# **Accident Victim Extricated**

An elderly woman was seriously injured in an automobile accident on Woodland Avenue last Friday afternoon after being broadsided by a dump truck.

Adolfo Aguilar, 37, of Plainfield, was heading south on Woodland Avenue in a Ford F350 Mason dump truck pulling an enclosed trailer, when he struck a 2001 Lincoln Town Car driven by Margaret Jaffe 84, of Scotch Plains. According to Aguilar, the victim pulled out in front of him while making a left hand turn onto Woodland from Sprague Avenue. Jaffee's vehicle was pushed onto the West Nine Golf Course where she was trapped for approximately 25 minutes and had to be extricated by the South Plainfield Volunteer Fire Dept. The victim was treated by South Plainfield EMS and paramedics from Muhlenberg Hospital at the scene and was airlifted by N.J. State Police Medi-Vac helicopter to The University Hospital in Newark.

At presstime Jaffe was listed as being in stable condition. The cause of the crash is still under investigation and any witnesses are asked to contact South Plainfield Poilce Traffic Safety Officer Gary Kline at (908) 226-7693.

# **Council Majority**

The Borough's Republican Majority voted 4-2 at Monday's Agenda meeting to override Mayor Charles Butrico's veto of two weight restriction ordinances that were passed at last months council meeting.

With the weight restrictions repealed, trucks will be allowed back on Hamilton Boulevard and Belmont Avenue after being banned for nearly three years.

This is the second time the weight


restriction ordinances were introduced, passed and then vetoed. The council was set to override the mayor's veto on the first ordinances, but Council President Rob Bengivenga abstained from voting after questions were raised as to whether his vote would constitute a conflict of interest. Bengivenga works for Marpal Disposal, a division of Republic Services of New. Jersey. Republic Services also owns (Continued on page 10)

# **EWA Seeks Capacitor Cleanup of Bound Brook**

Robert Spiegel, executive director of the nonprofit Edison Wetlands Association (EWA), spoke at Monday's Borough Council Agenda meeting stressing the need to prioritize the clean up at the Cornell-Dubilier site. Spiegel reported that he found leaking and decaying capacitors lying on the eroding banks of the Bound Brook in April. Photos of the capacitors were shown during a Power Point presentation by EWA Environmental Engineer Richard Chapin to demonstrate the need for the EPA to make cleaning up the Bound Brook a priority.

Chapin said the capacitors in the photos were found downstream of the railroad culvert lying three feet from the brook and were actively eroding into the brook. The EPA removed the capacitors. Chapin pointed out that those jogging, bicycling or walking along the banks of the Bound Brook could inhale or touch dust possibly contaminated with PCB's, which over time could cause cancer and other problems.

The clean-up of the PCB's and other carcinogens resulting from manufacturing on the Cornell-Dubilier Electronics Superfund Site is proceeding close to plan, according

to EPA Remedial Project Manager Peter Mannino, who also attended Monday's meeting to give a status report on the clean-up. In May, 18 contaminated buildings bordering Hamilton Boulevard within the Superfund site were demolished and the resulting 26,400 tons of building debris were trucked off-site to approved landfills.

In June, 21,000 tons of capacitor debris was excavated. Plans call for the soil collected from around the contaminated buildings to be processed through an on-site low thermal desorption unit. "We went out to bid for a low temperature thermal desorption unit and will evaluate and then award the bid before the end of September," explained Mannino. Before this phase of the remediation begins, a public meeting will be held in South Plainfield to explain the process.

Even though much has already been done to the site to return it to viable use as an industrial site, PCB contamination problems remain. According to Spiegel, a major problem is a spike in the measurement of PCB'spolychlorinated biphenyls-found in the waters of the Bound Brook.

"Measurements for PCB's were higher in 2007 than those taken in (Continued on page 12)

# **Junior Police Academy Graduates 25**

The South Plainfield Recreation Department's Junior Police Academy held its second of two week-long session on July 21. This is the fourth year that Police Officers Dave Franchak and Al LaMonda, along with other members of the department, have conducted the condensed version of real police academy training.

Cadets began the day with calisthenics and marching techniques.

Throughout the week specially trained officers shared their expertise in different fields of police work with the class. They learned first-hand about special weapons and unarmed tactics training, how to conduct a car stop and wore special "drunk goggles" to understand how the body reacts when someone has had too many alcoholic beverages.

