

Diehl Starts Position as SPHS Disciplinarian

During their August meeting, the Board of Education reinstated the position of high school disciplinarian and appointed Robert Diehl, a social studies teacher in South Plainfield High School for the past six years, to the post. According to Diehl, the position of

disciplinarian has been shared among the four assistant vice principals since disciplinarian Brian Bilal left the district a few years ago. This year, there will only be two assistant principals at the High School.

This job of disciplinarian is quasi administrative. I am not a vice principal. I am strictly a disciplinarian. I work with the administration, but my job is to maintain discipline in the building, to enforce the rules and communicate with the parents,' said Diehl.

Diehl views the job of disciplinarian as one that doesn't punish students. "The whole philosophy behind having a disciplinarian is to modify behavior in a positive way. Our main task is to provide a healthy and safe learning environment. There is a lot of communication involved. Everyone

has to understand what the school policies are so you need to be clear on what the rules are and everyone has to understand that you have to take disciplinary action to maintain that," said Diehl.

Diehl's duties, as disciplinarian, will be to deal with students who are tardy and with those who cut classes. "Some kids are late with a reason and some kids are chronically late. It's the chronic lateness that concerns us most, because you won't have lunch first period. It is a class period se need student

And tenth period is a learning period-with math, English or history-as well," said Diehl.

But if students are chronically late or violate school rules, Diehl will assign punishments including detention, in school suspension and outside school suspension (OSS). "I'm not big on outside school suspension, but sometimes it's necessary because you don't want the student in the general population when the need is to maintain discipline within the building." said Diehl. "I expect to be consistently fair to the students," said Diehl. "Every infraction will be logged in and also when the phone calls and meetings with parents were made. Everything will be document-ed," said Diehl.

Diehl has been head soccer coach for four years and will continue to coach soccer as a volunteer when his schedule permits. The year he was junior class advisor. To the Editor,

I was in Marine Air Group 32 at

the end of WWII. This air group went into Japan by way of Okinowa about the middle of September of 1945. We relieved many of the men that had their 20 months overseas time in and had the number of points to go home. Our first stop after Okinowa was a small airfield over the ridge from Nagisaki called Oppama. We flew over the atom bomb target and witnessed the destruction of that bomb. The destruction of the Hurricane Katrina reminds me of what I saw in Japan.

September 9, 2005

There was destruction from the fire bomb raids that, to me, equaled an atom bomb blast. We could stand at the edge of the village and look right across Yokosuka and Yokohama to Tokyo, because the area was burned flat.

But the amazing thing was, people did not sit on the curb and cry for help. It was going into November and people had to get ready for winter. The temperature range there was much like South Plainfield's.

We saw them scrounge around and find pieces of wood and material for a 'tin' roof, to make any kind of shelter.

While watching the coverage of the Katrina damage, I wondered why some of those people didn't try to make shelters for themselves.

Yes, the conditions were altogether different, but instead of looting jewelry and other things that they could not eat or drink, I think they could have made something to get out of sun

I hope Uncle Sam doesn't force feed these people with many things that they never had before.

I think the able bodied ones should be put to work cleaning up areas as the water goes down. Most people can handle a si

or broom or a wheelbarrow. Those with a driver's license can be put to driving trucks to remove trash, etc. Military personnel could go back to what they are trained to do. WILLIAM TUTHILL

The Internal Revenue Service announced today the establishment of a special toll-free telephone number for use by taxpayers affected by Hurricane Katrina

People affected by Katrina who need help with tax matters can call (866) 562-5227.

Beginning today, taxpayers can call the special number Monday through Friday from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. local

Callers to this dedicated telephone line can find out about available tax relief, get free copies of their tax return transcripts and receive Disaster Tax Loss Kits. Callers may also be re-ferred to the Federal Emergency Management Agency's assistance lines for additional help.

Affected taxpayers who need copies of tax returns to apply for aid or other purposes can have the normal user fee waived by writing 'Hurricane

Katrina" in red across the top margin of their Form 4506, Request for Copy of Tax Return.

