

# Nine Join Borough CERTS

# Borough Bonds \$1.6M To Allow Extension of New Market Avenue

The Borough Council approved a \$1.6M bond ordinance at Tuesday's meeting. The money will be used to purchase three pieces of property on Hamilton Blvd. in order to extend

New Market Ave. The property to be purchased is located at 401, 403 and 405 Hamilton Blvd., all are residential.

The property will be demolished to allow New Market Ave. to continue across Hamilton Blvd. and then onto Spicer Ave., thus eliminating the zigzagging of trucks through that intersection

intersection. During the reconstruction of Hamilton Blvd. trucks have been detoured onto South Clinton Ave., to New Market Ave., right on Hamilton Blvd. for one block and turning left onto Spicer Ave. to get onto Belmont Ave. Truck traffic has been banned from Hamilton Blvd. and Belmont Ave. during the construction. Councilman Charles Butrico has proposed a plan to keep trucks off of Hamilton Blvd. permanently. His plan calls for extending New Market Ave. through the Hamilton Industrial Site 9 (formally Cornell Dubelier) and onto Spicer Ave. in two phases. The first phase is construction of a temporary road extending New Market to Spicer Ave. just a few blocks from Hamilton. Phase two would be the construction of a permanent road, which would come out on Spicer at the Department of Public Works building.

# Middle School Students Learn to Eat Right

While studying a chapter on the human body and body systems, Middle School teacher Andrew Cefalo's seventh grade Science classes had a visit from their classmate Erin O'Connors' mom and certified personal trainer Liz Morella who gave them a lesson on health and nutrition.

Morella is the Kid Fit program director at The Club at Ricochet in South Plainfield and teaches in-line skating and exercise classes to children there, as well as being a yoga, sports and fitness and aquatics instructor. She's said, "My goal is to teach children why kids shouldn't eat certain foods. Obesity facing kids today is tre mendous. It can lead to diabetes, high cholesterol and high blood pressure." By reading the nutrition labels on various food products placed on their desks, students discovered which foods are high in fat, sugar or salt which are all health risks. "I am discussing with the class the way foods are processed and the way to eat correctly because kids don't understand," Morella com-

mented. She pointed out that children their age only need to consume 1,600 to 2,200 calories a day. The classes we shocked to learn that a McDonald's meal consisting of a Big Mac, fries and soda total 1,400 calories, almost as much as their body requires per day in just one meal. At the same time they are getting 70 percent of their daily salt requirement and 200 percent of their fat requirement. It only takes an extra 3,600 calories to gain a pound of body weight, therefore keeping up this type of diet is putting their health

In order to stay healthy, Morella pointed out that certain foods in front of them such as canned soups and vegetables, oatmeal, juice and spaghetti were a better choice. Eating whole grain products and lots of fruits and vegetables are also a good source of fiber. She hopes that by teaching children to read the nutrition labels on foods they eat that they will become more aware of what they are putting into their bodies. Morella also had a son, James, who attends Grant Elementary School.

The JP Morgan Chase Bank is planning to open a new South Plainfield branch in December at 5201 Stelton Rd. The bank received approval at the June 27 Planning Board meeting. Plans are to replace the existing building where the former Yardville National Bank was situated. The Yardville National Bank opened in the 2003 and was their first in Middlesex County. The bank has moved into a larger building on Stelton Rd. in Piscataway. The new JP Morgan Chase Bank

will be constructed as a brickfaced, one story 4,206 square feet building with a metal roof. Landscaping will include grass and low shrubbery, with taller evergreens and deciduous trees. Exterior signage will be installed on the façade and a stand alone pylon will be

Vice President of JP Morgan Chase retail branch of Central New Jersey Jason Zarabets said there will be nine employees staffing the new branch who will provide commercial and personal financial services.

Plans call for 31 parking spaces to be installed, eight more than the 23 that the ordinance calls for. The banking hours will be from 8:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. Monday through Friday and 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Saturday.

The entrance to the bank will be on Stelton Rd., with a rear approach available from the Target store located in back of the bank. There will be left turns allowed onto Stelton Rd. Plans are in the works by the Middlesex County Transportation Department, but not yet completed, to widen Stelton Rd. Chase Bank said it will dedicate a portion of its property for the widening

# Board is Still Looking for Sports Program Money

The Board of Education held a special meeting last week to further discuss the impact of the \$1.2M budget reduction imposed by the Borough Council. By the end of the evening, there was still no money for a Middle School sport program.

Board President Jeff Seider reviewed the events leading up to the decision to cut the Middle School sports program. Funding for the sports program had been in the 2006-2007 school budget, but when voters defeated the budget, the need to replace the \$500,000 cut from the special education account by the Council arose when additional special education children entered the district. The Board decided to use the \$150,000 targeted for the sports program and move the money into the special education account.

Because of the unfavorable public

reaction to eliminating the sports program, the Board decided to take a vote on the question of bringing back all Middle School sports at a cost of \$86,000. That amount was arrived at by eliminating sports at Grant School. The Board voted 4-3 with one abstention to not bring back the Middle School sports. Voting against the proposal were Carol Byrne, John Markham, Tim Morgan and Jeff Seider, who said they were concerned about where the money for the program would

Just a few days prior, two young children developed breathing problems when they unintentionally inhaled pool chemicals that were improperly stored. This highlights the need for pool owners to practice safe handling and storage of pool chemicals. Dr. Bruce Ruck of The New Jersey Poison Center advises all pool owners and users that "all chemicals and pool maintenance supplies should be kept sealed in their original containers, stored, locked up and out of reach of children."

The Poison Control Center Hotline number, 1-800-222-1222, can be used for treatment advice for emergency poisonings as well as for nonemergency questions. The hotline is accessible 24 hours per day, everyday! Remember, help is just a phone call away!


