Come January, Republicans will be a part of the Borough Council, ending a trend of Democratic victories, which spanned 12 years. First time Republican candidates Rob Bengivenga and Matthew Anesh defeated Democratic incumbents Ed Kubala and Kathy Thomas in a close race. Democrats David Crabiel and Camille Fernicola won re-election for Freeholder and Elaine Flynn won for County Clerk.

Assemblyman Patrick Diegnan, a

resident of South Plainfield, will be returning for a third term as assemblyman, as well as his running mate Peter Barnes, who both won by wide margins.

While the Democrats were disappointed in the outcome of the election, they all publicly congratulated the Republican candidates and vowed to work together. "We congratulate the winners and will work with them in the future. We are all in this together," said Kubala.

The Republicans were ecstatic with their victory. The Democrats still hold a 4-2 majority on the council. Council members serve for three year terms.

The final vote tally gave Republicans Rob Bengivenga 3,143 votes and Matthew Anesh 3,066. Democrats Ed Kubala received 3,044 votes and Kathy Thomas 3,017. These totals do not include provisional votes.

Approximately 50 percent of the borough's residents cast votes. An exact count was not available at presstime.

The South Plainfield Traffic Safety

Advisory Commission supports the continuation and ultimately, the completion of the project which is to construct an alternate roadway accommodating heavy truck traffic into and out of the Borough. The roadways of Hamilton Blvd., between Durham Ave. and New Market Ave. and Belmont Ave., between Hamilton Blvd. and Metuchen Rd., are currently overburdened with heavy truck traffic. The traffic surveys and counts have shown very high volumes of heavy truck traffic on what are otherwise local roadways, which were never intended to carry such traffic. Relief from this situation is long overdue.

These are residential streets with homes and pedestrian traffic that are put at risk due to these heavy volumes. The noise, congestion, air pollution and traffic delays all impact the local neighborhoods and the municipality at large, causing deterioration in the quality of life.

Emergency response times, as well as typical travel times, are adversely affected for all our residents. Motorists consciously avoid the area during the morning and afternoon peak hours, which continues to expand into and impact larger periods of the day. It is becoming more difficult and time consuming to drive to a relatively close-by

The "Helen Street Project," which would alleviate a large portion of this problem, has been held up by many issues, including environmental concerns. The South Plainfield Traffic Safety Commission is concerned about our environment in every aspect of our lives. Our wildlife, clean air and water are extremely important concerns. They must be maintained to ensure our overall quality of life, now and in the future. The planning for the Helen St. Project has included provisions for these concerns and more. If this project is not completed, the environment for the people of South Plainfield will continue
