Franklin Honors Former Student Trista Moretti

On November 7, Franklin School honored a local fallen hero during their annual Veterans Day Program. Sgt. Trista L. Moretti, 27, died on June 25 in Nasir Lafitah, Iraq when her unit was attacked by insurgents using indirect fire. In a touching ceremony, the school presented Trista's parents, Frederic and Judith Moretti, with a memorial plaque of Trista that will hang in the hallway of the

PTO member Barbara Rhoads said, "Franklin School celebrates Veterans Day every year to give the children an understanding of the acts of unselfishness and service that our family and friends gave at war for us. This year, we recognize a former student of Franklin who served our country in Iraq and lost her life doing so. She, among others, served so that we may continue to have the benefit of our freedom. We, at Franklin School, are very proud of our former student and classmate Trista Moretti. On behalf of the PTO, students, faculty and friends we present to Mr. and Mrs. Moretti a plaque in the memory of Trista, which will hang in the hallway of Franklin School." As her parents accepted

the plaque, tears were flowing freely among the teachers and guests.

Trista's energetic, shining pe sonality seems to be everyone's fin memory. Trista entered Franklin School in the first grade. The school nurse recalls her as "outgoing, dashing about the hallways, blacktop and playground with smiles and laughter." Some of her teachers are still teaching at Franklin

Rhoads met with Trista's parents and they shared favorite memories. Even as a child Trista was very athletic playing kickball, tag, softball at the school. She loved to go behind the school with her dog. They would play in the creek and often returned home with poison ivy, but she still returned to play in the woods.

Her mother noted some of her other favorites, such as her favorite color-blue, game-scrabble, movie-"Dirty Dancing," and book-"The Little Engine that Could." Trista's favorite friend was her older sister, Jennifer.

"Trista is remembered as strong and fearless, not letting anything stand in the way of her goals." The family shared another story with

Fate of Helen Street Discussed At Special Council Meeting

At a special Borough Council meeting held Monday night, the fate of the Helen Street Extension Project was the topic of discussion. More than 100 residents attended the meeting.

Mayor Charles Butrico told the filled chamber that time has run out for the Helen Street Project. The N.J. Transportation Planning Authority (NJTPA) has given the borough until December 31 to decide whether to end the plans for the Helen Street Extension or to pursue other means.

The project has been held up in the DEP because the road will pass through a very small portion of the Dismal Swamp, which is listed as riority one wetlands. Without the DEP's approval, the borought cannot

Butrico laid out three options, the first of which is the "no build" option. He said, "If we take the no build' option, we won't owe the Federal government \$650,000. That is the amount which the New Jersey Transportation Agency (NJTPA) has already spent for engineering studies. We will also not be able to reapply for Federal funding for another five years. It also means we sign off on build-ing a road extending Helen Street. A second option is to go ahead and apply for a 'permit to build,' without final approval from the DEP. This could cost the borough up to \$1M and if unsuccessful, we will have to pay the Federal government back the

\$650,000. The third option is to not sign off on the project and pay the \$650,000 and proceed on our own, finding our own funding."

Several residents made suggestions, including initiating a lawsuit against the Federal government. According to Butrico, engineers working with the

borough feel we have a good case.

At their next public meeting on Tuesday, Dec. 4, the council plans to discuss the matter further before deciding what action to take. The November 30 Observer will have a more detailed story on the discussions which took place at Monday's meeting. We will also have a comprehensive review of the history of the Helen Street Project.

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

Two Men Killed on Rt. 287

Two men were struck and killed on Rt. 287 in South Plainfield early Saturday morning after they hit a deer and left their vehicles to check on the animal.

Justin Ridley, 19, of Hamilton and Gustavo Pineda, 39, of Elizabeth were traveling in the northbound lanes around 3 a.m. when they both hit a deer crossing the highway. According to N.J. State Police, they apparently exited their vehicles and went to where

the deer was and were struck by a driver in a 2003 Volkswagon.

Both men were pronounced dead at the scene at 3:58 a.m. The unidentified driver of the Volkswagon had only minor injuries to his hands.

Rt. 287 was shut down for four hours at Exit 4. Traffic was rerouted through South Plainfield to Exit 5 at Stelton Road during the investigation, which is still ongoing.

School Budget Audit Reports Surplus

For the second year in a row, the audit for the school budget showed a surplus. The annual audit for the 2006/2007 school budget showed the district ending the fiscal year on June 30, 2007 with a \$546,639 un-reserved fund balance in cash and an excess surplus of \$198,424. This will be returned to taxpayers as tax relief in July 2008, by applying it to the 2008/ 2009 budget.

According to Business Administra-tor Donna Tolley, the budget surplus

resulted from less spending in several restined from less spending in several areas of the budget, such as purchas-ing lower priced supplies, saving from transportation jointure agreements, tuitions and miscellaneous items. The \$546,639 surplus will be set aside for use in unexpected emergencies explained Tolley.

According to State Law 1701, a school district's surplus can not exceed two percent of their total budgest anything according get-anything over that amount-must be returned to the taxpayers as tax relief. Last year's excess surplus amount of \$78,384 was deposited July 1,

The report was given by Gary Vinci from the firm of Lerch, Vinci and

Higgins of Fair Lawn.
The audit statement also showed that total liabilities and fund balances were \$2,446,200, with \$1,508,468 in encumbrances owed to vendors who had not been paid because the paper work was not completed.
