They also met the five South Plainfield eighth graders who entered





They went outside and saw a demonstration of the cars in the sunlight. It was a sunny day and the cars ran well in the sun. The guests toured the butterfly garden, located outside the classroom, and the greenhouse.

At Franklin School, Félicité-Maurice and Brown passed out special ultraviolet beads to the fourth grade students. The students settled into a hands-on project of stringing the special beads to make themselves a bracelet. "We took them outside and immediately the beads in the bracelets turned all sorts of colors. As soon as the beads turned color, the students looked for a shady spot to see if the beads would turn white again-and they did," said fourth grade teacher Janet Donnelly.

At the high school, NASA Observatory Manager Willie Blanco gave a presentation on the different heliophysics projects, including magnetic fields, radiation belts and the storm probes to understand how the sun affects the earth power systems, satellites, navigation, communications and astronaut safety.

The Verdict Is In!

Mock Trial Held at Borough Hall

The verdict is in and the hard work of SPHS students in Patricia Porzio and Joe Cirigliano's classes has paid off. The mock trial conducted on May 31 in the courtroom at Borough Hall was a wonderful and exhilarating

The trial began promptly at 9 a.m. with the prosecution's opening statement. Then the defense spoke on Diane Joe's behalf. Once the statements were heard, the calling of the witnesses began. The prosecution called their first witness, Middlesex County toxicologist, played by Amanda Harzula. Harzula confirmed that the drug found in the victim's blood poisoned him. Following were eight other character and expert witnesses

who argued evidence to prove Diane Joe was guilty of murder.

As soon as the prosecution had rested, the defense called their witnesses, many of whom were friends, family, as well as the family doctor. Their arguments were good, but to the jury and audience they didn't seem strong enough to acquit Mrs. Joe.

Finally, the prosecution and defense made their powerful closing statements. The prosecution made a rebuttal, then the charges against Diane Joe were stated.

Cirigliano, who played the part of the honorable judge, explained that Diane Joe was on trial for murder (death that was the result of murder or serious injury), a crime committed purposely and knowingly and not in the heat of passion. The bailiff, played by Billy Ashnault, escorted the jury to the deliberation room to decide Diane Joe's fate. The courtroom took

About an hour later, the jury arrived back in the courtroom to an anxious audience. Judge Cirigliano was handed the verdict and announced it out loud. The defendant was found... not guilty! Lawyers and the audience alike were in shock. Everyone then heard the real story behind what happened at the Joe house.

Every morning Mrs. Joe would make her husband a nutritional shake that he would drink when he came home for lunch. On the day of his death, he drank a shake that Diane poisoned with his carpal tunnel medication, Prednisone. She wanted to dispose of her husband so she could start her new life with her lover, the owner of the local diner where she is works as a waitress.

This trial was complex and tedious, but exciting. Everyone had a great time and learned a lot. Special thanks to Porzio and Cirigliano for their help and guidance. A very special thank you to Borough Clerk Vincent Buttiglieri for offering the use of the courtroom to the classes for the big day. Great job forensic science and law experts!

Senior Census Begins Saturday Dates Extended to Provide Accurate Results

Recently the Observer ran an article outlining the costs for the alternate traffic route that re-routes trucks onto New Market Avenue. The article pegs the cost at about \$4.6 million, a figure that came from a recent council meeting.

That number is not realistic. Residents, many of whom are split on whether the route is the right solution for traffic, deserve to know the real cost. The price for purchasing land for the project already exceeds initial estimates. In addition, missing from the estimate is also any indication what reconstructing New Market Avenue will cost.

When asked about this at a council meeting, the mayor said reconstructing New Market Avenue is not part of the project. But does anyone really believe that road can handle fulltime truck traffic much longer? It was not designed for trucks and is already starting to deteriorate. The road also lacks sidewalks, which creates a danger to children who walk along the street with trucks whizzing

Regardless of where they stand on this project, the people of South Plainfield deserve an honest answer about the cost, which they will be paying for years to come.

