

Crossing Guard Speaks Out for Safety of Kids

After viewing the photo of children crossing Hamilton Boulevard near the Board of Education building in the September 12 *Observer*, a crossing guard in the area felt compelled to speak out about the incident.

The crossing guard, who did not want to be identified for fear of being fired, complained about the "ongoing situation" with children crossing the busy boulevard on their own.

The crossing guard has worked for over 20 years in the area and has seen the number of children walking in the area grow during the past year. The guard explained that the courtesy bus dropping off middle and high school students arrives prior to post time at 2:45 p.m. Guard employer DMS Security of Jersey City said that they are aware of the problem, but due to insurance issues, guards are only covered during their assigned times. DMS also said that according to the South Plainfield Traffic Safety Department, "There is not enough money in the [borough] budget" to pay for more guards or more time.

The guard added that they did not get a raise this year saying, "If only they would let me get there 15 minutes earlier, I could cross those kids. The town is not thinking of the safety of the children."

The guard feels that complaints have fallen on deaf ears, and added that traffic safety has not returned calls.

The guard's daughter was struck by a car on Hamilton Boulevard when she was 15 years-old and explained, "I never want to see another (Continued on page 10)

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

Amanda Veinott Spends Fall Semester at Sea



A wise man once said, "When you find yourself in a hole, the first thing you ought to do is quit digging."



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


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
