Guidance Center Named For Longtime Counselor

South Plainfield High School held a ceremony on May 8 to dedicate the Guidance Center in memory of former guidance counselor and director, the late Michael A. DeCarlo, who served the school for 35 years.

DeCarlo, born and raised in South Plainfield, graduated from North Plainfield High School in 1945, before the borough had its own high school. He worked in manufacturing prior to being accepted at Tusculum College in Greenville, Tenn. in 1949 on a football scholarship. He transferred to East Tennessee State University after two years, graduating in 1953. He married and had three children, Suzanne, Michael and Christopher. He also served in the U.S. Army from 1953 to 1955 as a corporal. Upon discharge, he began teaching English and social studies in South Plainfield and was also an assistant football coach DeCarlo received an MA degree from Rutgers University to college."

and attended Montclair State College for graduate courses in guidance. He became a SPHS guidance counselor in 1963 and was honored to have the school yearbook dedicated to him in 1965. In 1966 he replaced Charlie Cann as guidance director.

Aside from his position as guidance director, DeCarlo belonged to the SPEA, MCEA, NJEA, NEA, MCPGA and the AASC. He was a member of UNICO, the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation, Sacred Heart Church, was involved in boy scouts and served as the chairman of the Labor Day Parade Committee.

Assemblyman Patrick Diegnan presented a plaque to the school with a resolution from the State of N.J. on behalf of DeCarlo, as well as a Borough proclamation from Mayor Charlie Butrico. Diegnan said, "He worked with a sense of calm, reassurance and respect and presented students over the years with the many opportunities in this country to go to college."

and Tulio Capparelli, who were instrumental in naming the Guidance Center after DeCarlo, thanked Principal Dr. Ken May for his efforts. Cotoia had been a closed friend of DeCarlo's for 40 years and coached the football team with him. Capparelli said, "This is an historical school," referring to the naming of the high school auditorium after Joseph Mondoro and the gymnasium after Anthony Cotoia. There is also a plaque in the school commemorating a visit to the school by former Dallas Police Officer Nick McDonald, who was instrumental in the capture of Lee Harvey Oswald.

Steve and Chris DeCarlo attended the ceremony where they unveiled two plaques with their father's picture, one outside the Guidance Center door and one inside. Steve said, "We appreciate you honoring him in this way." Their sister Suzanne resides in the Netherlands.

DeCarlo passed away in 2003 and their mother, Kitten, is also deceased.

Motor Vehicles Commission Relocates to Golden Acres Shopping Center

N.J. Motor Vehicles Commission (MVC) Chief Administrator Sharon Harrington celebrated the grand opening of the latest model agency in the Golden Acres Shopping Center on Tuesday. The former site in Middlesex Mall closed permanently on May 24. The new site at 698 Oak Tree Ave., next to Shopper's World and Big Lots, was funded through a capital improvement bond as a part of the 2003 Motor Vehicles Customer Service and Security Act.

Harrington, joined by Middlesex County Freeholders David Crabiel and John Pulomena, Mayor Charles Butrico and Councilmen Rob Bengivenga and Matt Anesh, highlighted features of the new facility and expressed the MVC's strong commitment to providing clean, comfortable and modern facilities for its customers. "We are making every effort to modernize our

facilities statewide to better serve MVC customers. This new agency is another step in accomplishing this task," said Harrington. "Through careful planning, the MVC has wisely invested in customer service, technology and security for its facilities. This investment allows us to continue down the path of becoming a model of excellence in motor vehicle services."

The model agency concept was established following a 2004 comprehensive MVC Siting Study performed by Standard and Poor's Corporate Value Consulting. The study analyzed all aspects of MVC facilities, including locations, service times, transit access, population growth trends and transaction volume projections over a five-year period. The new agency provides approximately 8,500 square feet of business space, almost double the size of the old facility, and includes

12 customer service counters and four digital driver's license camera stations. There are also expanded waiting areas and restrooms, along with plenty of parking. In addition to customer amenities, the new locations provide the MVC with invaluable training space for employees, where essential programs such as document fraud detection and driver history training can be taught.

