BOE Business Administrator Council Tolley Resigns, Put on Leave

George Sarnoff Hired as Acting Business Administrator

BOE Business Administrator/ Board Secretary Donna Tolley has resigned effective January 28, 2008. Tolley's resignation was the last item listed on the agenda at the November 28 Board of Education meeting. The board further approved a paid leave of absence for Tolley effective that day. No explanation was given, nor was there any comment from the public or any board member about her resignation. Tolley will be paid until her resignation goes into effect. When asked for a reason for her resignation, Superintendent of Schools Jose Negron answered that he could not comment because it is a person-

\$600 a day, without benefits, until a qualified replacement is hired.

Sarnoff, who has an extensive background in business administration, is presently working for the New Jersey State Department of Education as Interim County Business Administrator in Paterson.

Tolley began as Business Administrator/Board Secretary on Jan. 1, 2006. She was also given the titles of Affirmative Action Officer for Equity in Employment Practices, Public Agency Compliance Officer and Custodian of School Records.

Tolly served as assistant business administrator from October 2004 until January 2006 and briefly as acting business administrator/board secretary from July to September in 2004. She also served as school district accountant from September 2003 until July 24.

At Tuesday night's Borough Council meeting, Mayor Charles Butrico asked council members to offer input on the Helen Street Project. The borough is facing a looming December 31 deadline to either move forward on its own or abandon the project and wait five years to reapply for federal funding.

If the council decides to go ahead, the borough will have to repay the \$650,000 already spent and then spend at least an additional \$1M to formally apply for permits for the roadway.

Butrico also asked Councilmenelect Ray Rusnak and Tim McConville for their opinions.

The consensus was that the cost to continue is too high to pass on to the taxpayers without any guarantee of receiving approval to start the project.

Butrico said he will draft a letter to the NJ Transportation Authority indicating the borough's intention to abandon the project and reapply in five years. He added that he will resident Joann Graf to form an ad hoc committee to work on the project, so that we can move forward at a future date. He noted he would like a representative from a local trucking company to be included. It was also suggested that Helen Street Coalition members Jane Dornick and Debbie Boyle be included. The coalition was responsible for getting 800 petition letters in support of the project mailed to the DEP last year.

Dear Editor,

On May 2, 2007 our son Matthew was diagnosed with Ewing's Sarcoma, a very aggressive cancer that is usually diagnosed in boys between the ages of 10-20 years old. Needless to say, childhood cancer is rare and much rarer still in a boy so young. Matthew was not quite eight months old at the

His cancer started as a soft tissue tumor in his left forearm and spread to his lung and liver. Instantly, our lives were turned upside down. Our baby was diagnosed with a disease that was unimaginable and his life was threatened. Indeed, we were told that his chance of surviving was only a 30% possibility.

After our initial shock, it became our goal to immediately do whatever possible to try to save Matthew's life. Over the past seven months Matthew has undergone intense chemotherapy to try and kill his cancer. He also had his left arm amputated and had surgery on his liver to remove any reachable numors.

We have spent countless days in the hospital with him, between The Bristol Myers Squibb Children's Hospital at Robert Wood Johnson University Hospital and Children's Hospital of Philadelphia.

I have had to leave my job to stay home and take care of Matty, as he requires full-time care. We have relocated to my parents' home, as financially it has been difficult with only one salary and it is extremely helpful to be home with them, since we also have two other children at home; Nicholas, who is five, and Justin, who just turned two.

Matthew is handling treatment as well as can be expected. He has a few more chemotherapy sessions left and then he will start outpatient physical and occupational therapy to get him walking and using his arm.

Earlier this month, we received extremely good news as the doctors informed us that the tumors removed during his last surgery were dead. Matthew will also spend the next five years being rescanned since this cancer can

Matthew's cancer has a 30% cure rate and because of the fighter he is, we are planning for him to be in the

We want to take the time to thank all of the people who have been praying, supporting, giving blood and financially trying to help our family. There are so many people that have helped us, many whom are anonymous to us, and I felt this is the best way to tell everyone how much we appreciate everything that has been done on behalf of Matty and our fam-

When something as bad as this happens to you, it warms our hearts to know how good people can be. I want

to thank our family, friends, co-workers, classmates and neighbor's, along with each and everyone who has helped us anonymously out of the goodness of their hearts. We can't put into words what it has meant over the past seven months to know we have such a wonderful support system. You all mean the world to us.

No child should ever have to go through what Matthew has been through, and no parent should ever have to go through what we have gone through and watched him go through.

Investors Savings Bank Coming to Borough

Investors Savings Bank will soon open its 47th location in South Plainfield.

At the November 29 South Plainfield Zoning Board of Adjustment meeting, builders Fox and Foxx received preliminary site plan approval by a unanimous vote to subdivide the lot at 2449 Plainfield Ave. and build an Investors Savings Bank, and a variance to build a single family residential house.

The lot is across the street from the municipal building and will be adjacent to Commerce Bank.

Architect Mark Haas noted the design of the bank building is a new architectural design with a dome, sporting an exterior design of brick and limestone panels. It will have two drive-in windows and ATM machine designed for safety, with no physical contact with the teller except through a closed circuit TV screen.

The building will have approximately 2,000 sq. ft. interior space.

