# Council Cuts \$1.25M From BOE Budget

The Borough Council voted unanimously on a resolution approving a reduction of \$1.25M in the tax levy as a result of the defeated school budget, along with an addendum recommending further reductions totaling \$725,000, at a special meeting held

The \$53M school budget was overwhelmingly defeated in the April 20 school elections by a vote of 2,096 to 1,398. When a school budget is defeated, the council has the authority to recommend reductions in expenses and the board can either approve the cuts or appeal them.

The recommended cuts include \$250,000 in savings due to a change in insurance carriers, \$375,000 in anticipation of the newly enacted law requiring a 1.5% employee contribution toward health care coverage and a decrease in budgeted raises which would affect every employee in the dis-

trict, including the superintendent.

The last suggestion would mean reopening talks with the unions. Mayor Charles Butrico emphasized that the council is not recommending a wage freeze, but a reduced percentage of their increases. Rusnak stressed that none of the proposed recommendations would jeopardize teachers' positions nor district programs.

# Council Waives Fees for Non-Profit, Encourages PBA to Follow Suit

The Borough Council voted unanimously on Monday to waive the police vehicle and administrative security service fees for Our Lady of Czestochowa's (OLC) Feast of St. Anthony scheduled for next month. Additionally, the council voted in favor of asking members of the police department to agree to a reduction in the hourly rate for off-duty security services for the event. Both are effective for this year only.

The rate of pay for an off-duty police is calculated at 1½ times the compensation rate presently payable to a Class B patrolman (\$62). An administrative fee of \$5, or \$2 for non-profit organizations, is added on by the borough. A

\$15 per hour fee is also charged for the

use of a patrol vehicle.

OLC Finance Committeeman Frank Mikorski has been asking the council for many months for a reduction in the hourly rate for police security or a waiver of the fees for the feast. Mikorski, along with other OLC parishioners, met with the borough's PBA officials asking them to "meet them halfway." Mikorski said, "They weren't in a position to change." The church paid police security roughly \$11,000 from the total income from last year's feast. "This is an issue whose time has come," said Mikorski,

# South Plainfield Man Indicted in Labor Day Attack

A South Plainfield man has been indicted by the Middlesex County grand jury on charges stemming from the attack of a borough employee, whose neck was cut on Labor Day.

Anthony K. Cole, 24, of Woolworth Avenue in South Plainfield, was charged with attempted murder, unlawful possession of a weapon, possession of a weapon for an unlawful purpose and hindering his apprehension or prosecution. A separate indictment charged Cole with a count of certain persons not to have weapons.

The grand jury handed up the charges on April 21 following a pre-sentation by Middlesex County Assistant Prosecutor Christopher Kuberiet, who oversees the Middlesex County Gangs, Guns and Drugs Task Force in the prosecutor's office.


The panel reviewed the case follow-

ing an investigation by members of the South Plainfield Police Department, who determined that Cole approached David Donatelli, 53, from behind and cut his neck with a knife on September 7, 2009, at Spring Lake Park.

Donatelli, who is employed by the borough's public works department, was shutting off park lights at the end of the borough's Labor Day celebration when he was attacked shortly before 8:48 p.m.

Donatelli was taken to JFK Medical Center in Edison, where he was treated. An on-going investigation by South Plainfield Police led to the ar-

rest of Cole on December 16, 2009. As is the case with all criminal defendants, Cole is presumed innocent until proven guilty



# Council Cuts \$1.25M From BOE Budget

(Continued from page 1) shortly after voters defeated the BOE budget. The council hired the auditing firm of Suplee Clooney to identify possible areas in the budget that could be cut in the event the budget was defeated. CFO Glenn Cullen, members of the finance committee, headed by Councilman Ray Rusnak, began by sending a letter to Superintendent Jose Negron and members of the school board asking nine questions. "Based on the information they gave to us, we felt we could cut the budget," explained Rusnak.

After receiving answers to the nine questions and with the help of the

auditors, the finance committee along with Mayor Charles Butrico and Cullen began meeting to discuss what areas of the budget they would recommend cuts. Superintendent Negron, Business Administrator Richard Guarini and Board President Jim Giannakis were invited and attended some meetings with the finance board. At Monday's meeting, BOE member Debbie Boyle said she had not been informed of the budget meetings even though she had asked to be included.

The council added an addendum to the proposed budget cuts suggesting that the Board of Education take money from three reserve/surplus accounts totaling \$725,000 and use the money to either restore the adult high school program, extra curricular activities/sports, six teachers, a safety resource officer and building and grounds director; or to restore 15 teachers, plus the safety resource officer or building and grounds director. The addendum was only a recommendation and not part of the resolution to cut \$1.25M.

If the board approves the recom-mended cuts, there will be a slight de-crease in the school tax levy. A resident with a home assessed at \$122,500 will see a total decrease of \$84.52 in their calendar year taxes.

Did you know that May is National PKU Awareness Month? Do you know what PKU is? For approximately 300 individuals in New Jersey, their diet consists mostly of carbohy-drates, some fruits and vegetables, a "special" milk, and almost no protein. Why? Because they have PKU or phenylketonuria. Phenylketonuria is a rare, inherited metabolic disorder in which individuals with the disease are born without an enzyme necessary for processing a part of protein (phenylalanine, aka phe). The only effective treatment is for individuals to adhere to a strict, low protein diet for life, which consists mostly of carbohydrates, fruits and vegetables and special low protein medical foods. There is no cure.

People with PKU also cannot have NutraSweet (aspartame), since it con-

tains mostly phenylalanine. Franklin School third grader Ryan Purcell; Kennedy School fourth grader Noah Cabrera; Kennedy School first grader Evan Cabrera and Future Stars pre-schooler Leah Cabrera all happen to have PKU. Their goal is to raise PKU awareness and funds for research so that maybe one day they will be able to eat more "normal" foods.
