This information will be used to determine the amount of damage that has occurred in South Plainfield and to find out if any funds will be available through the State of New Jersey and/or FEMA.

Also, anyone needing a rubbish pickup due to the storm are asked to call the Department of Public Works at (908) 755-2187 to arrange for a pick-up.

Torrential Rains Cause Flooding Problems

More than six inches of rain resulting from a Nor'easter, which began Saturday evening, caused extensive flooding in the borough, closing roads and forcing residents from their homes. Many homeowners also watched their basements flood.

"For the past 24 hours, our volunteer firefighters have done an incredible job," said Councilman Dennis Cerami at Monday evening's Borough Council meeting. "They received non-stop calls and have responded to approximately 200. I give credit to all volunteer firefighters, the police department and EMS," added Cerami.

According to Cerami, firemen were

hindered by a lack of pumps to help residents pump out their basements. Calls for residents to evacuate their homes initially were not heeded until firemen began knocking on doors as the rising water made roads impassible. Roads closed to traffic were New Market and the side roads in the flooded area, New Brunswick, Clinton Avenue Extension, Fred Allen, Spicer, Highland, Metuchen and a portion of Belmont. Late on Monday, Woodland Avenue was closed due to a retaining wall collapse behind Sears Hardware on Oak Tree Road. As of presstime all roads are open, with the exception of Woodland, which will be closed for at least two weeks.

Council Raymond Petronko, who is a volunteer fireman, noted the damage he saw resulting from the storm, "We took 71 calls between 3 and 5 a.m. It was sad to see the stuff floating in the basements."

Michael Zushma, coordinator of Emergency Management, estimated property losses to residents at about \$190,000. A last minute resolution was added to the agenda authorizing an emergency appropriation of \$100,000 to supplement the already adopted budget for the flooding damage caused by the storm. The money will be used to pay for services administered by the borough for cleanup, items ruined by flooding and costs covering closure (Continued on page 12)

New Face of BOE

2007/2008 Budget Gets Nod; Two New Members Elected


South Plainfield voters said yes to the 2007/2008 school budget by a wide margin. The final vote count was 1,310 yes and 879 no. This year's budget did not cut any teachers, but did cut middle school sports.

Winning three year terms on the school board were incumbent Pio Pennisi and first time candidates Debbie Boyle and Bob Jones. The final vote count was Debbie Boyle with 1,177, Bob Jones with 1,128, Pio Pennisi with 1,104, Sharon Miller with 1,045, Steve Bohn (incumbent) with 623 and Danielle Harris-Lacasale with 392.

In the past three years, voters had rejected the school budget twice, in 2006 and 2004. Both times the Borough Council make various cuts to the budget. In 2006, they cut \$1.8M and in 2004 they cut \$143,000.

This year only 2,246 (17.6%) of eligible voters went to the polls, but that number is up over last year's 15.32 percent.

A reorganization meeting will be held on Monday, April 23 at 8 p.m. at the Roosevelt Administration Building. At that time the newly elected board members will be sworn in. The public is invited to attend.

All About Pets.

As many of you know, many common pet foods have recently been recalled. This is cause for concern, but not panic. A complete list of

affected foods including date and product information codes is available through the American Veterinary Medical Association Web site at www.avma.org/aa/menufoodsrecall/de fault.asp. If you have any of the products identified on these lists, immediately stop feeding them to your pet.

Some pets that have consumed the recalled pet food may show no signs of illness while others will exhibit lethargy, decreased appetite, vomiting, diarrhea, changes in thirst, and changes in urination. The sensitivity to the toxins found in these foods can vary from one animal to the next. Therefore, there is concern for both pets who have only consumed small amounts of the recalled foods and those who have been eating these diets long term.

If caught in time, most animals can be successfully treated. Contact your veterinarian immediately while closely monitoring your pet for signs of illness. Your veterinarian will take a detailed history, give your pet a thorough physical examination, and perform routine bloodwork and urinalysis. If necessary, treatment can range from at home medication to hospitalization with intravenous fluids.







of streets, etc. It will not cover individual losses. "It's adding another line item to the budget, as we do for snow cleanup. The state is asking us to do this and will be providing payment in full in the 2008 budget," said Chief Financial Officer Glenn Cullen.

The borough will be sending Public Works trucks around town to collect items ruined by flood waters. Pickup times are being arranged. Cerami provided 100 copies of flyers, which are available at the library, with information from Middlesex County Public Health Department detailing how to avoid mold, entitled "After the Flood: Cleaning up Mold." The information is also available at www.bt. cde.gov/disasters/mold/protect.asp. Residents are also asked to log on to southplainfieldnj.com and go to the fire department Web site for safety tips about flood cleanup.

Residents who have incurred damage due to last weekend's storm are asked to call South **Plainfield Office of Emergency** Management at (908) 226-7718 twenty-four hours a day and leave a brief message.
