# Borough's Top Cop Retires

Police Chief John Ferraro will retire effective today after 28½ years of service to the borough. Ferraro, a 1976 SPHS graduate, spent his entire career as a police officer in South Plainfield.

Ferraro was sworn in December 1981. He attended Middlesex County Police Academy for six months and began his career as an of-ficer "on the road." Before he became chief in 2005, he served as a detective for several years, a position he says he found "rewarding." He was promoted to sergeant and then lieutenant of the bureau. He returned to the road for a short while and was promoted to captain of the detective bureau.

During his years on the police force, Ferraro also served as a career bias incident officer, police baton

"The most important thing in police work is to ensure that residents are always protected and to provide the best service possible without being oppressive," said Ferraro.

instructor, crisis negotiator, public information officer, press intelligence officer, undercover officer with Middlesex County Task Force and the Border Anti-Drug Task Force. He also worked several cooperative investigations with federal agencies

Over the years as a police officer and as chief, Ferraro has seen an increase in the use of technology used to combat crime. Police vehicles are now equipped with mobile data terminals and video recorders. The department

also has a forensic computer for matching fingerprints and performing DNA investigation. Ferraro maintains a portion of the police department budget for education and training programs for police officers.

The continuing need for a good and positive relationship with the public and to invite their help is Ferraro's approach to his job and mission-to provide safety and protection to everyone in South

He asked the public to report anything suspicious in their neighborhood during a home safety program held on March 8 to allay fears about recent home invasions occurring in the borough. Over 300 attended. (Continued on page 3)

# Dems Endorse English for Mayor, Williams and Sorrentino For Council

The South Plainfield Democratic Committee has unanimously endorsed Michael English as their candidate for mayor and Jeffrey Williams and John Sorrentino for council candidates in this November's election.

Michael English served as mayor from 1983 through 1986. He was twice elected to the borough council prior to his election as mayor. He has also served on the South Plainfield Board of Education, and was board president in 2005. English was a Social Studies teacher at St. Joseph's High School, Bridgewater-Raritan East and SPHS. He also served as South Plainfield Recreation director, spearheading the expansion of the PAL and restoration of the community pool facility. He presently is the chair of the

Social Studies Department at Hillel Yeshiva High School and is a CCD teacher for eighth grade candidates for confirmation at Sacred Heart Church. Former Mayor English has received a host of recognitions and honors. He and his wife Susan live at 123 Lee Place. They have two children, Shawn and Brian. Brian is married to the former Jenna Flakne; they have two children, Aidan and Bryce

Jeffrey Williams is a 2003 graduate of SPHS. He earned a bachelor of arts degree from High Point University where he was a dean's list student. He was a Presidential Award Recipient in 2003 and was named most valuable player in men's varsity track and field while at South Plainfield High. At college he was a five-time Southern Conference Track and Field Champion. He continues to compete in track and field events and was the USA Indoor National Club Champion.

Jeff is a minister and volunteer youth leader at the Upper Room Full Gospel Church. He is also the mayoral representative for the Housing and Community Development Committee and is a member of the Public Celebrations Committee. He lives (Continued on page 5)

# **BOE Elections, Budget Vote Next Tuesday**

On Tuesday, April 20 the South Plainfield Board of Education will ask residents to vote on the \$40,688,303 tax levy portion of a \$52,299,265 school budget for the fiscal year 2010-2011.

Governor Chris Christie's drastic cut-backs in education funding left the borough with an unanticipated 28% decrease in state aid. The board approved a budget with a 4% increase and new tax rate of 2.932 which result in a yearly increase of \$100.34 on the average home assessed at \$122,500. The increase also comes with the elimination of 16 teachers, 10 aides and secretaries, school resource officer, summer and adult high school programs, buildings and grounds director, computer technician, high school freshman sports, varsity winter track for boys and girls, competition cheerleading, swimming and fall weight training, team leaders at the

middle and high school, a reduction in program and course offerings and

There are three open seats on the Board of Education and only three candidates seeking election.

