

# **COUNCIL TO REORGANIZE JAN.1** Two Republicans to be Sworn in to All Democratic Council

This Sunday, Jan. 1, 2006 will see a change in the make-up of the South Plainfield Borough Council when Republicans Matt Anesh and Robert Bengivenga, Jr. will officially be sworn in for three year terms. For both Anesh and Bengivenga this is their first elected positions and it was the first time either ran for council.

At the same meeting, the borough will bid farewell to long time Councilman Ed Kubala, who has served on the council for 12 years, and Councilwoman Kathy Thomas, who has served for two years.

The meeting will begin with the current council in place and end with the new council seated. Mayor Dan Gallagher will give his annual message and the minority party will also make a statement. Boards and commissions appointments will be announced and appointees will be sworn in.

The reorganization meeting begins at 2 p.m. The public is invited to attend. Following the meeting, all are invited to a reception at the Rescue Squad.

# Local Family Exemplifies The Meaning of Christmas

The desire to help others has be come contagious for South Plainfield resident Shirley Thompson. For the third year, Shirley has provided meals and Christmas gifts for the elderly and needy. This year, she delivered 98 fresh-

needy. This year, she delivered 98 fresh-ly made Christmas dinners, provided Christmas gifts for 44 children and delivered 36 bags of food. It began two years ago when Thompson overheard an elderly woman complaining because the deli wasn't serving hot food on Thanksgiving. That very night Shir-ley began making plans to cook and deliver Christmas dinner to anyone in need who was elderly, handicapped or would not have a home cooked Christmas meal. Christmas meal.

She asked her family if they would be willing to give up their Christmas dinner to help cook and deliver these meals, and got their approval. Shirley said her greatest gift has been see-ing her family and extended family embrace this enormous project with great enthusiasm each year. Shirley got the word out through

the Observer where she ran an ad ask-ing people to call if they were unable to cook Christmas dinner. She also received some names from South Plainfield Social Services Director arge Ackerman. While compiling her list Thomp

son also discovered families with children who would be without gifts. Thompson then took on the task of providing for 44 children. Some of her own children adopted

these families, and when their neigh-bors and co-workers found out what they were doing, the project grew even larger. By the time the Observer arrived on Christmas morning to take photos of the Christmas dinner volunteers, Thompson and her elves had already delivered Christmas gifts and Christmas trees the evening before. # **Council Bids Farewell | Anesh and Bengivenga** Kubala's 12 Years Thomas Plans to Are Eager to Start Stay Involved Comes To End

For the past 12 years Ed Kubala has dedicated his life to serving the needs of the residents of South Plainfield, but that will end on Sunday, Jan. 1, when he steps down.

In a close race in November, Kubala lost his council seat by only a few votes. Disappointed though he may be, Ed understands that the people

have spoken in a fair and democratic election and he has no regrets.

Ed's journey into politics began in 1993, when he ran for office for the first time with Jim Vokral. He ran on the theme of changing the way government worked in South Plainfield. Ed and Jim wanted to (Continued on page 10)

Thomas has applied to be a member of the Planning Board. She served there for a year prior to being appointed councilwoman after Jim Vokral stepped down to work for the Middlesex County Board of Elections. She subsequently ran for council and was elected in the 2004 election to complete Vokral's term (Continued on page 10)

Kathy Thomas had only served two years on the council before losing her bid to remain in office last November, but she plans to stay involved. "It's very important to give back and I will continue to have a positive impact in other ways," said Thomas.

Matthew Anesh and Rob Bengivenga are the first Republicans elected to South Plainfield's Borough Council in 12 years, and are eager to begin their three-year council terms. During the campaign both spoke of opening up government and are prepared to begin their terms by introducing

ordinances to do just that. "Throughout the campaign, we mentioned various initiatives that could accomplish that goal. For example, we would like to enact an open-applications ordinance that would require all positions, both paid and volunteer, to be posted by the borough. Details such as responsibilities and qualifications would be clearly addressed for all residents to inspect. I would also like to see an increase in the number of contracts that are sent out for bid. Quality should always be paramount, however, we should actively seek to attract as many qualified bidders to get the best value for our tax dollar," said Anesh.

To open the process even more, Bengivenga would like to introduce Pay-to-Play reform by introducing

competition into the contracting process. He is also preparing a developer disclosure ordinance which would request that a developer who goes before the planning or zoning board has to disclose any money contributed to a political party or political figure. "Another feature of the ordinance would require anyone wanting to do business with the town to divulge if there is a family connection-a son, brother or cousin-to a member of council or planning board member. This isn't just for developers, but for anyone doing business with the town," said Bengivenga.

During the campaign Bengivenga and Anesh spoke about starting a volunteer program involving teenagers to help seniors with some of the upkeep of their homes. "We called it the South Plainfield Volunteer Corp, but the name isn't what is important. The idea is to get help for seniors so they can stay in their homes. Fve spoken to Joann Graf about the idea and she said she has already been working on something similar, so we want to work as closely with her as possible.

This is another area where we should be able to work with the Democrats and get bi-partisan support," said Bengivenga.

As for the new library, both Anesh and Bengivenga want make sure that the planning process takes into ac-count future needs for expansion as well as parking. "We also want to help get the library foundation moving," said Bengivenga.

# Miss Teen 2005 Speaks to **Students About Bullying**

National American Miss Teen 2005 Samantha Hahn brought her very personal experience about bullying to South Plainfield High School and Middle School students at assemblies held in both schools.

In September of 2004, Hahn started a Tolerance-Anti-Bullying Program geared to school-aged children based on her own horrifying ex-periences. After receiving her title in November, she was asked by the NJ State Attorney General's Office to be the spokes person for the NJ Statewide Anti-Bullying Campaign, NJ Cares About Bullying. She has also filmed a public service announcement sponsored by the Middlesex County Outreach Education Unit that has been seen on MTV, ESPN2, ABC Family, TLC and HGTV

Prior to graduating from Bishop

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Ahr High School in Edison in 2003, Hahn had experienced bullying firsthand and now speaks to students about her verbal, physical and cyber bullying which drove her from school to school. She speaks poignantly about how she had scrap metal thrown in her face by a fellow middle school student and received death threats from classmates on her computer. She hopes that her personal and important message can reach as many children as possible, bringing awareness to this ever increasing problem.

Currently Hahn is attending the Circle in the Square Performing Arts Conservatory in New York City and is pursuing an online journalism degree. She is an accomplished actor, dancer and singer and has performed locally in commercials, music videos, TV and theatre since age seven. She recently completed her first feature film to be released in 2006.

In those day, candi-dates didn't just go door to door, but attended neighborhood coffees held all over town. Residents invited their neighbors to speak one on one with the candidates. Ed and Jim won that election and the first thing they did after being sworn in was to form the Tax Advisory Board and Business Ad-visory Board and invited residents to get involved and to add their voice to the decision making.

Since then, many suggestions from these boards helped mold a many improvements and plans that have been initiated by the council. One of the most significant promises Ed has kept through the years is Pay-As-You-Go government. Its success has made South Plainfield known throughout the area for their fiscal responsibility, with one of the lowest tax bases in the county. Ed has served on the Economic Committee and helped bring in numerous budgets with little or no tax increases

Ed has also been involved in many other project during the past 12 years. One dear to his heart is the Veterans Memorial in Veterans Park. He was involved from the first design to the dedication. He also was council liai-son to the Veterans Memorial located near the Senior Citizens Recreation

During her two year tenure on the council, Thomas has directed most of her efforts toward the plans for the new library. "I was determined to make sure that this library was what the people of South Plainfield wanted it to be. 




