# Council Schedules Special Meeting

For the first time in more than a decade, the Republican Party will gain the majority control of the Borough Council in 2008. As a result, new professional contracts will be awarded.

To fill those professional vacancies, the borough advertised the 12 categories to be awarded contracts during the reorganization meeting to be held on January 5. The borough received more than 108 applicants.

appointed Councilmen Rob Bengivenga, Matt Anesh and Ray Petronko to review the applications and choose three from each category. They will be interviewed at a public meeting next Thursday, Dec. 27 at 7 p.m. and if needed, Friday, Dec. 28. These meetings will be open to the public.

Butrico said he was disappointed to find out that Republican Chairman Bob Jones, Republican Councilmen Matt Anesh and Rob Bengivenga, along with Councilmen-elect Ray Rusnak and Tim McConville were already interviewing applicants on their own. He added that even though it is not against the Sunshine Law, the other members of the council should

# Weekend Storm Creates

The after effects of last Sunday's storm that dumped sleet, rain, snow and subsequently slush, left roadways, sidewalks and parking lots slick with ice after temperatures dropped Sunday night. Those driving children to school early Monday were faced with dangerous, ice covered roadways and school parking lots that were not safely navigable.

Four police cars were stationed at borough schools to help ease the congestion from backed up traffic caused by the icy conditions. Police Officer Dave Franchak was seen helping SPHS teachers and students traverse the dangerous parking lot. Many students were late for school due to the heavy backup that occurred. High school students were not allowed to go out for lunch and an early dismissal was called at 2 p.m. so that busses could remain on schedule district-wide

The area around Grant School was equally dangerous. Cromwell Place, in front of the school where a crossing guard is stationed, was not plowed and was extremely icy.

According to Superintendent of Schools Jose Negron, the general manager of Sodexho was contacted on Sunday afternoon to find out the condition of the school grounds. He assured Negron that they were clear and safe. He had no further communication with them.

At 6:30 a.m. on Monday, Negron received a call from BOE President Jeff Seider saying that the parking lots were sheets of ice and very dangerous. Negron explained that by that time busses were already out and it was too late to call for a delayed opening. To complicate matters, school phones were not functioning. He immediately called the police department to alert them to the icy conditions and they immediately dispatched officers

Negron also contacted Sodexho (Continued on page 11)

# Spreading Cheer, One Bulb at a Time

The Observer received calls during the past few weeks alerting us to a George Street home that is decorated with spectacular holiday lights synchronized to music. Every night between 5 and 10:30 p.m., visitors can stop by the house (off Sampton Avenue), tune car radios to 107.3 and be mesmerized by the display of Christmas lights.

Homeowners Anthony and Sarika began preparations back in October while the weather was still warm. It was a family project; their three children helped set up the display, which numbers between 12,000 and 15,000 lights and more than 2,000 feet of extension cords.

Nick Cremone, a visitor to the "light show," sat in his car with his wife, Marion, for nearly an hour, and commented that he was unable to get even one string of lights to work this year. Carloads of high school students pulled up outside the house and hung out with friends while watching the light show.

"I could not believe that I found a couple of young children sitting on my front lawn with their parents standing behind them watching the show; the sparkle in their eyes and the smiles on their faces just gave Christmas a new meaning for me," Anthony said. "For me, I just wanted to spread a little Christmas magic and I just hope that everyone has enjoyed it."

Anthony said that he usually decorates the house with lights, but wanted to "take it up a notch" this year. What started out as a small-scale display turned into a bit more costly project when he decided to computerize the light show. He said it took about two months to set up and program the computer sequences and the lighting controllers.

The light show will run through January 7. It can also be viewed on the Internet at www.youtube.com and search for "George Street & Lights."

# County Personal Assistance Services Receives Record Funding

The New Jersey Division of Disability Services has awarded \$736,000 to Middlesex County for the operation of the 2008 Personal Assistance Services Program (PASP), a funding increase of \$121,000 and a record high in funding for the program.

This increased funding will allow the county to continue to add new participants to the very successful PASP program.

The PASP provides assistants to help individuals who are physically disabled, but able to supervise their own care, with activities such as bathing, meal preparation, light housekeeping, laundry and chores. PASP also provides some self-care type services for eligible individuals.

"The Personal Assistance Services Program has helped many of our residents with disabilities live independent and productive lives," said Middlesex County Freeholder Blanquita B. Valenti, chair of the county's Human Services and Aging Committee. "We are delighted to be able to add people to this important program and are grateful for the additional funding."

The major focus of the program is to assist individuals not able to secure personal care assistant services through other programs. The PASP regulations require that participants be New Jersey residents, under the age of 65 and actively engaged in community activity, such as work or schooling. County PASP funds must be used for county residents.

PASP participants credit the program with helping them to live independently and safely in the community. "PASP makes it possible for me to work full-time and live in my own home," said John Fig, a project analyst at Wakefern Corporation, and a member of both the New Jersey and local PASP Advisory Councils.

Debbie Hehir, Middlesex County PASP coordinator, noted the wide range of activities PASP participants complete. "We have a variety of people, including teachers, telemarketers, several college students and volunteers participating in our program."



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

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


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#### **County Ensuring Gasoline Meets** Octane Levels

The Middlesex County Department of Consumer Affairs is performing random checks to the more than 200 gasoline stations within the county to ensure that the octane level of the gasoline coming out of the pump is the same as what is posted.

Freeholder Christopher D. Rafano, chair of the County Law and Public Safety Committee, said inspectors are using a recently purchased octane analyzer to determine if drivers are getting fuel with the proper octane rating, which is free of water, silt or other contaminants. Fuel not at the proper octane levels could cause extensive engine damage.

"Gasoline prices are at or near alltime highs and it is incumbent upon us to make sure that consumers are getting what they pay for when fueling up," Rafano said. "The mobile analyzer enables us to perform this worthwhile task effectively and efficiently.

Until the county purchased the Zeltex Octane Analyzer, inspectors would collect samples and take them to a laboratory for testing, which proved time consuming and costly. Rafano said numerous consumer complaints are received each year.

As a result of the random testing, several stations have been found to be selling fuels with octane levels significantly different from the values posted on the pumps.

Rafana said stations found to be in violation would be prosecuted under State Weights and Measures Law and the New Jersey Consumer Affairs Fraud Act and would be required to pay steep fines.

to get their trucks out to the schools immediately. They had trucks in the school parking lots sanding and salting, but not until after school was in session.

Late Monday afternoon Negron reached out to Mayor Charles Butrico to ask for the borough's help with the school parking lots. All school property had been salted and sanded on Monday, but with the anticipated drop in temperatures predicted that night, he wanted to make sure there would be safe conditions on school property Tuesday morning. At 5:30 on Tuesday morning, the Department of Public Works trucks were out sanding and salting school property and it was clear when teachers and students arrived at school. The borough will be reimbursed by either the BOE or Sodexho.

Negron said he would like to personally thank the police department, the mayor and council and the employees at public works for their help during this emergency. He also wanted to thank the teachers, parents, students and the members of the community for their help and cooperation. He commented on how pleased he was to see everyone in the community work together during this emergency. He

added that despite the dangerous icy conditions, no major injuries occurred, but there were incidents of people who slipped on the ice.

Negron has already held a meeting with the general manager and regional manager of Sodexho and the school board business administrator to assure that this never happens. They now have a detailed plan in place for the

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

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


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