Detective Vincent Campagna demonstrated fingerprinting techniques and a crime scene was staged to train cadets in detailed investigations.

Middlesex County Prosecutors Office Investigator Sgt. John Rodriguez gave a Powerpoint presentation on how gangs operate and their destructive activities.

The South Plainfield Volunteer Fire Department displayed their rescue training by demonstrating extraction techniques using an old car and gave a demonstration on fire detecting equipment.



# New Jersey Unveils New 511 Phone System

New Jersey Department of Transportation (NJDOT) Commissioner Kris Kolluri recently launched the state's new and improved 511 travel information telephone system. This service will help motorists save fuel, navigate New Jersey's roadways, reduce commuting times and minimize the impact of traffic incidents.

Motorists can now dial 511 for voice-activated telephone information regarding traffic, weather and construction. They can also request updated traffic information on highways, cities, or hot spots as well as information on EZ Pass.

"By using 511, motorists can make informed decisions about planning alternate routes and revising departure times. This improves the driver's trip and helps reduce congestion and improve safety," said Commissioner Kolluri.

Motorists who dial 511 will hear information about congestion, incidents or unusual delays on state highways, the New Jersey Turnpike and Garden State Parkway. The service provides motorists with real time traffic and travel information seven days a week, 365 days a year. Traffic and travel information on 511 is managed by a partnership of public agencies led by NJDOT, the New Jersey Turnpike Authority (NJTP), and the New Jersey State Police (NJSP). Traffic information is provided by a variety of sources including local law enforcement agencies, local fire departments and traffic monitoring devices such as traffic cameras and travel time sensors.

New Jersey recently opened a new, state-of-the-art Statewide Traffic Management Center that enables NJDOT, the NJTP and the NJSP to improve

management of and response to accidents, adverse weather, special events and congestion. Up to 40 staff members from all three agencies monitor and exchange video images from 420 traffic surveillance cameras located throughout the state on an 18 foot by 50 foot video wall.

NJDOT is offering motorists several other new services that use technology to provide traffic information. NJDOT recently launched a new realtime traffic Web site, www.NJ511.info, which offers interactive maps and displays traffic incidents. The Google maps-based Web site offers motorists real time traffic conditions on state highways, interstate highways, the Garden State Parkway and the New Jersey Turnpike. The Web site highlights incidents, construction, weather and special events. NJ511.info also includes an interactive traffic camera page.

NJDOT has also launched a personalized travel service, which sends free real-time road condition updates and alerts to motorists' cell phones, E-mail accounts and personal digital assistants.



(Continued from page) Midco Waste Systems, which does business in South Plainfield. Because of his non-vote, the override did not pass. When abstaining, Bengivenga said he wanted to wait and asked the Borough Attorney to research the matter and give a legal opinion.

The attorney has since said Bengivenga's vote would not be a conflict of interest. The weight restriction ordinances were introduced a second time, passed and then vetoed by Butico.

With the weight restrictions lifted, trucks can return to the boulevard immediately. However, Bengivenga said that trucks would not be allowed back on the boulevard until the safety issues submitted by Traffic Safety Officer Lt. Kevin Mutagh under the borough's control have been implement. He did not give any details on what safety issues would be done, but said the borough engineer is working on the plans.

The weight restrictions will need approval by the county, since the road is a county road. However, the state DOT can override the county's decision.

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

1997 when the EPA monitoring of the Bound Brook began. After the 1997 measurements were taken, the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection installed signs warning that fish caught in the waters of the Bound Brook, New Market Pond and Spring Lake Park should not be eaten. New signs will be going up and the fish will be tested as well," said Mannino.

To prevent problems in the future, Chapin called for the EPA to take actions involving physically removing the capacitors and providing an asphalt cap to prevent migration of contaminated sediment instead of going through a remediation process.

Chapin stated if the remedial process is initiated, the work won't be completed until 2034 and acceptable ground water goals are reached. "At the end of the day, there will still be a landfill there and over 50% of the PCB's will be left," Chapin said.

Mannino noted that stabilization technologies will be evaluated to stabilize the stream banks as part of the remedial process and funding provided for any additional work.
