Police Advise Residents on Safety

More than 300 residents attended the police department's crime prevention meeting at Roosevelt School on Monday evening. The meeting was held in response to an increase in home burglaries, the most serious being three home invasions which have occurred during the past few months, on Amboy Avenue, off Durham Avenue and most recently, 2nd Avenue. The program was held to raise awareness, answer questions and address the concerns of residents.

In addition to South Plainfield Police

Chief John Ferraro, the meeting was attended by police officers and detectives from the crime prevention bureau, Mayor Charles Butrico and members of the Borough Council and the Board of Education.

Chief Ferraro began by providing an update on the investigation of the home invasions, saying, "These incidents were unlike most past burglaries. We believe they were not random events. We believe these were targeted entries of people who owned busia beefed up detective unit and state and federal forensic help, as well as sharing information with neighboring communities to help solve these crimes. Following his update, Ferraro took questions from the audience.

To combat possible future crime activity, Ferraro urged residents to be on guard, and if they see anything

To combat possible future crime activity, Ferraro urged residents to be on guard, and if they see anything suspicious, to contact police. Residents were also encouraged to sign up for a home security inspection whereby police inspect homes and make suggestions on ways to burglar-proof their homes. It is free and open to all residents of South Plainfield. Residents were also reminded to keep their doors locked at all times, even when they are at home, and advised that they do not have to open their doors to anyone.

"It's important that everyone be informed," Ferraro told residents. "You are the eyes and cars for us. If you see a suspicious car, call us and pass the information on to us." He urged all to contact police by dialing 911 or the police non-emergency number, (908) 755-0700. Calling 911 from a home phone will dispatch someone to the location immediately, even if the caller hangs up. However if a call is made from a cell phone, the caller should give his/her exact location, because it may not always go directly to the South Plainfield dispatcher.

Councilman Matthew Anesh, chairman of the Borough Council Public Safety Committee noted, "We are looking at reinstating the Neighborhood Watch program (throughout the borough). I will be meeting with Congressman Lance and ask for additional funding for the police."

Mayor Charlie Butrico assured the public there will be no reduction in manpower, despite the budget crisis the borough is facing. The police department had two officers retire recently, but there is an officer attending the police academy who will be assigned to a patrol unit.

The program concluded with Lt. Charles Seidenberg demonstrating different hardware items on loan from Home Depot that could make a home more secure. To learn more about home security, you can Google "home safety" on your computer and download safety ips. 



Library Board Approves Move

The South Plainfield Library Board voted 6-1 to lease 14,000 sq. ft. of space at 901 Montrose Avenue.

Before the vote was taken, residents were given the opportunity to express their views on the move. Residents who spoke were split, some favoring the move and some opposed.

Mayor Charles Butrico asked the board to delay its vote, saying he would appoint a commission to see if they could find a better location. The board voted 6-1 not to delay a vote and then voted 6-1 to authorize the lease agreement.

The no vote was cast by board member Kathy Thomas, who is opposed to the move. Thomas agreed that a new library is needed, but felt the board should be spending its money on a new building, not on a lease.

The lease will run for 10 years and the library will pay \$275,000 towards the cost of the tenant fit-out.

Dear Editor.

As you may recall I previously wrote urging the library board to reconsider their recommendation to relocate the library to the industrial section of Montrose Avenue. I have noticed that several residents have also sent letters to the editor making the same request. Let me repeat that I have great respect for all of the volunteers who serve on the library board. I can relate to their frustration over the lack of a viable plan to replace the existing inadequate facility. However, the plan to rent space on Montrose Avenue is not the answer. I ask that the library board and the mayor and council immediately come to an understanding on the fol-

lowing items:
(1) The lease under consideration for Montrose Avenue should not be entered into at this time. The mayor and council should at its next meeting adopt a resolution opposing the lease arrange-ment. They should also take whatever action is available to them under state law to negate it if necessary. Hopefully

this action will not be necessary.

(2) A bipartisan committee should be appointed to seek input as to where a new library should be located. Input should also be given as to whether it is better to rent a facility or build one. A certain time should be set to. come up with proposals for consideration by our residents. I suggest no later than December 31 of this year.

(3) After recommendations are received another Democracy Day should be held to allow our residents to give their input on the best location.

(4) The mayor and council in co-

operation with the Board of Education should explore creating an after school program for older kids. One of the concerns of the library board involves young people hanging around the building after school. After they finish their homework they wait at the library for mom or dad to pick them up. It is my understanding that over \$20,000 was incurred last

year to offset the cost of having a po-lice officer present to maintain discipline. I propose that we reach out to the Rescue Squad about renting their meeting room for after school activities. A flat screen TV and video games could be placed there. Maybe a couple of basketball courts could be constructed on the park area behind the squad. It's a perfect location because it is next to the library and across the street from Spring Lake Park and connected by walkway to Veterans Park.

It's time to stop talking about the problems at the library and start doing something about them. I am sure that other residents have other recommendations. Hopefully this proposal will start the process to come up with a plan of action under which the library board, the mayor and council and most importantly our residents, work together to come up with a so-

Three Trapped in Overturned Car


