## Massage Parlor Ordinance Considered by Council

After listening to the comments of Nancy Grennier, editor of the South Plainfield Observer, at last week's Borough Council meeting, council members promised to enact an ordinance to rid the borough of the massage parlors that are operating in town.

One massage parlor, located directly

above the Observer office, was recently raided for the second time in less than a year. It is also located across the street from Roosevelt Elementary School.

According to Grennier, South Plain-

field has five such massage parlors, three of which have been raided.

Unfortunately, they all returned to business as usual within a few hours, leaving the police frustrated. "Police need the council's help in stopping the influx of these types of businesses into our town," she explained. "In order to make an arrest, police have to use undercover officers who must visit these establishments several times just to make one arrest." According to Chief John Ferraro, when he asked the woman arrested for prostitution why she opened a business in South Plainfield, she said, "Because it is easy."

"I don't ever want to hear someone of that character say something like

that about our town again. Let's get rid of these massage parlors right now," said Grennier. Last month she submitted copies of ordinances regulating massage parlors that have already been enacted by other towns in New Jersey.

Councilman Dennis Cerami said he has studied those ordinances and asked that the council enact a similar one. The ordinance would require massage parlors to apply for a license. To get that license they must be certified masage therapists, provide Social Security numbers, be fingerprinted and go through a police background check.

Last week, the health department visited the five massage parlors and informed the owners that if they are providing massages in South Plainfield they must pay a fee of \$4,000 for a permit. Coincidently, all five massage parlors in town don't utilize the word 'massage' in their names, and for good reason. The occupancy fee in the borough is \$60; massage therapists pay \$4,000. Locations that have been raided with arrests are on South Clinton Ave. (two separate locations); and one on Hamilton Blvd. Two other suspected massage parlors are located on Park Ave. and Oak Tree Rd.

## Accidents Mar Holiday Weekend

A head on collision caused by a drunk driver early Sunday morning on New Market Ave sent a 76 year-old woman to the hospital with serious injuries.

Dru Hinton, 32, of New Brunswick was charged with driving while intoxicated, reckless driving and failure to keep right after losing control of his 1995 BMW and striking a 1994 Saturn driven by Vincent Russ, 49, of Willingsboro. Russ was taken to Robert Wood Johnson University Hospital in New Brunswick with minor injuries along with his aunt, Ramona Prince, who underwent emergency surgery. Russ's 19 year-old son, Vincent, was not injured.

Hinton remains in the Middlesex County Adult Correction Center in North Brunswick in lieu of \$150,000 bail.

On Monday afternoon at approximately 4:14, a 2001 Buick Century driven by Maritza Nieves, 22, of Dayton, Ohio ran a stop sign at the intersection of Amboy Ave. and Pitt St. Carla Serra, 49 of South Plainfield, was returning to her Elsie Ave. home when she tried to avoid hitting Nieves' vehicle. Both cars collided and Serra's vehicle was pushed into a telephone pole, trapping her inside for a short period.

Nieves was charged with failure to yield to a stop sign and failure to use a child restraint for her one year-old daughter who was in the back seat. Neither was injured. Serra was taken to Robert Wood Johnson University Hospital in New Brunswick with a fractured pelvis, rib, vertebrae and concussion. She was released on Tuesday.

Moments after the crash on Amboy Ave. and just a block away, Ralph Di-Andrea, 38, of Dunellen side swiped a parked car and plowed into two cars parked in the driveway of 622 Bergen St. He was charged with driving while intoxicated and careless driving.



### Grant Science is 'Egg'citing

Is it a bird? Is it a plane? No! It is Grant Elementary School principals Leo Whalen and Rob Richkus dropping Ellen Peterson and Elizabeth Mazzacco's fifth grade science classes egg projects from the roof of the

Students had been studying about Newton's second law of motion which states that the force required to accelerate an object is proportional to the object's mass. This was equated to the landing of rover spacecrafts on Mars in 2004. They studied the design and construction challenges sci-entists faced in order to make the mission successful. The students then set out on their own to create a similar rover type object using a raw egg as a way to see if their vehicle was adequate for a safe landing from reasonable height. The materials students could use for their "rovers" were balloons, bubble wrap, zip-lock bags, cardboard, newspaper, plastic bags, rub-ber bands, packing peanuts, cotton, tape, straws, toilet paper rolls, popsicle

sticks, yarn or string. After weeks of designing and experimenting with their projects, the day came to see if the students hard work had paid off and a whopping 80 percent of the eggs survived the one story drop.

Peterson attended a Jason Project workshop at Montclair State College for training in order to help her own students think, plan and achieve a safe egg landing. The Jason Project is a non-profit educational organization founded by Dr. Robert Ballard who discovered the RMS Titanic. When Peterson designed her own rover at the workshop, the egg survived a three story drop from the college Science building. She also plans to go to Washington, D.C. this summer for a workshop on monster storms to include in her future curriculum.

The library has an Internet policy which will be enforced all year long. The library also has a behavior policy. When unattended children in the library are disruptive or in the li-brary every day, all day long, we may request a conference with their parents, or if necessary, call the police. For copies of the library's Behavior Policy or Internet Policy, please ask at the Reference desk.

• Continental Congress Flag-representing 13 colonies with red and white stripes, blue field with the red cross of St. George and white cross of St. Andres

· Continental Colors or Grand Union Flag-Flag updated to thirteen stripes of alternating red and white with thirteen white stars representing the union on a blue field representing a new constellation on June 14, 1777.

• Betsy Ross Flag-Thirteen stripes representing the original 13 colonies and fifteen stars. This is the flag from which Francis Scott Key was inspired to write our National Anthem, The Star Spangled Banner.

• On April 14, 1818 Congress adopted a resolution that on July 4, 1818, the number of stripes should be thirteen and the blue field should carry one star for each of the twenty states in the union and that a new star should be added for each state thereafter admitted.

 Forty-eight Star Flag-Since 1918, there has been no change in the flag design except that twenty eight new stars were added before July 4, 1912 and this flag of 48 new stars

flew over this nation for 47 years until just before the Vietnam War.

• Fifty-Star Flag-On July 4, 1959, a star was added for Alaska and one

year later, another star for Hawaii.
• POW-MIA Flag-Recognizing the plight and demise of a special group of our Armed Services-those who were prisoners of war or remain missing in action.



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
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