More information about tax relief for victims, making charitable contri-butions and links to other government web pages is available at IRS.gov.

The IRS is continuing to monitor the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina and will provide additional relief and guidance in the days ahead.

IRS Expedites Charity Applications

The Internal Revenue Service will provide an expedited review and ap-proval process for new organizations eeking tax-exempt status in order to provide relief for victims of Hurri-cane Katrina. However, the agency encourages people to use existing organizations currently working on immediate aid efforts.

New organizations should apply for tax-exempt status by filing IRS Form 1023, available at <u>www.irs.gov</u>, and write at the top of the form "Di saster Relief, Hurricane Katrina." The IRS will give such applications expedited attention to ensure they meet legal requirements.

"We want to make sure we do all we can to help new charitable organizations get up and running so they can begin providing the assistance the victims of this terrible disaster so des-

perately need," said IRS Commissioner Mark W. Everson. "Just as we did after September 11, 2001, we will put these applications at the head of the queue and turn them around promptly.

Use of existing charitable organizations is encouraged because such or-ganizations, including churches, are frequently able to administer relief programs more efficiently than newly formed organizations, because they already have fundraising and distribution infrastructures in place. The website of the Federal Emer-

gency Management Agency (FEMA) and the U.S. Government's main Web portal, www.FirstGov.gov, offer lists of organizations that provide support to victims of Hurricane Katrina. This publication is also available on the IRS website.



Thomas, Kubala Update **Residents On New Library**

Democratic Council members Kathy Thomas and Ed Kubala are excited about the new library planned to be built on Plainfield Avenue. Council member Kathy Thomas is coordinating the design and construction on behalf of the Mayor and Council. Kathy said, "The design of the library is well underway and construction will begin in 2006. The library will be built on the prop-erty between Unity Bank and Conroy's Funcral Home. The new, two-story, 15,000 foot library will be designed to assimilate with the surround-ing neighborhood. It will have expanded public access computers and a computer training lab, a children's craft room, dedicated quiet study rooms for group study, a large meeting room, and a drive-up window for returns as well as picking up reserved materials. The building is also de-signed to allow for future expansion. The new library will be a centerpiece in So. Plainfield for many years to come."

Council member Ed Kubala complimented Kathy Thomas for her work on the library project. "Kathy has done an excellent job coordinating one of the largest projects the borough has un-dertaken in recent years. The present library has served South Plainfield for almost 40 years, but it is just too small when you think about the popu-lation of South Plainfield and the need for any modern library to have plenty of computers avail-able. The new library will be two and one-half able. The new horary will be two and one-nam times as large as the current library. Councilperson Kathy Thomas has been leading the charge to get the new library built. She has helped moved this project from an idea to reality by spearhead-ing the purchase of property on Plainfield Ave., and overseeing the selection of an architect and

the initial design of the library. Since I was first elected to the Council 12 years ago, we have com-pleted some important projects such as the senior housing unit across from Riley School, im-provements to the Community Pool, the expansion of the PAL, construction of a state-of-theart senior recreation center, the permanent pres ervation of over 150 acres of open space and the expansion of Putnam Park. The new library will

be another great asset to borough residents." Council member Kathy Thomas described the process for building the new library, "The Bor-ough had owned a small piece of property next to the South Plainfield Funeral Home (formerly Conroy) for a number of years. When the property next to Unity Bank adjacent to the Borough's property became available, I knew this would be a great place for a new library, near the other Bor-ough facilities. We then reached out to interested groups throughout the Borough to get their in-put. The library board of trustees visited many put. The library board of trustees visited that different libraries to gather various layout and con-struction ideas. The entire town should thank the brary for the time and energy they have devoted to this project. The library board then selected an architect to put everyone's ideas down on paper The preliminary design for the new library will be presented to the public shortly." Like Bengivenga, Anesh sees controlling costs as a key part of being a council member. "While our friends on the other side keep talking about all the money they're spending, they have to remember that the public is funding their spending spree. They need to concentrate more on cutting costs. While it's nice to point to all the things they're spending money on, they have to remember the taxpayer."

