
Borough Celebrates 50 Years of Parades!

Dear Editor:

For several months the head of the local Republican party, Bob Jones, and a small group of his supporters have come to every council meeting criticizing everything they can think of about Mayor Butrico's plan to permanently keep trucks off Hamilton Boulevard by extending New Market Avenue.

They reached a new low last month when they actually questioned the honesty of one of South Plainfield's most respected families, the DeAndrea family, who are the owners of one of the properties needed to build the new extension.

To Director Crabiel and Middlesex County Freeholders,

Please accept this letter in strong support of the acquisition of the 39acre Texas Eastern/South Plainfield Holding Company (Block 494, Lot 1) for permanent preservation as a passive natural area. This parcel is perhaps the most significant unprotected property in the 600-acre Dismal Swamp complex and represents an extraordinary opportunity to preserve irreplaceable wildlife habitat and open space.

A large variety of migratory songbirds, wading birds, amphibians and a host of other wildlife species are supported by this land. It consists of approximately 25 acres of wooded and scrub/shrub field uplands, and 44 acres of high quality freshwater wetlands. In fact, because of its outstanding natural attributes this site has been recognized as a top priority acquisition by the EPA administered bi-state Harbor Estuary Program (HEP).

NY/NJ Baykeeper, which preserves and restores HEP sites through cooperative partnerships, has worked for the past 18 months with TRC/South Plainfield Holdings towards the acquisition of this parcel. During this time we focused on project fundamentals: property research, funding, and finding the most suitable take-out partner. Two certified appraisals and an environmental study were completed and at least half of the required funding has been lined up for this project. We would be gratified to share any of our information and experience with the county.

Also, we highly recommend taking advantage of existing outside funds that have been targeted for this project, particularly HEP acquisition funds set aside by the Port Authority of NY/ NJ, to offset Middlesex Counties potential contribution to this acquisition. By doing so Middlesex County taxpayer dollars can be saved and used for other valued open space projects in the county that do not have access to existing HEP site funding. Working with Bill Kastning of NJDEP Green Acres, who is very familiar with this project, would provide a direct route to Port Authority HEP funds. Baykeeper is glad to assist here as well.

Mayor Butrico, Councilman Cerami and the Borough of South Plainfield deserve great credit for stepping up to take title and help manage this ecological treasure. The councilman, at the last county open space meeting, recognized the great value this acquisition would represent to the local community and to Middlesex County as a prized addition to the Dismal Swamp natural area.

As noted above, this and other unprotected Dismal Swamp properties have also been recognized as regionally significant habitat by HEP. HEP priority sites have been compiled and vetted by key natural resource agencies including the United State Fish and Wildlife Service, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection, along with other natural resource agencies and conservation groups.

Most noteworthy is that several pots of funding have been established specifically to acquire and preserve HEP priority sites. This includes \$20 million from the Port Authority of (Continued on page 26)

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Willard Dunham Wins Glitter Award

The Willard Dunham Construction Company has received the South Plainfield Clean Business Association's Glitter Award. Thomas D. Dunham, Jr. and his cousin, Clifford, accepted the award from CBA President Joseph Diegnan at their Tyler Place business.

The contracting company is celebrating its 70th year, having been founded in 1937 by Willard Dunham in Fords. His grandsons were forced to relocate from Woodbridge when their land was condemned for a road-widening project. Dunham said they were very happy to have found this piece of land in the borough, and to have the South Plainfield Planning Board approve their application two years ago. They spent half a year renovating the property, which is now the stand-out parcel on Tyler Place.

The attractive landscaping is maintained by the Valluzzi Group, but everyone in the company takes a hand in keeping the yard and grounds neat and orderly. Tyler Place carries heavy traffic and draws an unusual amount of litter, so they often find themselves bending over to pick up a stray soda can or water bottle. Dunham noted that their equipment and supplies have to be kept organized so that they can mobilize rapidly for the large construction jobs they specialize in. As a result, the passerby must look twice to believe this is a contractor's yard.

The Dunhams said they have always thought of South Plainfield as a special place. They said they were happy the borough has welcomed them and recognized the pride they take in their business.

