Faced with parents upset over the elimination of the middle school athletic program, the school board, at its regular meeting on June 21, adopted a motion to examine the feasibility and all aspects of a Pay to Participate for sports and marching band programs for students in Grant School, as well as the middle and high schools.

The \$120,000 to cover their salaries was swept away by the addition of two special educa-tion students and their out of district placement tuitions.

Strapped by budget woes that have worsened since the 2006/2007 budget was defeated and the Borough Council cut \$1.2 million, Superintendent of Schools Dr. Robert Rosado noted, "We are in danger of exhausting our entire school budget and surplus by the end of the school year. Students of each class were required to learn their parts and were encouraged to dress up the day of the trial.

Resident **Charged With Child Sex Abuse**

A long-time South Plainfield resident with a previous record was ar-rested by the South Plainfield Police Dept. at his home on Norwood Ave. on June 16. He was charged with sexually abusing a friend's six year-old daughter.

The victim's mother explained that she didn't think much of the accusa-tions her daughter made a year ago about their family friend, 39-year-old Louis P. Corradi. She decided to go to police when her daughter brought up the accusation again. Corradi had known the family for several years and spent time at their home, which is located a few blocks from his residence. According to the girl's mother, he had

even asked to sleep over.


Corradi served time in jail in the past on narcotics charges and for viewing child pornography on the Internet, a Federal offense. The por-nography charge is considered a Tier offense under Megan's Law and does not require the acquised to register not require the accused to register with the state as a sex offender.

The Division of Youth and Family Services was called in after the accusations. Corradi is currently being held at the Middlesex County Adult Correction Center in North Brunswick in lieu of \$275,000 bail and faces 10 to 15 years in prison on charges of aggravated sexual assault and endangering the welfare of a child. If convicted of the sex crime, after his release he will be required to register as a Tier 3 offender under the

Megan's Law program.

Information on registered sex offenders in any state can be found at www.megans-law.net. New Jersey sex offenders can be found at www. state.nj.us/lps/dcj/megan. The listing includes the offender's name and address, any aliases used by the offender, any Megan's Law sex offenses committed by the offender and includes a brief description and the date and location of any such offense; a general description of the offender's modus operandi, if any; the determination of whether the risk of re-offense by the offender is moderate or high; the offender's age, race, sex, date of birth, height, weight, hair, eye color and any distinguishing scars or tattoos; a photograph of the offender and the date on which the photograph was entered into the registry; as well as the make, model, color, year and license plate number of any vehicle operated by the offender. The Internet registry is continually updated with information about additional registrants and names are added as court orders are issued authorizing Internet disclosure about those individuals.

Corradi was unemployed at the time of his arrest and according to neighbors, lived with his parents in their home, which is in close proximity to John F. Kennedy Elementary School. He is single and has no



Dr. Anthony Inverno of 3148 Woodland Ave. told board members he was in the process of putting in a two car garage to house the cars. He listed the cars as a 1969 Cutlass, a 1985 Le Baron convertible and a 1976 Mustang. Inverno explained that the family cars were parked on an easement on Woodland Ave.

Neighbor Dr. Michael Jalali of 3142 Woodland Ave. stated that Inverno would need more than four tents for his collection. He presented

13 pictures taken "a couple of days ago," indexed by his wife Maryann showing what the property looks like. The cars were housed on the driveway in Quonset-type huts. The board admitted the pictures as evidence.

According to Jalali, the cars were always being worked on and a bunch of tires were constantly visible. He also complained of a large commercial-type light pole on Inverno's property. The property also has a log cabin built by Inverno, used by his children as a playhouse when they were younger. Inverno claims he intended it to be a shed, but hadn't sought permits for it. The neighbor noted the shed currently houses a TV and sofa and is still being used, but not as a storage shed. Board member John Rayho viewed the log cabin as a secondary dwelling.

Another neighbor, Joseph Villano of 1358 Woodland Ave., described his house as the last one on a private road, providing the only access to get out of his driveway. Speed bumps had been installed on the road this past year, making it more difficult for him to maneuver his vehicle up the road's steep incline. Villano also noted seeing three to four cars for sale in Inverno's driveway.

Inverno explained that the sale of the cars was a one time incident. When his twin sons graduated college last June and bought themselves new cars, they asked him to sell their old ones. During that same time, Inverno himself purchased a new car and was selling his old car as well. "We are not fixing cars then selling them," Inverno

Board member Frank Furino recalled a previous application from a car collector who wanted to rent a building to hold his collection of 18 cars and that application was denied because of zoning regulations. "This is an eyesore. It seems to me it's six vears out of hand and it's time to remove it," said Furino.

Board chair Bill Thomas explained that the intent of the ordinance for temporary permits is for when there is an emergency, for instance when a fire occurs and the occupant puts a trailer on the site temporarily. The current situation does not fall into this category.

The board denied the application for temporary tents, but allowed the applicant to keep two sheds and the greenhouse on the property. However, the log cabin must be dismantled and Inverno has 30 days to do so.

Zoning officer John Pabst said that if the cabin is not dismantled, the town will issue a summons and bring Inverno to court-or Inverno can ap peal the board's decision.

There were three other applications that came before the Board and were approved: James DeTata of 200 Thomas St., to enclose a 12 by 16 ft. patio; Neil and Barbara Rothweiler of 189 Garden Dr., to put in a 12 by 24 addition to their home and Al Pecker, to build a two-story single family home on an undersized lot at 1906 Hamilton Blvd.






