# **Council Cuts Tax Rate** Tax Bills to Reflect Municipal Rate Decrease


The public hearing of the Borough of South Plainfield's SFY 2008 Municipal Budget covering the period of July 2007 through June 2008 was held at last Tuesday evening's Borough Council meeting.

The budget total-\$25,655.983.06is up three percent from last year. The increase was due largely to state mandated pension and library contributions that are required to be paid. Without these two items the overall budget would have been up just shy of one percent.

In spite of the budget increase, the municipal tax rate for the average homeowner will decrease from 1.002 to .99. The rate is based on the borough's budgeted taxes divided by the rateable base, or the amount that homeowners and businesses pay in taxes. The borough's ratable base this year is \$1,435,804,761-up \$16,852,798 from last year due to the increased number of new businesses

near Hadley Road. An individual tax rate is calculated by multiplying the assessed value of a home by the tax rate .99 (or 99 cents on the dollar). The average borough home assessment is \$120,408; therefore, homeowners will pay approximately \$1,206.48 a year-a savings of \$14.50 over last year.

"One of the key drivers of the municipal budget was the actual decline in health benefit costs," said Chief Financial Officer Glenn Cullen. "Municipalities and businesses are experiencing double digit increases in their healthcare costs. Last year the borough had a 13% decrease in paid claims over the year before. These savings are the result of a change that was made in the borough's benefit structure about four years ago. It took time for the borough to experience the savings, but sure enough, the changes paid off in the long run. As a matter of fact, the borough's health insurance has increased at a rate of (Continued on page 12)

# House OKs Ferguson 100K Bid for SPPD

Joined by South Plainfield police officers and local officials, con-gressman Mike Ferguson, R-N.J., announced on Monday that the House has approved his request for \$100,000 to improve public safety and enhance communications among first responders in the borough.

While visiting South Plainfield, Ferguson toured the police 911 dispatch center and viewed one of the department's new police cars.

If that funding level makes it through Congress this year, borough officials said they would purchase a 24-hour video surveillance system for the municipal complex and 40 portable police radios.

"Enhanced communications capabilities for South Plainfield police will emergencies and help to make our community safer," Ferguson said during a news conference in South Plainfield to announce the congressional action. "I'm pleased to have secured initial congressional approval of these important Federal funds for South Plainfield. The funding isn't a advocate for the South Plainfield Police Department receiving the funding it needs and deserves to protect our community."

Police Chief John Ferarro said upgraded communications equipment will increase the efficiency and reliability of day-to-day operations, as well as the response to critical incidents.

These important funds will help our department achieve many of our critical long-term goals," Ferraro said

at the news conference. "For instance, the funds will help us install a security system at the municipal complex to enhance public safety, purchase radios to enhance communications and help us establish a communications system to rapidly notify the public of emergencies or enlist their help in solving crimes in our community."

Charles Butrico said the funding would protect borough residents. "South Plainfield is grateful for Con-

When Red Line Studios Senior Producer Matt Pellowski wanted to find a location for the bar scenes in "Rachel Marks," the independent thriller being filmed locally, he walked into Adelines Restaurant on Hamilton Boulevard. "I remembered eating there years ago and thought it would be perfect," said Pellowski, on the set of "Rachel Marks" at Adelines Restaurant last Sunday. Three weeks

after taking some interior shots of the bar, co-producer Billy Mulligan not only made arrangements to utilize the restaurant for the shoot on September 23, he also hired Adelines to cater lunch and dinner for the cast and crew while on location in New Jersey.

"The restaurant is about 32 seconds away from the crew house [at the Highlands]," said Mulligan, in between introducing himself to the extras seated inside the restaurant.

"We were told the food was excellent," added Pellowski, who graduated from Hillsborough High School in 1997 and has "strange" ties to the local South Plainfield area.

# **BOE Presents Plaques to Rosado and Crown**

The South Plainfield Board of Education awarded individual plaques to Superintendent of Schools Dr. Robert Rosado and Assistant Superintendent of Instruction Kaye Crown at their September 19 meeting.

Both Crown and Rosado are retiring from the district. The two administrators were praised for their accomplishment in raising the district's test scores during a time when resources were strained and 31 positions were eliminated.

"The kids now have recorded outstanding academic achievement and that's my biggest joy. It's what the board asked me to do when they hired me. I leave the district in a much better place than what I inherited it. The scores bear it out. I think it's a tribute to the staff here because they are really an outstanding group of teachers and administrators. I think they responded well to direction and provided a lot of impetus themselves. They are a pretty well motivated group right now," Rosado said adding, "When [you] have a good staff, good administrative staff and a supportive board, it makes the task of getting the scores up a little bit easier."

Rosado is beginning a new career as director of field-based education at Caldwell College, overseeing teacher placement and education. Although he started the new position this month, he is still in the district and will remain until December 31 according to his contract.

State law dictates a 30-day wait for the title of Superintendent of Schools to be transferred. The district can't have two superintendents at the same time so the board appointed Jose Negron, the incoming superintendent, to the temporary position of director of operations from September 19 until October 17. On October 15, Negron will assume the title of superintendent of schools and Dr. Rosado will be

deputy superintendent. Until the title change, Negron will be assigned by Rosado and be involved with the dayto-day administration of the district. Negron is also interviewing the candidates for Crown's position.