Ten residents who live on Manning, Van Fleet and Pearl Place attended the meeting with concerns about possible water problems that may result from building the bank. The 35,475 sq. ft. lot is located in an area with a stream encroachment from Spring Lake. Initially, engineer Steve Parker planned for excess water to flow into a detention basin, however CME Engineer Rob Russo objected to the plan because of potential problems with mosquitoes. Final plans call for underground pipes to move excess water to the sewer lines on Plainfield Avenue.

To buffer the back of the bank from residential housing, a fence will be installed on the property line and also 15 six-foot high evergreen trees.

The second lot will be subdivided to build a two-story center hall, four bedroom, single family home. The location of the house itself will be a buffer to residents whose homes are located behind the proposed bank.

"I don't have the power to keep the woods [located on the property] between the commercial property since the area is zoned OPA [offices and professional buildings]," William Thomas, zoning board chair, explained.

"If we deny the variance for the house, then the only thing that can go up will be a commercial building with a parking lot," Thomas said.

Before building can start, Fox and Foxx must return to the zoning board with their plans for site plan approval.



are you waiting for?" Rarely' does this question invite an answer. Usually, it's spoken impatiently, and demands action. "Make a decision," "Get over it!" "Just do something!" But if someone really and honestly asked, what would we say?

In answering, we might first check our calendars. The new month has revealed a whole new set of days, tasks, appointments and deadlines. Flipping the calendar may mean trading in a sense of accomplishment for a feeling of being overwhelmed. Or, maybe it means dread about the empty, lonely times ahead. Either way, the calendar itself, may demand: "What are you

The calendar of the Christian church is new, too. With December comes the season of Advent unlike a new month of fresh demands-"Do this. Endure that. Buy something else. And look good in the process"-Advent is completely different. Advent asks, patiently, and with honest curiosity, "What are you waiting for?"

For millennia, Christians have entered Advent waiting for Jesus. Waiting for Christmas and the birth of hope. Waiting for God to act, beyond what we can control or make happen even a little bit. So Advent invites us to wait, watch and listen in a way that is free from endless worry-driven working, beating ourselves up and cracking the whip on others.

Probably your answer to the question "What are you waiting for?" isn't Jesus. Mine isn't. I'm waiting for everything from a new cell phone to seeing dear friends again to things I can't even begin to put into words. Advent doesn't force us to give up everything else and wait only for Jesus. Instead, Advent reminds us that only when Jesus comes can we experience the joy, love, peace and hope that make everything else worthwhile. And this changes how we wait, if not what we

So, whatever we're waiting for, instead of waiting like we deserve it or can earn it or control it, Advent frees us to wait for it as a gift freely offered, confident that it's in God's hands.

God knows so little is up to us or within our grasp. God doesn't demand, "Get over it!" or "Do something!" Instead, in Advent, God invites us to wait. For Jesus. For loneliness to end. For rest. For new cell phones.

We wait together, knowing it's all in God's hands, given to us as a totally free gift.

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All About Pets....

As the winter months and holidays approach, you need to take time to ensure that your pets enjoy a happy, healthy holiday season.

Cold weather can affect our pets just

as it does us. It is best to keep pets indoors during the winter months, but if this is not possible, outdoor pets must be provided with warm shelter. Dogs and cats can suffer frostbite, hypothermia and can even develop colds from being left outside too long. Snow salt can also harm dogs

and cats. It is abrasive and may irritate their skin or if ingested can lead to many intestinal problems. Make sure you clean and dry your pet's paws when bringing them back inside.

Holiday decorations pose several risks for our pets. Holiday lights mean more electrical cords for kittens and puppies to chew. Be sure you have cords secured and out of the way. Lighted candles should never be left unattended and is even more important if a mischievous pet is around. Anchor candles securely and away

from curious faces, paws and tails. Pets, particularly cats, love to chew ribbons, bows and tinsel. If ingested, these items may lead to intestinal obstructions requiring emergency surgery to repair. Many holiday plants are also toxic including holly, mistletoe, ivy, and poinsettia. If ingested

these plants may lead to intestinal problems.

Pet-proof your Christmas tree by making sure it is secure. An adventuresome cat or dog may find it a fun place to climb, so consider anchoring the top of the tree to the ceiling using a hook and rope

to prevent it from toppling over. It is a good idea to place breakable or valuable ornaments up high on a sturdy branch. Also, keep your pets away from the tree stand, as many preservatives used in the water are potentially toxic

Do your best to continue your pet's daily routine. So often this is forgotten during the busy holidays, but keeping to your pet's feeding and walking schedule will help keep your pet's world consistent and avoid them feeling the holiday stress.

Have a happy and safe holiday.

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

The goal of the Helen Street Project is to provide the best and safest truck route in South Plainfield-not totally eliminate trucks from South Plainfield roadways. The leaders, political parties and residents of our town are in complete agreement that this is the best solution. We owe it to our children, truckers and all who drive in our town the superior truck route that the Helen Street Project affords; to do this we must move forward and oppose any EWA efforts and influence against it.

Mr. Spiegel's letter would lend one to believe that we are totally helpless to take care of problems in our own town. The South Plainfield leaders are the ones that engaged the EPA and addressed the Cornell-Dubilier and ball field soil issues. I suppose in a funny logical way the EWA can claim involvement by not opposing these projects and influencing the DEP to shut them down. He mentions his efforts on the Talmadge Road extension that includes not only a road, but acres of high density housing through and abutting to the protected Dismal Swamp. 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
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