Residents also deserve a chance to vote on whether to fund the project. Democrats have made Democracy Day a campaign promise for many

years, including last year, but they've not held one in more than five years. They promised that voters would have the chance to voice their opinions whenever the town borrows more than \$1 million. Yet these same people are refusing to let voters have their say on one of the highest-cost projects in decades.

Residents deserve to know the real cost of the alternate route and they deserve to have their voices heard. It's time for the Democratic majority to stand by its promises





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
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Carleen Tedeschi Retiring From Strings Music Program

Thirty-three years ago Carleen Tedeschi started building a new strings music program in the district. The program introduced youngsters to learn to play the violin, viola, cello or bass in the third grade. She will be retiring at the end of the school year.

"Leonard Tobias, then superintendent of schools, wanted to start a string

program. I was hired to teach in all the elementary schools in 1974, Kennedy, Roosevelt, Riley, Franklin and Grant, which at the time were all K-6," said Tedeschi.

In her second year, Tedeschi started the middle school strings program. "I was teaching in six schools and that meant six Christmas and six spring concerts. Robert Escott, the fine arts coordinator, knew I played clarinet and asked me to conduct the band for him at Roosevelt School, a position I held for four or five years," added Tedeschi.

"There were times while I was at Roosevelt School that I would conduct the strings, then the band would come out and I would conduct them and then play the piano for the chorus," Tedeschi recalled.

Additional help was added as the program grew and now Tedeschi teaches at three schools: Kennedy, Riley and the Middle School. Bruce Mikolon is the high school orchestra teacher and also teaches strings at Franklin and Roosevelt. Tobie Baldwin teaches strings at Grant School.

Last year Tedeschi brought her middle school orchestra to a competition held at Dorney Park, Pa. and the students won first place. This year on May 18, students from the middle school in orchestra, wind ensemble and Gems competed again and won superior ratings.

Tedeschi also played for the high school student musicals when she first came to the district as Carleen Cunningham. These days as a mom, Tedeschi spends her available time chauffeuring daughter Jennifer to figure skating practices and some of her students have taken her place in the orches-

"My kids played in some of the high school shows, "Wizard of Oz" and "Cinderella" and in the Summer Drama's "Carousel" last summer. It's a good musical experience for them," she said.

In May, Tedeschi gave what she called her "farewell concerts." The last concert was on May 23 at the middle School. The program included the classical music of Bach's Brandenburg Concerto and a new piece called "Rosin Eating Zombies from Outer Space," with a resident zombie-a musical take off on the 50's and 60's horror films.

"When I teach them, I want them to have a good time and have a good sense of humor," she explained.

These were almost "farewell concerts" in more ways than one, because with Tedeschi retiring, the music teacher position was initially cut from the 2007-2008 school budget. However, at a budget workshop held on March 5, board member Carol Byrne made a motion seconded by John Giannakis to restore the position and the board unanimously agreed.

Tedeschi's musical training started in public school. "Basically I'm a pianist. I started when I was eight years old with private lessons. I learned clarinet in fifth grade and in six grade I learned to play the violin. I didn't have private lessons. I played in the band and in the orchestra and took four years of music classes. That's when I fell in love with music, tried out and played in regional and all state orchestra

She went on to Trenton State College, graduating in 1972 with a double major of piano and violin and didn't start teaching until 1974, after receiving her masters there.

Although Tedeschi is retiring and plans to move to Manning, South Carolina, it won't be an immediate move. Daughter Jennifer still needs to complete her senior year at East Brunswick High School, where her husband teaches in the music department.

Currently Tedeschi sings at the Calvary Episcopal Church in Flemington. "It's different for me to sing alto in the choir. I stay in the background. It's nice to have people getting together making music. I've been fortunate to do that all my life. It's a wonderful gift to have. I really enjoy it, it keeps me young," she

Tedeschi is looking forward to doing some community work, giving private music lessons and building her new home in Manning in a few years.

"I won't miss doing the grades and lesson plans, but I will miss the kids,"

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


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
