in New Jersey and the 30th Anniversary that special education is guaranteed to children in the United States through the Individuals with Disabilities Act (IDEA).

The person who spearheaded special education in New Jersey was the late Senator Alfred Beadleston. As such, New Jersey was in the forefront of offering programs in public schools for children with mental, physical, emotional and learning needs. New Jersey's pioneering effort in 1955 laid the cornerstone for the enactment of IDEA in 1975.

Fifty years ago only full-time selfcontained classes were offered to children in need. Gradually, this expanded to include a pullout service known as supplementary instruction that was tutoring. Today, there is a wide mean of educational programs available from the least restrictive to most restrictive. The gamut runs from inclusion, inclass support, one to four resource center classes, in-district part-time or fulltime self-contained classes, to out-ofdistrict part-time or full-time classes.

Initially, the school psychologist was the only diagnostician determining a child's entrance into a special education class. In 1963, the social worker became part of a two member team acting as a bridge between the parent and the school. By 1969, the learning consultant was a team member whose function was to translate findings and recommendations into instructional realities. From this point on the concept of three members of a child study team (CST) consisting of a school psychologist, social worker, and learning consultant was established.

Because IDEA shadowed many of the practices in New Jersey, the only major changes to special education in our state were the implementation of the Individual Educational Plan (IEP) and Annual Review (AR). The former is a written summary of test findings, proposed academic program, and educational goals. The latter is a written statement of yearly progress, intended class schedule, and learning goals.

Fifty years ago a verbal response was all that was necessary to conduct an assessment and to provide a special education service. Thirty years ago accountability in the form of written documentation became the norm under IDEA. Child Study Team reports were never given to parents until the advent of IDEA. Today, parents receive these reports in advance of an IEP meeting.

The emphasis from 1955 to 1975 was primarily helping students with learning problems or intellectual limitations. During the last 30 years special education also has been involved with the emotional and social problems of children.

For the first forty years, special education teachers had been providing specialized methods for students with specific disabilities. Within the last ten years, they have been increasingly servicing pupils with a broad range of disabilities and diverse needs. In addition, the role of the special education teacher now also includes being a facilitator or partner with the mainstream education teacher.

It is hard to believe 50 years have gone by since Senator Beadleston's vision to ensure that children with special needs get an education. However, it is easy to realize how far special education has come since then. Students with disabilities are doing things to-day never thought possible in 1955. New Jersey's Golden Anniversary of special education is only the beginning. Here's to the next 50 years.




community."

Creature Feature

Just as you see your doctor on a regular basis, it is important that your pets receive routine veterinary care. Preventative medicine and early detection of diseases are the keys to pet health.

Your per should receive a thorough physical exam, from nose to tail, at least once yearly for young pets, twice yearly for senior pets. Theses exams will assess your pet for both normal and abnormal findings, which may indicate potential health risks or un derlying disease.

The second part of a comprehensive health exam is laboratory testing. This includes fecal and urine analysis, heartworm and lyme disease testing as well as routine blood work. This testing is important because your pets often show no outward signs of illness until the condition is far advanced.

The last part of a comprehensive health exam is recommended preventative care. This includes routine vaccinations, monthly flea, tick and heartworm prevention, at home dental care

and dietary suggestions.

As your pet ages, more frequent checkups or additional testing may be recommended since senior dogs and cats can develop chronic health problems including arthritis, kidney, liver, and heart disease.

Your pet's health care should continue at home. Check your dog or cat for lumps, bumps, flakes, or scabs. Observe your pet's eyes and ears for clarity, discharge or odor. Monitor for any changes in your pet's eating or drinking habits.

If you have any concerns, contact your veterinarian immediately. Remember, your pets offer unconditional love and affection and become an additional member of the family. They deserve the very best health





(Continued from page 1) students and staff were completely revised and describe higher expectations in areas such as academics. Beginning Oct. 3, the Middle School will provide morning classes for GEPA math prep. The classes will run from 7:15a.m. through March. New to the school are the AM GEPA prep classes for Language Arts. These will run mornings a month prior to the tests. In order to improve GEPA scores, Novak held a one-week seminar with about 25 teachers in attendance. They

worked on team teaching and curricu-lum. Novak noted that the input he and Panuzzo garnered from the staff was very helpful. He said, "We learned a lot from each other. Improving the GEPA scores is everyone's responsibility, not just math and language arts teachers. I am not their boss; we will work together so these children can succeed in high school and their entire lives. Study skills must be mastered in junior high, especially in math. Co-operation has been outstanding, this is a great faculty!" Novak said, "I am

also blessed with wonderful secretaries, Linda Gianakas and Joanne Plate." Long-time Middle School secretary Grace Decillis will retire the end of

The Middle School's team teaching will continue. The successful program consists of three teams for each grade. Each team has four teachers-language arts, reading, social studies and science-who work together on a common preparation for tests, quizzes and projects. There are approximately 100 students per team. They will compete during the course of the year, and the team with the highest GPA will be awarded a prize. Novak noted there will be incentives for best attendance each marking period.

The list of goals doesn't end with cademics. There will be more emphasis on classroom management and improved behavior. Students will be expected to respect everyone; there will be zero tolerance to violations. The dress code will be enforced. Novak said, "This is not the beach!" There is a section in the student handbook that details the dress code-what is acceptable and what is not acceptable. Parents will be asked to review the book with their children and sign a form noting that they have done so. There will be a t-shirt available for students to wear for the first violation. Parents will be notified. If there is a second violation, the parents will have to pick up their child from school.

Novak will handle discipline of eighth grade students and Panuzzo will handle seventh grade. They plan to use in school suspension, out of school suspension, and may institute an AM detention. New walkie-talkies will help maintain better control of all activi ties such as outdoor gym classes and hallways. Novak has created a fifth "A."-attendance. All students will be expected to arrive at 8 a.m. prepared to start the school day. The Middle School will resume the tradition of an eighth grade trip to Washington, DC and Baltimore. Academics and behav ior will determine which students will be permitted to take the trip.

Students will be issued ID cards on the first day of school. The card will have last year's photo and their student ID number, which will follow them throughout middle and high school. The card will have a barcode and can be used to check out library books. Cards with new photos will be taken in the fall.

Improvements include new computers in the computer lab and infor-mation center. The new librarian is Wendy Su. The library will be open all day and after school. Looking to the future, Novak hopes to see new lockers, better lighting throughout the school, and air conditioning and heating improvements by 2007-2008 school year.

Novak had a hand in preparing the building for the new school year and said, "I never knew a principal's job included pruning trees, painting hallways, feeding fish and cleaning a custodian closet!