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

Engine City Technical Institute: Career Training (Close to Home

Picture an ideal college campus: big enough to move about, but small enough not to get lost on. Classes are small but comprehensive and handson, so in no time you are more than qualified to move on to success in the

Now imagine the same thing, only with diesel engines. If your perception has soured somewhat at the prospect of bright young men and women learning to change mere truck parts rather than getting a doctorate degree, it is entirely possible that you have the wrong idea about what going to a trade school can do for your future.

Enhanced 9-1-1 **Grants For** South Plainfield

Senator Barbara Buono, Assemblymen Patrick Diegnan and Peter Barnes III announced that South Plainfield has been approved to receive a \$21,183 grant.

Enhanced 9-1-1 Grants are part of the 9-1-1 Commission, the Department of Treasury, which provides financial aid for the purpose of purchasing, upgrading, maintaining, and operating the technology to provide the most reliable and cost effective stateof-the-art emergency telephone reporting systems in New Jersey. The grants are meant to provide financial aid to the Public Safety Answering Points (PSAP), in which the PSAP must meet certain criteria in order to receive such funding. Such criteria's include population of township or county from U.S. Censure, number of

call-taker positions and staffing levels.

The Enhanced 9-1-1 Grant has had three years of success throughout New Jersey. It provided \$576,507.85 to three townships in the 18th Legislative District and gave them not only new 9-1-1 telephone equipment, but computer aided dispatch upgrades or replacements for the database links, Geographic Information System enhancements for the purpose of preparing for the implementation of the FCC wireless E9-1-1 requirements and records management systems.

"It is outstanding what this fund will do for our district's police departments," said Assemblyman Diegnan, D-Middlesex.

Rob Merkle, director of education at Engine City Technical Institute, is hoping to change the perception about pursuing a career in the trade industry. Merkle, himself a graduate of Engine City-one of the leaders in diesel engine training since 1969 and a fixture in South Plainfield for the past three years-has worked with the institute for two decades as a teacher, head instructor and recruiter.

"Not a lot of young people know that the trades exist, or that they can be a viable way of working," Merkle said. "If you want to work with your hands, go for it. There's nothing wrong with it."

Engine City offers extensive training on diesel maintenance and repair through a 13-month program consisting of a week-long, half-day schedule. Some 150 students on the 48,000

square-foot campus experience both theory and hands-on experience with diesel engine, drive train and refrigeration courses.

"The diesel industry is what makes this country work," Merkle says. "Anything you see moved out there-truck transports, buses, cranes-all that kind of industry is powered by diesel. Without the industry, the world would be cold, dark and naked."

However, he said, the industry shies away from overt self-promotion. Most people who get involved in the industry, in fact, earn their knowledge and appreciation for diesel in schools such as Engine City.

The trick, he said, is getting people to realize their calling and try a trade school. "There's an awful lot of resistance to allow someone to train to go in the trades," Merkle said.

Looking at some statistics, it is hard to understand why. The standard program at Engine City costs about \$22,000, and scholarships and financial aid are awarded to qualifying students. Plus, students find upon graduation a job market that shows few signs of slowdown.

And the job market comes calling at Engine City. Graduates have found jobs with companies from Ryder to Federal Express, and the institute holds a job fair for each of its classes. "Our job placement is great; we can't fill all of the job offers we have," Merkle said, estimating a 4:1 ratio of jobs to stu-

So what does cause the resistance to go to a school like Engine City? Merkle says it has a lot to do with scholastic politics-getting high school stu-

dents to apply to more colleges in order to boost their approval ratingsthe declining presence of shop and trade classes in schools and the overall negative social stigma of attending a mère trade school rather than a four-

But Merkle encourages those who truly love to work in the industry to follow their dreams. "If college or the military is for you, you should go," he said, "but if you want to work with your head and your hands, there's nothing wrong with going into traditional trades. If you don't have the right education or proper training for something you're passionate about, you can't succeed as easily.'

IRS Eases "Labor Days" for Small Businesses

For many citizens, owning and running a successful business is part of the American dream. And while most Americans take the day off in celebration of Labor Day, the Internal Revenue Service is ready to assist the nation's 45 million small business owners and self-employed taxpayers.

For business owners, holidays are normally time to catch up on paperwork, do recordkeeping and work on tax information. But few business owners are tax experts and the IRS is prepared to help. Free publications, Internet resources and electronic services are available to make their work easier-perhaps for them to enjoy the Labor Day holiday.

