Library Bursting at the Seams; Will Residents Pay for More Space?

On Monday morning at 8 a.m., residents will begin the week-long opportunity to cast their votes on whether the Borough should bond for up to \$4.5M to finance the construction of a new library building. The vote will be

The library held an open house yesterday (after presstime) to give residents an opportunity to ask questions and to view the proposed building plans.

According to Library Board of Trustees President Eric Aronowitz, "A study in the early 1990s determined that, at 6,400 square feet, the current library was 50% too small when it was built over 40 years ago." The present building is not able to accommodate a second floor or be expanded because it is located in a flood zone. He noted that when students visit the library after school and also during children's programs, the library becomes so crowded it is almost impossible for anyone else to use the facility.

The proposed plans call for 15,000 square feet of floor space, more than twice the current floor space. The first floor will have 10 rows of stacked books, a reference and circulation desk, a 22-by-30 foot children's room, quiet study rooms for group study The library will also have a drive-up window for both drop off and pick up of materials.

"Democracy Week" voting will take place May 5 through May 10 in the Borough Hall courtroom. No voting will take place on Wednesday. Votes will be cast on paper ballots similar to those used in some


local, state and national elections. INTERPRETIVE STATEMENT:

The proposed bond ordinance would be used to fund the development and construction of a new public library building within the Borough of South Plainfield. The estimated cost for the development and construction of a new library building and related improvements, which includes, but is not limited to, landscaping, utilities and parking improvements, is \$4,500,000. This amount includes monies which the Borough has already expended on the project. There may be additional funding provided to the Borough to offset a portion of the estimated costs.

A "Yes" vote on the above question means that you do want the Borough Council to authorize the adoption of a bond ordinance to fund the development and construction of a new public library building.

A "No" vote on the above question means that you do not want the Borough Council to authorize the adoption of a bond ordinance to fund the development and construction of a new public library building.

Muhlenberg Hospital provided \$154M worth of charity care. The state and federal government reimbursed Muhlenberg Hospital a paltry \$6.2M. Eleven hospitals in the state. are slated to be closing this comingyear. Besides the impending doom for Muhlenberg Hospital, Raritan Bay in Perth Amboy isn't far behind. JFK Medical Center, part of the Solaris Health System, is also facing budget issues

Muhlenberg Hospital serves the communities of Plainfield, South Plainfield, North Plainfield, Dunellen, Scotch Plains, Watchung and Westfield. If this uncompensated care issue isn't rectified the closing of Muhlenberg Hospital will only be the beginning. We will see a domino effect where other hospitals will close. Patients without insurance will go to the next closest hospital. Without increased funding for charity care the next closest hospital will suffer severe financial losses. The shutting of Muhlenberg Hospital means precious time will be lost in transit to JFK, Overlook and Somerset Medical Center. As anyone experiencing an emergency knows, additional minutes can mean the difference between life and death. I've always found the staff at Muhlenberg Hospital to be professional and caring. A public hearing on the fate of Muhlenberg Hospital will be held on Tuesday, May 6 at 6 p.m. at Plainfield High School, 950 Park Ave. Commissioner Heather Howard of the Department of Health and Human Services will conduct this hearing. If you are interested in maintaining access to quality health care in our community by keeping Muhlenberg Regional Medical Center open. Please join up with fellow concerned citizens at the public hearing. It is your chance to speak out against the closing of Muhlenberg Hospital





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

FROM THE LIBRARY BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Some frequently asked questions about the South Plainfield Public Library Project

Do we need a new library?

A study conducted by a consulting firm, Grimm & McPherson, in 1990 concluded that, at that time, the South Plainfield Public Library was too small for the size of the community. The situation has only gotten worse. Additionally, our existing library is not accessible to those with disabilities.

Why not expand the existing building?

The current library building cannot be expanded because it is located in a floodway. Government regulations prohibit expanding buildings in these areas.

Is the new library going to be larger than the current building?

The new building will have more than twice the floor space of the current library. The current building is 6,330 sq. ft. and the new library will have 15,000 sq. ft.

What improvements will the new library have?

The new library will have a larger children's area, a children's craft room, quiet study rooms for group study, a young adult area, a large room for meetings or classes, and a drive up window for both drop off and pick up of materials. All areas will be handicap accessible.

Will the new building be able to be expanded in the future?

The new building will be a one-story building plus

a mezzanine level. Should there be a need to expand in the future, the building has been designed so that a complete second floor could easily be added.

Will there be adequate parking at the new library?

There will be 22 new spaces and a walkway will be built to the existing municipal lot.

What will the new library cost?

The current estimated cost of the new library, including professional fees, site work and construction is \$5,000,000. Of this amount, \$850,000 has already been spent. The potential impact on the average taxpayer is \$2.50 per month.

or taxpayers list. All residents who are registered voters or are listed as property owners are eligible to vote. Those unable to vote during the week will have an opportunity to cast their vote on Saturday.

Hours for voting are as follows: Monday, May 5, 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.; Tuesday, May 6, 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.; Thursday, May 8, 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.; Friday, May 9, 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. and Saturday, May 10, 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Once a resident is vetted, they will receive a paper ballot and check off either "yes" if in favor, or "no" if opposed. Half of the ballot will go into the box; the other half will be threaded onto a spindle outside the box. According to Municipal Clerk Joann Graf, with someone standing next to the box at all times and having the same number of paper slips collected outside the box as inside, there is no way for the ballot box to be stuffed.

So far, \$850,000 has been expended for the library, including the purchase of the building lot and architect's plans. In March of 2007, the Planning Board gave its final approval. If the referendum is approved, and the council agrees, the library can begin the bidding process.

The potential impact on the aver-



age taxpayer is approximately \$2.50 per month, or \$30 per year.





We're between groups on the DVD Circuit today. The latest group should be available for borrowing very soon.