There are 24 full-time and seven part-time staff members. Hours of operation are weekdays 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.; Tuesday evenings until 7:30 p.m. and Saturdays 8 a.m. to noon. Harrington encourages customers to avoid the end and beginning of the month rush by planning to visit mid-week and mid-month. On May 12, the South Plainfield Police Department hosted its 10th annual bicycle rodeo at Spring Lake Park. More than 200 residents attended the event, which promoted bike safety and theft prevention. Over 50 children took part in a bicycle safety course staffed by volunteers from the South Plainfield High School Peer Leadership Group. After completing the course, participants all received a certificate.

As part of the "Baron Von Pedaloff" anti theft program, approximately 50 children registered their bikes with the police department. This program, designed by retired South Plainfield Police Officer William Frink, encourages the children to register their bikes with the police department in the event they are stolen.

The department distributed over 60 bicycle helmets to children that attended who did not have a helmet. The South Plainfield Traffic Safety Advisory Commission provided the helmets. Robert Wood Johnson University Hospital's Injury Prevention Coordinator Diane Starace staffed a booth where the children observed a demonstration utilizing a Jell-O brain, emphasizing helmet use to prevent brain and head injuries.

nently suspended from attending South Plainfield High School. The problem with this situation is that there have been far greater altercations at the school and in this situation the punishment does not fit the crime.

Now this letter is not about the wrestler, but the abusive power of Dr. Rosado, the superintendent of education. He continues to disrupt our education system with his Gestapo tactics. The pattern here is that in September he will be absorbing his accrued sick and vacation time, which will bring him to finally officially leaving our system in January. (I wish I had those benefits in my job).

The problems, however, go far beyond the wrestler situation. This month, Dr. Rosado took it upon himself, without interacting with the staff at the high school or the board, to fire two non-tenured teachers for having satisfactory evaluations. Both teachers, on their reviews were recommended for rehire by their respective supervisors as well as a pay raise, but here again the superintendent, without just cause and any input or interaction, fired both teachers. One of the teachers reported a sexual harassment complaint after being assaulted by a fellow teacher earlier this year. The board, after an investigation, resulted in the firing of a teacher (he actually resigned) and the relocation of another teacher to a different school. Now was the non-tenured teacher fired for having a satisfactory evaluation or for reporting a sexual harassment complaint?

Both teachers have asked for a hearing in front of the board, which has the power to overturn Dr. Rosado's decision. It is time the board got a hold of itself and realize that it must take back control of our school system. The superintendent is leaving He cares nothing about the mess he will leave behind. Just like past superintendents who have left the district (see English vs. The South Plainfield Board of Education), the legal battle will ensue and cost the taxpayers of this town thousands of dollars to defend the actions of an obvious violation of the right for an employee to work in an environment free of sexual harassment.

elected position and given a trust to do what is best for our students, teachers, and citizens. Both of the teachers, from what I understand, are adored by their students. Opposition Leads Builder to **Modify Martin Drive Plans**

The application to build five houses on Martin Drive ran into opposition at Tuesday night's Planning Board meeting causing builder Nick Lemmo to modify the plans and reduce the number of homes to four.

The initial plan called for five single family homes to be built around a cul-de-sac. One of the lots was on a site which had a 40-foot slope with a seven foot drop in what would have been it's rear yard.

"I feel this is overuse of property. That [site] isn't usable," said Mayor Charles Butrico during the first hearing on the application held in March.

Although fewer neighbors were present at the second hearing, their concerns about additional housing in the area were the same-the impact of rain runoff and potential flooding in their homes, despite assurances from engineer Edward S. Dec that plans include retention basins to capture water to provide less discharge and reduce runoff.

Maureen Terhune, who lives at 205 Fred Allen Drive, recalled moving into her home and not needing to purchase flood insurance in order to get a

mortgage. Roy Brubaker of Norway Lane brought in photos of his home, showing the flooded side yard. The flooding occurred from a heavy rain in October, a situation that hadn't occurred before his neighbor paved his driveway. Brubaker was also concerned about the possibility of contaminants in the soil from buried demolition debris and said it should be investigated.

"I pull out glass, concrete and other items when I plant a tree," said Richard DeFrancisco of 161 Martin Drive.

Attorney Walter Abrams disputed the charge of contaminants on the property. "Applicants must get approvals for landfill and buffer areas and are subject to approval of their plans by the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection.

DeFrancisco also noted that the planned extension of a 50-foot paved road on Martin Drive leading into and out of the cul-de-sac will bring drivers into his driveway at 161 Martin Drive in order to turn around.

The Planning Board will review the revised plan for the development of four houses on the site at their June 12 meeting.