"Running a business is a big responsibility requiring long hours and the IRS wants to help ease the process for this hard working group of taxpayers," said Gregg Semanick, IRS spokesperson. "Whether a person is just considering opening a business or has years of small business experience, IRS provides a wide range of tools and educational assistance to help the business owner succeed."

The small business section of IRS.gov provides a one-stop resource for information on starting and operating a business. On this site taxpayers can: learn about employment tax requirements; make tax payments; find out how to set up and distribute retirement plans; view a streaming video of a small business tax workshop and order free products like a tax calendar or small business resource guide.

IRS.gov is also the gateway to a host of electronic services for small businesses including business e-file and the Electronic Federal Tax Payment System (EFTPS). E-Filing options include employment taxes, information returns, partnerships and corporations. EFTPS is an alternative to paying taxes by check or money order. Small businesses can make payments 24 hours a day, seven days a week using EFTPS.

The "Find it Fast" feature in the Small Business section of IRS.gov enables small business owners and selfemployed individuals to access information using the A-Z topic listing or searching by topic such as business types, business expenses and employ-

Over the past few years, IRS.gov has provided new options for communication between the IRS and small business owners and the self-employed. But IRS employees are still available by phone; for telephone assistance with tax issues, small businesses may call 1-800-829-4933.

Small business owners and self-employed taxpavers are also encouraged to sign up for e-News for Small Businesses, an electronic subscription newsletter that brings timely, useful tax information right to their computer.




The project was approved in 2006 and has been managed by Village Realty Group's Frank Cannone and Anthony Vizzoni-whose many other redevelopment activities include a project in nearby Fanwood.

Century 21 Moretti Realty has been named marketing agent. Guy Moretti, president, says the story behind Hamilton Square gives the property a warm and personal feel that perfectly mirrors its architecture and setting.

"When I think of my father and Mr. Popik standing together back in 1980 with their dream and then see all of us today standing together with the same dream I know that the story of Hamilton Square is more than a story of real estate and building materials. It's the story of a town that has been fortunate enough to look back on its visions for the future and see them now coming true," he said. "It's the story of taking a giant step 'back into the future'; into being in the right place at the right time again."

to sign into law three pieces of legislation sponsored by Senator Buono, Assemblyman Barnes and me. As you can appreciate, the Governor's time is limited and for him to come to our borough for an official bill signing ceremony is a special event.

Many constituents have asked me exactly how does a legislator come up with the idea for a law and what is the process for a bill to become law. I will use the real life experience of the Governor signing into law Assembly Bill 3817 which I authored to explain how the process works. I am co-chairman of the Committee on Business Efficiency in the Public Schools. In 2004 the committee issued a



report that concluded that undiagnosed vision related learning problems ultimately lead to special education classification in a significant number of students. The cost to a school district may well exceed \$100,000 per student per year to meet the needs of a classified student. It is believed that as many of 40% of special need students may have a vision issue. For example, a student skipping lines when reading may have a visual problem which is not detected in a simple eye exam. The child may ultimately be placed in special education as an underachiever. If he or she had been properly identified through a thorough eye examination the classification would never have occurred. I had several meetings with members of the New Jersey Society of Optometric Physicians whose input was invaluable in helping me draft the legislation. A3817 establishes a pilot project to conduct comprehensive eye exams for children in second grade in three districts throughout the state over a three year period. The physicians group even agreed to contribute \$10,000 towards the cost of the program.

The bill was assigned to the education committee where I testified along with witnesses in support of the bill including the NJEA and the School Boards Association. It passed the committee unanimously with bipartisan support. Speaker Roberts then posted the bill for a vote of the entire Assembly where it passed unanimously.

Senator Joe Doria sponsored the legislation in the State Senate. It was passed unanimously by the education committee and subsequently by the entire Senate. Next the legislation was thoroughly vetted by all departments which will be affected. It was then reviewed by the attorney general. Senator Buono and I asked the Governor if he would honor us by coming to South Plainfield to sign it into law. The rest as they say is history. A3817 is now the law of the state of New Jersey. It is my intention to expand the eye screening to every district in the state after we get the results of the pilot program. That will require another law and the process will take place all over again. I hope you have found this to be



cloud in sight. The American Legion was thrilled with the success of the event and wanted to stress to residents that the picnic is a great family event open to the public.





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
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