"It's time to get our fiscal house back in order," said Bengivenga in summing up the GOP position. 





COUNT, New JERSET, TRAI: Ordinance #1710 entitled: AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE RULES AND REGULATIONS AS STATED IN THE INTERNATIONAL PROPERTY MAINTENANCE CODE AND IS HEREBY ADOPTED AS THE BOROUGH'S PROPERTY MAINTENANCE CODE was adopted on first reading and advartised in The Observer on Friday, Spetember 9, 2005 and that a public hearing be scheduled for Tuesday, September 20, 2005 at 8:00 p.m. in the Municipal Building, 2480 Plainfield Avenue, South Plainfield, NJ 07080.

Ordinance No. 1710

An ordinance establishing the minimum regulations governing the conditions and maintenance of all property, buildings and structures; by providing the standards for supplied utilities and facilities and other physical things and conditions essential to ensure the structures are said, sanitary and fit for occupation and use, and the condemnation of buildings and structures unfit for human occupancy and tise demolition of such structures; known as the *Property Maintenance Code*.

Be it ordained by the governing body of the Borough of South Plainfield as follo

De la ordaniec by the governing tody of the Government a control Planimed as indicating the second of the Borough of South Plainfield, being marked and designated as the International Property Maintenance Code as published by the International Code Council, Inc., be and is hereby adopted as the Property Maintenance Code of the Borough of South Plainfield, in the State of New Jersey; for the control of buildings and structures as herein provided; and each and all of the regulations, provisions, penalties, conditions and terms of said Property Maintenance Code are hereby referred to, adopted, and made part hereor, as if fully set out in this ordinance, with the additions, insertions, deletions and changes, prescribed in Section 2 of this ordinance. on 2. The following sections are hereby revise

- Section 101.1 Insert: Borough of South Plainfield
- Section 103.6 Insert: In addition to the actual cost incurred by the department, a \$1,000.00 fee shall be added to any lien placed against real estate to offset the administration cost incurred by the department and the municipality. Section 106.4 Delete: "shall be prosecuted within the limits provided by the state or local laws"
- Insert: upon conviction, a fine of not less than \$100.00 nor more than the max allowable by law or imprisonment for a term not to exceed 30 days, or both.
- Section 302.4 Delete: "10 inches (254 mm)"
 - Insert: 6 inches (152.4 mm)

Add to end of paragraph; Hedges, bushes and shrubs shall be kept Trimmed in order to prevent any over growth onto any adjacent property.

Add: Section 302.4 (a) The owner of any vacant lands fronting on any improved street or roadway shall be required to keep all grass and weeds growing within ten (10) feet of any street or roadway cut and trimmed to a height of not more than six (6) inches, and shall be required to keep all bushes and other plant life growing within 10 (ten) feet of any street or roadway trimmed.

Section 302.8 Delete: "inoperative or unlicens Insert: uninsured or uninspected

Section 303.14 Insert: October 1st, May 1st

Section 602.4 Insert: October 1st, May 1st

Section 3. That Ordinance Number 1349 of the Borough of South Plainfield entitled "An Ordinance Establishing a Property Maintenance Code For the Borough of South Plainfield, County Of Middlesex, State Of New Jersey, Prescribing Regulations Therefore Consistent with Nationally Recognized Standards" and all other ordinances or parts of ordinances in conditic therewith are hereby repealed.

ction 4. That nothing in this ordinance or in the *Properly Maintenance* Code hereby adopted shall be construed affect any suit or proceeding impending in any court, or any rights acquired, or liability incurred or any cause causes of actions acquired or existing, under any act or ordinance hereby regulated as cited in Section 2 of or ordinance; nor shall any just or legal right or remedy of any charter be lost, impaired or affected by this licenon.

Section 5. That the Borough Clerk's office shall certify to the adoption of this ordinance, and cause the same to be published as required by law; and this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its approval as required by law.