Incumbent BOE member Debbie Boyle has served for the past three years. Boyle is chair of shared services, personnel and employee contract ne-gotiations, is a delegate to N.J. School Boards Association Assembly, liaison to the borough council and the ad hoc truck committee, Quality Single Accountability Continuum (QUSAC) representative, Middle School PTO president and is a member of the borough's Public Celebrations Committee. Boyle was also instrumental in obtaining a Federal grant for security cameras. She has lived in the borough for 12 years with husband, Bob, who grew up in South Plainfield, and two (Continued on page 5)



#### Dear Editor.

Last week's letter about the school board budget by Debbie Boyle was dead on. I agree with most ofher points, and I'd like to add a few of my own.

Like Debbie, I disagreed with the budget's priorities. In fact, I voted for several reasons. Foremost was the effect on taxes. In this economy, people are losing their jobs and their homes. To raise taxes seven points may not seem like much to some, but for the one in 10 residents without jobs, it means a lot. It also means a lot to

our seniors on fixed incomes and families trying to make ends meet.

There were ways to bring the tax increase down, which I believe were disregarded. For instance, the budget should have included \$400,000 in savings from a new law requiring employees to contribute 1.5% of their salary towards health benefits. It did not. Including that amount, as well as cutting more in administration, would have yielded significant savings, without cutting any additional teachers or pro-

I also disagreed with the way the budget was presented and how questions were left unanswered. I was especially disappointed when people at tending the budget meeting were told by the administration that a defeated budget would result in 100 more job cuts, assuming the council reduced the tax rate to flat. This is inaccurate.

Right now, the tax rate is up about seven points. A tax point brings in about \$140,000 in revenue, which means reducing the tax rate to flat would require cutting about a million dollars. If you divide that million by 100, you get \$10,000. The average employee makes much more than

\$10,000. In fact, benefits alone average more than that. And again, there are places to cut that would not even require more staff reductions, so the whole premise is faulty.

People should be able make informed decisions whether to vote for or against the budget. Unfortunately, though, it's easy to be pushed into a decision that's not based on facts. Hopefully, that won't be the case. **BOB JONES**

We've got 10 times more phone calls coming in than we

had before," explained Ferraro. The increase in the number of calls was exactly the result he sought.

"You are the eyes and ears for us. If you see a suspicious car or person in your neighborhood, call us and some-one will respond," Ferraro told residents at the program.

"No matter what rank you achieve in your career, you can't forget where you came from-you are always a patrolman. The most important thing in police work is to ensure that residents are always protected and to pro-

vide the best service possible without being oppressive," said Ferraro. He also advocates 'educating stu-dents. Ferraro is a strong proponent of the D.A.R.E. program, and instituted the school resource officer at the schools. He let high school students experience what it is like to "drive while drunk" through utilization of special glasses to distort sense of balance. Most recently, in conjunction with Super-intendent of Schools Jose Negron and Somerset Medical Center, he began a program for high school students to instruct them in CPR. Ferraro credits Negron for his enthusiasm and efforts "in getting the program off the ground." Somerset Medical Center sent instructors to certify the physical education and health teachers who, in turn, taught the juniors and seniors the technique. CPR is now an ongoing program because the teachers are

"Now when students graduate they will all be able to be prepared to perform CPR, our main goal. Each year there will be nearly 300 students trained and ready to assist in a medical emergency," said Ferraro.

A believer in police getting out of their cars and making contact with residents, Ferraro always tries to make himself available to the public. He is in the audience during most borough council meetings, where residents can talk to him informally.

"He's been the chief since I've been mayor," said Mayor Charles Butrico. "I think he's done a good job. It's a tough job and he's balanced it well. He's really shown a great reception for the people in town as far as his being available for anything. Any kind of question people have, he will spend time and deal with those issues. He tells me all the time, 'call me.' People can reach out to the chief and he will respond."

Although he has had job offers, Ferraro would like to bring a chapter of Habitat for Humanity to South Plainfield to build houses or do repairs with the organization.