Crown said she is looking forward to her upcoming retirement. Her husband, Walter Crown, associate dean of academic affairs at Rutgers Graduate School of Education in New Brunswick, will be retiring in June 2008. Crown left her job as principal of Crim Elementary School in Bridgewater after four years to become South Plainfield's director of curriculum in 2003. She had returned to South Plainfield after teaching here 24 years earlier. "I loved being principal of Crim-the children, teachers and the

parents-but I didn't like the commute on Rt. 287 from Metuchen," she said.

Due to a budget crunch in 2005, the position of director of curriculum officially ended. Crown became assistant superintendent of instruction after the retirement of Anthony Massaro as assistant superintendent. Although Massaro returned last month as assistant to the superintendent, his duties ended September 21.

The public is invited to an informal gathering to welcome the newly appointed Superintendent of Schools, Jose R. Negron, on Wednesday, October 3, from 7-9 p.m. in the South Plainfield High School cafeteria.

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


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

# **High School to Establish Swim Team**

South Plainfield High School is known for its award winning sports teams. Now the school will also offer swimming as a team sport.

At a meeting planned just after presstime this week students and their parents were scheduled to attend the inaugural meeting of the new swim team at South Plainfield High School to review procedures and learn the location of the eight meets scheduled for the team. Also to be discussed is how the team will be supported this year through fundraising efforts. The team will have to raise \$9,000 by November 1 to fund expenses. The Tiger Shark organization has pledged \$2,000 toward the team's goal accord-



ing to BOE member Debbie Boyle. The ability to swim as a member of South Plainfield High School team is a goal many students and their parents have hoped to realize.

During the summer many local youth are members of the Tiger Shark Swim Team (the resident team of the South Plainfield Community Swimming Pool). They represent South Plainfield to compete against other area swim clubs where they show their ability and often win individual and team events.

Even without an official high school swim team, the experience of being a member of the Tiger Sharks has enabled members to compete and win against students throughout Middlesex County at the Greater Middlesex County Conference held at the end of the winter season

The establishment of a school team will allow South Plainfield students to participate in all GMC swim events. A few years ago, four members of the South Plainfield relay team, made up of members of the Tiger Sharks, won the event. The GMC subsequently changed its rules, allowing only school teams to compete in relay events.

Competing in individual events last February, Emily Piekarski and Matt Moats received recognition for their

event at the GMC meet held at Princeton University.

The BOE recognized the accomplishments of seven students participating in February's GMC with certificates, and those swimmers were awarded SPHS athletic letters for the first time. The students train at the Jewish Community Center (JCC) of Edison with swim coach Laurie Post and members of the Tiger Sharks. Post continues coaching the swimmers as members of the Blue Dolphins for the JCC after the summer season.

The Tiger Sharks are known in the community and regularly have a float in the annual Labor Day parade. This year the Tiger Sharks Swim and Dive Team float, with a larger than life-sized shark, won the Honorary Grand Marshal Trophy for best overall entry preented by parade Grand Marshal Owen Kelly.

"Having an official swim team at the high school will keep our students in the district. Students have enrolled in private high schools so that they could continue swimming on a high school team," said Boyle.



# McConville and Rusnak Look to **Revitalize Park Avenue Business District**

· Assist small business owners with obtaining the financing they require-We've seen how the borough can assist our senior citizens utilize all of the programs and benefits they are entitled to under the leadership of Joann Graf," noted Rusnak. "Working in the banking industry, I know first hand that many small business owners are not aware of programs such as low interest business financing that can help them transform their business."

· Enforce existing codes to ensure compliance with standards currently in effect-Residents and business owners are expected to maintain their property. Failure to maintain these basic standards can have a negative impact, even on nearby businesses and residents.

· Recognize business and property owners who make us proud to be South Plainfield residents-Many business owners take great care and pride in maintaining their property. We need



on children's health by putting together an innovative smoke-free parks program. It passed unanimously.

Matt and I have also worked with Congressman Mike Ferguson, who recently announced a \$100,000 grant that will buy turnout gear for our fire department and a first-of-its-kind communications grant for our police department.

Last year Republicans proposed rejuvenating playgrounds at Walnut Street Park, Cotton Street Park and Shadyside Park. Apparently these weren't bad ideas either, because the council approved two of the three not long after we suggested them. All these things were done with a Republican minority.

(Continued from page 1) only 3.5% over the past five years. I do not know of any other organization that can make such a claim.'

Cullen continued, "The other driver in the budget was an increase in municipal miscellaneous revenues. These items consisted of unspent health insurance costs reserved from the last fiscal year and the sale of certain municipal assets." These items combined increased miscellaneous revenues to \$508,729. There was also an increase in overall surplus used in the budget by \$261,000 due to a large delinquent lien that was paid in the prior year. The decrease in property tax means the borough is not eligible for Extraordinary Aid from the state, which last year totaled \$150,000 last year.

This years total tax bill also included an increase in the 2007/2008 school budget of approximately \$212.16 on a home assessed at \$120,700.

(Continued from page 1) gressmen Mike Ferguson's efforts on our behalf," Butrico said. "It's important that our law enforcement men and women have the necessary resources they need to keep our citizens safe and carry out their important jobs."

South Plainfield Councilman Rob Bengivenga thanked Ferguson for advocating for federal funding for the borough's first responders. "Earlier this year Councilman Anesh and I asked Congressman Ferguson to help, and he delivered," Bengivenga said. "With our local budget already stretched thin, this additional help couldn't have come at a better time."

The South Plainfield funding was included in the annual appropriations bill for the Justice Department and other Federal agencies. The House bill must still be reconciled with the Senate's version of the legislation before a final measure-not expected before this fallcould be sent to the White House.
