Mourners Say Goodbye to Trista

Sgt. Trista Moretti, who was killed last week by insurgents in Iraq, was honored at a funeral Mass on Wednesday in Sacred Heart Roman Catholic Church in South Plainfield.

Interment with full military honors followed at Rosedale Cemetery in Linden.

In addition to family and friends, the funeral was attended by Senator Frank Lautenberg, Congressman Mike Ferguson, Mayor Charles Butrico and members of South Plainfield Borough Council. The Patriot Guard Riders, an diverse amalgamation of motorcycle riders from across the country, were also there to pay their respect.

Trista was killed June 25 when mortar fire hit her trailer during an insurgent attack on the Army base where she was stationed near Nasir Lafitah, Iraq. According to the Department of Defense, her death was caused by indirect fire.

News of Trista's death shocked her family. Even though she was in Iraq, her family believed she wasn't facing any danger she couldn't handle.

Trista was awarded a Purple Heart and a Bronze Star, in addition to three other medals.


Trista worked nights at the base and was asleep in her trailer when the attack occurred at 12:45 p.m. local time. Trista, 27, was a signal intelligence analyst and a paratrooper. She was the 78th soldier-and the second woman-from New Jersey to die in Iraq. Twenty-one other paratroopers from the division were injured in the attack.

The close-knit community of South Plainfield united and erected memorials to Trista all over town. A cross of purple and white flowers stands in

Monument Park. Purple ribbons adorned telephone poles from one end of town to the other. Many places displayed American Flags and photos of

Trista joined the Army in 2003, and was assigned to the 425th Brigade Special Troops Battalion, 4th Brigade Combat Team (Airborne), 25th Infantry Division Fort Richardson, Alaska.

Trista played field hockey for SPHS throughout her high school career. Fran Flannery coached her for three of those years. "Trista got along with everyone, she was a team player and showed great sportsmanship. She was very 'coachable.' Trista was also known for her speed, she was fast!" Fran noted that she was petite but had long legs. She said, "I used to tease her that she ran like a deer." She also pointed out that Trista's smile was something

High school principal Dr. Ken May remembered Trista well. He said, "The Community of the Borough of South Plainfield mourns the passing of Trista Moretti. Many of her classmates have contacted me at school to express their regrets. Trista was an energetic young woman who always had a smile. She was well-liked and would light up a room when she walked in. Trista was an exceptional athlete with great agility and speed. She earned nine varsity letters while participating in field hockey, winter track and spring track. She was a member of the 1997 Middlesex County Championship Field Hockey Team. Trista exuded enthusiasm and confidence and always gave 110%.

She was a hard worker and took college preparatory courses. Trista was a patriot; she represented all that is good says that, but it's and respectful about our country.

Internet video footage shows the front of her home graced with a banner, American Flags and red, white and blue candles. A google search listed page after page about this brave young woman. A blogger by the name of Jersey Devil wrote, "Sometimes it seems we are so powerless that all we can do is grieve. I think of the daughters and sons of friends I know and cry with you. That it is someone so close to home makes it so much worse that hit hurts deep inside."

excelled in field hockey and track, earning nine varsity letters and whereas Sergeant Moretti volunteered for enlistment in the United States Army in 2003; and whereas Sergeant Moretti served proudly in the United States Army as a signal intelligence officer and a paratrooper in the United Sates Army's 425th Brigade Special Troops Battalion, 4th Brigade Combat Team (Airborne), 25th Infantry Division; and whereas Sergeant Moretti suffered fatal injuries on behalf of her country in an insurgent attack in Iraq; and whereas Sergeant Moretti served her country in a time of war with skill and courage in demanding assignments; and whereas Sergeant Moretti was a committed and highly trained professional soldier as well as a loving daughter, sister, and teammate, whose memory lives in the hearts of her family, fellow soldiers, and teammates; and whereas Sergeant Moretti's patriotism and dedicated service to her country and her fellow soldiers make it appropriate and fitting for the State of New Jersey to remember her and her family, to mark her passing, and to honor her memory; Now, Therefore, I, Jon S. Corzine, Governor of the State of New Jersey, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and by the Statutes of this State, do hereby ORDER and DIRECT:

The flag of the United States of America and the flag of New Jersey shall be flown at half-staff at all State departments, offices, agencies, and instrumentalities during appropriate hours on Tuesday, July 3, 2007, in recognition and mourning of a brave and loyal American, United States Army Sergeant Trista L. Moretti.

Summer has begun and all three summer reading programs are in full swing at the South Plainfield Public Library. "Get a Clue@Your Library" is the theme for this year and there are wonderful prizes all around. For the children's program there are stuffed animals, sticky-hands and wrist bands, and for those who are really dedicated and have read over 100 books, there are DVDs, t-shirts and a bunch of cool prizes.

For those on the YNK Young Adult Summer Reading program, there are DVDs, watches, graphic novels, etc., while adults in the adult summer reading program get free candy bars, t-shirts and tote bags. Also, we are selling "Get a Clue" t-shirts for only \$5. We carry all sizes, from the smallest child to the largest adult. 

Grant Elementary Student Recognized For Academic Excellence

Joshua Coupe, a student from South Plainfield, was recently honored at a statewide awards ceremony for gifted children held by The Johns Hopkins University Center for Talented Youth (CTY).

Joshua was invited to the awards ceremony sponsored by CTY based on an exceptional performance on a rigorous, above-grade-level test given to second through eighth grade talent search participants. Seventh and eighth graders took the SAT or ACTthe same tests used for college admissions. Second through sixth graders took the SAT, an above-level test scaled for younger students.

Since 1979, CTY has sought the most academically able elementaryand middle-school students and encouraged their enrollment in the annual fall CTY talent search, open September through November. Students then test in December or January.

The results of these tests give fami-

lies a better idea of a child's academic talents, particularly in comparison to the thousands of other academically talented students in the talent search. Students can also earn recognition at CTY's awards ceremonies, and their test scores may qualify them for CTY's summer programs and distance education courses.

In 2005 alone, over 83,000 students from 19 states and the District of Columbia participated in talent searches offered through CTY. About 30% of the 16,500 second and sixth graders who tested last winter earned an invitation to CTY's awards ceremony and about 25% of the over 30,000 seventh and eighth grade tested earned an invitation to an awards ceremony.

Coupe, who will be attending the middle school, joined other award recipients at the recent state ceremony, and was individually honored by Johns Hopkins for his academic performance.
